# Near Record Turn-Out For SABA/SAWBA Workshop

League Presidents, Secretaries and interested bowlers came out in near-record numbers for the four League Officers Workshops held this week - two on the northside, two on the southside.

Both association secretaries, Bob Martin of SABA and Louise Mangelsdorf of SAWBA, expressed their pleasure at the large turnout which should assure smoother running leagues in the coming season.

Few rules changes affecting leagues came from Bowling Headquarters, but concern was expressed by both regarding declining membership.

One of the major changes

this year is there will be no playing rules booklets available to all league members. Those will be provided only to league Presidents and Secretaries.

Men's sanction cards this season will cost \$7, with the ladies cards \$6, both of which should be completed and turned into the league secretaries prior to the completion of the first series in league competition. Pre-printed membership applications for members the past season are distributed with league supplies and secretaries are used to use these, with blank cards used for new members, in league leagues. For the men: the association has a new computer and all male bowlers are to complete application cards to begin the new files.

League officials were cautioned to "watch the money". According to Martin missing funds from local leagues represented a \$50,000 loss. "Select your league officers carefully, and ask questions about league funds. If there is a question, go to the President or call the association office," Martin warned.

"One of the reasons we are losing members is because our league rules are not properly formed. Be

careful about your rules - streamline them - and make certain that they work for all bowlers."

"Remember that both SABA and SAWBA are service organizations and service means giving the awards to which a bowler is entitled. SABA is now self-processing so turn around time for award applications is about five days. Make certain that your members receive all the awards to which they are entitled."

There's much area on the agenda for local bowlers: the Bowlers Picnic, sponsored by the two

associations, YABA, and the Bowling Council, is scheduled for Saturday, September 10th at Comanche Park No. 2 and tickets are available at all lanes.

The Open Membership Meeting for SAWBA is slated for the following day (September 11) at Highland Park Presbyterian Church (851 Hammond), and all SAWBA members are encouraged to attend to learn more about what's ahead as SAWBA bids for the WIBC meeting in 1993. At that meeting too the ladies will be naming their Superior Performance award winner as well as

taking care of other SAWBA business.

Part of that business is the local tournament, set for the first three weekends in November at Wonder Bowl and Country Lanes, and entry forms are available now at all centers.

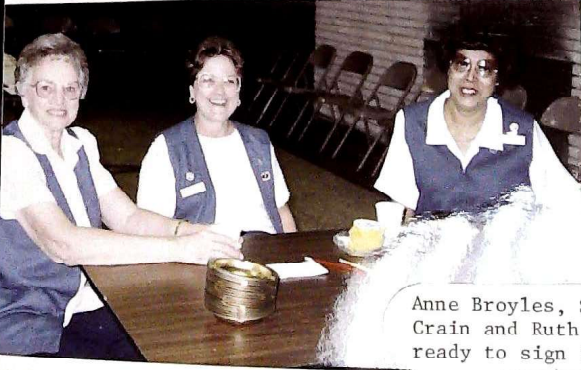
SABA will be making plans too for hosting the Texas State Bowling Assn. Championship Tournament in 1990.

## Packed House & Fun At TWBA Banquet Of Champions

When TWBA honors their Tournament Champions it is an event for members!

Almost three individual champions were not in attendance at the Banquet of Champions Saturday evening at the Holiday Inn Airport - and the evening was just perfect for those winning one (or two) of the magnificent trophies from Browning's Trophies (Garland) and enjoying the magnificent dinner.

The program was brief but each champion was treated to special words of praise for their achievements from emcees Beverly McLendon, Houston, and Sue Hunter, Alamo, who received winning stories and outstanding bowling feats during the 17 weekend run of the 1988 event at World of Sports and Astro Bowling Center.

Joining in the applause for the champs were the president and secretary of the State Men's Association, Ted Burns, Fort Worth and Jimmy Cline, Austin, as well as Lois Cathey, president of the State Proprietors and State Bowling Council. Special recognition was given to the SAWBA Board members in attendance, and numerous TWBA officials, such as past secretary, Life Member and Hall of Famer-Helen Baetz.

