ITEMS COMPLETED TO DATE:

An invitation to host the WIBC Annual Meeting and Championship Tournament requires a formal invitation from both the local Women's Bowling Association and the City Government/Convention Bureau be on file with the WIBC Executive Secretary dated no later than July 1, five years prior to the year for which the invitation is being submitted

++ COMPLETED ++

The local association membership has agreed to issue that formal invitation and to furnish hundreds of people to assist in the operation of the tournament. Support from the local men's bowling association and the local bowling proprietors association is also assured.

++ COMPLETED ++

The San Antonio Convention & Visitors Bureau has provided a detailed proposal to cover every aspect of the meeting and sleeping room facilities for WIBC's annual meeting. A 'hold' has been placed on the desired dates at the Municipal Auditorium.

++COMPLETED++

The financial obligation the city must consider is at least a \$125,000 contribution to WIBC. The contribution will serve as a portion of the cost of promoting the tournament and for the operation of the annual meeting. The letter of commitment for financial participation must include the terms and conditions under which such commitment is to be paid to the WIBC, and specify that the required facilities will be complimentary.

++ COMPLETED ++

WHAT IS NEEDED:

Bidding and approval of our city will take place in Bismarck, North Dakota in May of 1989. Approximately 4,000 delegates will decide the fate of this tournament for 1993.

Hospitality areas, delegates' gifts, food, fun and entertainment are an integral part of this bidding process. The expense for providing these services for a four-day period is approximately \$45,000. The bowling community, through various fund raising events, has accumulated about one-third of the needed dollars.

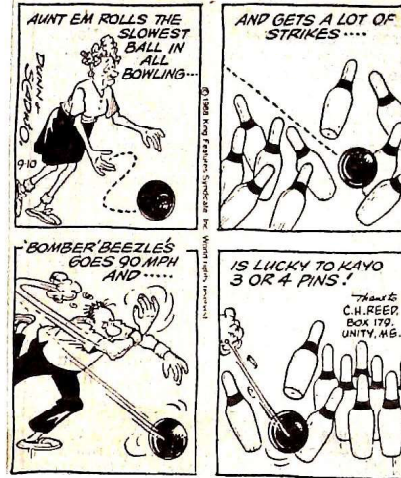

The baby was born Tuesday in New York, checking in at 7 lbs 10 oz and friends and family will be calling him Jason.

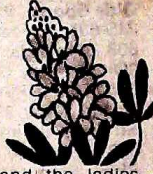

TWBA 20th Bluebonnet Queens To Roll This Weekend At Abilene

12 Local Ladies To Compete



It doesn't seem possible that it was just a year ago that Linda Urbanek, Humble, staged such a sensational showing in the TWBA Bluebonnet Queens Tournament, losing her final match to Houston's Donna Connors, but averaging 220 scratch for her ten game in the finals. But it has indeed been a year, and this weekend the Queens tournament will feature 223 ladies from 37 different associations across the state, vying for a prize fund in excess of \$10,000. And, Linda will again be in the field in Abilene attempting to retain her tiara.

Action this weekend is at Triangle Lanes in Abilene and in the field will not only be SAWBA's Local Scratch Champion, Nell Sadler, but Kathy Kirst, the reigning State Champion.

The field is divided into two blocks (Squad A and B) and bowl eight games qualifying (two 4-game blocks across 16 lanes). The 48 high qualifiers move into the semifinal round Saturday night (4 games across 8 lanes), with the top ten advancing to the match game finals on Sunday morning.

In the finals all pinfall is dropped from qualifying and

the semis and the ladies receive 30 bonus points for each match won added to her total scratch score. Pairing for the finals is according to placing after the semis.

Last year's Queen earned the right to wear the Queens Tiara for a year, won the gorgeous trophy provided by Queens co-sponsor Browning's Trophy & Awards of Garland, was presented the Queens gold pendant and chain and the gorgeous white satin Queens jacket, plus \$650 first place prize money and \$80

in prize money for her eight wins in the finals.

The Bluebonnet Queens again will feature a star-studded field. There are 24 ladies who will represent their local associations as official representatives, in addition to seven who have won the Queens tiara in the past. With Linda are Regina Loveall, Amarillo (1979, 1981 and 1982), Fran Lary Minton (1975), Mary Wolfe Betke, Waco (1983), Debbie Weaver, Conroe (1984), and Luci Bonneau, Houston (1985).

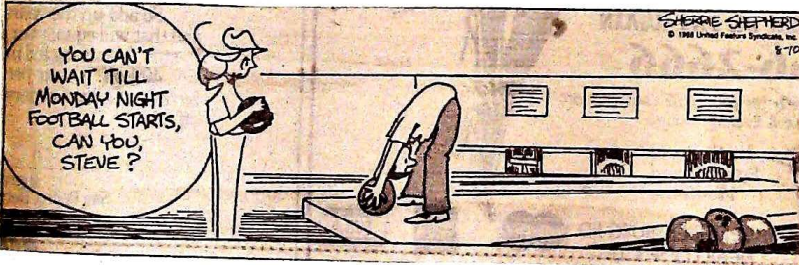

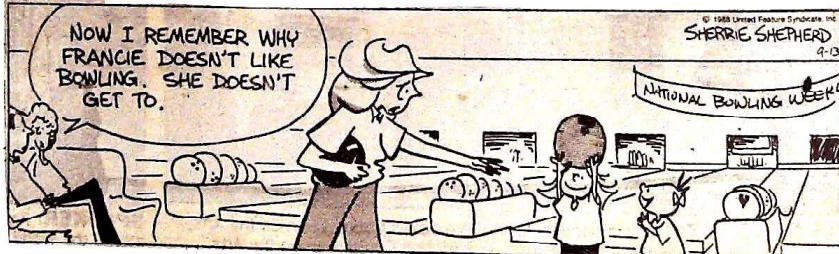

The Bluebonnet Queens Tournament is an individual competition championship tournament based on total pinfall and is conducted on a scratch basis. This event is limited to TWBA members. Each participant may enter only once. Tournament will consist of a **Qualifying Round** of eight (8) games across sixteen (16) lanes bowled in two 4-game blocks; 48 high qualifiers will enter into the **Semi-Final Round** of four (4) games across eight (8) lanes; and the ten high qualifiers will enter into the **Final Round** of match play.

