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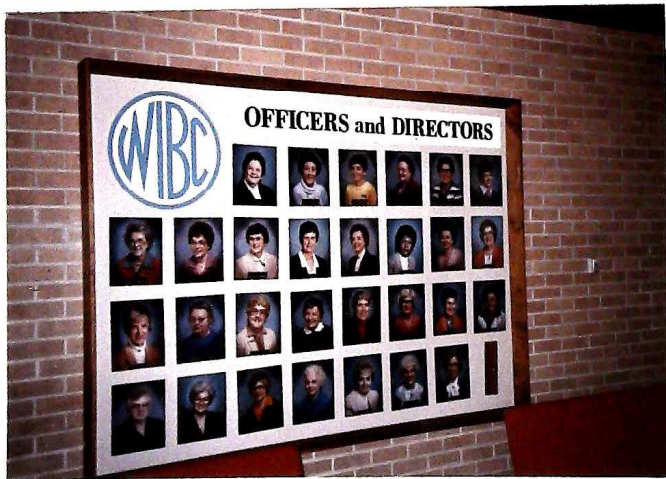

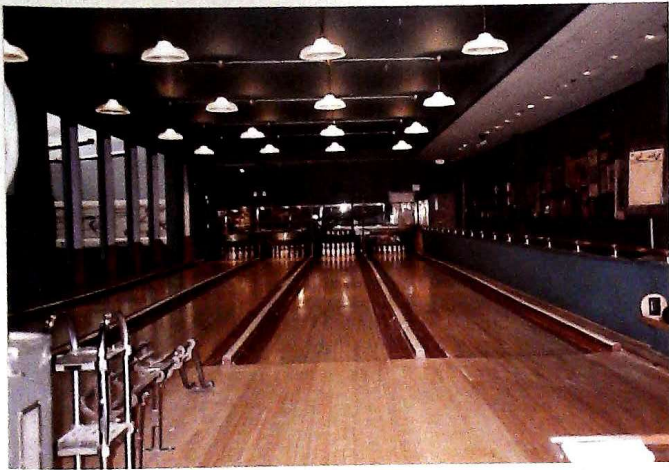

WIBC's Future is in Good Hands

Seventy-three WIBC Future Leaders participated in the inaugural WIBC Future Leaders program in Milwaukee and St. Louis

They needed no icebreaker. From the minute they arrived by plane at Milwaukee's Mitchell International Airport until the time they stepped off the bus into the St. Louis International Airport, these 73 future WIBC leaders communicated, worked together and proved WIBC's future is in good hands.

WIBC's inaugural Future Leaders program July 26-July 29 began with a welcome reception at the Milwaukee Grand Hotel.

"The next few days will add greatly to your knowledge about WIBC and its operations," WIBC President Gladys M. Banker said.

President Banker then introduced Executive Secretary-Treasurer Flora Mitchell who introduced several WIBC staff members who would be working with the leaders throughout the program.

The leaders went through a full day of training on Friday, July 27, that began with WIBC department presentations. Staff presentations described the day-to-day activities and operations of each of the 17 WIBC and joint WIBC/ABC departments at Bowling Headquarters.

"WIBC is a business, and in other ways it is very, very unique," WIBC Assistant Secretary-Treasurer Nancy Tatum said. "Not everyone who works here is a good bowler. Bowling is our livelihood and life for many WIBC employees.

"Bowling is a lifetime sport. People can enjoy it despite their abilities or their ages.

"As you can see, all of us are very proud to be a part of WIBC," Tatum said.

After lunch, the leaders underwent a training session conducted by Marilyn Berger of Marilyn Berger and Associates, Inc., at Tuckaway Country Club in Milwaukee.

"Leaders are many things," Berger said. "They are team players/builders; they achieve quality results in real time; they know themselves; they are motivated by a mission; they pool their skills and strengths; and they have followers.

For an example, Berger gave a mission statement developed by a bill-collectors group she conducted a seminar for.

"They had a hard time developing a mission statement and motivating their employees. Let's face it. Not many people are positive when bill-collector's come around.

"The mission statement they ended with was: The mission of a bill collector is to give integrity to the human promise, and help the debtor save his good name.

"This statement shows the power of purpose," Berger said.

Berger then got the leaders involved in determining the mission of WIBC and ultimately their local and state associations.

Some of the leader's mission statements included the following: cooperation, communication, continuity; the mission is the friendship, unity, training, understanding, recruitment, education; closing the generation gap, experience, credibility; being out on our own, bonding together, then getting all of our

ducks in a row.

Berger then introduced Mary Beth Malm, of the Volunteer Center of Greater Milwaukee, Inc., to conduct a seminar on the dynamics of volunteering.

To get the leaders moving around, Malm described various types of volunteers and asked the leaders to rate them on a volunteer scale from one to three with one being most like a "true" volunteer.

"A volunteer is a person who donates skills of their own free will and free time," Malm said. "There are as many reasons for volunteering as there are things to do. People have different motivations for volunteering. As leaders, you need to keep this in mind because you want to sell volunteering.

Malm stated there are three types of people: achievement, affiliation and power.

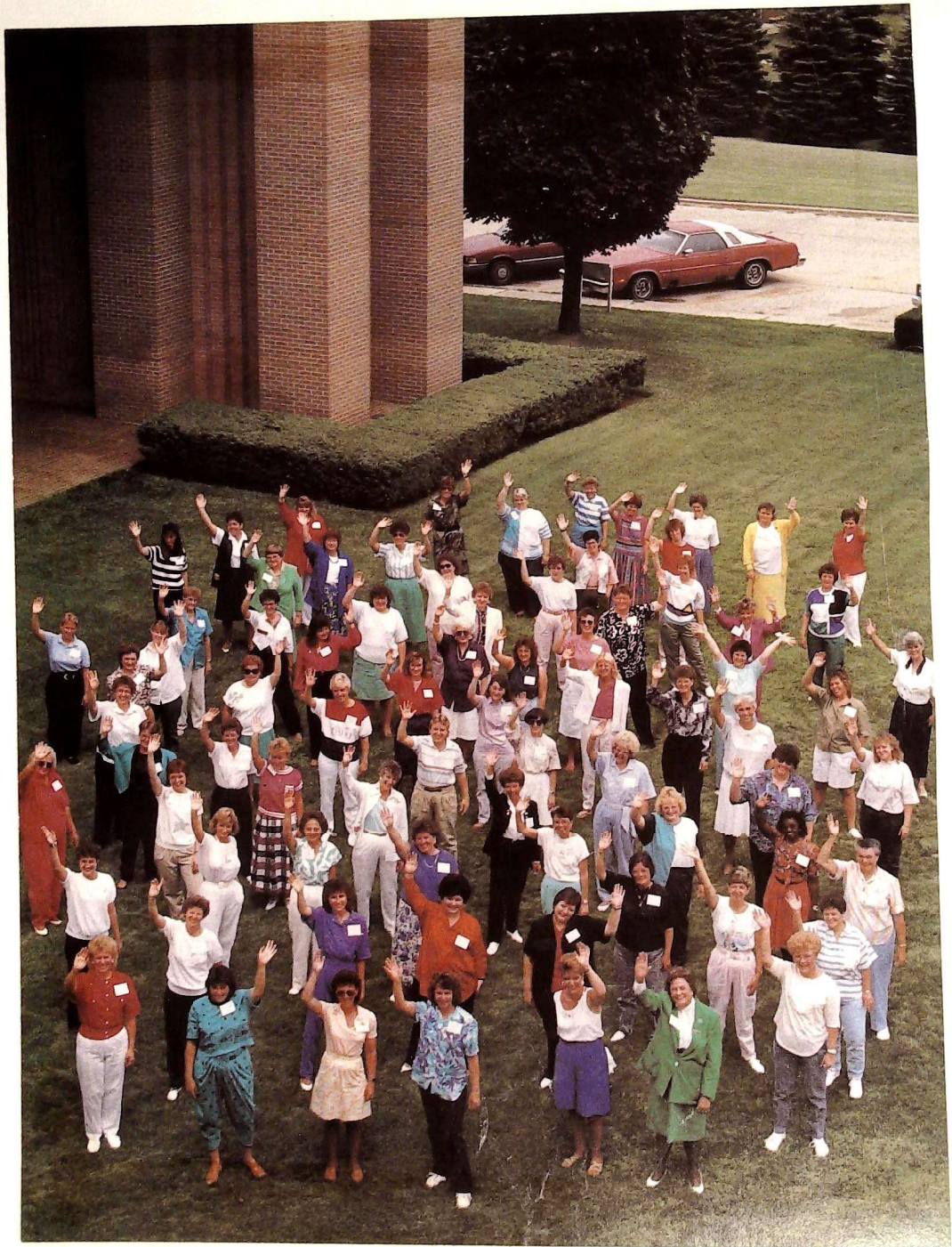
"Make sure you know what type of people your volunteers are," Malm said. Learn peoples' personal motivations and know how to connect them to volunteer tasks.

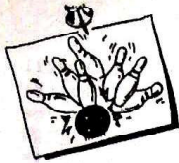
"If you understand why you volunteer and why other people are volunteering, it will help you in your efforts. People will continue to volunteer when skills are being used, when they're feeling useful, and when they like what they're doing," Malm said.

"Remember the No. 1 reason people get involved is because they believed in what they were doing. People want to volunteer; they just have to be asked," Malm said.

Berger wrapped up the afternoon session.