But the 'Magic of Music' was dimmed a bit when it was learned that State Champion Kathy Kirst could not attend the gala evening. She is recovering from facial surgery performed just days before the banquet. Kathy's state awards will be presented by Sylvia Broyles at the SAWBA Open Meeting Sept 11th. Sylvia's disappointment was evident as she made the announcement, her voice trembling and tears in her eyes.

In absentia, Kathy

received warm applause for her winning 1875 total in Div. 1 Singles, as well as applause for winning Div. 1 Doubles with partner Laurie Jo Scales.

Two other local ladies were recognized as Betty Roberts' 658 series in Div. 3 Singles withstood the shooting of all the other Texans in the class, and Casandra "Cass" Harris, a delightful mother of five, who won first in Div. 3 All Events the first time she rolled in the state competition.

The Championships in San Antonio was another milestone in the career of State Secretary Broyles. After serving many years as tournament office manager, the 1988 event was her debut as Tournament Manager. It was also a first for TWBA as all tournament scores were put into the computer for the first time.

Prize checks from the 17-weekend event went into the mails on Monday from the TWBA office at Spring Branch. Hundreds of Texas women bowlers will share in the fund which totalled more than \$200,000.

Before the evening came to an end Champions were reminded that the 1989 TWBA Championships are in El Paso, with special directions on this year's entry forms for team captains and delegates wishing to bowl convention weekend.

All 1988 Champions were alerted with the traditional champagne toast by Secretary Broyles and TWBA President Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls.

Members of the TWBA Awards Banquet committee were McLendon, and Hunter with Tip Pfeiffer, Barbara Wingfield and Millie Wood, plus president and secretary, ex officio.

Several SAWBA Board members took the role of the Red Carpet Committee and greeted the 1988 WIBC Site Committee Wednesday. The Committee, Mrs. Lo Borschuk of Sioux City, IA and Mrs. Beverly McLendon, Houston, are in the city until Tuesday studying all the facilities and attractions San Antonio has to offer to the women bowlers of the world. SAWBA has extended its bid to host the 1993 WIBC Annual Meeting and Championship Tournament. SAWBA President Ella

O'Quinn and Secretary Louise Mangelsdorf will accompany the Committee, with a representative, Patsy Vaughn, of the Convention & Visitors Bureau during the tour of facilities.

A special SAWBA Board Meeting was held last night at the Wyndham Hotel with the Committee. In attendance too were TWBA officials - Sylvia Broyles, State secretary, Austin's President and Secretary, Barbara Wingfield and Pat Smitherman, Edna Turnbo, now residing in Bandera.

Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi and of course San Antonio's TWBA board member, Tip Pfeiffer. That group of dignitaries will also be joined by Mrs. Helen Baetz, past TWBA secretary, Life Member and Hall of Famer, plus San Antonio's Life Member Madelyn Spreng and Member Emeritus, Clara Grimes.

Throughout the first two days of the Committee's visit, downtown hotels interested in serving as host hotels were visited, as well as the Convention Center and Municipal Auditorium.

Bowling centers interested in serving as hosts will be visited throughout the day on Saturday and Sunday.

The Committee's findings will be reported to the WIBC Board of Directors at its midseason meeting in November. If approved, San Antonio will present a formal invitation to the 1989 WIBC annual meeting delegation in Bismarck/Mandan, N.D.

The Baton Rouge, La., and Salt Lake City, Utah WBAs are also seeking the 1993 event -- projected to deposit \$16-\$20 million into the host city's economy over its 60-day run.

The WIBC Championship Tournament is the world's largest sporting event for women. It has averaged 45,000 entrants annually over the past 15 years, with more than 3,500 delegates attending the Annual Meeting.

Upcoming sites include Bismarck/Mandan in 1989, moving to Tampa, Fla., in 1990, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1991 and Lansing, Michigan in 1992.

