San Antonio bowlers, with the San Pedro Lanes practically to themselves during this rare mid-week running of the State Women's Bowling tournament, captured the lead in three more of the team divisions Thursday night.

The Turbiville Comets moved into first place in Class B with 2,514. The Prompt Printers moved in front of Class C with 2,464. F.M.T. Lines took over first in Class D with 2,313. All teams are from San Antonio.

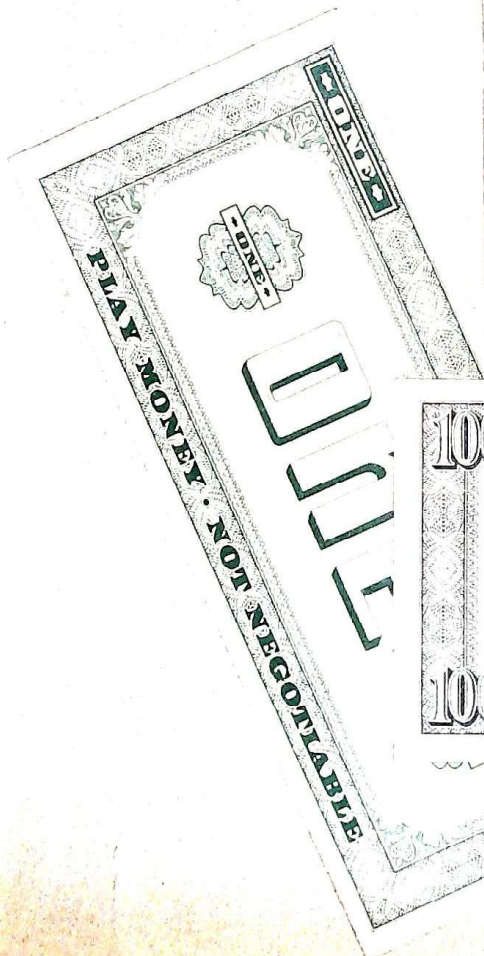
Rose Browy and Gladys Nelson of San Antonio hit 884 pins to take second place in the Class E doubles.

