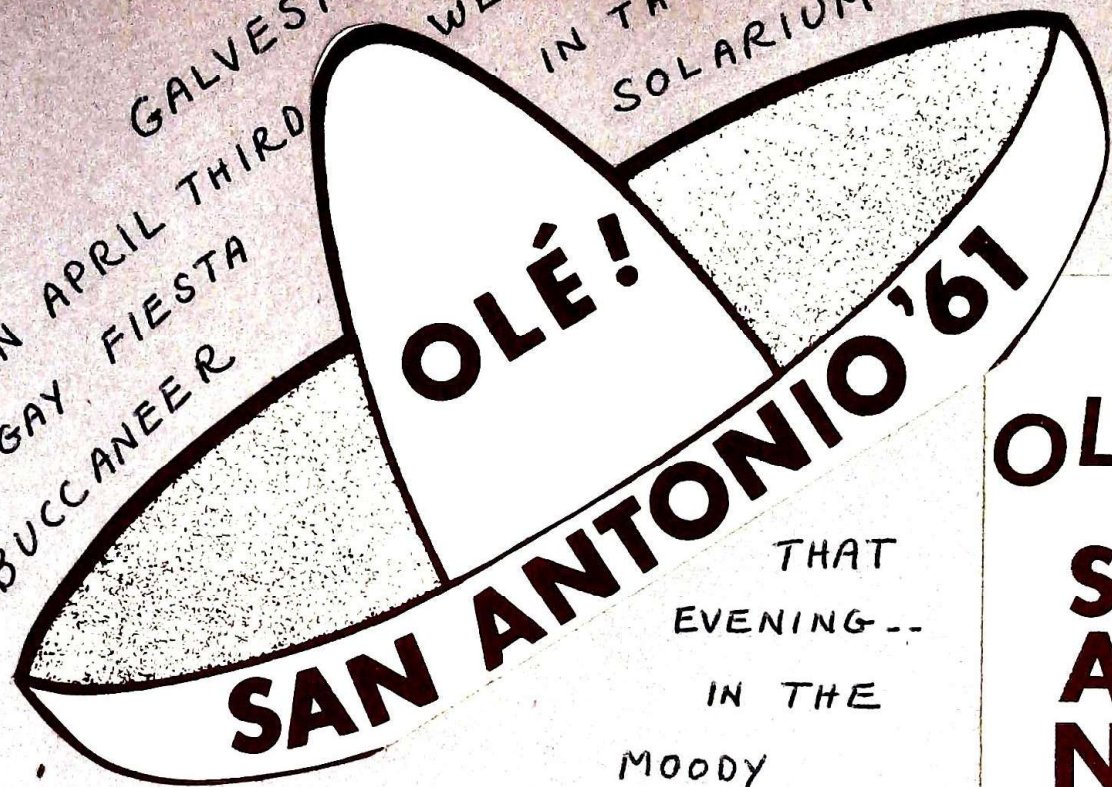

Six or Seven Weeks for 1961 Tourney

The San Pedro Bowling lanes have been picked as the site for the 1961 Texas Women's State Bowling tournament.

The state selection committee, composed of seven officers, made their selection Saturday after a day-long inspection tour of the city's lanes. The committee settled on San Pedro due to its desirable location but went on record as lauding San Antonio for its many fine and clean establishments.

The tournament will begin on Feb. 17 and will run from six to seven weeks. An entry list of 1200 teams is expected.

Next year will mark the first time since 1952 that San Antonio has hosted the women's tourney. That year it was held at Woodlawn lanes.

Members of the state selection committee were: Mrs. Rae Fisk, Houston; Mrs. Mary Bishop, Houston; Mrs. Jane Janes, Dallas, and Mrs. Estha Perkins, Mrs. Agatha Tapley, Mrs. Marilyn Funk and Mrs. Helen Baetz, all of San Antonio.

