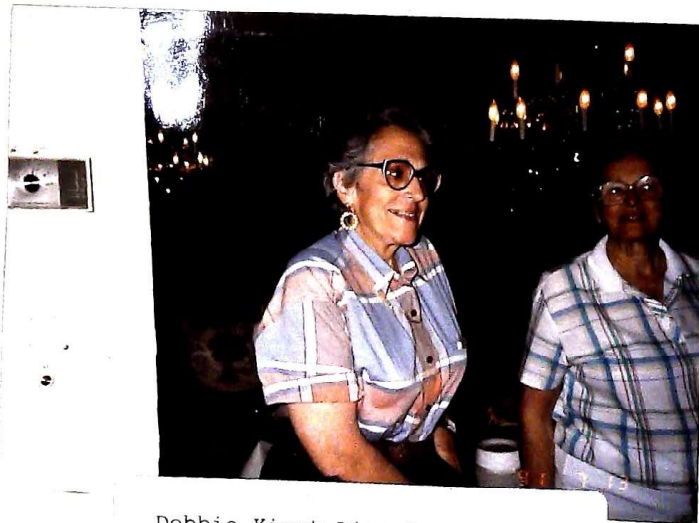

League Officers And

Other Interested Bowlers Invited To Workshops !!



All League Officers and interested members of WIBC and ABC are invited to attend the League Officers Workshops. And there are four of them to fit almost anyone's schedule.

The first two are on the southside of the city - Tuesday, August 13th at S. A. Moose Lodge No. 744 at 826 Highland Blvd. Those first two will be held at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Next, there are two at the Meeting Place at University Bowl (12332 IH-10 West (take DeZavala Rd exit off IH-10), on Wednesday August 14th, again at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Purpose of the workshops

is to distribute league supplies for the new season, explanation of rule changes adopted at the two national annual meetings, instruction on league sanctioning processes and discussion of services available through the local association, awards, officers' duties and solutions of most frequent league problems.

According to new season Publicity Chairwoman Jeanette Wahl, SABA Secretary Bob Martin, and returning SAWBA Secretary Tip Pfeiffer will also conduct a question/answer session for league officers. Other league officers - not just presidents and secretaries -

should also be informed of all matters pertaining to rules and league sanctioning, so they too should be encouraged to attend at least one Workshop.

No reservations are necessary, and no league supplies will be mailed, so if current officers are unable to attend, a league representative should make plans to attend.

August 9, 1991 KEGLER Fee Increase For WIBC

WIBC has increased its entry fees for the WIBC Championship tournament.

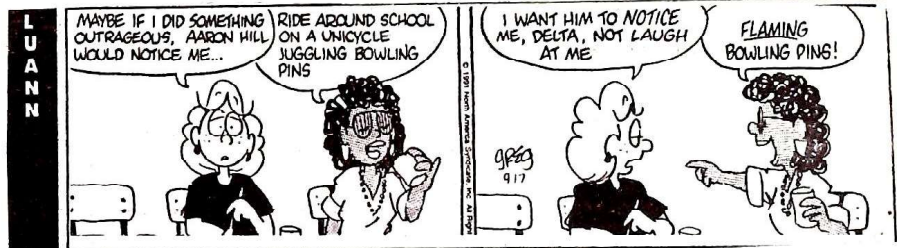
Effective with the 1992 event, entry fees for the team, doubles and singles events will increase by \$2. All events entry fees will remain unchanged.

Division I and Div. II bowlers will be charged \$17 per person per event, and Open Div. bowlers will be charged \$20 per person per event. All events will remain \$2 for Div. I and II, and \$4 for Open Division bowlers.

WIBC automatically mailed 1992 entry forms from Bowling Headquarters to 8,892 team captains from the 1991 event. To obtain an entry form, write WIBC, Championship Tournament, Dept. 5301 S. 76th St., Greendale, WI 531-29-1191 or call (414) 421-9000.

All entries must be postmarked no later than Jan. 10, 1992.

WIBC will conduct the 1992 event in Lansing, Mich., April 2 to May 26, 1992, unless extended. Holiday Lanes will host the team event, and Pro Bowl will host the doubles and singles events.

It's time to prepare for the 1991-92 league season. As you begin the season you may wonder what you get for your money when you pay for membership in the WIBC. An appropriate question, especially in this day and age.