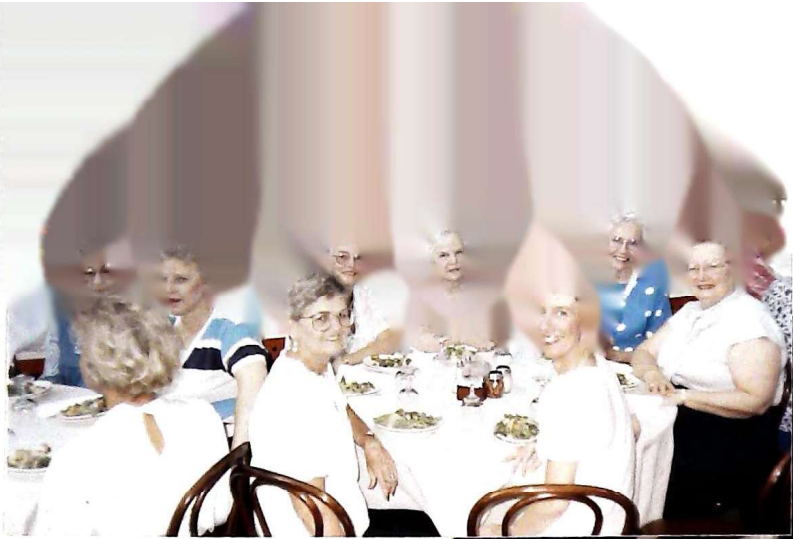

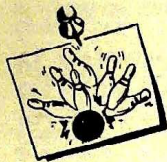

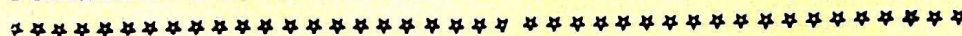

## ARE YOU A GOOD LEAGUE SECRETARY?

A good league secretary has many important duties. She should have the time and interest for the job, a working knowledge of WIBC rules, and know where to obtain answers to questions league members may have from time to time. Much of this information can be gained by attending the League Officers Workshop sponsored by the local men's and women's bowling associations each fall. She can also receive all the supplies needed to put the league in operation.

A secretary's job begins the moment she is elected at the end of the league season. At that time a roster of returning members should be made to point out vacancies that will have to be filled during the off season.

The first day of the new season is a busy time. Remember, membership applications must be filled out and paid for by each bowler before the completion of his/her first series in league competition. These cards, along with the league sanction application should be forwarded to the local association offices within 30 days of the time the league starts. Remember also, to include the membership dues.

A secretary is also responsible for keeping accurate records of scores and averages of every bowler in her league, and posting a weekly standing sheet. Her records should always be up-to-date, and available to any league member is questions should arise.

The local association office provides secretaries with information about tournaments, meetings, workshops, and other events taking place during the season. Please pass this information on to the bowlers!!! WIBC provides the WOMAN BOWLER magazine; share this publication, also.