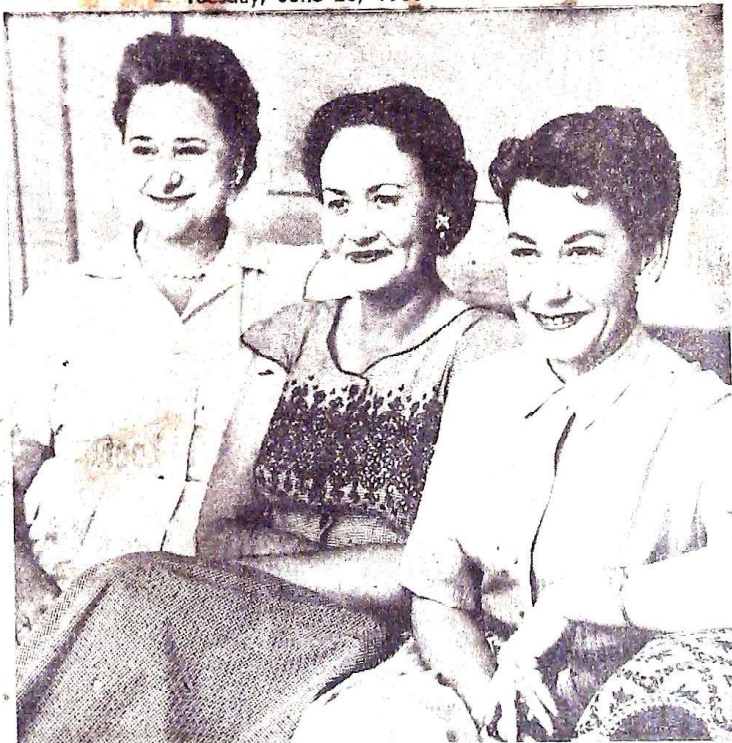

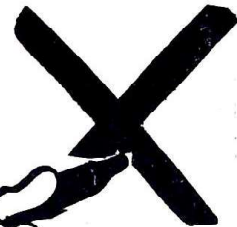

TIME SHORT TO ENTER TOURN

Only Few Days For Women To Turn In Entries

There will be a host of New Year's resolutions made in the next few days, but one of those won't be worth a nickel, even at modern inflation figures.

You can't make a New Year's resolution to bowl in the Texas state women's bowling tournament on the San Pedro lanes here. You must have your entry in by midnight, Jan. 1, so there isn't time to wait for the old custom of a change in heart with the change in the calendar.

The entries from over the state have been swamping Mrs. Helen Baetz, secretary of the association, but San Antonio women have been too busy, apparently, with their final Christmas shopping.

There is barely a week left to get the team entries in and San Antonio women who do not compete will regret it. Many of the men who passed up the state tournament at here last year still are kicking themselves for failure to enter.

San Antonio women, regardless of their bowling averages, can find a spot. Those who want to compete should call Marilyn Funk, CA-6-6095 for full information.

In the South Texas area the interest is sky high. Corpus Christi has entered 17 teams. New Braunfels will send 18, Galveston 15, Victoria 15, McAllen 10, Alice 10, Laredo six, Weslaco two, Gonzales one, Taylor one Temple five, Killeen two, El Campo four, Goliad three, Seguin six, San Marcos three, Hondo five, Beeville two, Kerrville three at present with the possibility of more from these spots.

The tournament will open Feb. 17 for a 10-week program.

There are varied classes, giving each woman an opportunity to compete with those of about the same average.

Austin, for example, is sending 62 teams but not all of them are the upper bracket bowlers. There will be many competing in the lesser divisions, but all entries boost the tournament and create interest in the annual event.

There had been hopes that 1,200 teams would bowl. There still will be that number if San Antonio bowlers decide to compete with their friends and neighbors from around the state.

Many women will travel from 1,000 to 1,500 miles to the tournament and back home, but for the local women there is no travel nor hotel expense. Some San Antonio women, who have not been exposed to tournament competition on a major scale, can gain valuable experience with a minimum of cost in this meet being held here for the first time in nearly 10 years.

At least you women have been warned. There isn't much time left for your big bowling party.

Entries close Jan. 1 at midnight.

You still have time to enter but no time to spare. You must strike now.