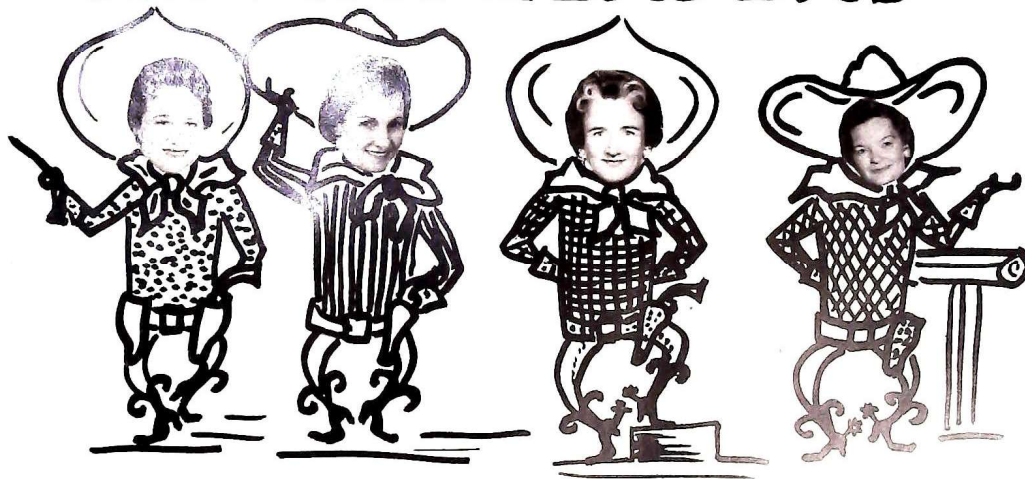
A TOUGH COMPETITOR AT 82

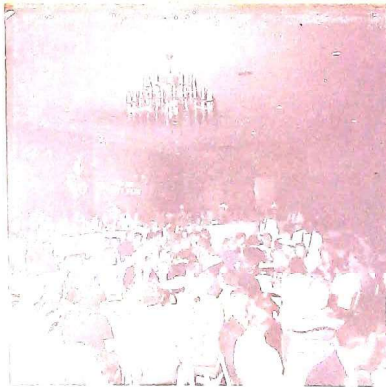

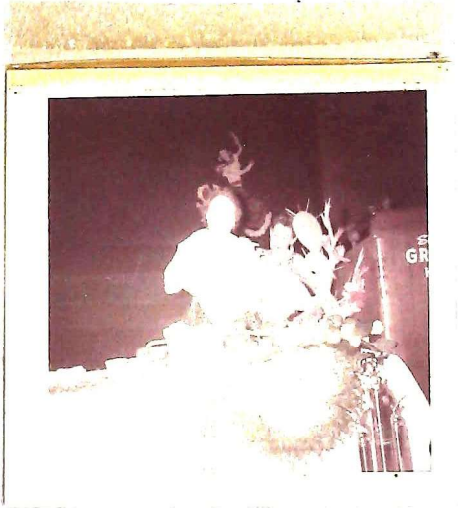

Mrs. R. L. "Estha" Perkins, San Antonio, was elected president for the next year and Waco was voted the tournament city for 1963 at the annual dinner meeting of the Texas Women's Bowling Assn., Inc., in the Granada hotel ballroom Friday night.

Mrs. Perkins, who has been first vice president, won, 117-69, over Mary Bishop, Houston, whose efforts to withdraw before the balloting failed to keep her adherents from putting her name in nomination.

She was later elected vice president by acclamation, as were Second Vice President Lil Poole, Ft. Worth; Third Vice President Mattie Tippitt, Tyler; Treasurer Jane Janes, Dallas; State Director Rae Fisk, Houston, the retiring president, and these district directors: Gladys Maxwell, Ft. Worth; Ruby Metzger, San Angelo; Mary Kneupper, Victoria; Jo Tucker, Houston, and Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls.

In one other contested election, Jo Scarborough, Midland, won out over Gerry Henderson, Dallas, in District 10 by 119-65.

Waco was chosen over Amarillo for the 1963 tournament (Tyler already had been selected for 1962) by a vote of 126-59. Both cities campaigned strongly, having large delegations in the gathering of the 500-plus at the meeting. Waco had chamber of commerce representatives among its speakers, a lively band and two students, Charles Smith and Larry Sjedon, in a "mother and daughter" skit. Pat Graham was master of ceremonies for the bid. Amarillo presented a stage show, directed by Louise McConnell, that included a can-can chorus and Elocution Teacher Glenn McConnell in a hilarious skit.

ORGAN FEATURED

Jo Novak's organ music was a feature of the long session, which started at 6:30 and broke up at 12:05. The assemblage sang "Irish Eyes Are Smiling" with just minutes of St. Patrick's day left.

Claire Leeper's singing of special verses introducing the local officers and "Going Home" during the annual memorial service were features, as was the presentation of the colors in which a WAC detachment and Grace Baskin and Myrt Defily were flag-bearers.

AWARDS PRESENTED

Awards were presented to three tournament "regulars"—Erna Hauffer, Emma Treiber and Elizabeth Whall, who received life memberships in the WIBC; to Ford Wendlandt and Hilda Shoop of Austin because that city topped all others in tourney entries with 64; to Gladys Matsumonji, Allen, for her contributions to the bowling publication "Across Texas Lanes."

Retiring State President Rae Fisk was given a bluebonnet oil painting by the state association. County Judge Charles Anderson made the address of welcome and gave Mrs. Phaler an engraved gavel after appointing her an honorary county judge.

CLOSING CEREMONY

In a closing ceremony, the golden bowling pin which the tournament city keeps for a year was turned over by Agatha Tapley to President Mildred Richardson of the Tyler Assn.

Mrs. Phaler said the WIBC now has 1,700,000 members and already has outgrown its new quarters in Columbus, O., which were only recently occupied.

The ballroom was decorated by Johnny Glodt in the Mexican motif and the San Antonio officers and many other local bowlers wore Spanish costumes. Ditty Oefinger was given a rising vote of thanks for her work as arrangements chairman.

There was just one change in the State Women's bowling tournament's top five Friday as bowling was shortened to two shifts Friday night. The lone change saw Barbara Maspero of San Antonio move into fifth place in Class E all events with 1346.