When you pay for membership in the WIBC you join the largest sports organization for women in the world. The membership card you receive represents standardized rules, gives access to counseling, workshops, awards for all average categories, gives bonding protection for league and association funds, publications and pamphlets, and printed supplies to help individual members, leagues and local and state associations derive the maximum from their participation in the sport of bowling.

New bowlers may think that organizing and sanctioning their league is unnecessary because all they want is "to have fun". But, the exact opposite is true. A well organized league, with reasonable rules, can prevent misunderstandings and inequities which may destroy the "fun" you are seeking.

Having publicized rules and prize funds, responsible officers who know where to get help if they have questions, and understanding among members of when, where and how long they will bowl and how much they will pay and can win, is the only business-like and fair way to operate. In this way the needed guidance and information are provided that is necessary for a large group of people to participate harmoniously in a competitive sport. Having these specifics spelled out in advance doesn't impose on league members; it sets them free to really enjoy bowling.

The price of a WIBC membership card is one of the only real bargains still around, take advantage of the membership benefits.

The SAWBA Open Membership Association meeting will take place at 1:30 P.M. September 22, 1991 at the Ponderosa Bowl on Goliad Road. Please make every effort to attend and take an active part in your association. The SAWBA Board members will be there, this is your opportunity to meet your House Director and get to know them. Also make your views known. We are here to help you with league problems and also to further the game of ten pins.

Best of luck to you all - and good bowling!

SAWBA TOURNAMENT

In the heat of mid-August, it's hard to imagine what January and February will be like, but we've got a special guaranteed "chiller" planned for you. Our SAWBA Annual Championship Tournament for the 91-92 season has been scheduled for January 25 - February 9. Ponderosa Bowl will be the Team House and Brunswick Thousand Oaks will be the Doubles and Singles House. Each event is \$11.00 per bowler. Optional All Events is \$2.00. Entry blanks will be available in all the centers sometime in October.

As in the past, the tournament will be handicapped in each of the four divisions, so no matter what your average, there's a category for you!!

Reserved times: If you have a preferred time you would like to bowl, call the SAWBA office and make your reservation. Your entry with correct fees must be submitted to the SAWBA secretary by December 19, 1991, or your advance reservation will be canceled.

Closing date for all other entries is Thursday, January 9, 1992. Instant cash (\$\$\$) will be distributed at the Team House. Look for posters with more details in your centers in November.

The Second Time Around -- Some of you may remember that eight years ago I turned over the reins as Secretary of SAWBA to Louise Mangelsdorf, who has done an outstanding job. She leaves some big shoes to fill and I know she will be missed. However, she has now passed those reins right back to me, and it is with extreme pleasure that I begin a second "tour of duty".

We'd like to call your attention to a few important changes in our operation beginning this season. First we remind you that the SAWBA Local Association Tournament has been moved from the fall of the year to January 25 - February 9, 1992. Team event will be bowled at Ponderosa Bowl and Brunswick Thousand Oaks will host the Doubles/Singles events. This will be the first year to hold the tournament during the winter months and we hope the bowlers will approve the change. We look forward to a big turn-out.

Beginning on August 1 this year, members of other women's bowling associations who bowl in leagues in this association will be required to join the SAWBA by paying \$3.00 (Local Association portion of dues) plus State Association dues of \$1.25 if from out of state.

In the six weeks I have worked with Louise to acquaint myself with the computer, etc., I have learned that one of the most important and helpful things a bowler can do to help our office is to give us her correct Social Security number on every membership application she fills out, whether she is purchasing her card through that league or not. Our computer program is set up to index by Social Security number, and this is the method by which our bowlers are identified. You can see how important these numbers are!!

We are proud of the wonderful cooperation between our Association and that of the San Antonio (men's) Bowling Association. We feel this gives both Associations a better opportunity to serve the bowlers of San Antonio.

We want you to know that the SAWBA office and its phone lines are always open to any and all members, for whatever we can do for you.