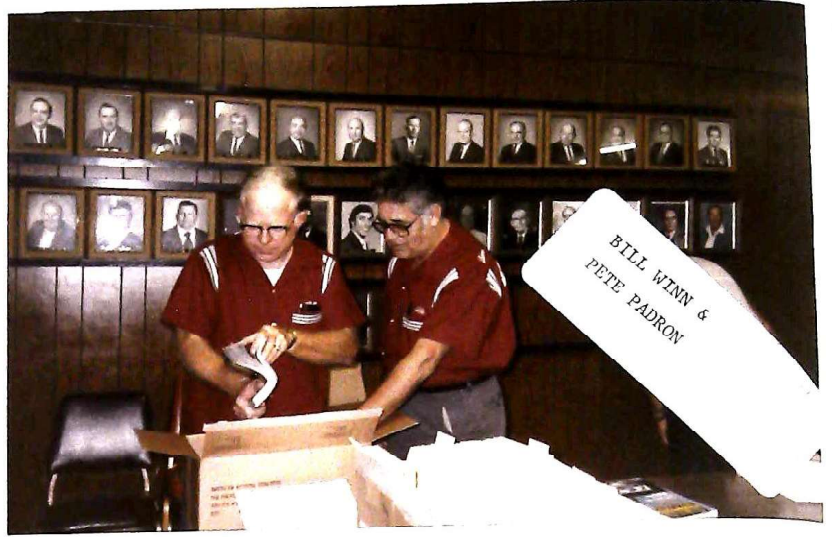

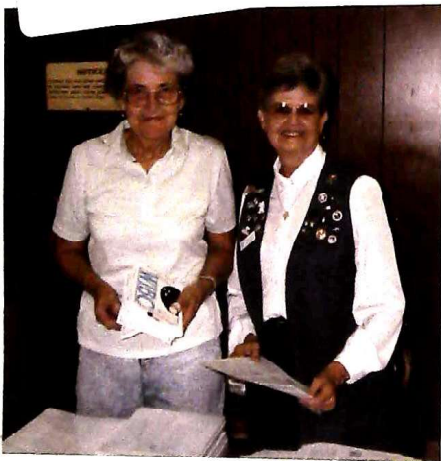

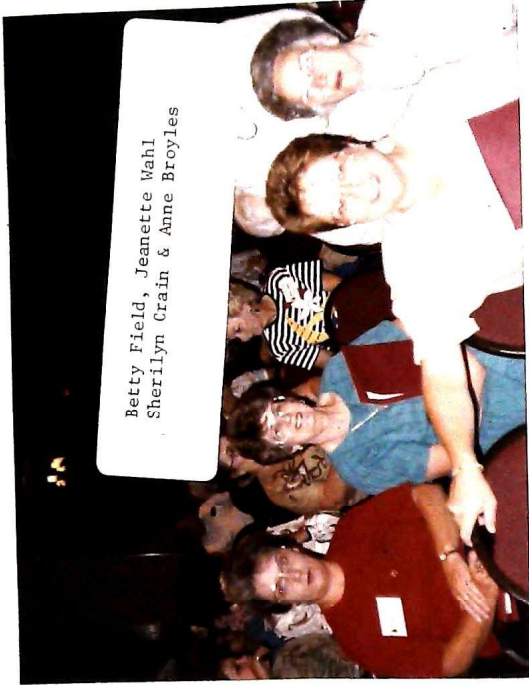

San Antonio Seniors dominated the top spots of the tenth annual Texas State Senior Mixed Tournament at Temple.

Pending final verification of averages, the Four friends -- with a handicap series of 2531 - captured team titles. Don Eberhardt led the team with a 683 series, followed by Ray Kirby 512, Trudy Eberhardt 447, and Betty Kirby, 426.

For the second time, Bill Bilikas won the men's singles honors with a handicap series of 718. He stepped into the first place slot the second weekend of the event with games of 173, 223, 223 for a scratch series of 619.

The women's singles title went to Mary "Tip" Pfeiffer with a 691 handicap series. Tip entered the event with a 155 average and bowled games of 163, 167 and 221 for a scratch series of 551.

The men's Class A All Events title went to Andy

Anderson, Abilene, with a 1344 handicap series, with Eberhardt taking Class B honors with 1348. Bilikas with a 1500 won Class C for the second consecutive year and J. R. Reule, Killeen won Class D with a 1341.

In ladies all events winners were Mary Tunnell, Midland, 1308 handicap; Leta Nicholas, Austin, Class B, 1353; Vera Redding, Corpus, Class C 1327 and Helen Bletsch, Baytown, Class D with 1337.

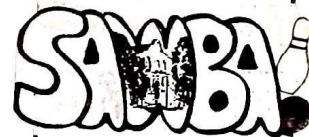
All the all events winners are eligible for the National Seniors tournament to be held in Toledo, Ohio in 1991.

S.A. shines brightly at state meet

Bowlers from the San Antonio area, led by Bill Bilikas and Don Eberhardt, dominated the Texas State Senior Tournament recently in Temple.

The locals won four individual titles, including two by Bilikas, and one team title in the event, which officially ended Aug. 26.

Bilikas won Class A singles with a 718 handicap score and Class C all-events with a 1,500 total.

Eberhardt won Class B all-events with 1,348 and teamed with Ray and Betty Kirby and Trudy Eberhardt to win the team event with a 2,531 handicap total.

In the team action, Don had a 683 scratch series, Ray 512, Trudy 447 and Betty 426.

Mary "Tip" Pfeiffer won Class A women's singles with a 691 handicap series, and finished third in all-events with a 1,289 total.

Mary Turnell of Midland was the Class A all-events winner with 1,308, followed by Myrtle Oren of Polk County with 1,289. Juanita Hamell of San Antonio was fourth with 1,272.

Bilikas had games of 173, 223 and 223 for a 619 in singles, and finished with a six-game scratch total of 1,302 en route to winning the Class C all-events crown for the second straight year.

Bilikas and Eberhardt, who had a six-game scratch total of 1,166, are eligible to compete in the National Seniors Tournament, to be held in Toledo, Ohio, next year.

"Everything just fell into place at the seniors tournament," said Pfeiffer, who entered the meet with a 155 average. "I had to be way over my average to win. I was really glad to get what I did."

Pfeiffer had games of 163, 167 and 221 for a scratch series of 551.

"San Antonio really has good senior programs," Pfeiffer said. "I'm just glad that we were able to go to the state tournament and do some good."

Ray Costa of San Antonio finished fourth in Class B all-events with a 1,317 total; Charley Bagley of New Braunfels was fifth in Class A all-events with 1,294; and Charles Whitesell of San Antonio was fourth in Class D all-events with 1,281.

Kathy Kirst Wins Second SAWBA Award For Superior Performance



For the second consecutive year Kathy Kirst earned the SAWBA Superior Performance Award for her outstanding performance on the lanes the past season.

The award is given on a point basis established by the San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn. and credits are given for each performance in WIBC sanctioned events.

Kathy rolled in four leagues this past season (including a men's draft-for-teammates league) with ending averages of 199, 191, 192 and 193.

She also had the highest composite average for a woman in the city, a 194.06.

Highlight of course was a five-week span in which she rolled not only a 299 game (WIBC award score), but a 300

game during league play.

She also had 41 series over the 600 mark with seven in the range of 650-699. Additionally came two series over the 700 mark (a 725 and 749).

Kathy was active in tournament play as well, cashing in the TWBA Championships in eighth in Open Singles. She also participated in this year's WIBC Queens tournament in Tampa Florida, with numerous cashings in weekend tournament events (no points given).

In May Kathy was recognized by TWBA as the "Texas Woman Bowler of the Year", an award also presented during the Open Membership Meeting last weekend. Kathy was in Tampa bowling in the WIBC Queens at the time of the TWBA Annual Banquet.

The quiet and shy lefthander in accepting her many awards asked the SAWBA Board of Directors and the ladies attending the meeting to consider naming an All City team, rather than recognizing just one lady for her outstanding accomplishments. The suggestion will be discussed by the Awards Committee at a later date.

During her career as a WIBC member (she was previously named one of the outstanding youth bowlers in the country with the awarding of the Alberta E. Crowe "Star of Tomorrow" award (1976) Kathy has earned the SAWBA Local Championships all events title three times.

TWBA Secretary Sylvia Broyles made the presentation of the "Texas Woman Bowler of the Year" plaque; her mother, as chairman of the SAWBA Awards Committee recited her accomplishments and Kathy was gifted with an appreciation gift certificate from the Association as well as her awards for her high games.

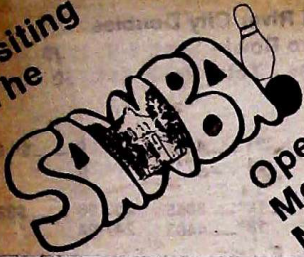

As is traditional for the local association, members remembered their friends who passed away the past

season and Jane Wright, Sherilyn Crain, Jeanette Wahl and Georgia Hayes conducted a lovely Memorial Service.

Prior to the start of the meeting, past president Ella O'Quinn presented Mrs. Holzmann with a new gavel, then gifted the association with a new American Flag which was carried in and placed at the stage by Sgt-at-Arms Ruth James.

The Invocation for the meeting was given by State Secretary Sylvia Broyles.

and in attendance were four SAWBA Life Members, Broyles, Madelyn Spreng, Mary E. Pfeiffer and Helen Baetz.

Mrs. Baetz also served a Installing Officer for those members elected to the Board of Directors, or appointed since the last meeting. Using a "Key" installation with gold keys

place don the "SAWBA door" the directors and officers pledged their support to the game of bowling and the association works.

In her first message as President, Mrs. Holzmann stressed the problems which face all bowlers - declining membership, and up-dated those in attendance on

projects ahead.

Members approved the budget for the coming season and approved a legislative amendment to increase membership. Ladies who previously been carried as Inter-Association members will pay local dues beginning with the 1991-1992 season. Those ladies would then have all the rights and privileges set forth in the SAWBA by-laws.

Reports were also of publicity, the senior trip to Temple, the awards committee (see front page story), equipment & specifications and the youth program.

Two members were gifted with charms for their service on the Board for more than ten years. Past president O'Quinn received her award

for 23 years including six as President. Irene Castaldo was thanked for 25 years of dedicated service from 1966 to 1990 when she retired. Mrs. Castaldo also has been recognize for more than 20 year appearances in the WIBC Championship Tournament.

During balloting for election to the Nominating Committee a video was shown of the highlights of last year's WIBC annual meeting in Tampa, Fla.

Elected to serve as co-chairmen of the committee were Helen Baetz and Tip Pfeiffer with members Dorris Tanner, Madelyn Spreng and Myrt DeFily.