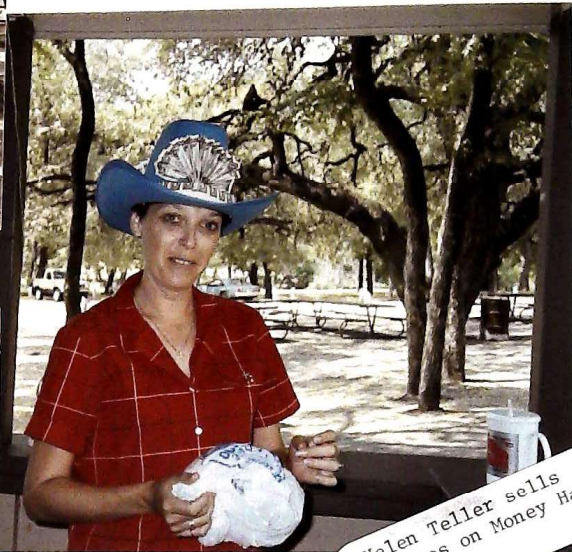

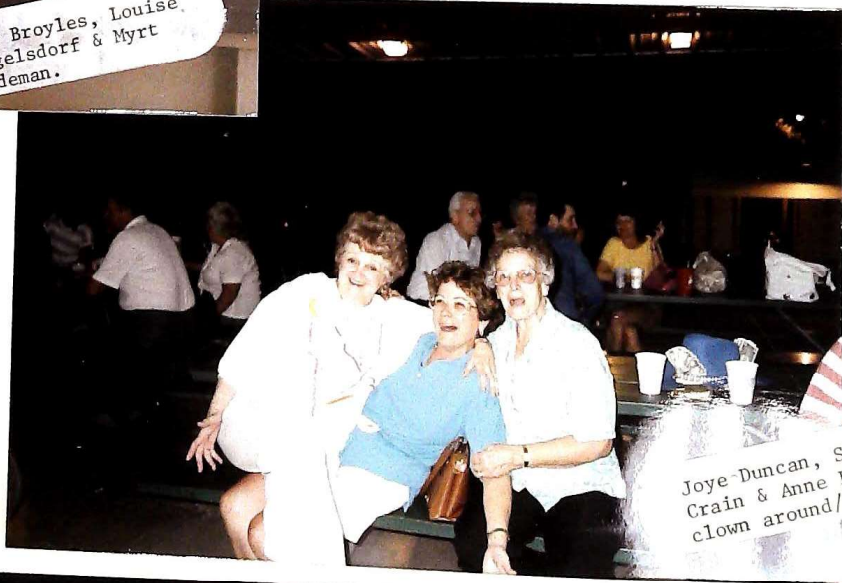

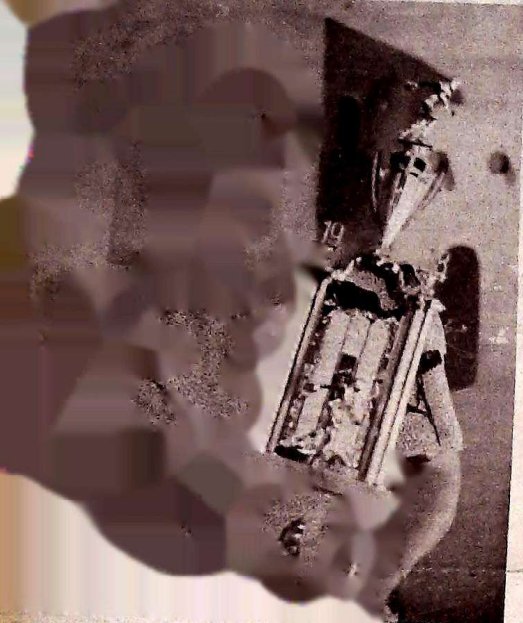

# SAWBA Board Begins League Visitation At All Centers

SAWBA League Visitation begins Saturday at all centers throughout the city.

League Visitation is the time SAWBA Directors attempt to visit each all-women's and mixed league in the city, generating entries for the 51st SAWBA Local Championship Tournament.

All centers have the attractive pink entry forms now and the Championships will roll the first three weekends in November.

Host centers this year are Wonder Bowl for team event, and Country Lanes for singles and doubles - and the entry fee is a nominal \$10 per entry per event. Optional all events is just one dollar, and those who include that fee with their entry are eligible for the all events prize fund.

While the ladies are bowling their team event, they also have a chance to earn additional cash in the Instant Cash feature by stringing strikes - a payoff different in each class - or by converting pesky splits which may jump up. Consecutive strike payoffs range from \$1.00 to \$100 -- and SAWBA is still awaiting their first tournament perfect game.

Over and above the considerable payoff for tournament competition (considerable each year), at Country Lanes there's also the opportunity to pay a \$1.00 special fee and be part of the National Bowling Hall of Fame feature. 50¢ goes to the prize fund for the lady rolling most pins over average the second game, and 50¢ will be donated to the NBHF/M as SAWBA's method of supporting this worthwhile venture.

There is a place for any lady who wants to be part of the excitement of SAWBA Local Championship Tournament play. There are two squads on all three weekends at 12 noon and 3:30 p.m. for team doubles and singles and two on Sundays at the same time, also all three weekends.

For five-woman team event there are two squads (12 noon and 3 p.m.) on all Saturdays and Sundays during the three-weekend run. In addition for those who cannot bowl on weekends, there are two special squads - Friday, November 11 at 12 noon for team event; and Monday, November 14 for singles and doubles, also at 12 noon.

By payment of an

additional \$5.00 fee ladies may also attempt to become a part of the TEAM USA national team. Fee must be paid prior to the bowling of the lady's first event.

All ladies will be receiving handicap - 80% from the highest average in each class. Class A will receive handicap from the following scratch figures: Team event from 1000, doubles from 400 and singles from 200. All other classes will be handicapped from the top of their respective categories and once again there are four classes.

Team captains should be aware that in team event a member may bowl as often as she wishes, however, not more than three players on one team may place more than once in the prize list for position standings.