Workshops Well Attended

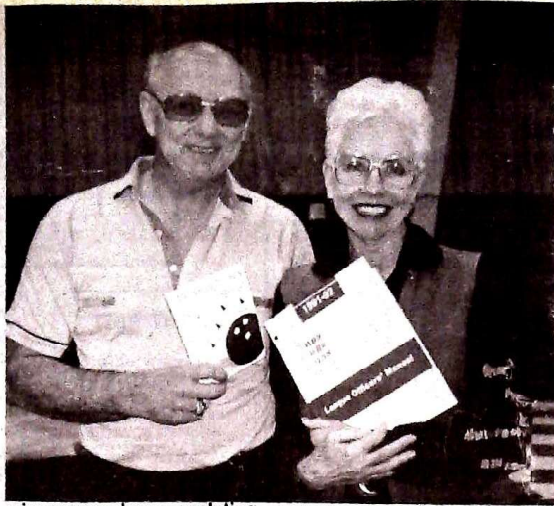
Bob Martin, at right, SABA Secretary, and Mary Elizabeth Pfeiffer, better known as "Tip", SAWBA Secretary-Treasurer, have every reason to smile as they show off some of the new material from WIBC and ABC for the new season.

The Workshops were well-attended by league officials and a mountain of printed materials and supplies were dispensed at four Workshops held this past week.

Both stressed the need for all league officials to seriously study the materials in their kits, particularly noting that contained in the new combined ABC/WIBC Playing Rules books. As the two national rules come closer and closer together, there are fewer rules which differ in the two groups. The new Rules Books give the more restrictive rules in bold print (where there is a difference) and the more restrictive rule applies in mixed league situations.

As the bowlers return to league play for their fall session, membership dues are \$7.00 for the ladies and for the men of ABC, membership cards are \$10. Those fees are payable your first league session.

Social Security numbers are required in both associations on the membership applications, since both groups operate with an office computer -- please make certain that you



give yours when completing the form.

Both Secretaries urged officers to review their existing league rules, to make certain they are WORKABLE, paying attention to rules regarding bowler arrearsages and absentees.

There are also new awards for bowlers and all those are described in the new book. Of particular interest for the men will be a new ABC award for 100 pins over average in a single game - an award watch, which hasn't yet been received here. Any man achieving that feat since August first however, is entitled to the watch award, so secretaries please note.

And, of course, available to all league secretaries and centers are the new Yearbooks which also contain a wealth of information. Inside each is a

listing of all the Center directors, both SAWBA and SABA and their phone numbers. Those center representatives are the liaisons between your league and the association offices. Call on Directors for assistance!

Both local associations have offices with recording devices should the secretary be out of the office. SAWBA's phone number is 342-3129, and the SABA office number is 657-7070.

With the new method of lane dressing this season less emphasis is placed this year on award scores -- however, Martin cautioned secretaries to report award scores as quickly as possible, even though 48 hours is now the maximum time limit. Please don't penalize your bowlers by not reporting their achievements.

For the second year, Presidents and Secretaries who are serving their league members for the first time are urged to attend the P/S School on September 11th at both 9:30 a.m. and 7 p.m. at The Meeting Place at University Bowl. In depth discussions of rules and answering of any questions by league officers will be handled at that time.

Serving as a league officer carries certain responsibilities to the members of the league. SAWBA President Betty Holzmann noted "having Publicized rules and prize funds, responsible officers who know where to get help is the only business-like and fair way to operate. Having specifics spelled out in advance doesn't impose on league members; it sets them free to really enjoy bowling."

In other business taken care of at the board meeting was the awarding of the hosting duties for the San Antonio 600 Club Singles tournament to Astro Bowling Center. The tournament is October 14-20, with two squads each day and a membership meeting between shifts on Saturday, October 19.

Entry forms will be out to all members shortly, but members should mark their calendars for those dates, and join in the celebration -- Don't Mess With Texas!

By the way, renewal fees are currently due -- \$2 local, \$2 Texas renewals, which can be paid when entering the tournament (total \$11 entry, \$4 renewals). And for all ladies who dropped out of the club for a short time, come back...there's no penalty for past years dues unpaid--just pay \$4 and you're back in good standing. 7 pm, and the awards presentations to follow.