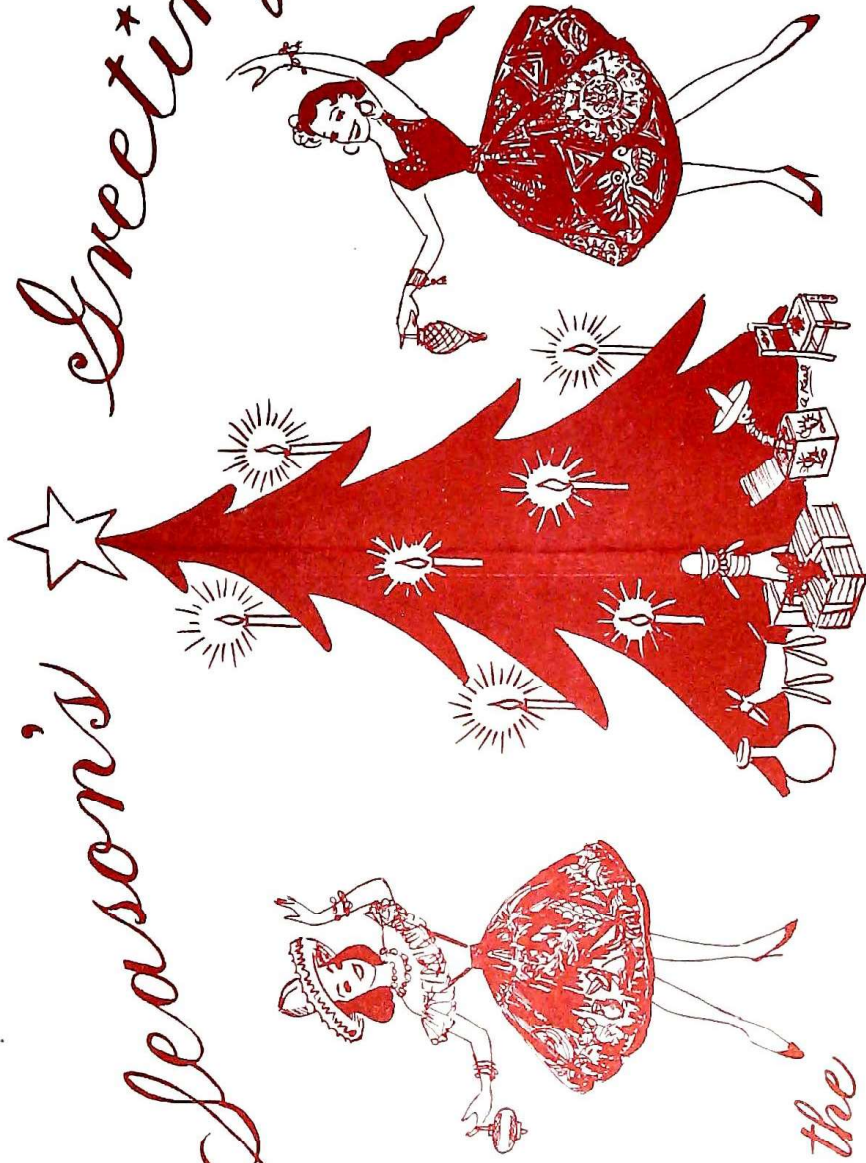

Women's Tourney Has Record Entry

A record-smashing total of 1,206 teams, with 200 of them from San Antonio, will compete in the 1961 Texas Woman's State tournament

on the San Pedro lanes here starting Feb. 17.

The massive entry list, due greatly to the untiring efforts of Helen Baetz, secretary of the association, the women of Austin, and the San Antonio Woman's Bowling association, will give this city its greatest pin carnival in history.

Not only will the city be honored with a record entry, but will have the chance to see a new crop of bowling stars, developed since the state last was held here several years ago on the Woodlawn planks.

Several records established at Woodlawn since have been broken. But it is likely a number of new marks will be set before the better than 6,000 women have taken their final shots this year.

"We are gratified with the entry list," Mrs. Baetz said this week. "We were aiming for 1,200 teams—an all-time mark. We went over with a few teams to spare.

"I'd like to thank the women bowlers of Texas and especially those here in San Antonio, where we have 200 teams from the host city.

"It took a lot of work on the part of many. I hate to mention anyone in particular because if I do I'd leave out some of those who did so much. Of course Marylyn Funk bore the brunt of a lot of work because she is the secretary of the San Antonio Woman's Bowling association. But she received much help from many sources.

"We in San Antonio are proud to have this tournament here. We are proud of the entry list and are confident the teams bowling this year will have lots of fun, lots of team spirit, and loads of scores."