Highlights of her trip to Bowling Headquarters and the National Bowling Hall of Fame/Museum as one of the two representatives from Texas under the WIBC Future Leaders program was given by Helen Teller.

Other reports included actions of the TWBA Annual Meeting last year, the San Antonio Bowling Council, the Texas State Jamboree and both the 500 club and the San Antonio 600 Club.

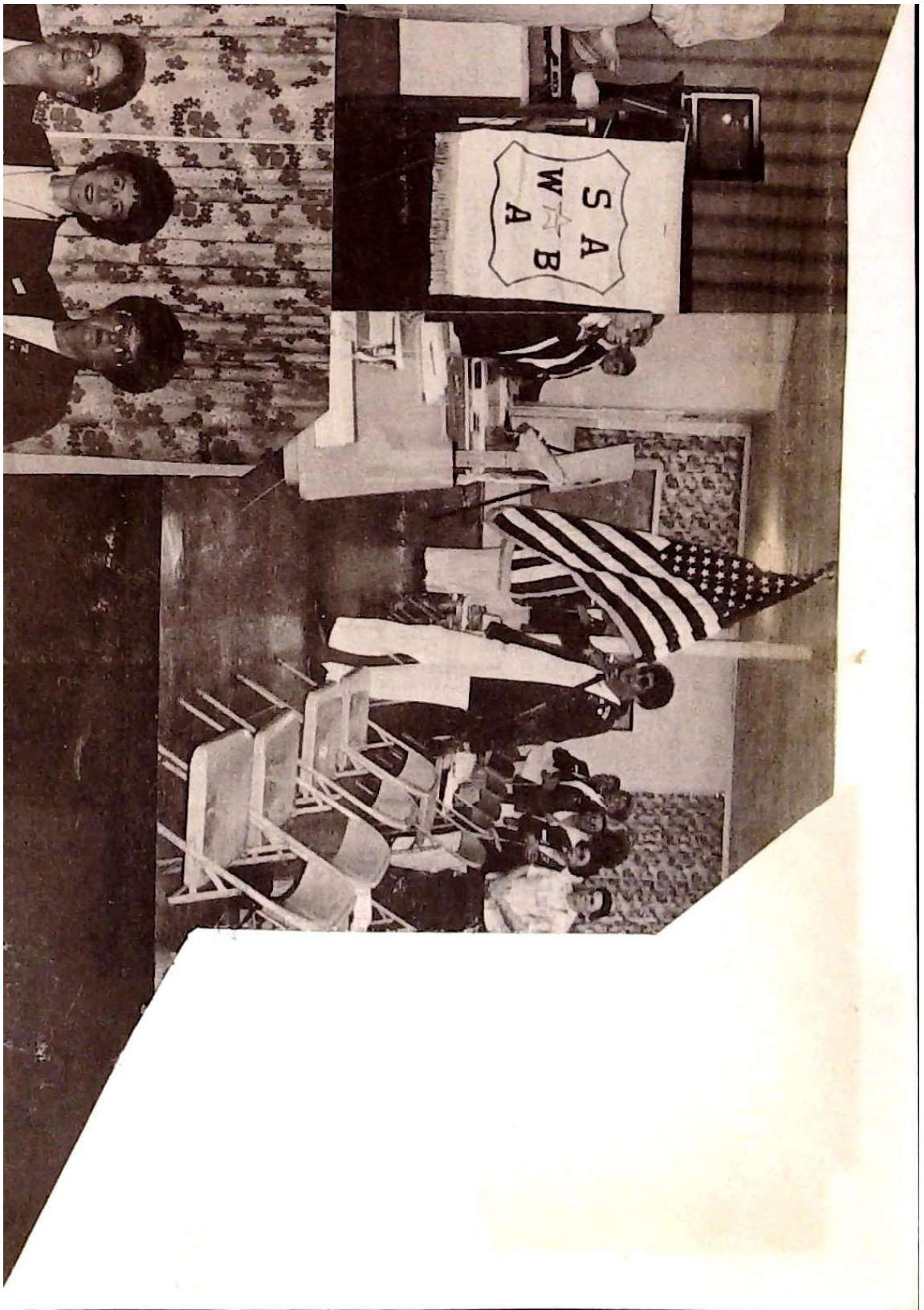

Life Member Helen Baetz installs new officers & directors for the season

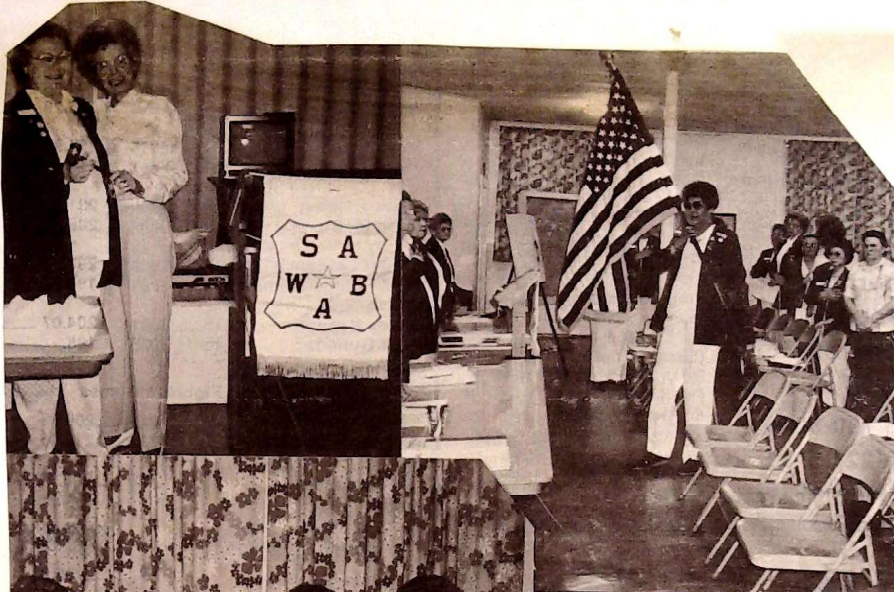

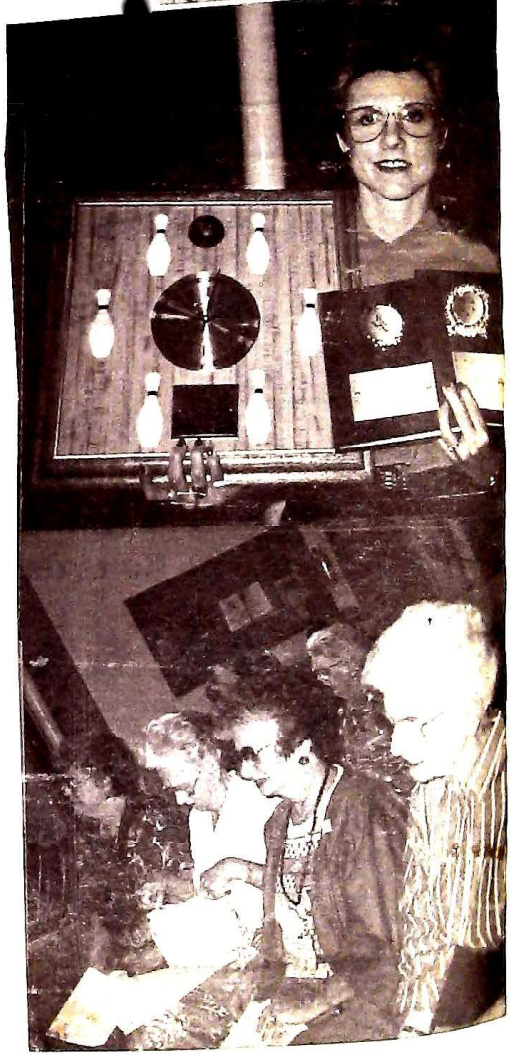

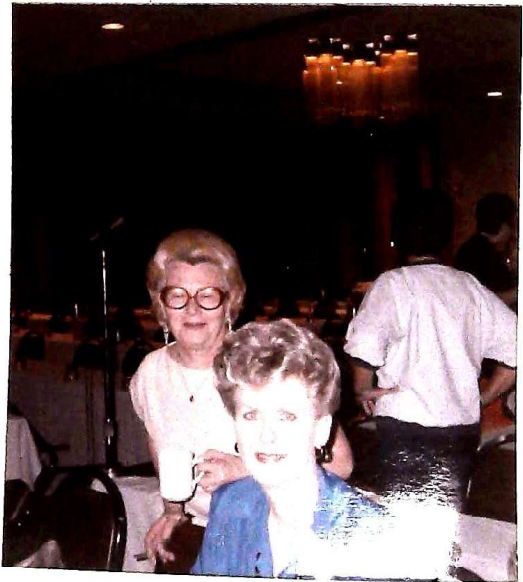

SAWBA Life Member And Hall of Famer Rosalie Bushick Dies

The game of bowling lost a great friend last week with the passing of Rosalie Ann Bushick, at age 70.

And if tears were shed, they had to be those of relief that her battle was finally concluded. The past eight or ten years, health-wise, were not kind to Rosalie.

But in life, and particularly during the decades she was involved in bowling, Rosalie was known as one of the kindest, most considerate, thoughtful ladies to grace the scene. She truly cared about all those with whom she came in contact.

Her bowling days began in 1956 when she assumed the secretary's position of the Dee Howard (aviation company) employees league a tenure which spanned a decade. Soon she became involved in the work of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn. serving as director, vice president, stepping down as vice president to fill the secretary's post when SAWBA was set to host the WIBC events in 1968. After that eleven months, when SAWBA's office was in her garage, it was two years as SAWBA president.

During that time it was also involvement at the state level, serving on several committees, and at the national level on the teller's committee, but actively involved in three bids for the association for the WIBC events.

In 1962 she joined the San Antonio "600" Club, serving from 1965-1977 as president later to return to serve on the local club board. She was tournament coordinator for The Texas 600 Club in 1973 when WBA was in the city, and she was tournament secretary in 1968 for the national event. Her 600 Club work also included more than a decade as Texas 600 Club president, and she was a Life Member of that organization.

lanes. Captain of the 1962 championship team in the local tournament; captain again in 1965; and a member of the 1970 winning team. During her lengthy career she would boast of a 180 average in 1967, a career high game of 278, and a career high series of 670. For six years she was selected for the Women's Top Twenty list, the last time in 1970.