In doubles and singles ladies may enter only once and bowlers entering doubles must also enter singles, and vice versa. First scores in the tournament will count toward all events placings.

In most cases yearbook averages will be used, but there are provisions for those who bowled only in the summer leagues or new

members within the association.

So, say "YES" when your center director of Service Representatives visit your league.

Although this is just the first step toward generating entries, reserved entry date is October 6 with full fees and completed entry forms in the SAWBA office by that date. Final entry deadline is Thursday, October 20, but please don't wait until then to get your entries completed!

SAWBA Local Tournament time is the most exciting three weekends of the year -- don't be left out!

The property had been known by three different names during its short life. First it was Thunder Bowl, then River City Lanes, then Celebrity. But Matye and

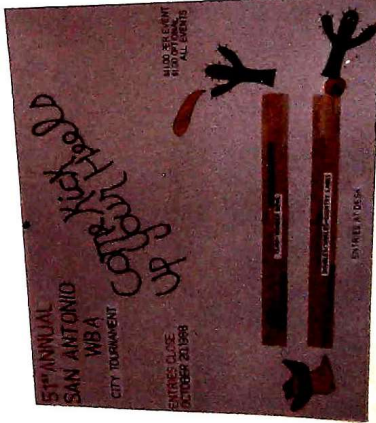

(Complete tournament rules may be found in each bowling establishment)

This tournament shall be governed by the provisions of Chapter IX of the WIBC bylaws pertaining to Local Championship Tournament.

- ELIGIBILITY:** Entry will be open to members of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association. Members of other associations who bowl in leagues sanctioned through this association may enter, but participation shall be confined to the team event with the team of which the bowler is a regular member. Every entrant must be a member of WIBC.
- TEAM EVENT:** A member may bowl as often as she wishes in team event; however, not more than three players on one team can place more than once in the prize list for position standings.
- DOUBLES AND SINGLES:** Doubles and Singles may only be entered once. Bowlers entering Doubles must also enter Singles, and vice versa.
- ALL EVENTS:** All events are automatically entered without fee when bowler enters team, doubles, and singles; however, only those paying the optional all events fee shall be eligible for prize money in all events. Paid All-Events are not transferable unless substitute replaces original entrant in all three events and the transfer is made by the tournament manager or her assistants prior to substitute's participation in any event.
- When a bowler bowls in team event more than once, her first team score shall count toward her all events score.**
- HANDICAP:** Handicap to be 80% from the highest in each division. Division 1 will receive 80% handicap from the following scratch figures: Team event from 1000; Doubles Event from 400; Singles Event from 200. All other divisions will be handicapped from the top of their respective categories. There will be four divisions.
- TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONS:**
  - In this tournament the scratch score winners in each event shall be the **CHAMPIONS** and the highest all-events scratch score, regardless of division shall be declared and acclaimed the **LOCAL CHAMPION**.
  - In this tournament, the handicap score winners in each event shall be the **HANDICAP CHAMPIONS** and the highest all-events handicap score, regardless of division shall be declared and acclaimed the **LOCAL HANDICAP CHAMPION**. The handicap shall be based on 80% difference of 200.
- TOURNAMENT AVERAGE:**
  - Entrants will use their highest WIBC sanctioned average of 21 or more games taken from previous winter leagues or as of mid-night, May 1st as listed in the year book. Entering averages is subject to change if participant bowled in any league which did not submit averages, providing final average sheet is on file in the SAWBA office prior to distribution of prizes.
  - If no previous winter season average, an entrant shall use her highest WIBC sanctioned league average as of the end of the previous summer season, provided she has bowled 21 games or more.
  - If no previous winter or summer league average has been established, an entrant shall use her highest current WIBC sanctioned league average of nine (9) games or more as of closing date of entry (Thursday, October 20, 1988)
  - Entrants not having an average as specified in either a, b, or c, will use her highest average for nine (9) or more games as of date of participation.
- Participants must check in 45 minutes before scheduled time of events and **MUST SHOW WIBC CARD** upon checking in. Replacements may be allowed for just cause in any event upon notification to the Local Secretary at least one (1) hour before squad time.
- Substitutes will not be required to reimburse the original entrant with the entry fee paid nor shall she be expected to give the original entrant any prize money or trophy she (the substitute) may win.
- Scorekeeper will be furnished by the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association.
- Any player or team arriving late shall begin play with the score counting beginning with the frame then being bowled. No frames may be made up. No absentee average at any time is permissible in tournament play.
- Entry fee must accompany entry form. **RESERVATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED BY TELEPHONE** but will be forfeited unless all fees are in the hands of the Secretary by Thursday, October 6, 1988.
- Members are requested to wear suitable attire when appearing in the Local Tournament. **SHORTS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED.**
- A prize list of winners will be posted in each bowling establishment ten days after the close of the tournament. **ONE WEEK** will be allowed for protest of the winners prize list. After that time prizes shall be paid according to the posted list.