The Tournament will be held at Triangle Lanes, 3122 South Clark, Abilene, Tx. 79605.

All prize fees collected will be returned 100%; prize ratio — at least 1-10.

Contestants in the Queens Tournament will be governed by rules of the WIBC, plus the following provisions:

**GENERAL RULES — REGULATIONS — INFORMATION
QUALIFYING ROUND**

- The qualifying round will consist of eight (8) games across sixteen (16) lanes and will be bowled in two 4-game blocks on Saturday, March 4, 9:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M.; Squad B — 11:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M. Each squad will be limited to the first 100 bowlers who enter. Only after both squads are filled will additional spots be added to each squad.
- (a) All contestants will be allowed 5 minutes of practice.
(b) Scorekeepers will be supplied by the tournament committee.
- Entry Fee will be \$50.00 (\$3.15 expense; \$32.45 prize fund; \$14.40 lines). The expense fee includes all bowling lines in the semi-finals and finals, promotional and operational costs.
- An entrant while participating in a scheduled event may be disqualified for the following:
 - An infraction of the rules.
 - Conduct derogatory to the best interests of the tournament.
 - Consuming beverages or food in the bowling area.
 - All forms of gambling.
 - Use of foreign substances which come in contact with the approaches or the lanes.

Any infraction of the rules will be cause for immediate disqualification and removal from the tournament. Disqualification of an individual shall result in forfeiture of the entry fee and any right to prize money and/or awards.

It is understood and agreed that after an entry fee is accepted for the Bluebonnet Queens Tournament, the fee cannot be transferred EXCEPT with the written consent of the Tournament Committee. If an entrant is unable to appear, the Tournament Committee agrees to authorize a transfer of the entry. The Tournament Committee is not obligated to refund the entry fee unless a replacement is secured.

- (a) If the final position in the qualifying round should result in a tie, one game will be bowled by the bowlers tied immediately after completion of the round. The bowlers will draw for starting lanes and the bowler on the odd numbered lanes will start the roll-off. In event a tie exists after this match, one (1) extra frame will be bowled.
- Failure of any contestant to be available in the event of a tie will constitute a forfeiture.

SEMI-FINAL ROUND

- The semi-final round will consist of four games across eight (8) lanes and will be bowled on Saturday, March 4, 7:30 P.M.
- (a) If the final position in the semi-final round should result in a tie, one game will be bowled by the bowlers tied immediately after completion of the round. The bowlers will draw for starting lanes, and the bowler on the odd numbered lane will start the roll-off. In the event a tie exists after this match, one (1) extra frame will be bowled.
(b) Failure of any contestant to be available in the event of a tie will constitute a forfeiture.

FINAL ROUND

- The final round of the Bluebonnet Queens Tournament will begin Sunday, March 5, 9:00 A.M.
- Pairing for the initial round of matches will be according to qualifying position.
- All carryover of pinfall from qualifying round will be dropped and finalists will start from zero.
- All finalists will bowl nine games of head to head match play using a regular 10 team schedule. The final game will be a position game called the CHAMPIONSHIP FLIGHT, a total of 10 games. If a tie should occur for first place after the Championship Flight, one full game will be bowled by the bowlers tied immediately after completion of the round. The bowlers will draw for starting lanes and the bowler on the odd numbered lane will start the roll-off. In event a tie exists after this match, one (1) extra frame will be bowled.
- All finalists will receive a 30 pin bonus for each game won and the bonus is to be added to her total score. If a match ends in a tie, each contestant will receive 15 pinfall count.

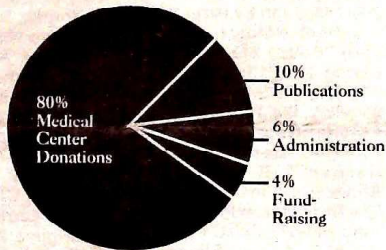

HISTORY OF THE

BVL FUND

During World War II Americans across the country were doing something to help the war effort and the bowlers of America wanted to pitch in and help. Kat LeCroy Defies Mother Nature While Winning Every Queens Match

Kathy LeCroy, Fort Worth, the 1983 Texas Woman Bowler of the Year, captured the one title which has eluded her during her illustrious career this weekend when she annexed the crown of the 20th anniversary TWBA Bluebonnet Queens tournament in Abilene.

Kathy's sensational performance was overshadowed by only one other woman -- Mother Nature!

As the Queens left their homes for Abilene, they left balmy skies and sunshine in most cases. As they arrived in Abilene the thermosists plunged, and the snows began to fall before the semifinal round was completed. A blanket of white and Abilene's coldest March 5th in history shook the ten finalists from their hotel room beds on Sunday morning.

Once the top ten finally arrived at beautiful Triangle Lanes, it was blistering scoring as the finalists went into heads-up match play.

Kathy, the pride of Fort Worth and former TCBA Woman Bowler of the Year, opened her play against the petite and talented captain of the West Texas State University collegiate team, Carolyn Dorin. Kathy took the first win from the leading qualifier and the bonus pins with a 198 game.

Dorin, a former New Jersey Queen led the field of 223 Representatives from 37 associations were shooting for the Queen's tiara, top prize money of \$675, a gorgeous pendant and chain, trophy and the Bluebonnet Queens white satin jacket.

From the first match the show belonged to Kathy. Her next three games were 204, 207 and 237 before she was fortunate indeed to take a win with games of 174 and 191.

Shifting into overdrive after those two, her next three games netted a 749 series - 243, 238 and the finals high game of 268. The match with the 268 game was against former Queen, Luci Bonneau, Houston, who lost with a 239, and the large gallery applauded both ladies efforts with great applause.