But it was her secretarial and organizational expertise for which she was most noted. In addition to her company league she was one of the organizers, and served as first president, of the city's first match-point league (11 years). She was secretary of the Airport Mixed, a continuation of the Dee Howard league for ten years; and organized and was secretary of the Four Squares league for 13 years.

For years of dedication and contributions, Rosalie was made a Life Member of the SAWBA, and later was inducted into the San Antonio Bowling Council Hall of Fame in 1979.

A few of other bowling-related activities were the Local Bowling Council, the state and national Bowling Writers clubs, and at one time she coached the youth bowlers at Oak Hills Lanes.

And Rosalie, with her distinctive style of delivery, was a tough cookie on the

With all the time given to bowling and bowlers, a great deal of Rosalie's time was also given to the Church. She was an Eucharistic Minister and lecturer, former Regent of the Catholic Daughters of St. Joseph's (Honey Creek) and chairman of the St. Joseph's Parish Board.

Rosalie loved the outdoors and Fall signalled trips to the brush country for deer hunting and javelina hunting. The Spring meant gardening - flowers, pot plants and vegetables.

For almost 20 years she was married to Charles "Bud" Bushick, who shared her love of the country in Bulverde. Rosalie had one daughter, Joyce, three beautiful grandchildren, Lisa, Mike and Crystal, and just one week before her funeral service, her first great-grandchild was born to Lisa.

Life was a joy to Rosalie. She found leisure in the smallest animals and birds, marvelled at the gift of wildflowers along the highways, re-acted to the successes of friends, and truly suffered their tribulations. With prayers, and loving care she always remembered those in need. Our bowling lives have been enriched by the care she bestowed. Her life was an enviable pattern which should be emulated more often.

The funeral Mass was Saturday at St. Joseph's Catholic Church (Honey Creek) with interment at St. Joseph's Cemetery.

Laurie Jo Scales Is 600 Club Scratch Champ With 706 Series !!

Billie Wheeler Is Hdcp Champ

This year's San Antonio Women's "600" Club Singles tournament at University Bowl featured five scratch series over the 600 mark, with one 700 by the Club Scratch Champion Laurie Jo Scales.

Laurie Jo rolled the first time in the tournament which allows each member to attempt to qualify twice, on Saturday and posted games of 190, 191 and 225 (606), off her 195 yearbook average.

Returning on Sunday on the 1 p.m. shift, it was games of 234, 248 and 224 for a scratch 706 series. With her 13 pins handicap, she posted a 719 handicap total. Her first place prize money in the Scratch Division was \$55.

Laurie is a two-time champion. She won the Club scratch title in 1975 with a 638 series, which included a 275 high game.

It took Mary Layman, one of the city's top senior ladies, just one 'try' to make the top in the prize fund. She rolled on the final shift on Sunday, rolling with her 178 yearbook average, and slamming in games of 172, 237 and 216 for a scratch 625. Adding her 59 pins handicap, she had a 684 total, for runnerup honors in the scratch division and \$35 in prize money.

The other two members cashing in the scratch division -- Kathy Kirst and

Rocky Boubel - each rolled with 5 pins handicap off their 198 averages. Kathy opened with a 243 game, then added games of 192 and 179 (614 for \$25, while Rocky opened with a 197, added 228 and 188 for a 613 set and \$20 in prize money. On Saturday she also had posted a 555 scratch.

The final scratch 600 set was authored by Patti Hines, just off the paysheet. The 183-average had 179, 197 and 232 for a 608 scratch.

The Club tournament rules provide for two divisions, with all members competing in both divisions, and their placing in the prize list is according to their highest qualifying total (either scratch or handicap).

Rolling with 94 pins handicap off her 165 average and winning handicap honors was Billie Wheeler with a scratch 595, 689 handicap for first money of \$55. Runnerup was 156-average Jeanne Kirk with 569 scratch, 687 handicap. Jeanne also had the tournament high game of 249, which earned her a Columbia 300 bowling ball and second money of \$35.

The remaining two slots in the handicap division were earned by Jeanette Wahl with a scratch 557, 675 handicap for \$25; and Kay Bridges who had 514 scratch, 657 handicap for \$20.

Of the ten dollar entry fee,

one dollar was earmarked as a donation to the BVL Fund and with the 75 entrants, plus donations, the Club will send to BVL \$127.00.

As a Club fund-raiser, several donated items were drawn-for immediately after the final shift. Winning a diamond ring was Mayselle Bauman, a handpainted T-Shirt Kay Bridges, a crocheted afghan Helen Kalala and a baby blanket, Tina Sloat.

Checking recaps of all the entrants in the Club tournament, tournament director, Helen Teller, noted that of the 225 games rolled, there were 26 over the 200 mark, with several dozen over the 190 mark.

Annual Meeting
Between shifts on Saturday, the ladies of the Club held their Fall Meeting and rewarded Phyllis Tondre as the member with the most series over the 600 mark during the previous season. Phyllis had 48 series, including one 739 series, and a 279 high game. She was also a member of the first place team in the Martha Washington Tournament.

Members also voted to sponsor one senior team to the opening of the TWBA Championship Tournament next year in Amarillo. They will also be sponsoring one senior team to the opening of the TWBA in Fort Worth

this year. Dates for the Club's "Bring A Friend" tournament was set as February 9-10, location to be determined later.

Named to serve as the Nominating Committee were Lori Stein, chairman, Anne Menendez with Helen Kalala and Jeanette Wahl as alternates.

As part of the annual meeting president Gail Cantu asked vice president, Joye Duncan to give the invocation. A candle was lighted in memory of Rosalie Bushick, past president and Life Member of the Club, who died on Thursday. Remembered too was past president Myrt DeFily's husband, Pat, who lost a leg to cancer, but hospitalized with a very favorable prognosis of return to the lanes. He is hospitalized at Southeast Baptist Hospital.

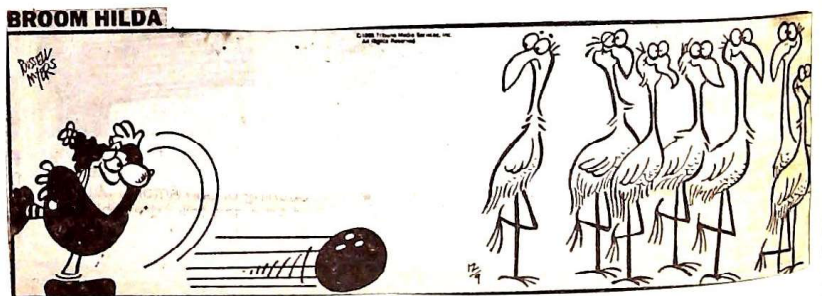
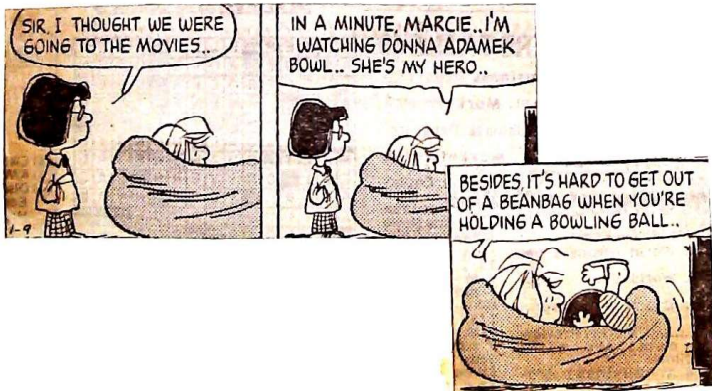

Eleven-year-old Robert Sanford may not bowl a 200 game, but that's all right. He was never expected to even be able to pick up a bowling ball.

The fact that he can ride a bicycle, prepare his own breakfast, speak to his family and friends and help care for Chili, his pet golden retriever, is amazing, his family says.

But that's the kind of boy Robert is — amazing.

Diagnosed at age 2 with fragile X syndrome, a genetic disorder of the X chromosome, about the only thing he expected to do was exist, said his father, Jay Sanford, a retired welder.

Helped stimulate upper body

A bowling ball was placed in his hands when he was 7 to stimulate his upper body, which was developing slowly because of his disorder. He picked up the game, and now bowls well enough to give his father a run for his money.

"P.E. is fun," Robert said. "I love bowling."

Robert has been at bowling for the past four years and will be one of the competitors in the Texas Special Olympics Area 20 Bowling Tournament.

Competing in the event this weekend are more than 1,000 athletes, making it the largest bowling tournament in the state, officials say.

The tournament is scheduled at Banderita Bowling Center, 6700 Huebner Road. Competition will be from 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Sunday. The public is invited.

A victory dance for participants and their families is planned for Nov. 11 from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at Broad Street.

WIBC Membership Drops Below Three Million Mark!

Membership in the WIBC, the world's largest women's sports organization - sadly fell below the 3 million mark for the past bowling season.

The official membership figure for the 1989-90 season is 2,859,570 women, including attached and unattached members. The figure represents a five percent decline in membership from the previous season's total of 3,026,595 women.

During the 1989-90 season, WIBC members competed in 123,907 WIBC sanctioned leagues in the U.S., Canada and on U.S. military bases abroad.

The drop marks the first time since the 1969-70 bowling season WIBC membership has been below 3 million. WIBC membership reached its pinnacle during the 1978-79 bowling season with 4,232,143 women participating in 168,227 WIBC sanctioned leagues.

Optimistic View

"WIBC believes its membership decline will soon stabilize," said Flora Mitchell, WIBC executive secretary. "During the past year, WIBC has fully implemented an aggressive membership recruitment program. The program,

called the Area Recruitment Coordinator Program, initiates and facilitates WIBC membership drives by local WBAs and bowling center proprietors."

"WIBC President Gladys Banker appointed 55 volunteers - representing both the U.S. states and Canadian provinces - to operate the program," said Mitchell. "WIBC is very pleased to announce these volunteers, called ARCs, have developed and enlarged many WIBC sanctioned leagues."

