14th by S. A. Woman:

Rocky Boubel Blasts Out First Sanctioned 300 Game !!

"I don't even remember throwing the last three balls," admitted Rocky Boubel, when talking about her 300 (just the 14th by a woman in this city) last Thursday in Wonder Bowl's Ladies Major league.

"I'm serious," she laughed. "I know that the first nine were right there. But on the first in the tenth I thought the seven was going to stand, but it fell late.

Someone told me afterward that the second one just sort of splattered the pins and about that time everyone was talking about down in the Commercial League who had the first eleven (strikes). I still had one more ball to throw, and when I heard a few groans from down there I felt he had missed his perfect. Everyone told me afterward that the last ball was pretty solid -- I just kept thinking -- "keep it right" -- and everything fell."

Rocky followed her perfect with games of 180 and 192 for a 672 series (her highest career set is 752 rolled last season in the summer Chester's Trio at AMF Country). Currently she's rolling with four over deuce averages - 203 in the Vegas League at Thousand Oaks; 193 in the Alamo City Masters (subbing in another Astro league with a 199 average); her 201 in Ladies Majors and 203 in the Friday Bluebonnet at Oak Hills. Her TCBA traveling average



is 200, and earlier in the season her high game there was a 279.

This was not the pint-sized bomber's first 300 - just her first sanctioned perfect. Several years back during Skins Game competition at Hacienda Bowl, she carded a 300 game in the unsanctioned event.

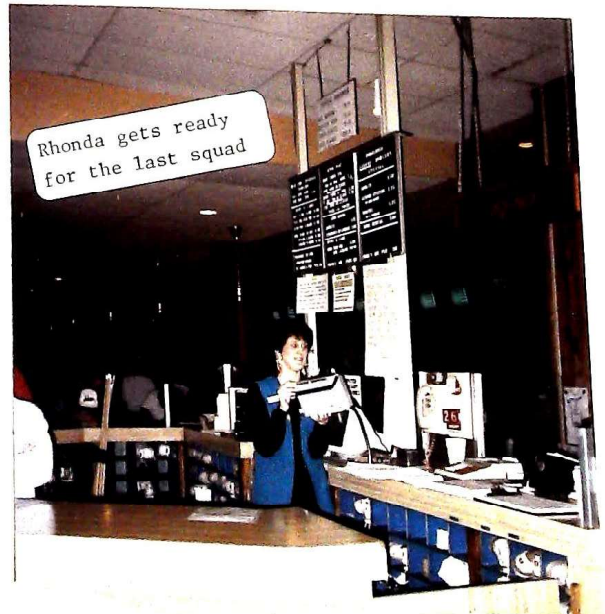

Helen Baker Dies of Cancer

Women's bowling suffered a great loss last Thursday with the death of Mrs. Helen Baker, Cocoa Beach, Florida. Mrs. Baker was immediate Past President of WIBC and upon her retirement made a Life Member.

Helen Baker was one of bowling's great leaders - a great teacher who had the uncanny ability to motivate those in bowling at all levels. For the thousands of women bowlers who served as state or local delegates to the WIBC Annual Meetings, while she was President, attending the WIBC was almost an inspirational experience. Delegates came home from those meetings, which Helen led impartially, fairly and with warmth, 'pumped up', more dedicated and certainly more focused for the future of women's bowling. She inspired the young and breathed renewed life into the veteran delegates.

Her career began in her local association where she served for 17 years. Twenty years were given to the state association, and she first became a WIBC delegate in 1959 - and from that meeting never missed another WIBC event.



Helen was elected in April of 1981 to succeed Alberta E. Crowe and was just the fifth President of WIBC. Prior to that she served some 12 years on the Board as Director and several Vice Presidents posts. The respect and esteem in which she was held was evident by the first Presidential vote when she received 2343 votes of the 3157 votes cast.

During her term as President WIBC made great strides in the Olympics direction, and under her guidance women began to be more equally involved with the men in equipment specifications and the certification of lanes process.

Mrs. Baker was no stranger to the ladies of San Antonio. She was the "extra special" guest at SAWBA's 50th Anniversary celebration, and later would be the WIBC President to bestow the prestigious Spotlight Award on the local association for service to its membership. The Spotlight recognition was one of her favorite causes to involve local associations with the WIBC.

That ever-ready smile and energy was known world-wide and during her years on the Board she served on almost every existing committee in the world of bowling, includ-

ing YABA President; NBHF/M director; National Bowling Council President in addition to those WIBC committees. And the awards and recognition given her for her great good works were numerous and all well-deserved.