All that remained for Kat was to keep her winning streak alive for just one more game. Her opponent was the

beautiful blonde TWBA 1988 State Singles Champion, Joycee Davis, Big Spring. Kathy had a lead of 112 pins (with bonus) over Joycee going into that final match. And, the match was dead-even after five frames. Kathy smashed in a four bagger while Joycee left a ten pin in the 6th. Although Joycee added a turkey to her 129 in the 6th, then spared the tenth and struck out for a 228, she just couldn't close the gap. The four-bagger by Kathy with a spare in both the 9th and 10th frames and a nine-count gave Kathy her tenth win of 234 scratch, plus receiving the 30 bonus points at stake for each win. Her ten game average was 219.4 scratch.

Bowling alongside Kat and Joycee were two ladies trying to fit their scores into the 3rd and 4th slots - former Queen Fran Minton, Wichita Falls and hometown favorite, Patricia Smith of Abilene. Fran was at plus 212, Pat at plus 132. Fran couldn't overcome the two leaders, and Pat had to have a win to keep Luci from moving up into the 4th position in the standings. The Minton-Smith match was close throughout until Fran popped in a four-

bagger to close out her 218 game, while Pat finished with a 214, but without the precious bonus points she lost her 4th place spot. Luci grabbed it by virtue of a win over Dorin 234-218 plus 30 points and Pat went into fifth place in her first Queens final.

Of San Antonio's 12 entrants this year only four cashed - Kathy Kirst, Rosie Cook, Rocky Boubel and city champion Neil Sadler. Kathy and Rosie made the top ten on Sunday, with Kathy finishing ninth for \$280 in prize money plus \$20 in bonus money. Rosie earned \$275, for tenth and ten dollars for her one win. After the semifinal round Rocky was 16th at minus-44 for \$100, and Neil finished in 18th for \$100.

The Queens Committee of TWBA made certain that the tournament left no stone unturned for the success of the 20th anniversary event. Chariman Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi, and committee members Sue Hunter, Alamo; Beverly McLendon, Houston, Edna Turnbo, Bandera, and Millie Wood, Abilene, reached their goal of perfection for this Queens - praise was warm and generous for their

efficiency. They received a great deal of help from the hostess association members. Each Queen found her own special "crown" in the hospitality room, a personalized key chain upon checkin and an absolutely fantastic buffet between shifts. Each committee member was also gifted with a beaded lapel pin in the form of three bluebonnets for the anniversary running of the tournament. The Queen's gifts were presented by committee members with TWBA

each of her ten matches in the finals, plus a paid entry into next year's Queens tournament at Beaumont. The prize fund was again enriched by Browning's Trophies & Awards Garland.

Woman's killers may be frequent robbers

Three men responsible for the shotgun slaying of a 66-year-old San Antonio woman may have been involved in as many as 15 armed robberies, a police official said.

Homicide Lt. Albert Ortiz said eight detectives are searching for the men who robbed and murdered Ann Stahl Thursday night as she carried groceries to her apartment at 1983 Oakwell Farms Parkway.

Stahl was secretary to the commanding general of Fort Sam Houston in the early 1970s and later served in a similar post in Panama, said Mario Lamestra, vice president of the National Bank of Fort Sam Houston.

Stahl worked as an executive secretary at the bank for about seven years, leaving about two years ago, Lamestra said. She lived alone, friends said.

Three men stole the woman's purse at the Oakhampton Place Apartments, and one of the men shot her in the right side as she apparently tried to flee, Ortiz said.

Stahl died at 10:45 p.m. Thursday at Brooke Army Medical Center.

Moments before the robbery and shooting, the three men approached a 40-year-old woman in a parking lot near the apartments and took her car keys, rings and purse.

A man in a pickup saw the incident and tried to stop the men, but the gunman fired twice at the truck, hitting a tire and blowing it out, police said.

The three men fled across the apartment complex. A shot was fired at two men trying to learn what was happening, but the shot missed, Ortiz said.

The suspects then apparently came upon Stahl. Witnesses described the three as black males in their late teens or early 20s with short Afro haircuts. Each was described as being between 5 feet 9 and 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighing between 140 and 150 pounds.

"They're certainly very cowardly," Ortiz said. He said they panic easily and are quick to shoot.

Robbery detectives are checking about 15 cases reported over the past two months that are similar to Stahl's.

lar to the incidents Thursday and may involve the same men, Ortiz said.

All of the 15 incidents took place at apartment complexes. In each instance, one man held a gun on the victim while other suspects robbed the victim, Ortiz said.

In at least one of the cases, victims were shot, he said.

Thursday was the second time armed robberies have occurred at Oakhampton Place in the past three weeks.

On Feb. 21, Felix Martuccia, 70, was walking from his car to his apartment when he was approached by three men, police said. One of the men held a pistol to Martuccia's head and demanded his wallet.

Two days later and about two miles away, Alex Moore of 10014 Broadway was shot in the abdomen as he walked from his car to his apartment at the Fox Run Apartments.

Ortiz would not say if the shooting of Moore is one of the 15 cases under review.

Ortiz said there are several suspects in the robberies.

Fond and happy memories will be recalled because these two gracious ladies passed our way through bowling. Love and sympathy is extended to the families of both.