The National Bowling Council and WIBC are also working together on another membership recruitment program. The program, called "Make Your Day" encourages women who are home during the day to join day bowling leagues. NBC mailed special sales kits to local associations and bowling center proprietors to help them organize and operate local "Make Your Day" promotions.

"WIBC expects the success of the two programs to gain momentum from their first year," said Mitchell. "We're very optimistic the two programs will help stabilize WIBC's membership decline."

In the Membership Leaders list the state of Texas is 9th with membership of 106,301. Leader is Michigan with 250,548. Texas has 5,765 leagues in the state (6th in the list); and Detroit is the largest local WBA with 79,639 also leading the local associations with leagues, 2,522.

- ELIGIBILITY:** Entry will be open to members of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association. Members of other associations who bowl in leagues sanctioned through this association may enter, but participation shall be confined to the team event with the team of which the bowler is a regular member. Every entrant must be a member of WIBC.
- TEAM EVENT:** A member may bowl as often as she wishes in team event; however, not more than three players on one team can place more than once in the prize list for position standings.
- DOUBLES AND SINGLES:** Doubles and Singles may only be entered once. Bowlers entering Doubles must also enter Singles and vice versa.
- ALL EVENTS:** All events is automatically entered without fee when bowler enters team, doubles, and singles; however, only those paying the optional all events fee shall be eligible for prize money in all events. Paid All-Events are not transferable unless substitute replaces original entrant in all three events and the transfer is made by the tournament manager or her assistants prior to substitute's participation in any event.
 When a bowler bowls in team event more than once, her first team score shall count toward her all events score.
- HANDICAP:** Handicap to be 80% from the highest in each division. Division 1 will receive 80% handicap from the following scratch figures: Team event from 1000; Doubles Event from 400; Singles Event from 200. All other divisions will be handicapped from the top of their respective categories. There will be four divisions.
- TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONS:**
 - In this tournament, the scratch score winners in each event shall be the **CHAMPIONS** and the highest all-events scratch score, regardless of division shall be declared and acclaimed the **LOCAL CHAMPION**.
 - In this tournament, the handicap score winners in each event shall be the **HANDICAP CHAMPIONS** and the highest all-events handicap score, regardless of division shall be declared and acclaimed the **LOCAL HANDICAP CHAMPION**. The handicap shall be based on 80% difference of 200.
- TOURNAMENT AVERAGE:**
 - Entrants will use their highest WIBC sanctioned average of 21 or more games taken from previous winter leagues or as of mid-night, May 1st as listed in the year book. Entering averages is subject to change if participant bowled in any league which did not submit averages, providing final average sheets is on file in the SAWBA office prior to distribution of prizes.
 - If no previous winter season average, an entrant shall use her highest WIBC sanctioned league average as of the end of the previous summer season, provided she has bowled 21 games or more.
 - If no previous winter or summer league average has been established, an entrant shall use her highest current WIBC sanctioned league average of nine (9) games or more as of closing date of entry (Thursday, October 25, 1990).
 - Entrants not having an average as specified in either a, b, or c, will use her highest average for nine (9) or more games as of date of participation.
- Participants must check in 45 minutes before scheduled time of events and **MUST SHOW WIBC CARD** upon checking in. Replacements may be allowed for just cause in any event upon notification to the Local Secretary at least one (1) hour before squad time.
- Substitutes will not be required to reimburse the original entrant with the entry fee paid nor shall she be expected to give the original entrant any prize money or trophy she (the substitute) may win.

According to tournament manager Louise Mangelsdorf, 177 teams with 384 sets of doubles, 768 singles and 728 all events entrants will roll their began their roll this weekend (and next) for SAWBA titles. Host centers are University Bowl (team) and Bandera Bowl (singles and doubles).

And there's sure to be new champions this year. Looking over the defending champs list from last year's event, in all events, our records show that only the defending scratch

champion from the 1989 tournament is in the field this year. Grace Richardson will be rolling with one of her teams opening weekend.

The Handicap All Events Champion, Christine McCoy, has entered only singles and doubles after her sensational scoring last year as a virtual novice in the competition. The Handicap all events champ in Div. 1, Stella Wood, is also not entered. The Div. 2 and Div. 3 all events champs (scratch and handicap) are not entered either this year. Defending in Div. 2 would be impossible for Toni Otto who now resides outside San Antonio, and Beverly McIntosh is not listed on the alphabetical list of contestants.

Wood is also the handicap singles champ in Div. 1, and the scratch singles champ,

Rocky Boubel will be competing in a Latin Bowlers event in Corpus Christi, this weekend, and competing in a Regional LPBT stop in Enid, OK the final weekend, so she'll be missing.

All-time record setter, Elizabeth Williams will be rolling her doubles and singles opening weekend, but won't compete in team event until the final weekend. Her 2013 scratch is the All Events total to top, together with a tournament high game of 288, high tournament series of 736, and the all-time high handicap all events total of 2106, all rolled during the record 1986 event.

According to Kegl records, the largest number of teams entered in the SAWBA Championships was in 1976-77 when 365 teams rolled. The most doubles and singles entries came in the 1982-83 season (1444 singles, 2888 doubles) plus the largest all events entry of 1,316. The largest prize fund was in 1984 when \$22,397 was paid out.

Plaque awards, chevrons and prize money will be distributed by Mangelsdorf and SAWBA president Betty Holzmann at the Awards Party on December 9th at Shenandoah Party House.

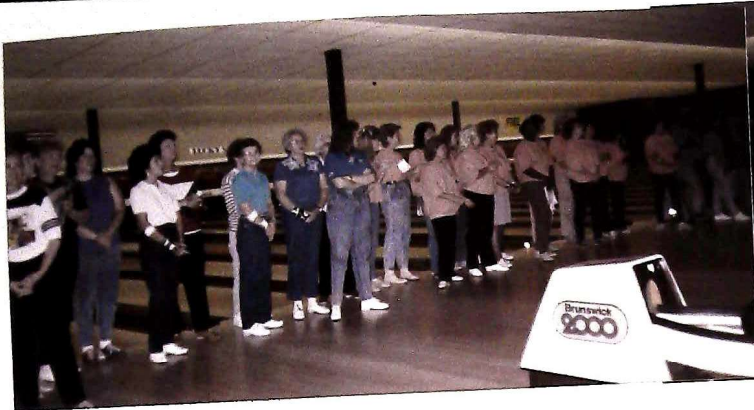

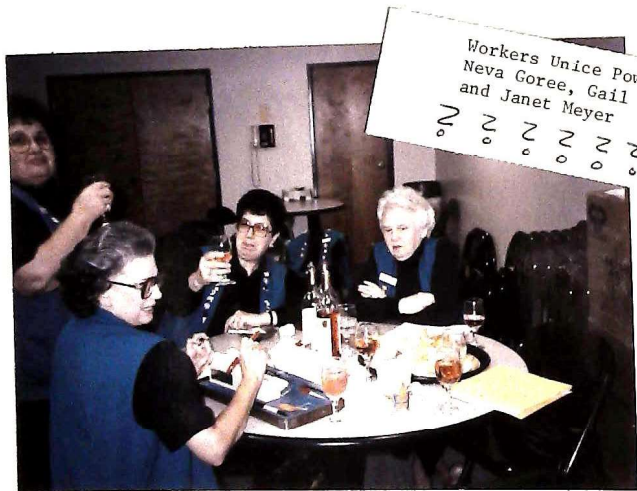

One pin stopped Rocky Boubel from perfection. In her first frame of the ladies TCBA traveling stop at University Bowl, Rocky left the 7-pin on her first ball -- then struck eleven consecutive times for a 290 game.

She went on to a 749 high series, and in the second set of the TCBA (the league rolls 6 games on Saturday, six on Sunday), she swatted 562 for a 1311 six-game total.

The 749 series is the second highest in TCBA history by a woman. The record score for a distaff member is held by Denise Harriston (751) rolled Dec. 18, 1988 at Don Carter Beach in Fort Worth.

Rocky already has the high 6-game individual series of 1426 rolled when the TCBA ladies rolled at Wonder Bowl last January 7th. She's also a member of the Astro Bowl team which holds the highest 3-game team series of 3211, rolled that same day at Wonder Bowl.

Former top woman bowler finds release with golf

The love for her future husband more than 30 years ago opened the door to an outstanding career in bowling for Mary Falconer.

Falconer earned the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association's Superior Performance Award, or Woman Bowler of the Year, for eight-straight seasons from 1973 to 1980.

She was named the Texas Women's Bowling Association Bowler of the Year in 1980, and was inducted into the San Antonio Bowling Council's Hall of Fame earlier this year.

"When I met Ken, he told me that, 'If you love me, you have to love my bowling ball,'" said Falconer, a Cotulla native, whose husband was an avid bowler at the time. "So I got involved in bowling because I wanted to be with him."

The Falconers have been married for 28 years and they have three children: Kevin, 27, Scott, 25, and Melissa, 22.

"What am I doing now? I'm playing golf as much as I can," the 45-year-old grandmother said. "My job is playing golf, and babysitting my three grandchildren, Crystal (7), Renee (3) and Amber (1). Now isn't that a tough life?"

"One thing is for certain, I've turned the tables on Ken. If he wants to see me, he has to be on the golf course. Now I've got Ken playing golf."

Falconer has only bowled in one league in the past two seasons, and virtually left the sport competitively in 1984. Ken, who works for the IBM Company, only bowls in one league as a substitute.

"I just got burned out on bowling," Falconer said. "I did it too much. Then, I got bit by the golf bug. I fell in love with golf."

"I play golf everyday if I have the opportunity. The hardest thing about it is learning to talk golf on the course. Instead of saying what lane my next shot's on, I have to learn what tee box we're starting from. It really takes a while to adjust."

Falconer has already made

some marks in golf. She won the third flight title in the women's city tournament three years ago, and finished second in the first flight last year. She has a 12-to-14 handicap in golf.

"I'll never be in golf what I was in bowling," Falconer said. "I think it's tougher to become a scratch golfer than a scratch bowler. And that's not to say that bowling was easy. I had to work for what I got in bowling. Golf is just more challenging."