## WIBC Gives SAWBA Nod To Pursue Bid For 1993!!

SAWBA officials know just exactly how young children feel while waiting the arrival of Old St. Nick at Christmas.

Wednesday was the final day of the WIBC Board Meeting and on the agenda was the vote to approve the bids of San Antonio, Baton Rouge and Salt Lake City to hostess the 1993 WIBC Annual Meeting and Championship Tournament.

The hands of the clock moved interminably slowly throughout the day. In fact, they seemed not to move at

all as minutes, seconds and hours passed.

Then came the call! at 4:56 p.m. "Hi, Ella, This is Flora Mitchell from WIBC. I guess you've been waiting for my call"--and that must be the world's greatest understatement!

"The Board Meeting has been adjourned and it's my pleasure to tell you that San Antonio has been approved to pursue the bid for 1993."

Anxiously we asked if the other bidding cities, known to also be inviting WIBC to their cities, had been

approved. "Yes," Miss Mitchell advised, "WIBC is fortunate to have three outstanding cities wanting us to visit them."

With that short telephone call the final barrier came tumbling down, and SAWBA's two year wait was over.

The official bid presentation included support from the local bowling center proprietors, the City of San Antonio with a warm letter from Mayor Cisneros, the local men's bowling association, and a magnificent pictorial presentation from the Convention &

Visitors Bureau, together with information on Sea World of Texas.

Final decision as to the 1993 site, will of course, be made by the nearly 3500 delegates attending the WIBC Annual Meeting next may in Bismarck-Mandan, North Dakota.

The 1993 WIBC is expected to bring in excess of 70,000 visitors to the Alamo City during the three-month run of the tournament, and should mean more than \$24-\$35 million dollars to local merchants.

In order to tell the San Antonio story to the WIBC delegates, SAWBA will be having a Hospitality Room at Headquarters hotel in Bismarck, using a theme of "Let's Fiesta, Y'all" complete with bright Texas Sunshine Yellow costumes.

The first step in defraying the cost of the Hospitality Room, is of course the SAWBA Big Draw fund raiser, set for Saturday, December 10 at Knights of Columbus Hall of 5763 Ray ellison Drive.

SAWBA officials, have tickets available now, but only 300 will be sold, allowing just 600 to attend the Big Draw party. Tickets are priced at \$100 per couple, and include live music by the Shinin Pride

High series belongs to Robin Laughlin who used a high game of 227 to post the top tally of 621.

Action continues today with one team squad at 12 noon, and a special daytime squad on Monday (singles and doubles) with four more shifts of the tournament on Saturday and Sunday, beginning at 12 noon.