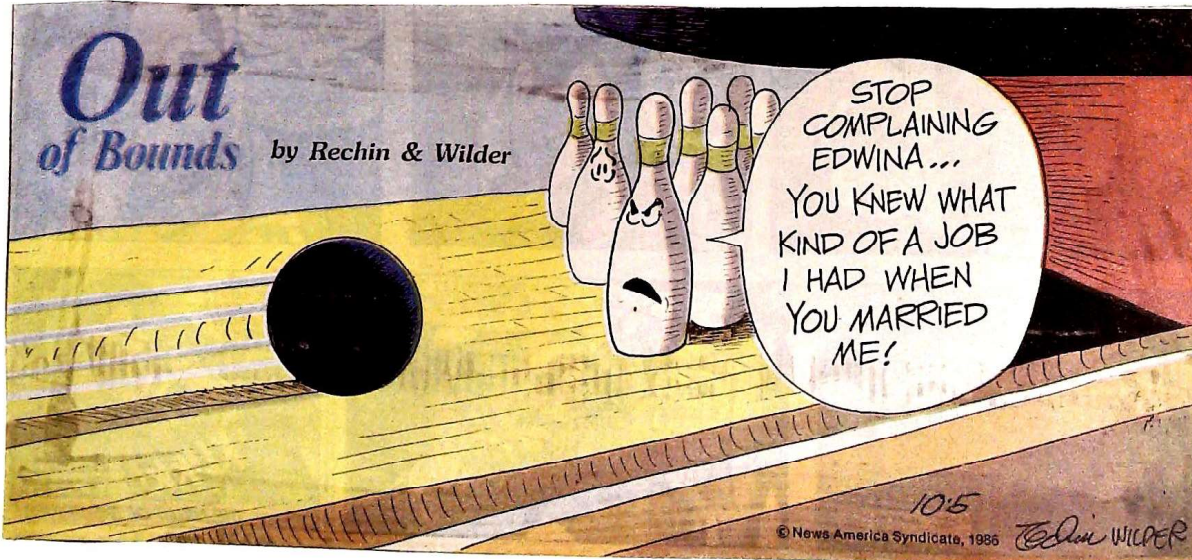

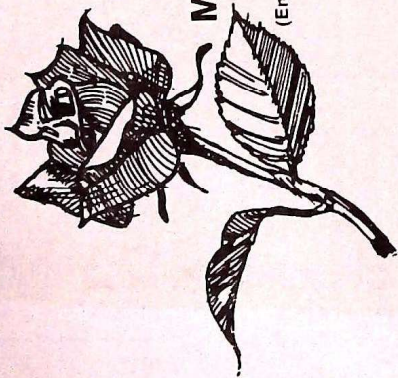

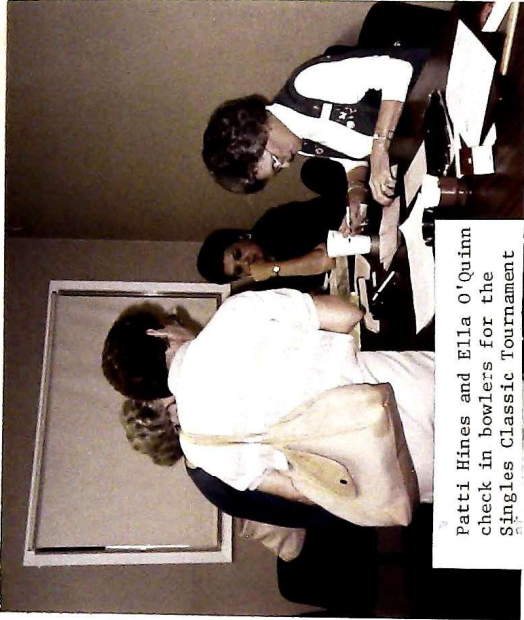

- 3. Handicap will be 80% of 200. Division I: 165 and above; Division II - 164 and below.

Entering Averages:

a. Highest Yearbook average (including summer addendum) of 21 games or more for the 1987-88 season. Rule 363A(2) will not apply. Rule 363A(3) will apply.

b. If (a) does not apply, highest current average of 21 games or more as of date of participation. Bowler MUST provide written verification signed by league secretary.

- 4. Format:

A total of six (6) games across 12 lanes in two three (3) game blocks will be rolled. Six game total with handicap will determine winners in each division with top prize money and an award. In case of a tie, duplicate prize money and awards will be provided.

- 5. Finals: (Scratch within Division)

Top six (6) scratch scores in each division qualifies to enter the finals.

If the final position (6th) place should result in a tie, an additional 9th and 10th frame will be bowled. In the event a tie still exists, an extra frame will be bowled until the tie is broken.

Kathy Kirst and Janet Bateman Are Singles Classic Champs

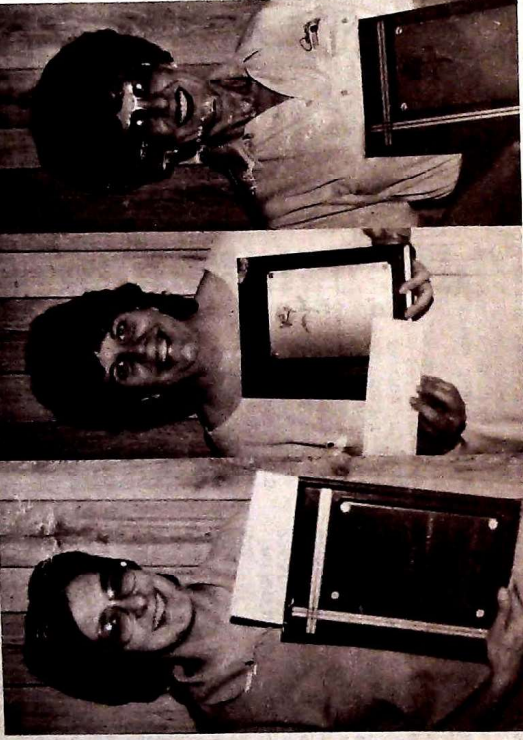
Connie Smoot-Freda Birdson Take Handicap Honors

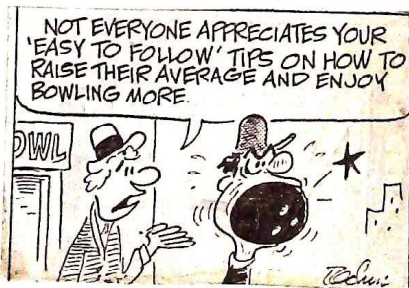
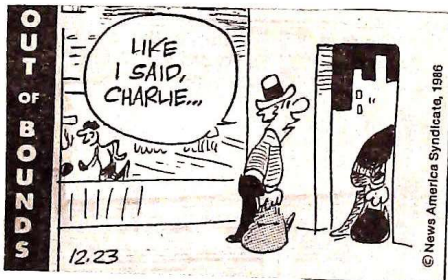

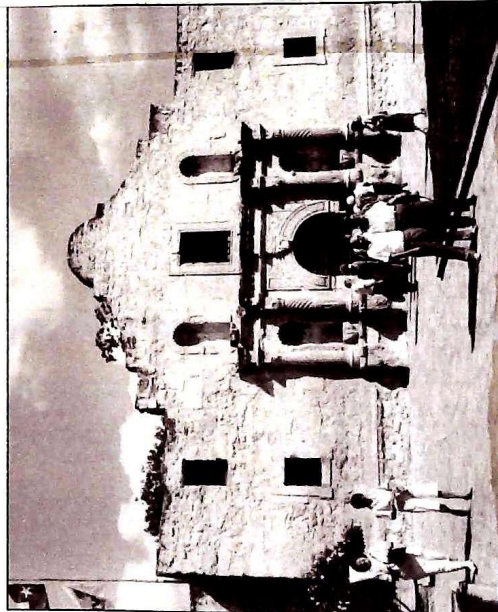
La Villita features shops with unique and original works of art, fine jewelry, valuable antiques, unusual fashions, plants and delicious food.