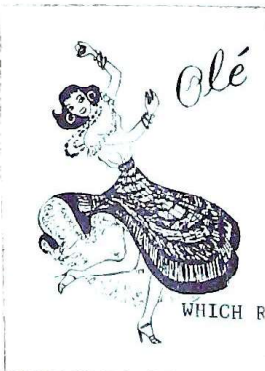

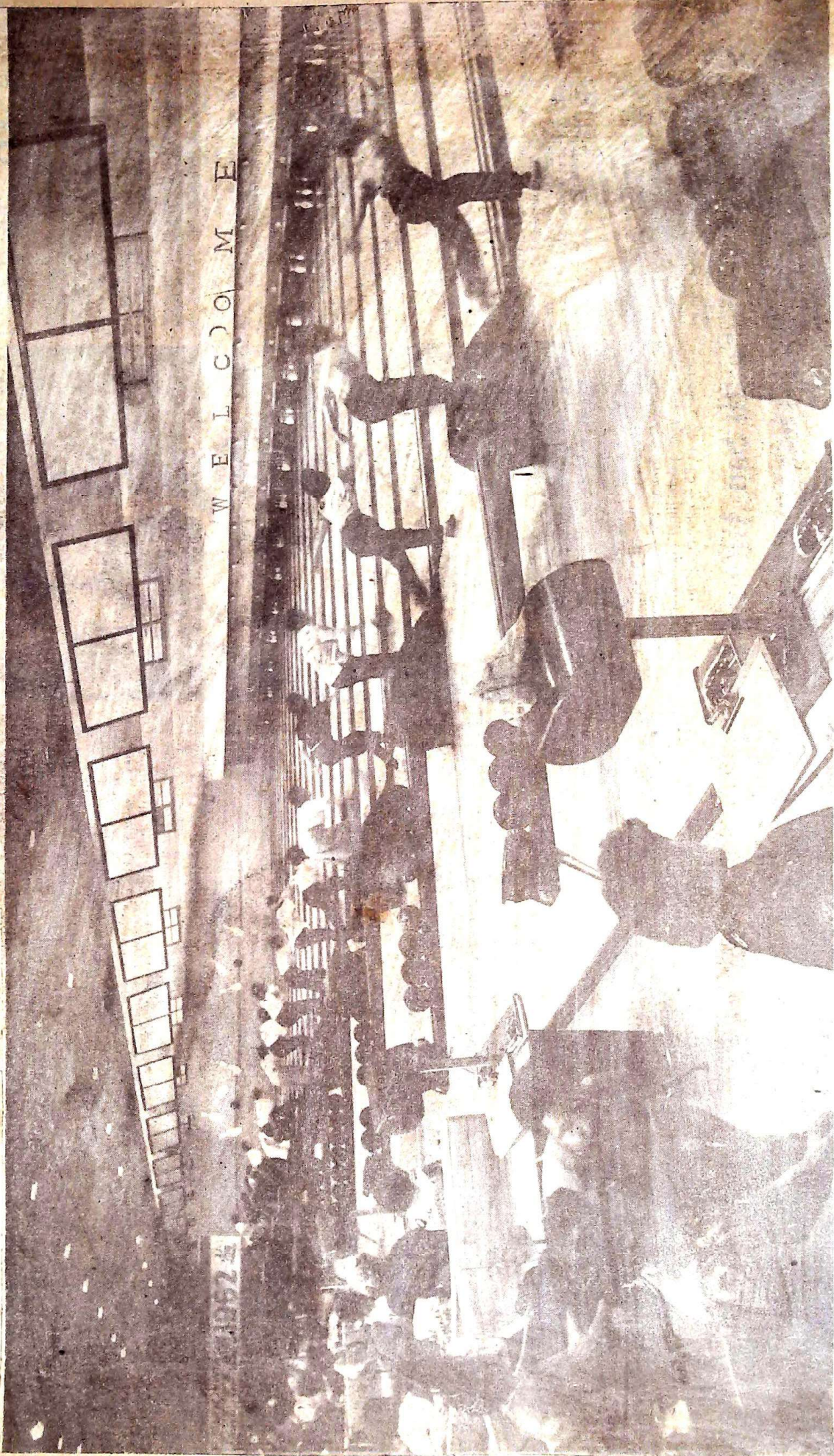

Rosie Newlin and Mary Rogres of MacAllen took over first place in the Wonder bowl doubles, being run during the women's state tournament, with a 1,247 total. That dropped the pair of Win Mackey and Evelyn Halfaker of Temple to second place on 1,235 for the first time in several weeks.