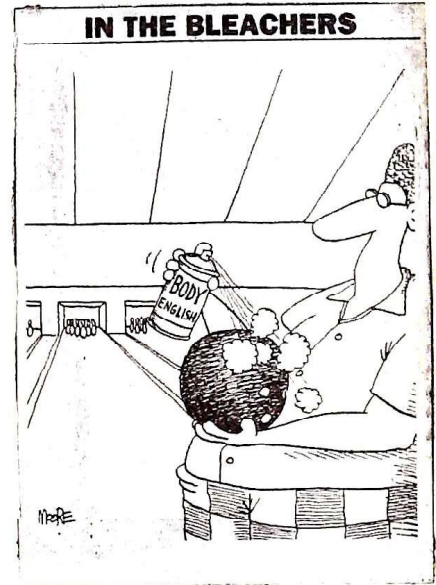

For the first time the association will name five ladies as a SAWBA All City team, with the lady earning most points for performances the past season being designated as Superior Performance Award winner. The selection of the first All

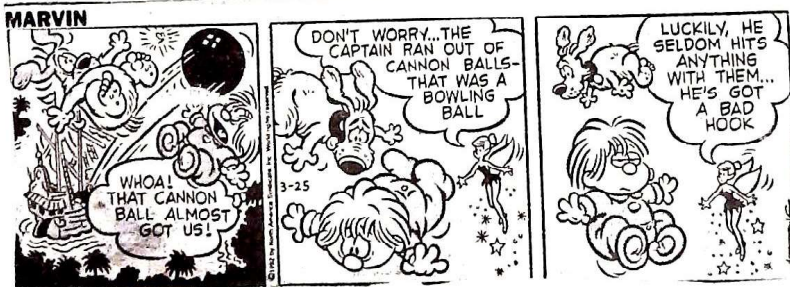
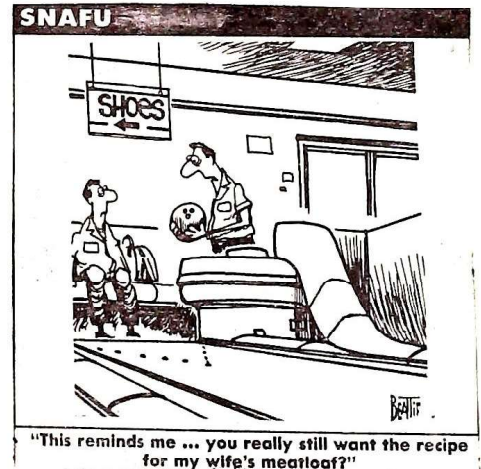
City team is kept secret until revealed at the meeting.

team-oriented management style. What I enjoy most is working with people, helping them identify their strength and watching them succeed."

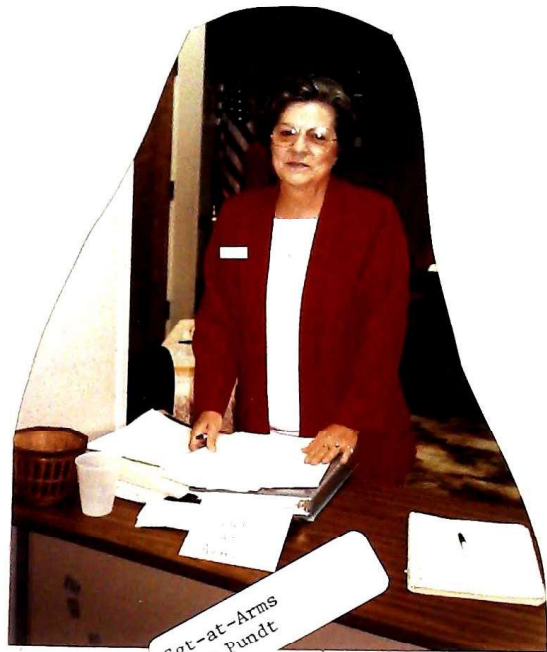

Report To Membership

The SAWBA Open Membership meeting (Sept. 22) was opened with a solemn remembrance of members who departed last season, and candles were lit as chairman Margaret King, Georgia Hayes and Roxie Shamp read inspirational messages.

Of great concern to all women bowlers was the decrease in membership within the association and the ultimate loss of two delegates to the WIBC annual meeting. The SAWBA Board of Directors took action prior to the season to pare the budget, dropping salaries of all officers and directors and combining the offices of secretary-treasurer as a cost cutting measure.

Even though the association stayed within the budget approved a year ago, even further cuts were made for the coming season, and the members approved the \$28,500 budget for the 1991-92 season based on 9500 members.