As Secretary Broyles introduced the teams the largest 'noise' came from the huge San Antonio delegation which included eleven senior teams for the

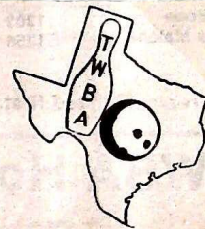


Doris Coffman and Sylvia Broyles TWBA president and secretary join Mayor Ed Elsey, El Paso, in traditional ribbon cutting.

What a battle it was for the Ladies Top Twenty trophy and \$400 first place prize check Saturday at Oak Hills Bowling Centre!

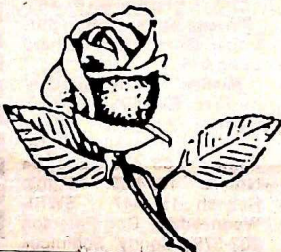

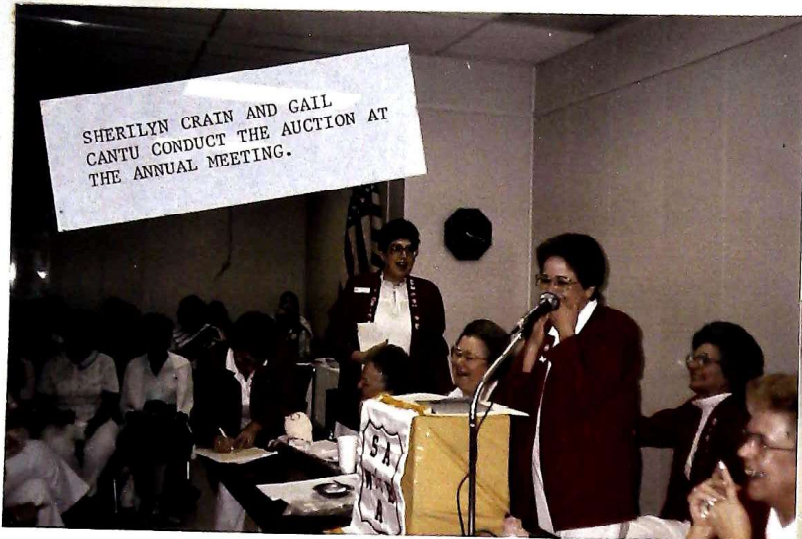

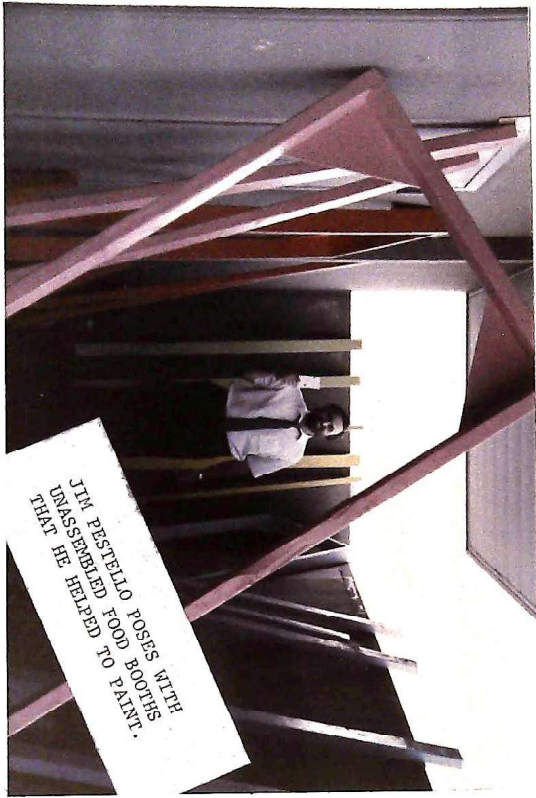

City's bid for WIBC meet denied

The San Antonio Women's Bowling Association found out how powerful the dollar is last week in Bismarck, N.D.

SAWBA's bid to stage the 1993 Women's International Bowling Congress national tournament was soundly thrashed by convention delegates Wednesday. San Antonio didn't even make the second ballot in its battle with eventual winner Baton Rouge, La., and Salt Lake City.

"It was a slap in the face," SAWBA city secretary Louise Mangelsdorf said. "It was more or less a race of which city had the most money."

On the first ballot, Baton Rouge polled 1,358 votes, Salt Lake City 1,042 and S.A. was eliminated with 448 votes. Baton Rouge earned the 1993 tournament with 1,592 votes to 1,247 for Salt Lake City on the second ballot.

The Baton Rouge delegation spent more than \$200,000 in wooing the WIBC delegates from April 29 through May 2. Salt Lake City invested more than \$160,000 and San Antonio nearly \$30,000.

"We were shocked," Mangelsdorf said. "We worked ourselves to death, 14 to 16 hours a day, but it was obvious that the delegates don't want to come to Texas."