San Marcos women continue to lead in the handicap single as Chris Hopper has 683 and Virginia Cox 680. As a doubles team they are third in the handicap doubles on 1,230.

For the most part out of town women have been taking charge, but in the singles Aline Hilgen, of San Antonio, is fifth on a 644 total. She is the only San Antonio woman in the top 10 of either division.

Helen Baetz Selected for Honor As February Bowler of Month

Helen Baetz, secretary of the Texas Woman's Bowling association and long a leader of the game here, has been selected as Bowler of the Month for February.

Her selection was announced this week by Jud Spring, chairman of the committee making the final decision on nominations.

"Mrs. Baetz has been a great leader and promoter of bowling in San Antonio for years," Spring said. "There are all too few who helped to develop and nurture the game. Mrs. Baetz belongs in that select group."

"With all due regard to other members of the Texas Woman's Bowling association, there would be an indispensable loss if she were to resign. Some people have the ability for such leadership and Mrs. Baetz has developed it to a high degree."

"The other candidate, Edna Bit-

ters, also has done a lot toward helping the game and deserves honors, too. But the committee, as always, has a choice to make and it was the committee's opinion Mrs. Baetz should be the winner."

Mrs. Baetz is the second straight woman to be honored with the Sports Mirror-Trophy House award. Last month it was Elizabeth Whall, one of the oldest women bowling in the state tournament this year.

Only bowlers nominated by letter are eligible to be considered by the committee. Any bowler, sponsor, or friend of the game can be nominated, by letter, to The Sports Mirror, 911 E. Euclid, San Antonio. All candidates will be considered by the committee, with the March nominations open through the first week in April.

Out of Town Bowlers Now Faced With Task of Catching Local Girls

It's up to the rest of the state now to knock the pins down and push San Antonio teams from the top roosts in the women's state tournament on the San Pedro lanes.

After a week-long assault which saw San Antonio teams take charge in every one of the team divisions, out-of-towners again get their chances this weekend. The scoring was heavy last week and it will take strong bowling by the visitors in the remaining five weeks to oust the present leaders.

Mary Louise Young and Pat Sacks of Houston found out, however, that fame is fleeting. The two stars from Houston vaulted into first place in Class A doubles last Sunday, but held the lead only a few hours as Dottie Brandt and Dottie Clark of San Antonio beat them out by eight pins.

The Houston pair hit 1,157 prior to the two Dotties socking 1,168 on the late doubles shift Sunday night.

So far two records have been written into the books, with Elsie Wells of Pasadena scoring 587 in the Class C singles and Wendy Moore blasting 660 in the Class A singles for all-time marks. Wendy also holds the lead in Class A all events with her 1,785.

Besides the five leading teams and the doubles combination of Dottie Clark and Dottie Brandt, other San Antonio entries setting the pace are Jean Halfant and Sylvia Smith in Class B doubles with 1,096, and Jean Halfant in Class B all events with 1,650.

Pat Lloyd is the only Austin leader, having taken over first place in Class D all events with 1,504 pins.

SAN ANTONIO READY FOR MAJOR MEET

The tremendous success of the women's state bowling here this year, plus the great showing San Antonio made in the men's state event a year ago, have opened the eyes of the state of Texas toward San Antonio as host for a major bowling carnival.

So now, with state recognition so firmly established, why doesn't San Antonio go after the big shows—the Southwest, the WIBC, and even the ABC?

It is well known, among those who follow the game closely, that San Antonio was in an ideal position to be host to the ABC the year Fort Worth was the site of the national event. Only the lethargic attitude of a few key persons prevented the Alamo city from making a solid bid for the kingdom of them all at that time.

The San Antonio Bowling association and The San Antonio Woman's Bowling associations have reached the status of maturity. Both organizations are in capable hands, as are the men's and women's state associations.

San Antonio long has been noted for its hospitality and its many vacation facilities.

It is true our city is not as centralized as many of the major bowling capitals, but the ABC and the WIBC have a rotating plan whereby the national events are distributed around the various sections.

The women, even more than the men, have proven to be alert and progressive.