As a bowler, Falconer averaged 201 in 1978-79 and 200 in 1980-81, and she won the city's all-events title in 1978. She still teaches bowling on an one-on-one basis at different local centers.

"Certainly, one of my greatest thrills was being inducted into the local Hall of Fame," Falconer said. "Another is having the privilege of coaching Joe Vito (Buenrostro), Carlos Castaneda, Randy Burns and Curt Elliott when they were junior bowlers. Heck, they already had 200-plus averages then. I didn't tell them what to do. All I tried to do was help them with their mental games."

Falconer, who was once a certified junior bowling instructor, was a junior coach at old Thunder Bowl, Sports Palace and Bowler-

ama lanes, and at Astro Bowl and Oak Hills lanes.

She had a number of 279 games and a career-high 762 series. She also won quite a few local women's tournaments, including three "600 Club" titles. Falconer was also a ninth-place finish in the national WIBC Queens event.

"I really miss the people in bowling," Falconer said. "but you also have good people in golf. But I look at my playing golf as if I was a bowler. Right now, I'm a fair golfer, which would be about a 182- to 190-average bowler. I moving up slowly as a golfer but it's fun working at it."

Consistent Kirst wins city title

If you let Kathy Kirst explain it, the only way she could have won the SAWBA city women's title was by luck.

However, when it's your fourth city title, many people aren't going to be convinced that luck had anything to do with it.

The 31-year-old left-hander walked away with top honors with a nine-game scratch total of 1,815 in the tournament, which recently completed its two-weekend run.

"I really didn't think that I would win because so many players bowled well," Kirst said. "I guess some of the bowlers did exceptionally well in doubles and singles, but didn't do as well in the team event, or vice versa. I was just fortunate to bowl consistent."

Kirst, who has earned the SAWBA Superior Performance Award the past two seasons, had games of 233, 226 and 232 for a 691 series in the team event. She had 177, 191 and 183 for 551 in doubles, and 185, 203 and 185 for a 573 series in singles.

"I'm very thrilled and happy to win another title," said Kirst, who earned the TWBA's Bowler of the Year Award for the 1988-89 season. "I won several city doubles and team titles. But the all-events title is something special. I won it in 1977, 1982 and 1983. It's a good feeling to win it once again. I wouldn't mind if I could do it again next year."

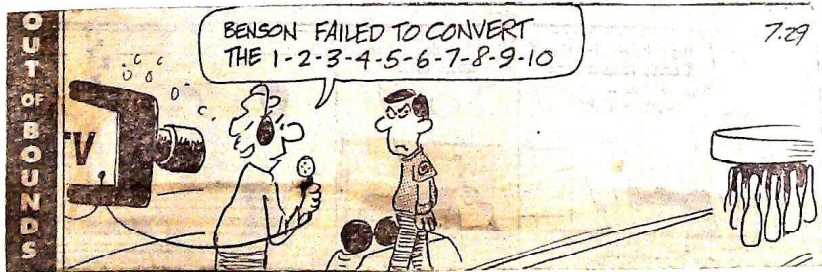
Janet Hajek won Division I handicap honors with a 1,903 total. Hajek had 624 in team, 588 in doubles and 520 in singles for a 1,732 scratch total. She had a 171-pin handicap for a total pinfall of 1,903.

Diana Nelson, a Division 4 competitor, was the tournament's overall handicap champion with a 1,964 score. Nelson had 568 in the team event, 458 in doubles and 406 in singles for a 1,432 scratch total. The 126-average bowler received a 532-pin handicap for the tournament and finished with a 1,964 overall score. Nelson also swept scratch and handicap honors in her division.

The Awesome Five, with Diana Everman (244-636), Andrea Keck (480), Phyllis Tondre (255-688), Tracy Desmit (235-661) and Kerrville's Nellwyn Sadler (544), captured Division I team scratch and handicap with respective scores of 3,009 and 3,177.

Connie Smoot, the long-time vice president of sales at Columbia Industries, and Linda Bray combined to win both Division I scratch and handicap with scores of 1,187 and 1,283.

Carol McTaggart also swept Division I singles with a scratch 643 series and a 679 handicap score.



When you wish upon a star...

In late February, or early March, local associations were informed about a brand new WIBC program that was to begin this past summer. Called the Future Leaders Program, it was designed to recognize and cultivate leadership capabilities in members of local and state associations who were at the entry level, and had been serving less than 5 years.

In keeping with the adopted theme of Proud of our Past, Prepared for our Future, WIBC realized that to insure that future, women needed to be "brought up" so to speak, learning and doing the things that will keep WIBC a viable entity in the bowling world.

San Antonio WBA submitted my resume to the committee, and I'm honored to tell you that at the National Convention in Tampa, my name was on the roster along with 72 other very excited women from across the United States and Canada.

In late July we were flown in to Milwaukee for 3 days of intense seminars on topics such as team building, volunteer recruitment, and problem solving. We were also treated to a tour of the ABC/WIBC Headquarters. The building doesn't look much different than any other corporate building, but some of the statistics about the organization were astounding. For instance: the Certification Department reviews and approves applications for approximately 150,000 lane beds every year. The CLIW program now boasts over 4500 trained Inspectors in the field. The Data Processing Department is supporting 1,222 LABS (local association bowling software) users, 423 of which are Women's associations. WIBC's mail room handles over 2,000 bags and trays of incoming mail each year, and sends out over 3.5 million pieces. The Printing Department processes 4,000 plus jobs every year, with anywhere from 15 to 150,000 pieces on each job. The warehouse ships, stores and receives over 3 million pounds of paper and other goods per year, and Purchasing is responsible for buying 5 million record sheets, 3 million standing sheets, 1.4 million playing rules books, 3 freight cars of paper, 600,000 emblems, and 30.5 carats of diamonds. Amazing! We were also treated to a tour of the Outback (the research and development center.)

They call it the Outback because it's out back of the main building. Clever!! Those fellows have some great "big boy" toys like lasers and piston driven ball throwers. They have a lot of fun, but it was apparent that the "mad scientists" have our best interests and the integrity of our sport in mind when they conduct their experiments.

We weren't brought to Milwaukee for a 3 day play period, though.

We were brought in to learn. This Future Leaders group had very special teachers—Gladys Banker, Flora Mitchell, Nancy Tatum, Lynn Madler, Bonnie Thuelecke, Elaine Riebotski, Jane Wippert, Jerry Topczewski, Mary Lynly, Marilyn Beck, Mary Beth Malm, Sheila Isakson, and Fred Borden. Through all the seminars they challenged us, changed our perspectives with a word here and there, made us think, and sometimes, made us hot under the collar.

What a year Kathy had!! Some of her accomplishments include 41 "600" series; 7 of those 650 or better; 2 "700" series, a 725 and a 749; a 299 and a 300 game; a composite average of 194.06 from 4 leagues, eighth in Singles at the TWBA Championship tournament in Corpus Christi, and being named TWBA bowler for the year.

Somewhat at a loss for words, Kathy nevertheless had a big smile for everyone. She commented "There are many good bowlers in San Antonio. I'm just one of them. How about naming an All-Star Team?" Thanks for the suggestion, Kathy, and congratulations, again. A big YAY!! Other business conducted at the meeting included presentation of 10 year service awards to Past SAWBA President, Ella O'Quinn, and retiring Director, Irene Castaldo. These two ladies have an aggregate total of nearly 50 years of service to SAWBA between them. The Nominating Committee elected for the 1990-91 season are Helen Buetz, and Tip Preitter, Co-Chairmen, Dorris Tanner, Madelyn Spreng, and Myrt DeFily. The assembly also voted to adopt multiple membership effective on August 1, 1991. San Antonio 600 Club is holding the annual Singles Tournament and fall meeting the

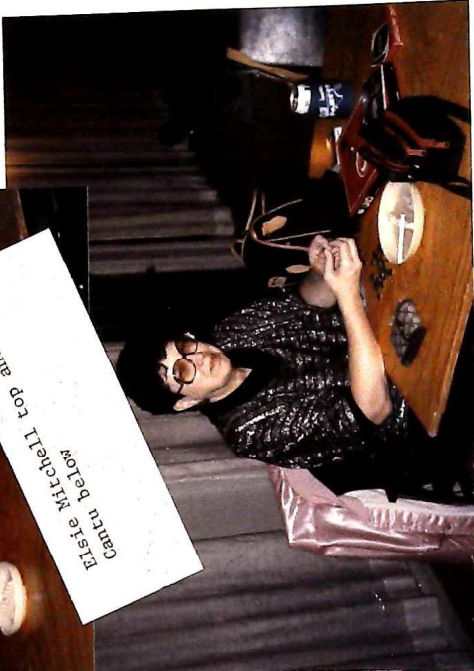

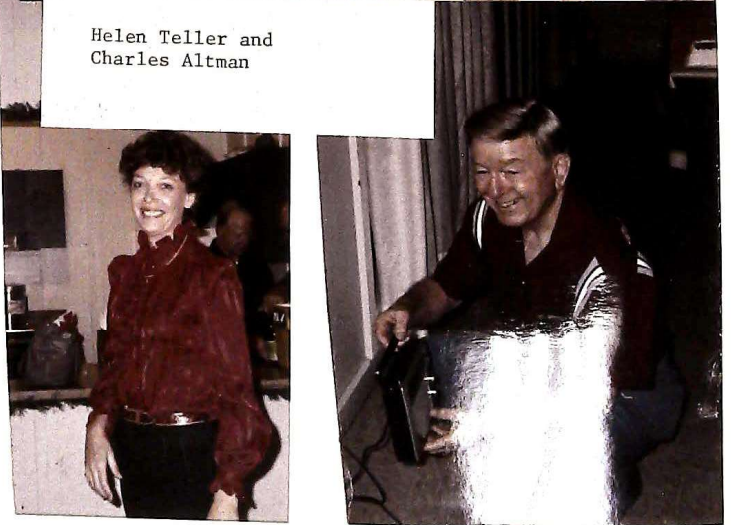

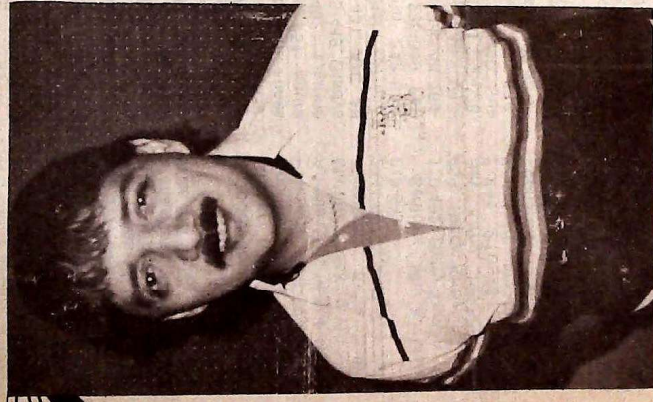

Joe Vito And Johnny Jowdy Sr. Selected For Hall of Fame Induction !!