Local Team Entries Reach 200

Marilynn Funk, secretary of the San Antonio Women's Bowling assn., was jubilant Saturday. She had just signed up a batch of teams for the state tournament coming to San Pedro lanes Feb. 17-March 23, and the additions gave her the hoped-for 200 locals.

In fact, at last count there were 205 San Antonio aggregations with 1001 teams from out of town for an all-time record entry of 1206.

To accommodate all these bowlers coming to the twenty-sixth annual state meet without adding an extra weekend, a number of out-of-towners will be scheduled on Fridays and all San Antonio teams will bowl either previous to the official opening, being assigned shifts on Feb. 13, 14 and 15, or on 9 p. m. on Sunday night.

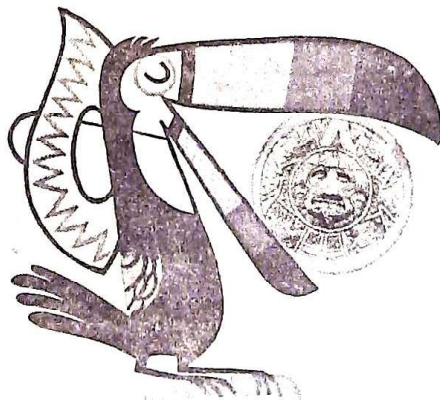
1206 Women Enter State Bowling Meet

One thousand two hundred six teams from 97 local associations will compete in the state women's tenpin tournament that will run 10 weekends at San Pedro lanes starting Feb. 17 and closing April 23. The old record was 986 teams at Ft. Worth last year.

The entry lists closed with 213 San Antonio teams, also a record, Mrs. Agatha Tapley, San Antonio assn. president, announced.

With more than 5000 visiting bowlers, many of them accompanied by members of their families, hotels and motels are anticipating a business boom.

A highlight will be the annual state business meeting at the Granada hotel March 17.



WIBC Leader Coming Here

Mrs. Emma Phaler of Milwaukee, long-time secretary of the Women's International Bowling congress, will be a guest at the Texas state women's tenpin tournament which starts Feb. 17 at San Pedro lanes.

Four side tournaments have been arranged during the state women's meet. Details are to be worked out but they will be staged at Austin Highway, Oak Hills, Bowlerama and Wonder Bowl.

Miss Violet "Billie" Simon, long prominent in bowling here and nationally, is putting up a "pioneer" trophy which will go to the bowler over 60 who rolls the highest game in the state tournament. The state association will give sterling silver pins for 200 games with a limit of one to a bowler.

Members of the San Antonio Women's Bowling assn. and state officers from other cities will identify themselves as hostesses during the tournament by wearing Spanish costumes.

Mayor J. Edwin Kuykendall will roll the ceremonial first ball at opening ceremonies at 6 p. m. Feb. 17. The Rev. W. Earl Waldrop, Central Christian church, will deliver the opening prayer. Harold Saunders will be master of ceremonies.

It Took Hard Work to Land Tourney

The state women's bowling tournament—the largest ever held with 1206 teams—will open in San Antonio's San Pedro tenpin center next Friday. San Antonio women bowlers have worked long hours to make this the best as well as the biggest, and will keep working almost ceaselessly to the finish, April 23, and even beyond when all the loose ends are put together.

Maybe you've wondered how—and why—a city decides to bid for a tournament like this, and gets it.

This one began Jan. 13, 1958. City Association President Agatha Tapley came to the point in an association meeting where new business was in order.

Clara Grasso, who has been a mainstay of local women's bowling for many, many years, asked for the floor and moved that San Antonio ask for the state tournament in 1961.

1951 "CREW" GASPED

There was one huge gasp from all who had worked in the last state tournament held in San Antonio in 1951, and clapping and shouts of enthusiasm from the eager new bowlers, then a moment of silence as we all regained our composure. Clara, known by her friends as "Gorgeous Grasso," explained that she "wasn't getting any younger" and she would like to have one more tournament in San Antonio before she had to put down her bowling ball. The motion carried, and it was agreed by all that we would throw our hat in the ring at the El Paso state meeting.

Armed with flower-covered sombreros, the delegates invaded El Paso in 1958, and announced that San Antonio had intentions and in Galveston the next year they would materialize.