President Betty Holzmann outlined the many honors which have come to SAWBA members since the Annual Meeting in March. The elevation of Sylvia Broyles from 5th to 3rd WIBC Vice President; the re-election of Mary Elizabeth "Tip" Pfeiffer as a TWBA Director, the certification of Sherilyn Crain, Yasuko Whitesell and Margaret King as lane inspectors; and the awarding of the TWBA Service Award to Ella O'Quinn.

For the first time since 1935 SAWBA saluted two national Champions, Lina Rincon and Bonnie Van Steenberg who won the WIBC Doubles in Cedar Rapids, IA, and at the TWBA Championships at Fort Worth, Glenda Recker and Marilyn Ferlito were named Div. I Doubles champions.

Secretary Tip Pfeiffer reported that 183 leagues had been sanctioned through Sept. 19th, and San Antonio has been asked

to help form leagues using the Modified Format approved at WIBC at Cedar Rapids. The Modified Format consists of leagues of 3-6-9, No Tap, The Baker System or Scotch Doubles, or any combination of the four. The leagues would be sanctioned and receive all the benefits of WIBC with the exception of high score awards. Anyone wishing to form such new leagues - bowlers or proprietors - are urged to contact the SAWBA office.

Highlight of the meeting, of course, was the naming of the first SAWBA All-City Team - Kathy Kirst, Rocky Boubel, Laurie Jo Scales, Tracy Desmit and Phyllis Tondre. And Kathy was named Captain and Superior Performance Award winner for the third consecutive season.

Reports from various officers and committee chairmen were varied and interesting and several new dates were announced: The SAWBA Singles Classic is set for University Bowl in November; with the Senior League Mixed tourney set for March 13-15; the BVL Fund drive is November

3-16 at all centers and the hosting of the YABA state youth tournament at University Bowl and Ponderosa Bowl.

Entry forms are out now for both the SAWBA Championship Tournament at Brunswick Thousand Oaks Bowl and Ponderosa Bowl (entries close Jan. 9) and the TWBA Championships at Amarillo, deadline for entry, February 13th.

During balloting for the Nominating committee, an edited video of the WIBC annual meeting was shown. Members elected Helen Bactz, chairman, Ella O'Quinn, Clara Grimes, Debbie Kirst and Dorris Tanner to serve on the Nominating Committee.

Reports were also from the TWBA Annual Meeting in Fort Worth (Gail Cantu) and from the local 600 Club.

Members selected the date of March 17, 1992 for the SAWBA Annual Meeting.

Serving as Reading of the Minutes Committee were Clara Grimes, Shirley Cain and Edna McNees with Elfi Tomczyk, Lupe Diaz, Marlene Stadler, Irene Leuck and Pinky Flors serving as Tellers for the meeting.