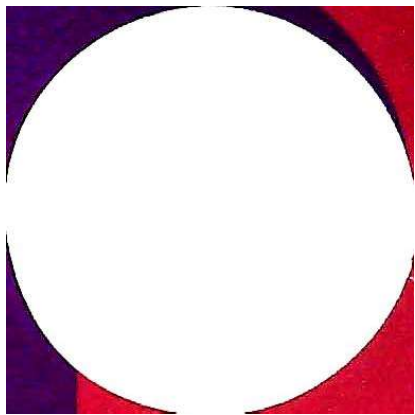
"You should have seen Baton Rouge's production to the delegates. It flew in more than 20 chefs and had two truckloads of Cajun food. It was fabulous. Salt Lake City was serving ribeye steaks."

"We had to cook our own food. The delegates said they liked the Mexican food, they ate it and promised us their votes. Something went wrong down the line. It was sad. All we could do was duck our tails and hide."

What may have doomed the Alamo City's bid were hotel rates. In a WIBC newsletter, the hotel rates in Baton Rouge and Salt Lake City were reported in the \$40 to \$60 range with free parking. In San Antonio, it was \$100 or more per night without free parking.

SAWBA, which had the backing of several local proprietors, held the WIBC event in 1968. A WIBC spokesperson said Wednesday that it was difficult for a city to get the tournament again. The annual event has been held in 46 different cities since 1916.

"It'll be a long time before we bid on the national tournament again — if ever — because it's too much work and it's too expensive," Mangelsdorf said.

SAWBA Team Does Everything Right But 1993 WIBC Event Awarded To Baton Rouge

The San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn. bid team came home from Bismarck, North Dakota as WINNERS even though the 1993 WIBC events they sought were awarded to Baton Rouge, La.

The local team did everything right! Certainly they caught the attention of the delegates with the Hospitality Room at poolside of the Kirkwood Motor Inn and introduced hundreds of WIBC members to the delicacies we take for granted every day at mealtime.

The Hospitality Room was open from Saturday night until Tuesday night, and following SAWBA's theme of "Let's Fiesta, Y'All!" featured food booths, margaritas and strolling mariachis. At registration were greeters giving out Texas and San Antonio attractions information and delegates' gifts -- all happily received by WIBC delegates.

There were hundreds of truly hard work in preparation. Almost back-breaking

hard work! And that work began with the collection and loading of all the food items and supplies needed in Bismarck. Then it was about 36 hours on the road by SAWBA's 'drivers' - Ken Beeler and Joe Pestello of Astro Bowling Center and Alamo Embroidery who braved the wrath and rules of South Dakota highway officials - a leaky truck through rainstorms and into Bismarck snow -- but with arrival Thursday night right on schedule.

Most of Friday's action was in a workroom in an apartment party room behind headquarters hotel-stuffing delegates bags, rolling posters, food preparation and storage.

The work force was seriously diminished as the ladies kept their bowling schedules, and it was well past midnight Friday before it was lights-out in the work room in near freezing temperatures -- but all the food stuffs were organized and refrigerated... thanks to some SAWBA delegates, non-delegates, Jim and

Beverly Pestello, John D'Andrea of Ponderosa Bowl, our drivers and those hardy enough to brave the extremely cold weather.

So organized was the move-in that only the items needed at Headquarters in the coming days remained on the truck -- which failed to start on Saturday morning because of the cold. Forty heads of lettuce had been chopped for the tacos and burritos, and that was depleted. Two and a half rolls of cheese had been grated and disposed of and as the ladies grated, tragedy struck. This time it was the grater insert breaking. Several ladies had enjoyed dinner at one of Bismarck's family steak houses and were greeted by the very pleasant manager who wished them well during their stay. They remembered his kindness

and place a quick call to his restaurant. That call brought the use of their kitchen grater for our cheese. The folks at Bismarck -- everywhere -- were so nice and friendly and helpful -- and this man saved our hides!

Once again it was a flood of visitors Sunday evening. Beverly and John D'Andrea led the "Cotton Eyed Joe" dancing at least another dozen times, but SAWBA delegates know additional help was on the way. Coming in Sunday were John Rizzo, Ponderosa and Hacienda Bowls, Joe Carmack of Wonder Bowl, Steve Moore, John Solis and Patsy Vaughn and her husband, Bill, and the talented mariachis from Mi Tierra Mexican Restaurant.

Just a few delegates were free to attend the WIBC Delegates Pow Wow Sunday afternoon (hosted by WIBC) since all the preparations for the booths had to be made others were unable to take a break. Several local ladies