At Galveston in 1959, dressed in gala Spanish attire, the San Antonio delegates were hostesses at a gay party. At the meeting that evening they were awarded the 1961 tournament on the first ballot.

AGATHA IN CHARGE

At Ft. Worth in 1960, San Antonio's choice, Agatha Tapley, was elected third vice president of the Texas Women's Bowling assn. In August, 1960, Agatha, as tournament manager, appointed the committee chairman and everyone rolled up sleeves and began working with one goal in mind. To make the biggest and best tournament the state has ever had.

Time has proved that the San Antonio tournament is the largest to date for Texas with 1206 teams.

I don't think that even Clara "Gorgeous" Grasso imagined her dream would swell to such proportions. Thus a state tournament is born.



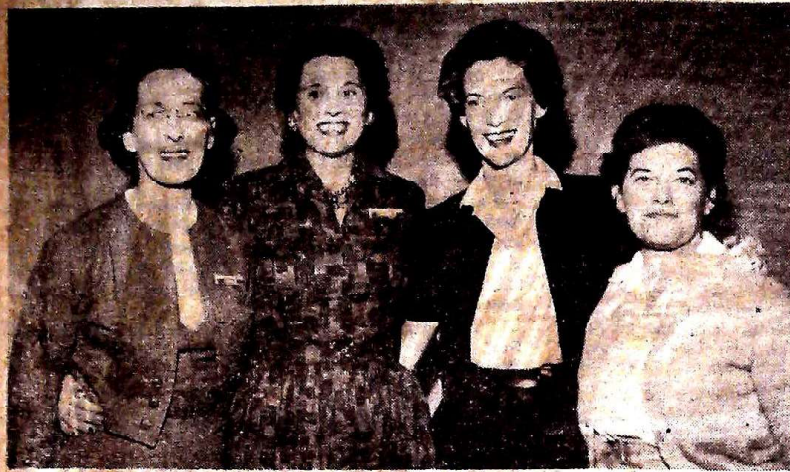

Welcome Mat Due to Greet States Stars

San Antonio's greatest bowling tournament, the twenty-sixth annual women's state event, will open on the San Pedro lanes next week for a record 10-week run.

The tournament, with an all-time high of 1,206 teams from every corner of the Lone Star State, make its debut at 8 p.m. Friday with a short ceremony. Following the short opening ceremony, 24 teams — from Austin, Brazosport, Freeport, Amarillo, Laredo, Tyler, Hondo, and Del Rio—will take the lanes with every class of team in the meet represented.

Prior to the bowling Harold Saunders will act as master of ceremonies. Dr. Earl Waldrop of Central Christian Church will give the invocation, Mayor Edwin Kuykendall of San Antonio will welcome the bowlers to the Alamo city, state officers will be introduced, there will be music by Mike Acosta's Strolling Troubadours and Jo Novak will play The Star Spangled Banner.

Judge Charles Anderson, Bexar County judge, will make the official opening of the meet, with the initial squad of teams being introduced by Helen Baetz, secretary of the Texas Woman's Bowling association.

After the fanfare and festivities women will begin their bids for top honors of 1961. At 6 p.m. squad will be followed

by the 9 p.m. squad of 14 teams, with the first of the San Antonio teams, taking up every spot on the squad. The teams will be in the B.C.D. and E division.

Doubles and singles will feature Saturday's section, starting at 8 a.m., but there will be team bowling at 3, 6, and 9 p.m. Teams from Alice, Austin, Houston, Laredo, Waco, Port Arthur, Amarillo, Temple, Corpus Christi, Abilene, Brownfield, Galveston, McAllen, San Angelo, Kingsville, Weslaco, Odessa, Midland, Plainview, San Marcos, Dallas, and Fort Worth will be in action during the day.

Sunday, starting at 8 a.m., again, doubles and singles will be bowled.

The women will be bowling for the top honors in the state and for \$34,000 in prize money as 1,206 teams, 2,675 doubles, and 5,350 singles entries compete.

Teams will come from 92 city associations. They will converge on San Antonio from every region. For some teams to bowl here it would be closer to bowl in Denver, Colo., and for others it would be closer to bowl in Biloxi, Miss. For the teams from El Paso it will be a trip of 569 miles and from Amarillo 505.