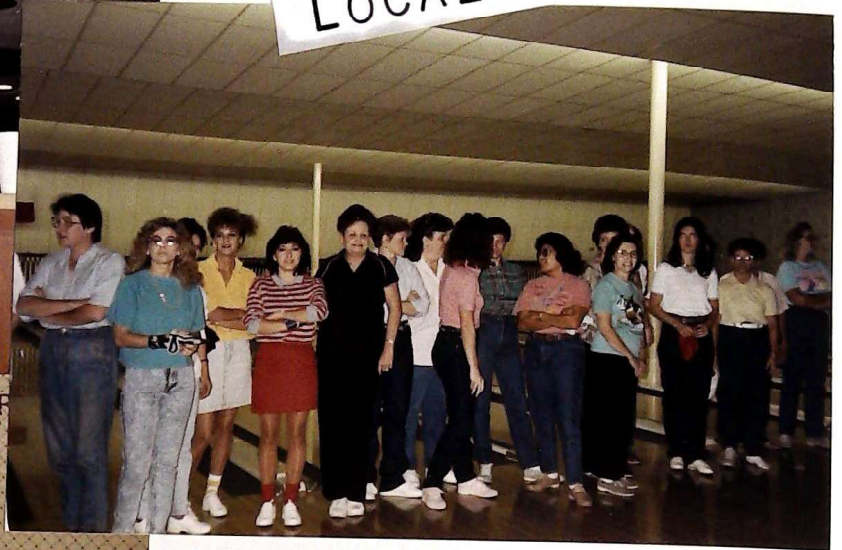

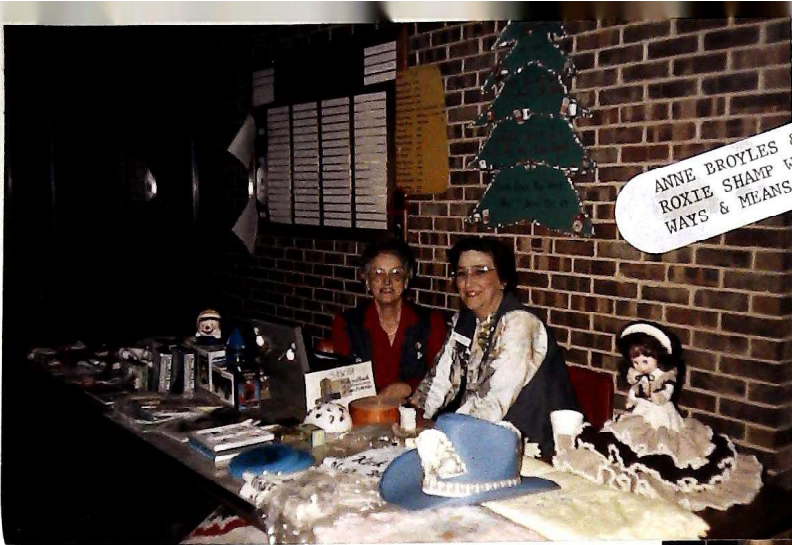

# Nell Sadler Is SAWBA Scratch All Events Champ !! Carol Opperman Takes Handicap Title & New Record !

With series of 714, 599 and 606 scratch, Nellwyn "Nell" Sadler, the TCBA "Woman Bowler of the Year", annexed the SAWBA Championship Tournament title to her growing list of honors.

The hard-chunking righthander posted a scratch 1919, while rolling off a 201 yearbook average in the Championships. She set the new record for Div. 1 Team also, and placed in third in handicap all events. Additionally, her 714 series for the Splatt-Blasters team is the tournament high series. For her nine games, Nell averaged 213.2.

## Teen athlete gains recognition from Special Olympics

Kimberly Gearhart was bowled over by the news.

The 15-year-old Judson High School student was chosen to represent Texas in the Special Olympics International Athlete of the Year competition. While friends and family - she is the daughter of Linda Gearhart of Universal City - were delighted with the teen's honor, "I was surprised," she admitted.

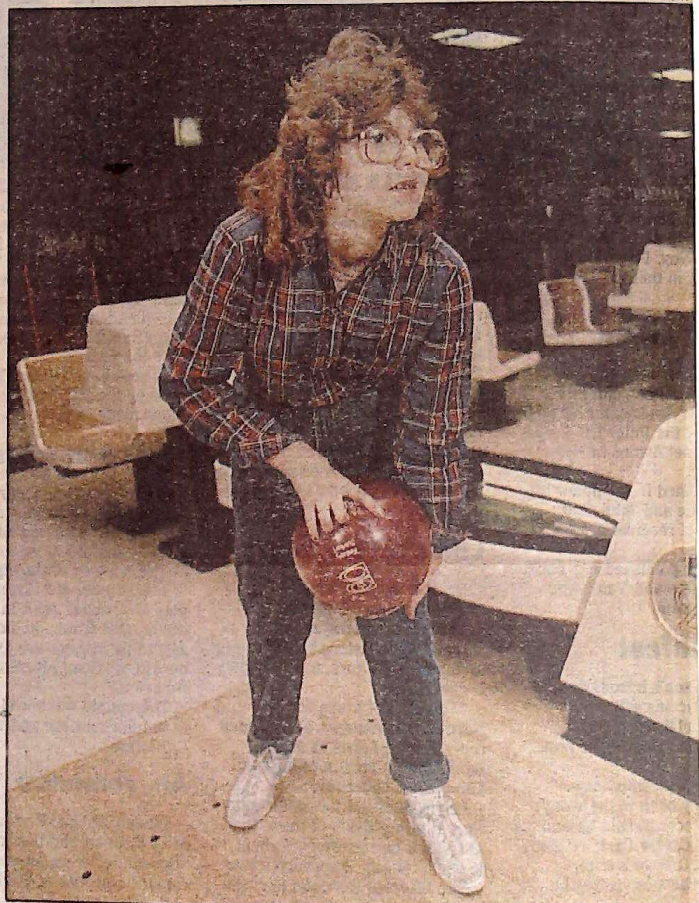
That she can compete at all was the first surprise.