Perhaps WIBC's slogan for the 75th anniversary celebrations would also be appropriate for this year's San Antonio Bowling Council Hall of Fame Banquet -- "Proud of our Past, and Prepared for the Future!"

John Jowdy, Sr. won the first City Match Singles back in 1948 -- and Joe Vito Buenrostro won it 33 years later in 1986.

In 1961, Jowdy originated the Top Twenty Tournament and Joe won THAT 23 years later in 1984 -- along with a win in the Austin Top Twenty Marathon (1980).

As Jowdy pursued his career as the 'ambassador' for Columbia 300 on the PBA Tour, Joe became one of the most well-known and feared shooters from San Antonio among the world's greatest bowlers.

Differences and parallels - from the past, present and future!

Now the two will share the spotlight when the San Antonio Bowling Council inducts both into the local

sanctioned perfect games. Joe was the youngest state All Events champion when he won the TSBA tournament in 1975-6 (2089 for nine games). Twice he's been a member of a team which had the nation's high series for the season; was a member of the team with the high series for a mixed team (1980), and was the first man ever to roll three games in the 290s in one day in the ABC Masters tournament (1982). He's at his very best in match play competition and has a host of trophies (and prize money) for his efforts, and his prize earnings in various events are unequalled by any local bowler (highest first place in the \$500,000 Hoinke Super Classic in Cincinnati last year, \$90,000 first).

Both honorees are avid sports fans. Joe played basketball for his High School team (Holy Cross) and follows football and basketball avidly. Jowdy was a star baseball player

all aspects of the bowling game, the PBA also named their Collegiate Scholarship in Jowdy's honor.

Joe, now 33, has to his credit wins in every major scratch event in the city and state, with a sprinkling of

national recognition in scratch events as well. Since joining his first adult league he has carried an average over the 205 mark (high of 227) plus at least eight series over the 800 mark (high of 859) and nearly 20

And the pros who have benefited from John's expertise all know Joe Vito. He's been in the field with many of them many times, most recently, last year in the Austin Open, when he was the only amateur in the top twenty four.

Jowdy may never be inducted into the ABC Hall of Fame because he's never stayed in one place long

enough to compete in regular league play. But in just a few short years Joe will be eligible for the ballot for the ABC Hall of Fame because of his outstanding performances in those events and in the Masters in the ABC with Carlos Castaneda. Joe was third in doubles in 1979; in 1980 he was fourth in All Events with 2025; fourth in the Masters in 1982; shot an 1823 in Baltimore; then 1852 in 1983, and again in 1984 was fourth in all events. And, sandwiched between the national competition have been high placings in TSBA state competition, most recently a first with 1502 in State Doubles (1989), again with Carlos.

(pitcher), once pitching eight games in seven days, giving up as few as two runs in a game.

After 20 years as a lounge operator, Jowdy joined Columbia Industries as a salesman in the early 1960s, and since that time has driven over 2 million miles promoting San Antonio, Columbia 300 and bowling, and another 300,000 by air. He 'semi-retired' after 25 years with the firm, but continues to handle several events for Columbia at ABC tournament time.

And, perhaps most importantly he's an expert on the games of most of the pros, and when they have problems, they seek out Jowdy to correct their flaws.

Past, present and future -- dedication -- knowledge -- talent and acclaim -- that's what induction into any Hall of Fame is all about. This year's banquet may surpass all those great ones of the past. Certainly two of the most worthy candidates have been selected -- all that remains is the time to adequately praise and applaud both Joe and John for their manly, superb achievements.

The date for the Hall of Fame Banquet is February 12th, Holiday Inn, and ticket information will be available shortly.

It should be one whale of a night !!

Three elected to WIBC Hall of Fame

Three women have been selected for induction into the Women's International Bowling Congress Hall of Fame during ceremonies April 22, 1991, at the WIBC Annual Meeting in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Vesma Grinfelds, San Francisco, and Betty Mivelaz, Tujunga, Calif., were elected under the Superior Performance category; and Anne Simone, West Allis, Wis., was elected under the Meritorious Service category. The three inductees will bring the total number of women honored in the WIBC Hall of Fame to 103—67 for Superior Performance and 36 for Meritorious Service.

Grinfelds, a professional bowler, has 10 professional titles and 13 regional professional titles to her credit. The right-hander earned a WIBC title when she won the team event at the 1983 WIBC Championship Tournament in Las Vegas, Nev. She is currently ranked 17th on the all-time professional career earnings list with \$142,360. Grinfelds, 39, was selected in her first year of eligibility.

"Being elected to the Hall of Fame is the ultimate honor," Grinfelds said. "It has caught me off guard. You never really expect it to happen, and I certainly didn't expect it to happen this soon."

Grinfelds was elected to the *Woman Bowler* magazine All-American team four times and was the Western Women's Professional Bowlers Rookie of the Year in 1971. That year, Grinfelds became the first amateur to win a national professional tournament, when she captured the Magic Roll Open in Las Vegas, Nev. Grinfelds accomplished another first in 1973 when she became the first American woman to win a Japanese professional tournament, winning the Khushu Open.

Grinfelds earned California Women's Bowling Association team titles in 1976 and 1979 and won the San Francisco WBA all-events crown in 1979. Her best year came in 1978 when she won three professional titles.

Grinfelds finished second twice in the prestigious WIBC Queens Tournament, in 1977 and 1990. She has three 300 games to her credit and a career high average of 201. Her career best three-game series is 772.

As an instructor, Grinfelds served as coach of the Philippines national bowling team in 1982 and 1983. She was the technical advisor to the National Bowling Council and has authored two books on bowling—"The Complete Book of Bowling" and "Right Down Your Alley."

Grinfelds, who began bowling at age 14, was inducted into the San Francisco WBA Hall of Fame in 1985. She is married and has an 18-month-old son.

Mivelaz, who was elected under the Veteran's division of the Superior Performance category, won the Professional Women Bowler's Association National Championships in 1967. That same year, Mivelaz earned a WIBC title, winning the team event at the WIBC Championship Tournament in Rochester, N.Y.

The 59-year old Mivelaz was forced to quit bowling in 1986 due to back and hip problems, but started competing again in league competition last year.

"I am absolutely numb," Mivelaz said about her selection. "This is the biggest thrill in the world. I knew my name was on the ballot, but I figured too much time had passed. It is such an honor to be held in the same company as the many great bowlers already in the WIBC Hall of Fame."

Mivelaz was dominant on the California bowling scene. She earned 10 Western Women's Professional Bowlers titles and compiled four California WBA crowns. She was named to the California Bowling Writers All-Star team nine times and was Southern California Bowler of the Year in 1968.

The right-hander has bowled in 24 WIBC Championship Tournaments and 21 WIBC Queens Tournaments.

She has two 300 games to her credit and a career high series of 748 and season average of 201.

Mivelaz was inducted into the San Fernando (Calif.) WBA Hall of Fame in 1979; the Southern California Hall of Fame in 1976; and the California WBA Hall of Fame in 1978. Mivelaz is married and has three children and five grandchildren.

Simone, 61, has served WIBC on the local, state and national levels for nearly 30 years. A Massachusetts native, Simone served as secretary of the Greater Springfield (Mass.) WBA from 1960 to 1965. She helped organize and charter the Massachusetts WBA and served as its secretary from 1963 to 1977. She was appointed to the WIBC Board of Directors in 1965 and served in that capacity until she was elected sergeant-at-arms in 1976. Simone served as sergeant-at-arms for nine years.

"This is the culmination of a dream," Simone said. "I am thrilled to be selected for this honor. I became involved in bowling because I loved the work. Working in the sport has meant many new friends and many opportunities."

Simone resigned her WIBC Board position in 1985 and accepted a staff appointment as WIBC administrative assistant. In that position, Simone was instrumental in the operation of the TEAM USA Bowling Tournament, which selected individuals for the U.S. bowling team. She was appointed WIBC Group Executive-Tournaments in 1988 and still serves in that capacity. At the 1985 WIBC Annual Meeting in Toledo, Ohio, Simone was elected a WIBC Member Emeritus.

Simone started her bowling career playing candlepins in 1940. She began tenpin bowling in 1959 and soon became involved in the administrative side of the sport. A teacher, Simone received her A.B. degree in mathematics from Boston University in 1950 and received a Master's of Education degree from the University of Massachusetts in 1958.