Many of the teams will travel over 350 miles—one way—to bowl here.

The preliminary work, two years of it, has been done and handled efficiently. Now the actual firing begins.

San Antonio is proud and happy to have this annual tournament of the women bowlers with their record entry list.

All that remains is for local fans to give a warm welcome to

the 6,030 individuals who will make the trip and be our bowling guests for the next 10 weekends.

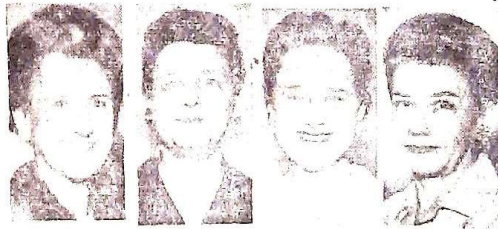

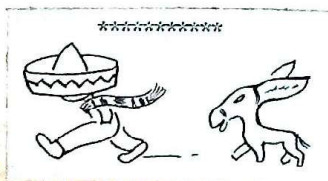

Wonder Bowl and Oak Hills will present interesting special events. Oak Hills will have a ladies scratch singles, in three classes, with an estimated \$200 first prize in each division.

Women with averages of 160 and up are in Class A, those with averages from 150 to 159 in Class B and bowlers with averages of 149 and under in Class C. The entry fee is \$5 with three games on a pair of lanes. State tournament averages will be used.

Let's Have No SECRETS

San Antonio has played a vital role in the growth and development of the Texas Woman's Bowling association and now, for the fifth time, is on the verge of acting as host to the women of Texas in their twenty sixth annual tournament.

Women such as Billy Simon, Clara Grasso, Erna Hauffer, Helen Baetz, Estha Perkins, Agatha Tapley, Marilyn Funk, Dottie Shook, Kitty Rizzo, Opal Schute, and Clara Oeffinger, to name a few, have been active in the organizational, judicial, and executive work mandatory for a successful operation.

It seems so fitting San Antonio should be the host this year. In 1935, the third year Texas women met to decide state honors, 36 teams competed here. San Antonio was the first to host 100 teams, as that exact number was reached when the association came to the Alamo city in 1939.

In 1945 a total of 146 teams bowled here in the state event and in 1951, on the Woodlawn lanes, San Antonio was honored when there were over 3000 teams for the first time, with 342 in completion.

Now, 26 years after the initial session in Dallas when 16 teams bowled, San Antonio can be proud over 1,000 teams are on hand—another milestone.

Perhaps the next time the women of Texas decide the determine their champions in San Antonio the number of teams will be 5,000.

There are many contributing factors to the success of the association. Primarily it has taken unlimited work on the part of a few to improve conditions of many. Since 1945 Mrs. Baetz has been the secretary of the association and has done a thorough job in guiding the women of the state.

But she has had loyal help, both from the women in San Antonio and the other key points of the state, and from Clarence Baetz, who has given much of his time to the Texas Woman's Bowling association.

As of last July, there were 62,632 women in Texas who are members of the Women's International Bowling Congress in the 92 state associations which are members. Houston leads with 12,064, followed by Dallas with 6,353 and Fort Worth with 5,072.

San Antonio, at the close of the last fiscal year of the association, had 4,961 members.

But the growth has been in in

the new members, since the game is moving into the smaller areas. For example Goliad has 122 WIBC members, New Braunfels 251, San Marcos 99, Seguin 195, Hondo 93, Kerrville 127, and Beeville 236.

Austin is growing up in the women's association with 1,890 members at the close of last year's books.

The tournament fund a year ago had \$53,827 with a little over \$30,000 going out in prize money.

It's not only big business, but it's good business.

Of added interest, and all the materials used in this episode are gleaned from the annual report of the association, the highest individual series shot by a woman bowler in Texas the past 15 years is the 743 of Lil Canfield of San Antonio, blasted in 1956.

Myrt DeFily's 300 game is one of two perfect games rolled in sanctioned play in the past 15 years, the other being by Beryl Cox of Houston in 1946. The highest series bowled for the 1959-60 season was by Mary Margaret Davis of Houston with a 726. Sue Kingham of Houston hit 297 for the high individual game last year.