An award-winning writer, Helen said upon her retirement that she planned to spend a lot of time writing and everyone looked forward toward her book of memories - incidents which had happened in bowling. Perhaps she wasn't given the days to complete that task. But one inescapable fact is that Helen Baker made an indelible mark on the pages of WIBC history. Her distinguished service to the game is almost unequalled and this year when the delegates come to Lansing, Michigan to observe their 75th Anniversary, memories of Helen's work and her voice will echo in that great hall and she will be lovingly remembered.

Woman Bowler magazine quoted, "return from your work must be the satisfaction that work brings you and the world's need for that work. With this, life is heaven, or as close to heaven as one can get." Helen Baker's work will always endure, and will be the standard for excellence for all ladies who are, or will become, involved in bowling.

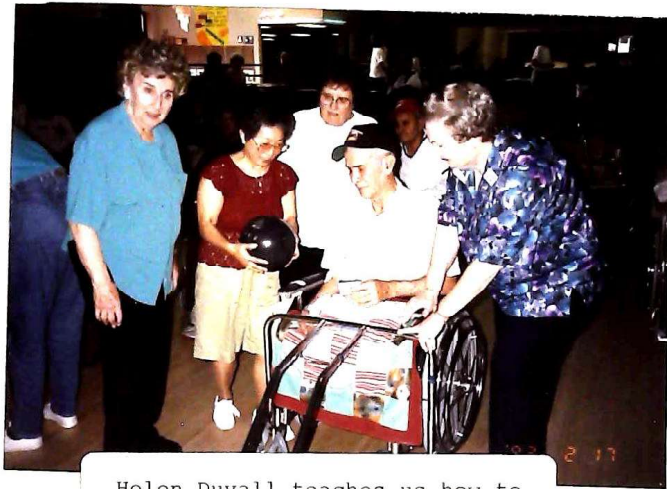

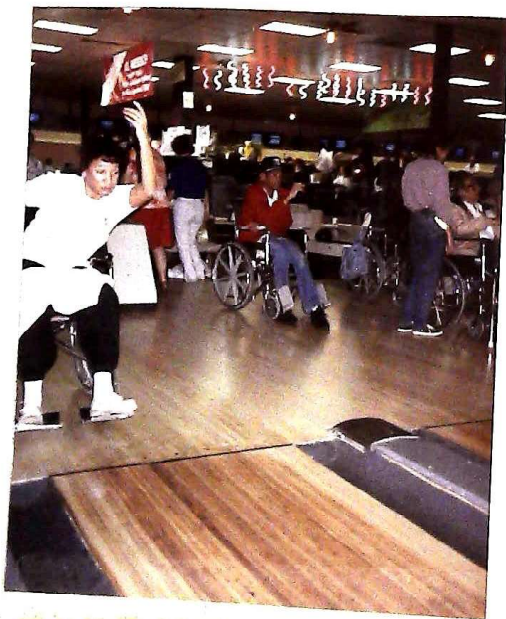

that telephone call saying an acceptable donor has been found. Although five successful operations have been done since Candy's arrival last fall, an acceptable match has not yet been found for Candy.

The new adoptee of the club has had one 600 in her career.

600 Club members are touched by Candy's plight, and her Mom's "up attitude, and will be calling on all San Antonians to join hands with those in Amarillo to give a helping hand.

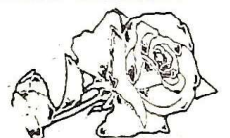

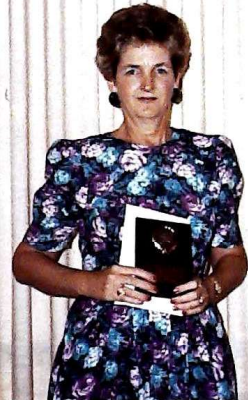

Gayle "Rookie" Goodwyn Shoots First 300 at Comal Bowl

Gayle Goodwyn -- the little bundle of dynamite who will always be known as "The Rookie" -- carved her name in the local and TCBA bowling records this past weekend while the Ladies Traveling Classic Bowling Assn. of America (TCBA) at Comal Bowl in New Braunfels.

The blast came in the second set of six on Sunday. Rookie put 12 solid -- REALLY SOLID -- shots into the 1-3 pocket and became the first woman to swat a 300 game at Comal Bowl (the center rewarded with a \$100 bill!). Her three-game total of 670 wasn't a league record, however, since she opened with a 194 and closed out with a 176 game.