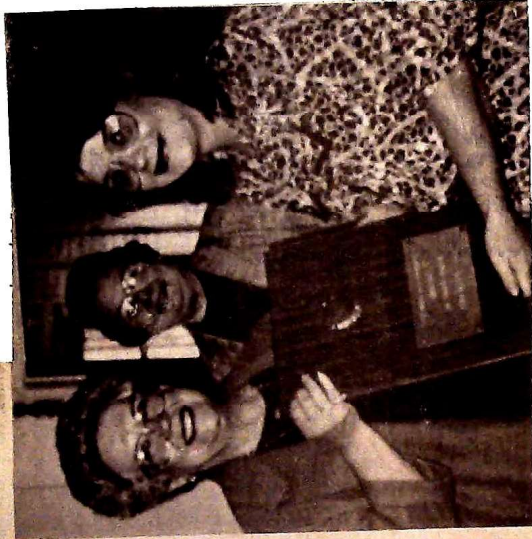

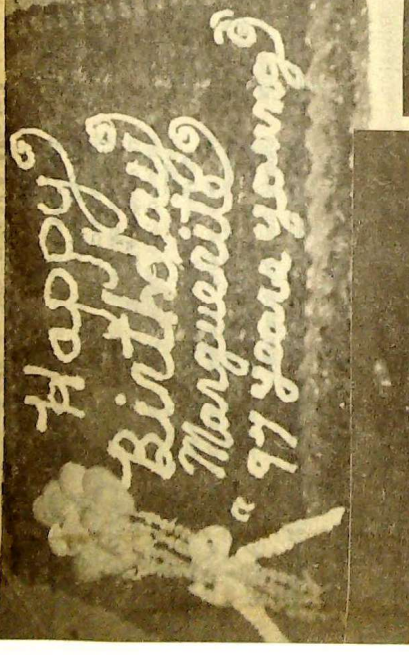

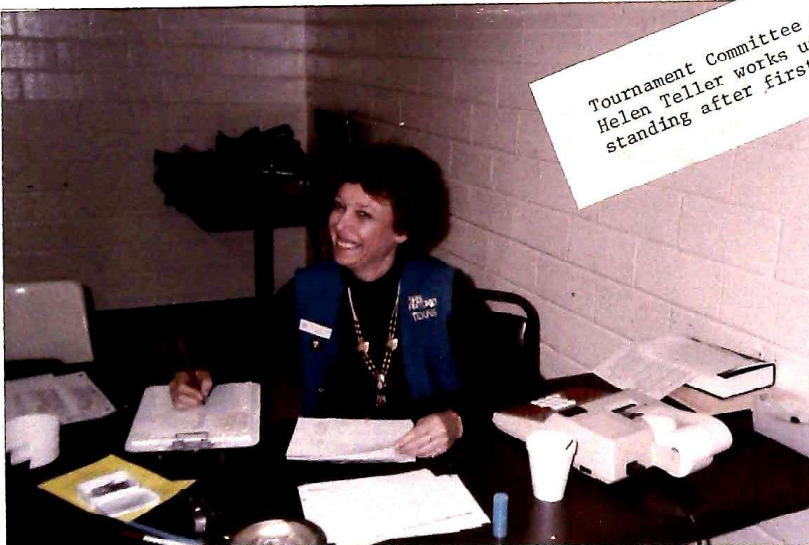

Saturday Nite Hall Of Fame Banquet To Salute Joe Vito & John Jowdy Sr.

Saturday night is Hall of Fame night for the San Antonio Bowling Council, and to be inducted are PBA's "Bowling Guru", John Jowdy, Sr., and the "Man With the Golden Arm", Joe Vito Buenrostro. Both San Antonio natives who have come to be known by the entire bowling world - and both with outstanding credentials during their bowling careers.

And they - so different - but so alike have made their own in-roads into the game. Both were born in April (Taureans), both love the thrill and challenge of high-rolin' scratch action (Joe currently, John Sr. in the past), both avid sports fans - both twice married with two children (well, Joe with one and one on the way), and both sharing a love of jewelry (John a connoisseur of silver Indian jewelry, Joe in the gold jewelry business).

But there are as many differences between the two as there are similarities. Flamboyant, talkative and happy-go-lucky Jowdy began his bowling in 1939, tutored by the late-great Willie Granieri at old Main Avenue lanes. In the second year of bowling John was averaging 188 at a time when no one in the city was averaging 200.

Joe, quiet, determined and businesslike as he goes about his lane tasks, started his career at age five and had his first feature story written about him when he was age six (for a 408 series). By age 13 he was carrying his first 200 league average.

John Sr. had traveled almost every city in 26 states for almost a decade for Columbia 300 before 19-year-old Joe Vito became the youngest man in the state to earn the Class A All Events (State Champion) title.

In 1974 while Jowdy was grooming his trademark beard and sporting his huge \$4.00 Royal Jamaican cigar (which he never lights) and improving and perfecting the games of many of the top professionals of PBA, Joe slammed in his 279-794 for the Special Edition team - the best team score in ABC for the season (3606)- and that was four years before his first 800 series (games of 256, 299 and 278/833) and the second time he was a member of the top team in the nation (Sports Palace team with 3757). For that performance Joe had games of 268, 299 and 233 for another 800 series.

There'll be dozens of tales -- some nostalgic, some inspiring as the duo are enshrined in the local Hall of Fame.

"Coming Home" to serve again as Masters of Ceremonies will be genial

John Jowdy, Jr., former manager of Ponderosa Bowl and Hacienda Bowl. John, of course is the son of the honoree who now resides in Houston.

It should also be a warm and wonderful time when nationally known bowling writer, Chuck Pezzano presents a special video message to formerly induct Jowdy. The two have shared many many memories as they traveled with the Pro Bowlers Tour.

Doing the 'honors' for Joe Vito will be SABA Vice President, John Jones, a former member of the Council and a lifelong friend of Joe's.

When I did venture to ask a question, I was told I didn't need to know what was going on, I only needed to do as I was told. So, you don't want my ideas; what am I doing here?

Be honest — don't these little scenar-

ios sound familiar? We are losing members at every level, but especially here in the grass roots.

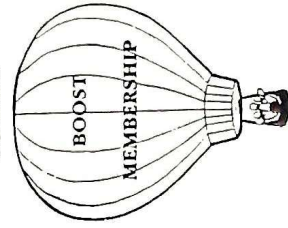
It doesn't take much time to keep a bowler happy and active. It does take a lot of time and effort to bring an unhappy bowler back. Answer her questions, or if you can't, find someone who can and get back to her with an answer. Take a moment and look up that schedule; the caller will be more confident in the information, having received it from someone she's familiar with, and you know she'll come back time and time again because you helped her keep her self-confidence and enthusiasm.

Keep the lines of communication open with your board members, too. Make a special effort to include new members in discussions. Answer their questions even if the information is "old hat" to you and some of the others. Remember, you want some of the others. Remember, you want new input, new ideas. These things aren't possible without the free flow of information.

Retaining the members we now have should be as important as recruiting new ones. You, be it as a league secretary, a tournament director, a board member, or simply a bowler, can help in both aspects — keeping and growing — by maintaining a positive, upbeat attitude in everything you do involving our sport. WIBC can continue to be the best women's organization around only if our members know and believe that we are.

Communication is the most valuable tool we have. Use it! ♣

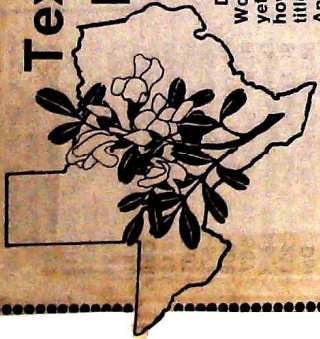

Texas Ladies Shoot For Bluebonnet Queens Crown



This is Texas Bluebonnet Queens weekend and 285 of the top lady bowlers in the state will invade Austin and Showplace Lanes for the 22nd annual scratch event for women.

Among the 285 entrants are representatives from 45 local associations, and since its beginning in 1970, 2,791 ladies have participated - many since the very beginning.

In the elite field of top women are eleven former Queens as well as eleven past State Champions.

Donna Dillon, currently bowling out of Dallas and the first Queen to win back-to-back Queens titles, then a third Queens crown in 1986 was co-State Champion in 1984. Regina Hillier Loveall, Armarillo, Queen in 1982 and 1982 and again in 1979 was State champ in 1983. They are the only two wearing the Queens' tiara three times.

Defending Queen, Mary Wolfe Betke, Waco, has not yet earned a state crown, however has two Queens titles to her credit - in San Antonio in 1983 and again last year in Beaumont.

The 1991 All Events champ, Evelyn Lanier, Austin, earned her Queens crown in 1976, and Fran Lary Minton, Wichita Falls, won both the Queens title and the State All Events title in 1975.

Others in the Bluebonnet Queens field this year who reigned as State Champions are Nell Jordan, Killeen (1977), Kimish Young, Waco (1979), Jane Galbreath, Austin (1980); Laurie Jo Scales, San Antonio (1981); Julia Halve, Waco (1985), Nancy Kuznieski, Austin (1987) and Kathy Kirst, San Antonio (1988).

Since Austin is just an hour's drive away, for those wishing to watch the action: Squad A begins its play at 9 a.m. Saturday, returning at 2 p.m. Squad B begins its roll at 11:30 a.m. and returns at 4:30 p.m.

That evening the 48 high qualifiers enter into semifinial play of four games across eight lanes set to begin at 7:30 p.m.

The ten high qualifiers advance to heads-up match play on Sunday (March 3) at 9 a.m. and the final game of

ten is a position match. When the 1991 Queen is crowned immediately after the finals she will receive approximately \$650.00 in prize money, a trophy, a gold charm necklace symbolic of the title, a white satin sports jacket and a paid entry into the 1992 queens.

Columbia 300, co-sponsors of the Queens contributes to the prize fund and in addition awards six Columbia Bowling balls. Columbia's Vice President, Connie Smoot is again expected in the Queens field. Not listed when we first gave the San Antonio delegation's names are former junior star, Laurie Leuck, now attending West Texas State University, and listed as Amarillo, and Nell Sadler, who lives in Kerrville, and rolls the TCBA Traveling league in the city.

The TWBA Board members who serve on the Queens Committee are Sylvia Broyles, State Secretary and tournament manager; TWBA President Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls; Beverly McLendon, Houston, Vice President and Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi, vice president and treasurer Sue Hunter, Alamo.

Council Fund-raiser

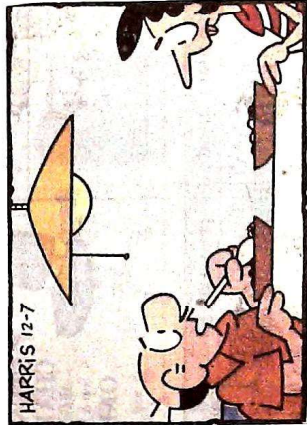