Three women in Texas averaged 191 last season, with Myrt DeFily, Sue Kingham, and Lou Lane of Houston all at the same figure. Above 180 were Lou Guller and Beth Hall of San Antonio and Evelyn Lanier of Austin.

There will be a lot more of those high averages this year.

The history of the Texas Woman's Bowling association glitters with fine achievements and steady advancement. Yet that all is in the past, and the women of this state are not looking back, except for guidance in their progress.

They are looking ahead toward a proud future, so vast it stuns the imagination of many of the faint hearted. The San Antonio women can be gratified they have had a part in the forming and maturing of this great association which honors us with a history-making tournament.

On the other hand San Antonio holds only three scoring records for the past 25 years. The Straus-Frank team's 2,862, set at Corpus Christi in 1956, stands as the high mark in Class A team. Dottie Brand Stevenson's 1,671 for Class B all events, established in Beaumont in 1949 remains unbroken and Neil Recroft hit a 276 game at Fort Worth last year as the top single game of the tournament.

Perhaps our local women will change those records a bit this year. Many are capable and it could happen.

Dottie Shook Explains Manner in Which S. A. Obtained Tourney

Have you ever wondered how a city decides to bid for a state tournament?

Well, in San Antonio it all began Jan. 18, 1958.

President Agatha Tapley came to the point where new business for the coming season be introduced. Clara Grasso rose to her feet and asked for the floor.

Clara then made the motion that San Antonio bid for the state tournament. There was one huge gasp in unison by all who had worked in the last state tournament held in San Antonio in 1952 and clapping and shouts of enthusiasm from the eager new bowlers.

Then a moment of silence as we all gained our composure. Clara, lovingly known by many as "Gorgeous" Grasso, explained she wasn't getting any younger and she would like to have one more tournament in San Antonio before she had to lay down her bowling ball for a rest. Needless to say the motion carried, and it was agreed by all that we would throw our hat in the ring at the El Paso tournament.

Armed with flower covered sombreros, the delegates invaded El Paso in 1958, and announced San Antonio had intentions and in Galveston they would materialize.

At Galveston in 1959, dressed in gata sparkling Spanish attire, the San Antonio delegation was hostess to a gay Fiesta party. At the meeting that evening they were awarded the 1961 tournament on the first ballot amid shouts of "Ole" by all from San Antonio.

At Ft. Worth in 1960 San Antonio's choice, Agatha Tapley, was elected as third vice president of the Texas Woman's Bowling Ass'n. In August, 1960, Agatha Tapley, as tournament manager, appointed the committee chairmen and everyone rolled up her sleeves and began

planning and working with one goal in mind. To make this the biggest and best tournament the state has ever had.

Time has proven the San Antonio tournament is the largest to date for Texas, with 1206 teams. I don't think even in her wildest dreams did Clara (Gorgeous) Grasso ever imagine her motion would swell to such great proportions.

Thus a state tournament is born.

Four Major Side Tournaments Due For Women Bowlers in State Tourney

Women bowlers coming to the state tournament on the San Pedro lanes will have their choice of four side tournaments when they visit the Alamo city.

Side events are scheduled at Bowlerama, Austin Highway, Oak Hills, and Wonder Bowl, all within short driving distance of the San Pedro lanes and all four on expressways.

Austin Highway is the only establishment with men getting into the act. An alibi doubles is scheduled, with an estimated prize list of \$1,500. Bowlers will roll four games, but toss out the weak one and count only the three highest. It will be a handicap meet with women using their highest 21-game league averages of Dec. 1 and men using their highest averages of Feb. 15.

All averages will be subject to verification. Bowlers can bowl as often as they wish in this ABC and WIBC sanctioned meet. It will cost \$3.25 per person in the

meet, with competition in both a mixed and women's division.

At Bowlerama a women's doubles, with averages of Dec. 1 to be used, is planned and will run through April 23. Bowlers can shoot only once with the same partner, with an estimated first prize of \$100, \$55 for second place and \$37 for third. Three games will be rolled on a pair of lanes.

Oak Hills will have a ladies singles scratch meet, in three classes, with an estimated \$200 first prize in each class. Bowlers with averages of 160 or more will be in Class A, those with 150 to 159 in Class B and those with 149 and under in Class C. The entry fee is \$5 per person. Wonder bowl is holding a women's handicap doubles meet, with an entry fee of \$3.50 per person. Prizes of \$200 first, \$100 for second, and \$50 for third are guaranteed. A \$100 first prize in the singles and \$50 for second are guaranteed.