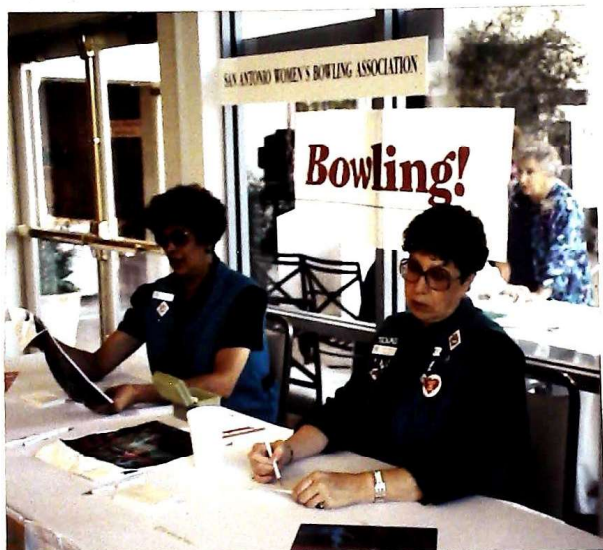
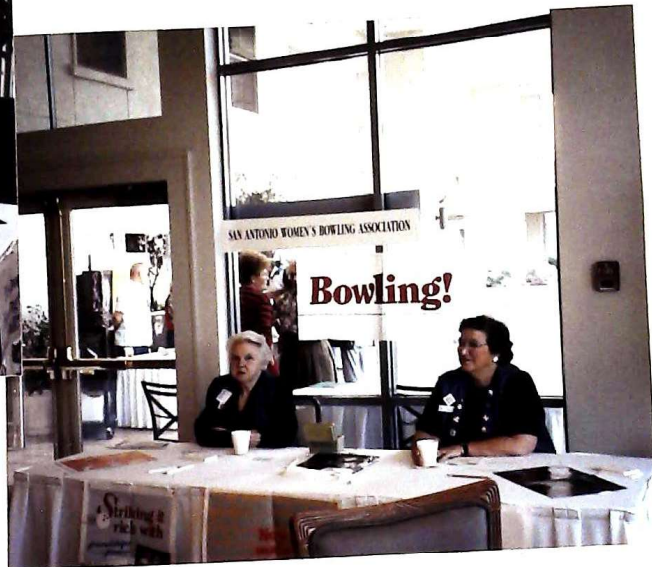
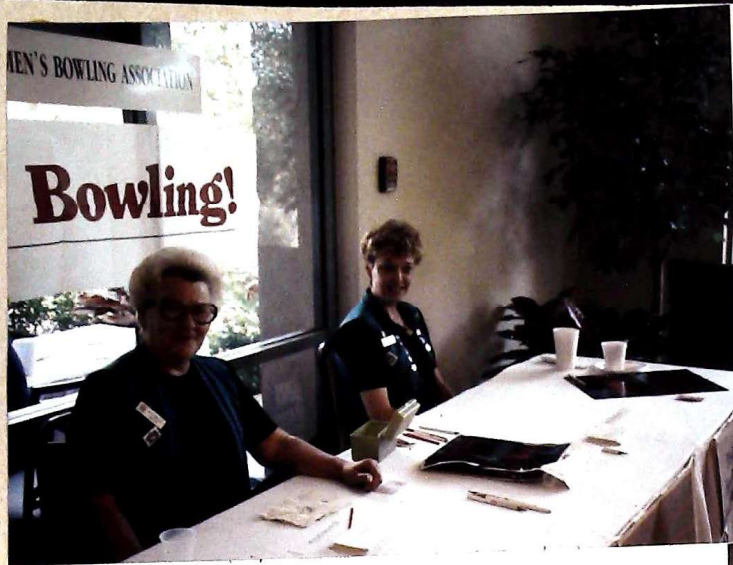

This year there will be no match finals.

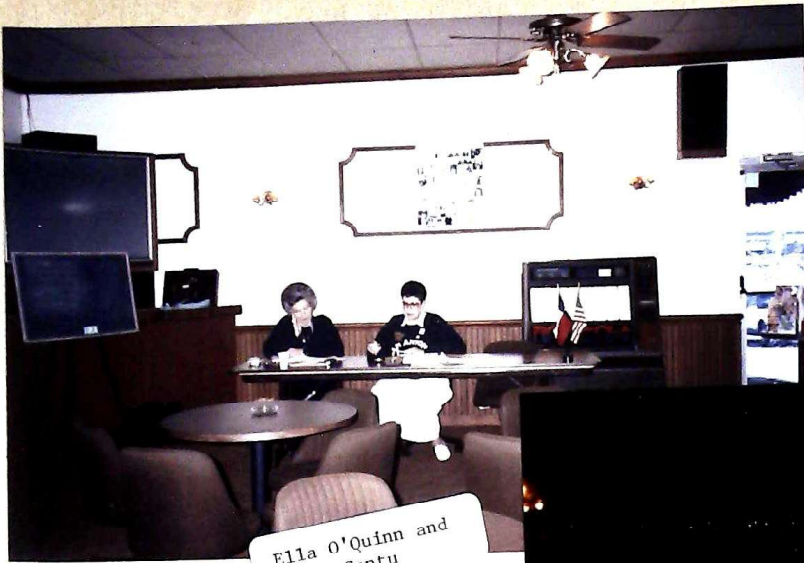
At the Ladies Top Twenty, it's a 1 p.m. start-time (30 minutes earlier to draw for start-lanes) on November 23rd at Oak Hills.