But high series wasn't her goal. The perfect game was! She's flirted with it before. In 1979 at



the now-closed Sports Palace, it was a single pin that marred perfection. In February

of 1988 at San Pedro Bowl -- again in TCBA action -- it was a 2-pin tap stopping her.

She now has the distinction of being the only local woman with all three top WIBC award rings -- 298, 299 and 300!

She also has the distinction of back-to-back Ladies Top-Twenty titles and her Spare Time TCBA team has earned District championships in

1986-7 and 1988-89. Additionally, in Latin Bowlers Club action she's a two-time singles champ, an all events champion and member of a winning team.

Added to all this she carried the city high average of 201 in 1988-89, and has to her credit FOUR series over the 700 mark -- 739, 735, 717 and 702.

This year she's rolling in more leagues than in recent years -- with fine-tuning of her game from brother, Chris, who also has had the thrill of 300 perfection. In addition to the TCBA league, she rolls in the Ladies Alamo City Masters on Wednesday and in the Ladies Majors on Thursday, both at Astro Bowling Center.

Think there's nothing more to shoot at for the 31-year-old hard tossing righthander? Wrong! Her mother's high series has been topped by others, but not by Rookie. The late Janet Goodwyn was an outstanding youth coach and former center employee, brought glory to San Antonio in the 1972-73 season when she pounded out games of 216, 259 and 279 for a then record-754 series -- a score which stood for more than a decade. That's Rookie's next goal.

And you who are into wagering -- bet the farm that she will achieve that goal too!

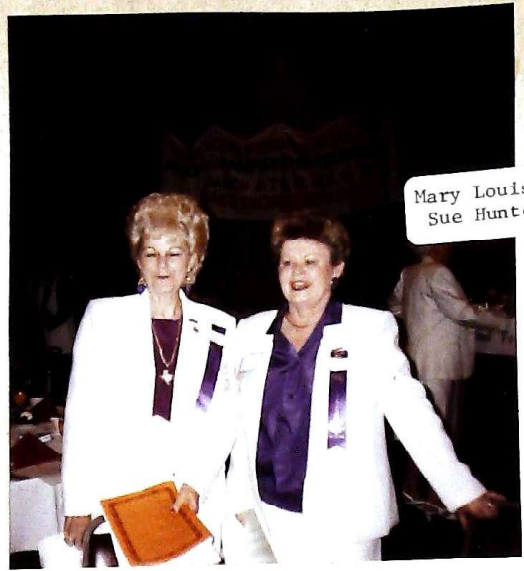
Invitations to host TWBA events in the coming years were from Houston for 1994; Dallas 1995 and Lubbock, 1996.

Duo hopes for repeat of state title

It was deja vu for Kathy Kirst and Laurie Jo Scales.

Kirst and Scales brought back memories in taking over the Division 1 doubles lead in the TWBA state tournament.

Kirst and Scales rolled a record, 1,331 total June 6-7 in Amarillo to pass Linda Urbanek-Linda Cope of Houston by 60 pins.

Now the pair must wait two weeks to see if the score will stand.

Kirst and Scales totaled 1,268 to set a mark in winning the state title in 1988. Kirst also was the state's individual champion that year.

That mark had been broken twice since then, with the latest coming from the 1,320 shot by Regina Loveall and Maureen Hood in 1991. Both players are from Amarillo.

Kirst, whose 1,936 total is second in all-events behind the 1,945 effort of Amarillo's Carol Dorin, had games of 243, 185 and 259 for a 687 in doubles. Scales contributed 223, 213 and 208 for a 644 series to the new standard.

Also anxiously awaiting are Seaguin's Catherine Wilson, and New Braunfels' Karen Lawrence and Nancy Herndon. Wilson is leading Division 3 all-events with 1,738, and Lawrence and Herndon are pacing Division 6 doubles with 948.

In Div. 2 All Events Rita Pruitt of the Alamo City also retained her third place finish with 1766.

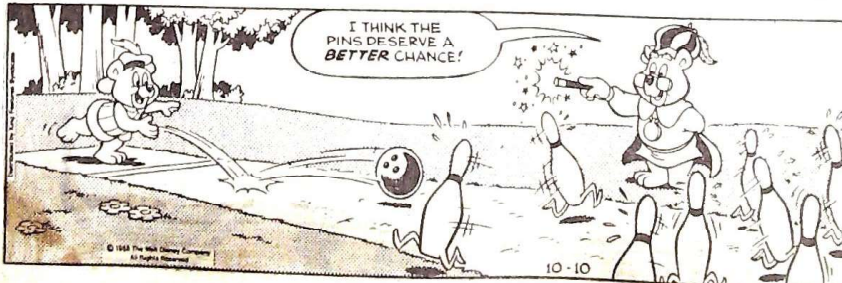
All champions will be feted in September at a gala affair.