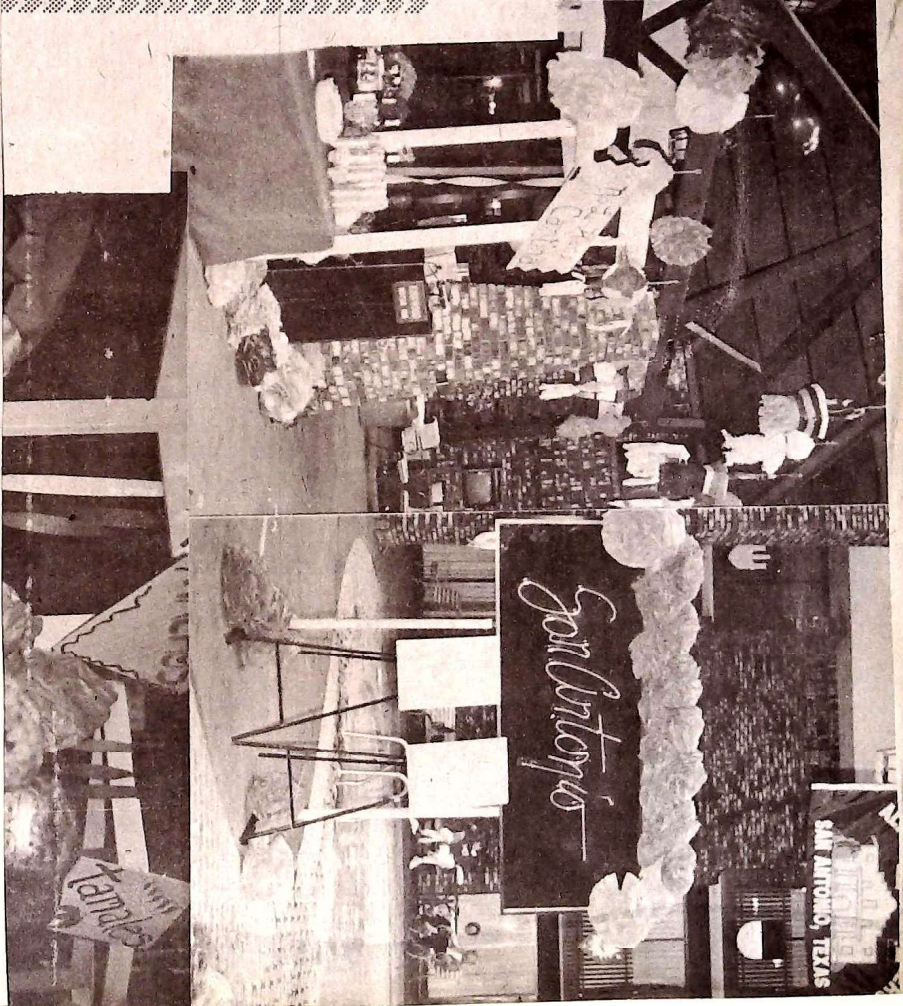

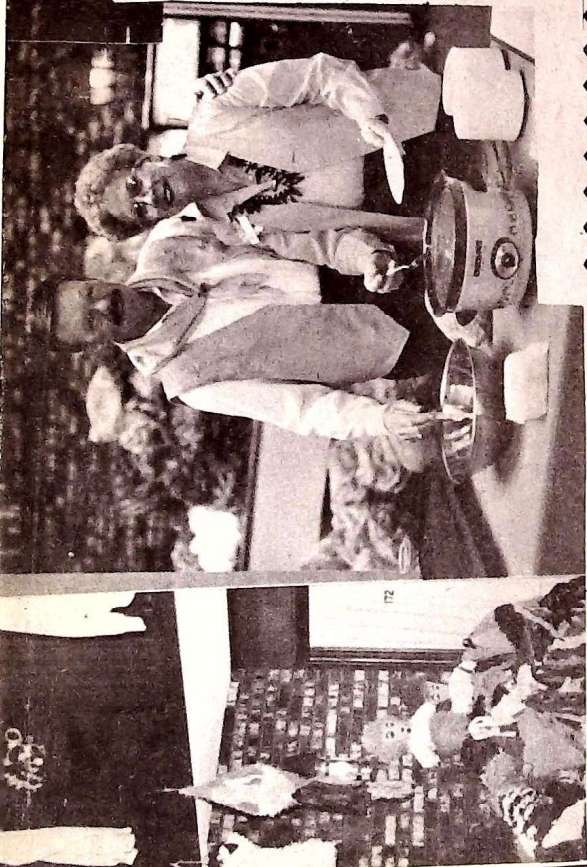

Some of the local team had the same questions when they learned that two local convention people took the afternoon off Tuesday for a round of golf! And, contrary to one of the published reports here upon SAWBA's return, YES! DEFINITELY YES! The delegates would love to come to Texas --- but not at San Antonio hotel prices!

Salt Lake City room rates were from \$38 to \$89 for doubles, Baton Rouge's listed as \$25 to \$65 for

TWBA In El Paso "Roller Coaster" Experience for Delegates

This weekend's Texas Women's Bowling Assn annual meeting was a study of both joy and sadness, as the ladies who serve on the Board conducted the business of the state organization.

The joy began with the appearance of President Doris Cofman, Wichita Falls, TWBA's "Lil Texas Critter" who was seriously ill at the time the ladies journeyed to Bismarck for the WIBC annual meeting. She was replaced by the alternate. But fully recovered and filled with her usual pep and vigor, Doris swept through the busy agenda with her usual efficiency, warmth and speed.

Happiness too came with the naming of award winners, recognition of associations for tournament participation, artwork, promotion and much more.

Sadly, the delegates awaited the arrival of the inductee into the TWBA Hall of Fame, usually the highlight of the annual meeting. But that moment in the state spotlight was not to be. Eleanor Rice, the 1989 inductee, a dedicated pioneer worker in the youth program who had served many years on the TWBA Board of Directors, had been stricken with a heart attack just days before departing Port Arthur for El Paso. In absentia, the delegates and guests at the annual banquet applauded Eleanor for her years of dedication, work and achievements in behalf of Texas women bowlers and the youth of the state. Happily, her association members reported that Eleanor was improving at home before the end of the weekend.

Woman Bowler of Year

An absolutely radiant Joycee Davis, Big Spring, captured "Texas Woman Bowler of the Year" honors for her performances during the past season. Last year

Joycee carried season high averages of 191 and 207 in her leagues and was fourth in WIBC All Events with an 1835. During the season she had 43 series over 600 with two 700s, with a 701 in

marked Joycee's second consecutive Singles title in the TWBA Championships when she slammed in a 690 series, the tournament high series, and she was third in all events with an 1820.

team event in the WIBC Championships. Joycee was Bowler of the Year in Big Spring where she also serves on the Board of Directors. The popular and stunning righthander, during TEAM USA qualifying averaged 208 for her 12 games. Her career highs include a 290 game with a 748 series, and last March she was runnerup in the Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament at Abilene, and gave Queen Kathy LeCroy, Fort Worth, a battle for the crown.

Sharing the happy evening with Joycee were her husband and son, Tom and Michael, whom Joycee praised for their support of her bowling activities.

Secretary Reports

TWBA Secretary Sylvia Broyles reported Texas membership at 112,777 as of May 20th, with 336 high score affidavits for 650 or higher series, and 68 affidavits for games of 270 or better.

High series to date is by Donna Conners, Houston, an 804. Three Texas ladies have rolled 300 games thus far - Christine Williams, Fort Worth; Dorothy Johnson, Tyler; and Kay Williams, Odessa.

The 1990 TWBA events will be in Corpus Christi with P.J.'s Crystal Palace as the site for team event, and Saratoga Lanes for doubles and singles.

The 1991 tournament and annual meeting was awarded to Fort Worth WBA.