As SAWBA Secretary-Treasurer she will

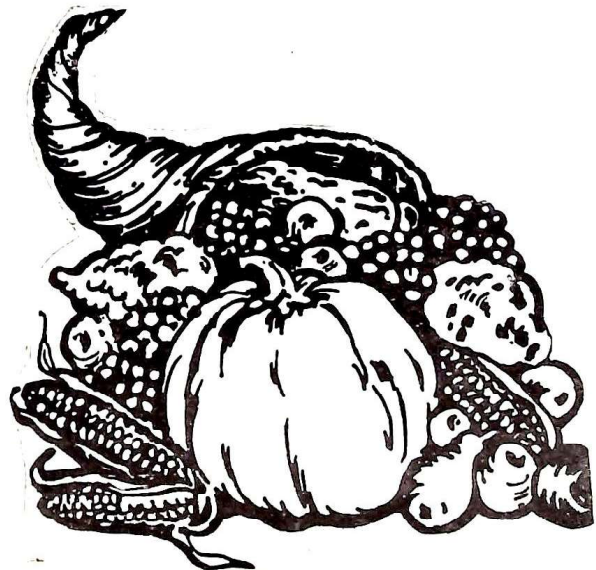

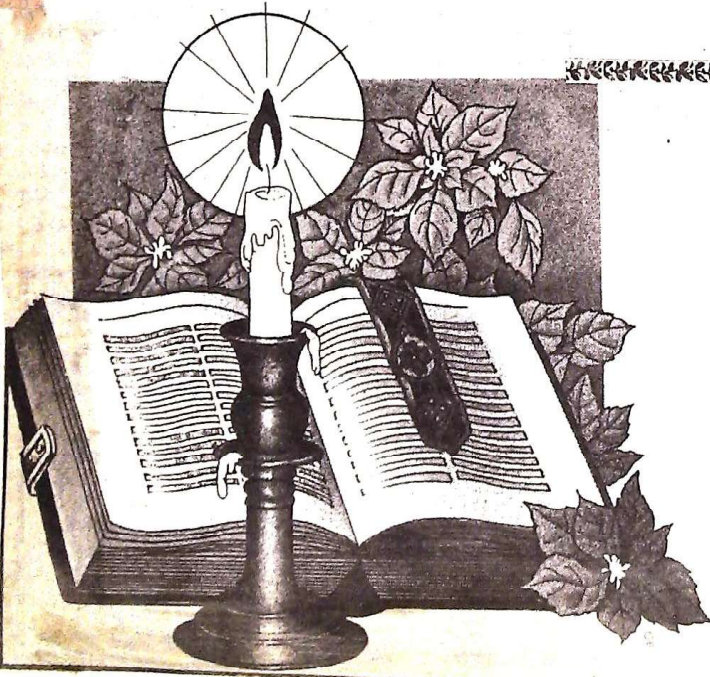

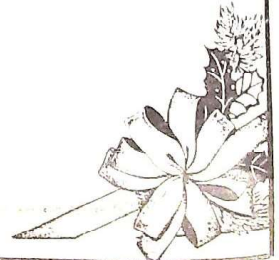

SAWBA Tourney Draws Increased

Entry This Year!

Preliminary accounting for the SAWBA Championship Tournament at Brunswick Thousand Oaks Bowl and Ponderosa Bowl shows an increased entry this year, according to Tournament Director/Secretary Rhonda Vasbinder.

Without late entries (those delayed at the Post Office) Vasbinder revealed that 178 five-woman teams have entered this year (one more than last year) with 414 singles entrants and 828 doubles entrants (an increase of 30 sets).

Optional all events totals also were over those of last year with 752 participating in that special feature (as opposed to 728 last year).

An estimated prize fund of \$12,963 will be paid out to those participating in the Championships.

Defending Scratch Champion is Kathy Kirst with Diana Nelson reigning as Handicap Champion. Kirst swatted 1815 for her nine games and Nelson totalled 1964.

The tournament

is set to open Saturday, January 25 and continue the following weekend until February 9th at both centers.

Bowlers can earn Instant Cash during their team event (only) by stringing strikes or by converting specified splits, and can participate in the BVL Special while bowling singles and doubles. Entry fee in the BVL feature is \$1.00 and 40 cents of each entry is to be awarded to the lady who goes most pins over average the second game, each shift.

Bowling Stadium In Our Future ?? Could Be!!

Delegates attending the 1992 WIBC Annual Meeting in Lansing, Michigan will consider an offer from the Reno-Sparks Convention and Visitors Authority to fund and build a start-of-the-art bowling stadium in Reno, Nevada to host the WIBC Championship Tournament and other bowling events.

A resolution would allow WIBC to commit to holding its annual Champi-

onships in Reno, every three years during a 15-year span, beginning in 1997. The years would be 1997, 2000, 2003, 2006 and 2009.