Gladys Banker To Retire - New Prexy To Be Elected Next Spring !

Oh, what an historic meeting it will be next spring when WIBC holds its annual meeting and election in Baton Rouge.

Gladys M. Banker, Charles Town, W. Va. announced that she will not seek re-election as President of the WIBC. Her term will expire July 31, 1993. Banker has served on the WIBC Board since 1968 (she was elected here in San Antonio) and took office as WIBC's sixth President July 1, 1988.

"As WIBC President, I have had an opportunity to guide the WIBC through a great number of challenges," Banker said. "This has been both rewarding and fulfilling."

"I believe there is a great amount of talent on the Board and I feel it is time to move aside and allow them to have an opportunity to lead," she added. "My family has also been a tremendous support and I want

to have time to spend with them."

As President, Banker aggressively worked to establish grassroots programs such as the Area Recruitment Coordinator Program and the Future Leaders Program to strengthen WIBC's membership ranks. During her presidency, the U. S. Tenpin Bowling Federation was formed and the System of Bowling was implemented.

In addition to her role as President, Banker serves as President of the National Bowling Council, director of the NBHF/M and a trustee of the U. S. Tenpin Federation, bowling's U. S. governing body.

The delegates attending the annual meeting in Louisiana will elect her successor.

Astro Bowl ranks '10-pins' above rest



Those shoes, those shoes! And the pretty balls with the swirly, glittery stuff in 'em! San Antonians just can't get enough bowling, with more

than 20 centers and social clubs in the Alamo City.

Notice we said "centers," not alleys; according to the Light's bowling expert, Ella O'Quinn, "alley" is a politically incorrect term. "Ladies don't go in alleys," Quinn says.

But according to O'Quinn, one "center" is 10-pins above the rest: Astro Bowl on Harry Wurzbach. The snack bar and restaurant goes beyond frito chili pies and beer, with phenomenal lunch specials like roast beef, mashed potatoes and green beans.

And the lanes, well, the lanes are the waxiest; O'Quinn definitely rates all 44 of them tops for best scoring conditions. If you're the kind of bowler who needs every edge, the facilities at Astro Bowl

may put you over the top.

But Astro Bowl is by no means the only center in town with allure. Oak Hills Lanes on Callaghan, like many centers, offers nursery care for kiddos too little to pick up an 8-pounder.

Our bowling expert recommends you knock down some of the Hills' Mexican plate specials while there. And Country Lanes on San Pedro has a patty melt that will make you forget that 7-10 split.

For a trip down *memory lane*, try Hermann Sons Bowling Lanes on S. St. Mary's or Turner Social Club on Ninth Street. Turner's is one of the few places in town that rabid bowlers can play nine pin, a team game in which players can elect to have their partners pick up elusive spares.

San Antonio is downright blessed with bowling alleys, all of which are automated to varying degrees and are well-maintained.

Whether you are a junior or a senior or somewhere in between, there is sure to be a patty melt with your name on it at some center in town.

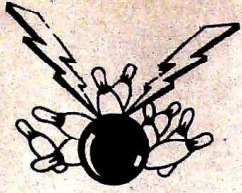

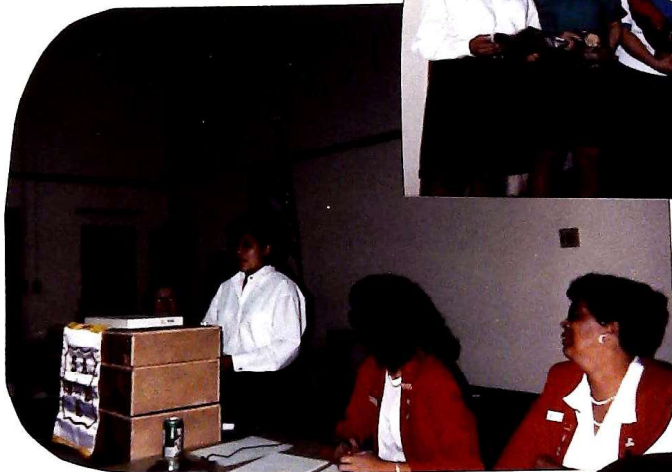