WOMEN BOWLERS BATTLE FOR HONORS

Frills Over, Keglers Seek State Titles

With the formalities of the opening weekend out of the way, women bowlers settle down to the serious work of deciding the 1961 state championships from now until the final squad takes the lanes at 5:45 p.m. Sunday, April 23.

Before the final shots of this record-breaking tournament are released on the San Pedro lanes, over 6,000 women from every section of the state will have seen action with championships decided in every one of the five classes and the four divisions of each class.

Only two class A teams are slated to bowl next week-end, with Sands Bowl of Abilene and Daniel Tire of Houston representatives of the open division.

There will be a heavy entry list from South Texas next week, as crews from Austin, Gonzales, Baytown, Harlingen, McAllen, Texas City, Kingsville, Corpus Christi, Victoria, El Campo, Laredo, and San Antonio take their shots. James Connally of Waco will be well represented.

The Oasis team of San Marcos also will bid for the Class C team crown, being led by Chris Hopper, a Class A bowler with plenty of tournament experience.

Estha Perkins of San Antonio is first vice president; Mary Bishop of Houston second vice president; Gladys Maxwell of Fort Worth third vice president; Helen Baetz of San Antonio secretary; Jane Janes of Dallas treasurer; and Clema Ruth Alexander of Odessa sergeant at arms.

Mrs. Baetz still has two years to go on her term of office.

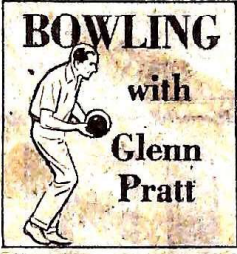
\$1,500 IN PRIZES Doubles Meet Set At Austin Highway

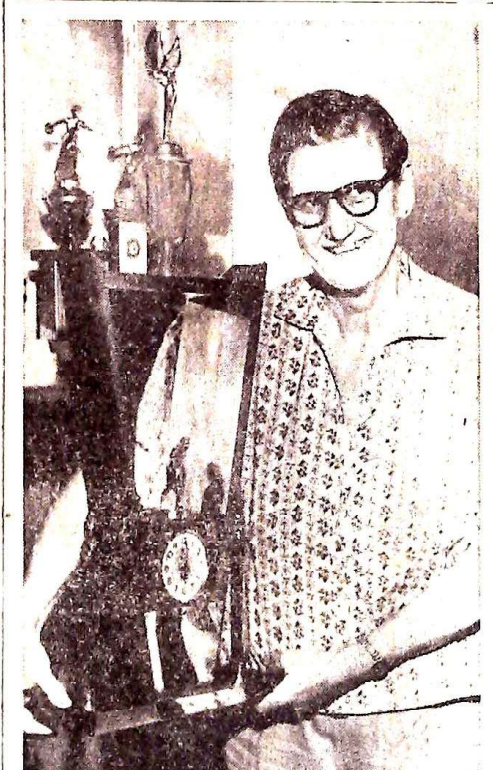
women like Effie Donoho and Ursula Webster, with averages of 81 and 91. . . they deserve credit for their fine spirit even though their scores are not likely to make headlines.

As of Dec. 1, 1960, when the averages are used for state tournament competition. Mrs. Wells had a 146 mark, placing her in class C.

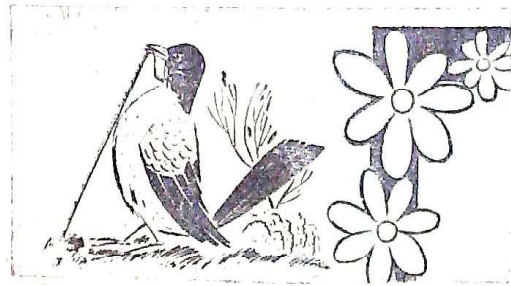
She spanked a 587 series last week to better the old mark of Leona Shumate of Monahans, set in the 1959 tournament at Galveston when the Monahans entry hit 580.

Robbie Frey, however, no longer bowls with the Great Southwest crew, having moved to California. But the team has Jere Price as its leader and is capable of reaching mammoth scores.