WIBC delegates would continue to select the tournament host city in the years the tournament is not committed to Reno and the current procedures for selecting the host city would be followed.

The current proposal calls for

a 72-lane state-of-the-art facility, complete with the latest in automatic scoring, offices, meeting rooms, exhibit areas, food service facilities and concessions.

The stadium would provide bowling its own national arena to showcase national events. A national bowling stadium would improve the image of the sport and enhance its stature in the sports world.

Besides the WIBC Championship Tournament and WIBC Queens, the stadium would host the ABC tournament and Masters, as well as the ABC/WIBC sponsored events such as the National Seniors Tournament.

In addition, the initial proposal submitted by the RSCVA would allow a \$500,000 site fee to be paid to WIBC each year the tournament is held in Reno. This aspect of the proposal

will allow WIBC to enhance the tournament prize fund and recognize all tournament participants.

The RSCVA proposal is contingent on the approval of WIBC as well as ABC. The ABC tournament events would be held in Reno every three years as well.

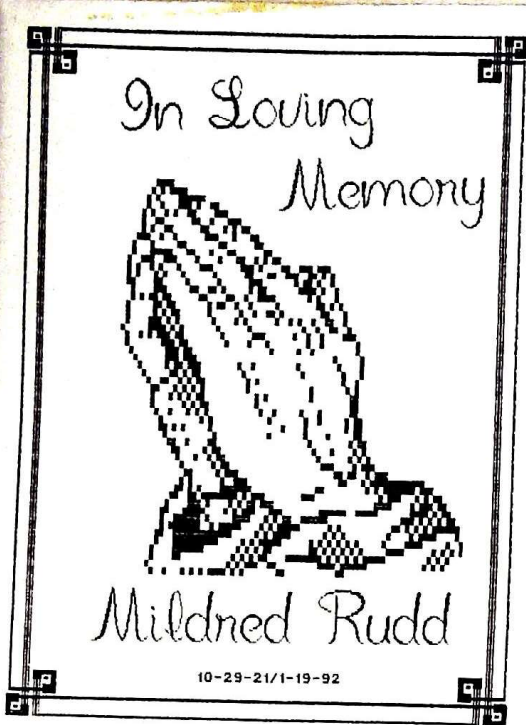

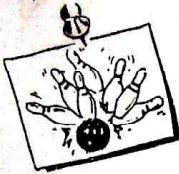

WIBC CELEBRATES IT'S 75th ANNIVERSARY IN 1991-92

Since its inception 75 years ago when a group of about 40 women gathered in St. Louis to form the organization, it has grown to a membership of 2,711,909 members in 1991.

The first group gathered in 1916, after a two day tournament in St. Louis, with Dennis John Sweeney, manager of Washington Bowling Alleys and Billiard Parlors. They organized what was then called the Woman's National Bowling Association (WNBA). The following year a constitution and bylaws were adopted and dues were set at 25 cents annually.

In 1917, Secretary Ellen Kelly received word that approval had been granted to hold the second WNBA tournament following the 1918 American Bowling Congress tournament in the Cincinnati Armory. The ABC had already existed for 21 years.

In 1925, the Association was re-incorporated as the Woman's International Bowling Congress. Further changes were made in 1927 when the delegate system was introduced during the annual meeting in Columbus. Also, the name was changed to "Women's International Bowling Congress".

The WIBC Annual Convention and tournament is held in a different city each year. Thousands of bowlers and delegates attend, bringing millions of dollars to the city's economy. The site for future conventions is decided each year when City Associations bid for the privilege of hosting the affair and the delegates decide on the location by vote. Although there were only 40 women at the first meeting in 1916, more than 3,000 have been attending recent conventions. This April the Convention is in Lansing, Michigan, and there will be twelve delegates from the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association attending.

The support of WIBC members has made the WIBC Championship Tournament the largest event in the world for a single sport and appropriately judged so by the Guinness Book of Records. The field for the 1988 tournament in Reno and Carson City, Nevada, totaled 77,735 women. All of which began in 1916 with an entry of eight teams - seven from St. Louis and one from Chicago.

Many things have combined to create the aura that you will find surrounding the WIBC. Among these special things are the WIBC flag, the WIBC march and the Gold Ball Ceremony. Ask anyone who has been a delegate to a WIBC Convention and you will find that these things have touched the hearts and feelings of each one of them.