The Texas Bluebonnet Queens Tournament will feature an increased entry fee of \$55 when it rolls on March 3-4, 1990, at Crossroads Bowling Center in Beaumont.

But that didn't complete the evening. Another standing ovation was given to Chantel Renee Williams, Austin as Texas 20-Year Club "Miss Texas Junior bowler of the Year". The pretty teen is a graduating senior from Sidney Lanier High School in Austin. She is a member of CVAE (classroom instruction/on the job career training; VOE (office occupation/word processing) and HECE, training in home economics, childcare/on the job training. She's also a member of the basketball, track team and

girls volleyball teams.

Beginning her bowling at age nine, Chantel won her first scratch tournament at age 13, bowling seven consecutive matches an averaging 178. She's extremely active in Youth Leaders groups and holds offices in her leagues.

Chantel's greatest achievement came at age 14 when she had games of 290, 204 and 223 to post the nation's top girl's series of 717, and high game of 290. A member of the Texas Junior Masters and Junior Queens Tour, Chantel still has time to serve as an in-center junior bowling coach. She's a credit to her family, her coaches and epitomizes all that caused the creation of the contest for the state's bowling girls.

Still More...

And, there were more awards presented during the all-day session. A former San Antonio Board member, Carolyn Page, who is now the super-efficient local secretary of the Fort Worth WBA received the plaque as "Secretary of the Year".

Forever-young Cindy Luce, San Angelo, was the recipient of the TWBA Service Award. Cindy's list of accomplishments, read by Helen Baetz as commit-

tee chairman, spanned nearly 40 years. She has promoted every type of tournament, assisted with all types of bowling instruction of the handicapped, originated all types of senior bowling events, operated a bowling center for years, and served admirably and with distinction on the TWBA Board of Directors. Cindy earned the admiration of all TWBA members when she enrolled in Karate classes after the age of 65, and is now preparing for her Black Belt. The soft-spoken, imaginative, dedicated innovator was a popular choice for one of TWBA's highest honors.

TWBA delegates always anxiously await the BVL Report listing contributions from the various associations. Texas was second in the nation this past year, and from the report given at El Paso they are in great shape again. At annual meeting time donations totalled nearly \$30,000 with the Bay City WBA earning the Dorothy Cornelison BVL Award by generating almost \$5.00 per member from their city bowlers.

Another coveted award is the Youth Bowling Service Award, and this year's recipient was Georgia

Biggs, Lubbock, who happily received her plaque and gifts from TWBA and a former youth bowler in her program. Georgia has been extremely active in the youth program both as a coach, president of the state youth board, and served her local association as its president, sandwiched among her duties as a coach and chaperone on junior trips.

Writers/Promoters Honored

The Texas Women Bowling Writers awards are announced at the breakfast and awards given at the annual meeting. Mary Jane Hester received recognition for the best story in *Across Texas Lanes*, the official publication of TWBA. Writer of the Year was Helen Kurburski of Austin, and awards for posters were earned by Austin and New Braunfels captured poster contest awards. The Wood Award given to a member of the professional press, radio or television was awarded to Pete Moore of the Dallas Bowling News. Membership in TWBW reached 127 with more signed up during the weekend.

Annual Election

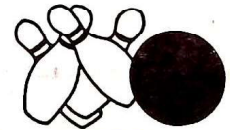
During the election all incumbent officers, Millie Wood, Abilene, first vice president; Gloria Newman,

WIBC Reinstates Many Awards, Services with \$1.00 Dues Increase

During the recent WIBC Annual Meeting in Bismarck, No. Dak., the delegates voted to raise the WIBC membership dues from \$1.75 to \$2.75 per year. Cost for the 1989-90 membership dues is: National Dues \$2.75; State \$1.75 and local \$3.00.

Any lady joining a Summer League will purchase the card and pay \$7.00. She will be issued a 1989-90 card which will be valid until the fall of 1990.

With the following service from WIBC will be reinstated effective August 1, 1989 for the 1989-90 season:

The WIBC Playing Rules book will be reinstated.

The 200 Average award will be reinstated and provided to all members with a final average of 200 or over based on 48 games or more. WIBC will also continue to provide a high quality medal to the members having the highest reported league average for the 1989-90 season.

Participation emblems will once again be provided to entrants in the WIBC Championship Tournament.

Emblems to recognize champions in each event of the local, state and provincial association tournaments, as well as emblems for association senior tournaments will again be available at no cost to associations.

In addition, throughout the season a number of communiquis will be sent by WIBC to the Boards of Directors of local and state associations.

Two new awards were approved for distribution in the 1989-90 season. These are targeted to give greater means of recognition to the average bowler.

By popular request, a 150 Pins Over Average award will be available. This will be given to WIBC members who bowl 150 pins over their average in a three-game series in a sanctioned league or tournament.

A special league award will also be provided to each sanctioned league. It will be up to the league to determine which female league member will receive this award and the basis on which it will be

awarded.

That \$1.00 increase approved by the delegates goes far and will be enjoyed by many. After a year of tough decisions and austerity, WIBC's number one priority has been to provide service to the members -- and that very nominal increase in fees -- a one time fee -- will ensure that WIBC will always remain the largest sports organization in the world for women...while introducing new programs and standards for the members.

The San Antonio Bowling Council members returned all three offices to their respective posts Monday.

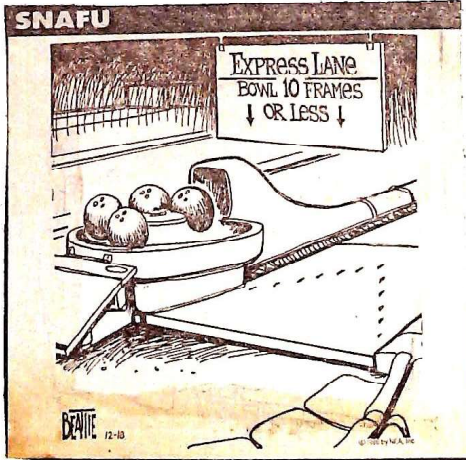
Continuing to serve as president will be Edwin Crabb, with Ella O'Quinn as Vice President, and Helen Kalala as Secretary.