When Kimberly was 5, doctors said she would never walk. Her mother said the youngster's list of medical problems was staggering. "She had a lot of illnesses with high fevers that caused damage." She has suffered from asphyxia resulting in spastic cerebral palsy, asthma, hypoglycemia, a bicuspid aortic valve and tendency toward heat exhaustion, and other medical maladies.

Yet lots of physical therapy and the support of family and friends have had a major impact. She's become a plucky competitor, inspiring her friends and her fellow Special Olympians with her dedication and spirit.

As Texas' nominee, Kimberly was judged with athletes from all 50 states and 70 countries. Judges considered local, area, state and international events to determine the winner. Last weekend the 1988 Athletics Congress National Convention met in Phoenix and selected Larry Swanger of Oregon as the international athlete of the year. But Kim's a winner too, according to her coach, Sue Rudlosky.

The head coach for the Judson School District's Special Olympics program, Rudlosky said, "Kim represented the state and the choice was made on performance, sportsmanship and community involvement with Special Olympics.

# SAN ANTONIO WOMEN'S BOWLING ASSOCIATION, INC.



## F A C T S H E E T

### WHO:

The San Antonio Women's Bowling Association, Inc., a non-profit membership organization of women bowlers across the City of San Antonio, has the desire to become hostesses to the national tournament and annual meeting of other women bowlers from across the world in 1993.

The Women's International Bowling Congress, over 4 million strong, is the governing body of women's bowling. WIBC is the largest sports organization in the world for women. It was formed in 1916 to set rules, promote and standardize the game of American tenpins.

### WHAT:

The Championship Tournament of WIBC is held annually during the months of April, May and into the middle of June/July. Bowling is continuous throughout those months from 8 a.m. until midnight.

Annual Meeting: The 3rd/4th weekends, more than 3,600 delegates from over 2,800 bowling associations across the world come to the Tournament City. The total influx during this period alone is approximately 10,000 people.

Other events held during the hosting of WIBC are the Women's Inter-Collegiate Tournament and the WIBC Queens Tournament, which features the top names in women's bowling, bringing additional visitors to the hostess city.

### WHEN:

The dates selected for 1993 are May 2, 3, 4 and 5 for the annual meeting, although the tournament itself would open early in April.

### WHERE:

Two or more bowling centers, one with at least 32 lanes and the other with 48 lanes or more are required - and San Antonio has more than adequate facilities.

Annual Meeting: Required is a facility with good acoustics that comfortably seat at least 3,600 delegates and an additional 1,600 guests. A 'headquarters hotel' near the convention meeting space which can provide a large portion of the 2,000 rooms needed for delegates - with preparation for 10,000 visitors to the city during the convention. For the tournament itself: at least 4-600 rooms daily for contestants during the time WIBC is in the city.

### NUMBERS TELL THE STORY:

Upwards of 80,000 people would visit the city. The tournament could mean more than \$24-\$30,000,000 for merchants. Surveys of past tournament cities show that the average lady WIBC Tournament attendee spends approximately \$400 while in the hostess city. Conservative estimates: \$88 lodging; \$86 food; \$55 entertainment; \$51 souvenirs and gifts; \$40 department stores and \$46 miscellaneous. During the tournament 600-800 women arrive every day; each staying 3-4 days, many bringing their families with them. 61% will arrive by plane; 33% by automobile and 6% traveling by recreational vehicle, bus or train.