The women's state tournament here this year has been handled in such perfect manner that it has attracted the attention of high ranking officers in the WIBC. Emma Phaler, executive secretary of the WIBC, was a visitor at the annual meeting of the state women's group last week and there can be no doubt she was deeply impressed by the manner in which both the major and minor details were handled.

San Antonio has made a preliminary bid for the 1963 Southwest tournament and while there is no hope, there are others who are convinced the city has grown enough in the bowling sense to be considered when the officials meet at Wichita next year.

If we are to obtain and to hold major events, it might be wise for the San Antonio Bowling association, the San Antonio Woman's Bowling association, the San Antonio Bowling Proprietors association, and the Chamber of Commerce to appoint a committee to delve into the possibilities of obtaining major events.

The women's tournament here this year brought about 5,000 visitors to the city—with cash to spend.

Many came, saw and were con-

vinced San Antonio is an ideal place to spend a vacation or a weekend. It is fortunate beautiful weather has been the rule this year, but even adverse weather conditions prove that the Alamo City is less stricken than other areas.

If it is cold and gloomy here the chances are it is even colder and more gloomy elsewhere in the state and miserable in the north-

ern sections of the nation. Bowling is big business — here and everywhere around the country.

Bowling has grown in our area and will continue to develop. There is nothing to stimulate the game such as a major tournament. True there is a great deal of labor connected with such an event as the WIBC, the Southwest, or the ABC.

But the value of such tournaments and the impetus it puts on the game wherever held returns vast benefits.

San Antonio has many who are nationally known in bowling. Charley Treuter and Billy Simon are two names that come to mind quickly and there must be others.

The Sports Mirror feels San Antonio should quit thinking it is an isolated bowling community.

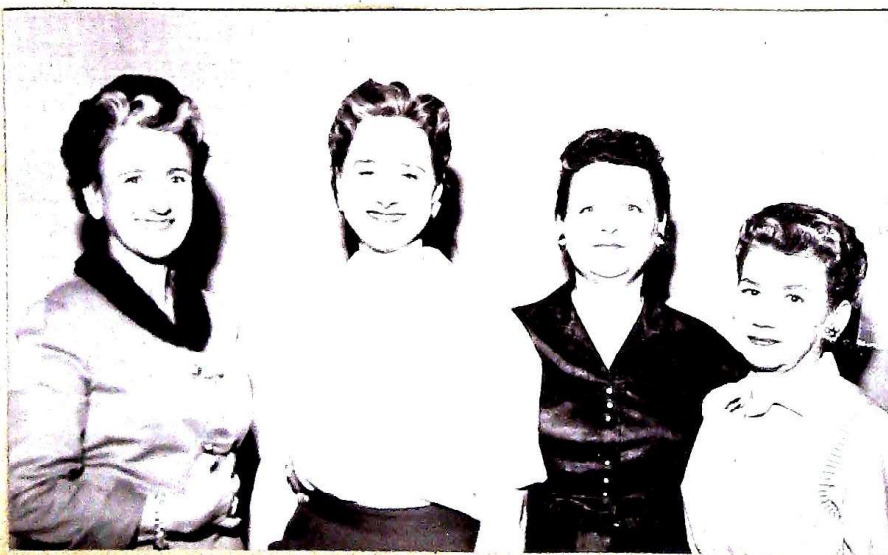

Emma Phaler, executive secretary of the Women's International Bowling Congress, isn't a Texan by birth but there always will be a spot in her heart for the Lone Star state.

"There are hotel facilities to consider and the vast amount of work that must be done on a single event. To double that much labor for the groups in one city is virtually impossible."

Mrs. Phaler was met at the plane and given the red carpet treatment, with personal greetings from Mayor Kuykendall. Later she was made the alcalde of La Villita and at the meeting was made honorary judge of Bexar county, following being made an honorary citizen of the county.

"I have enjoyed every minute of the time I have been in office," Mrs. Fisk said, "but feel it is time to step down and turn the reins over to someone else."

Let's Have No SECRETS

Bowling is the great American sport. In a sense it represents this entire nation, with people from every walk of life engaging on equal terms. The millionaire, the virtual pauper, the preacher and the thug all can — and probably do — enjoy bowling even with the many problems which the game affords.

As mentioned a few weeks ago in this column, bowling is going into the hinterlands in its sweep of the nation.

But, oddly enough, the game already has made inroads on the vast population of this country. The only difference is that now the folks in the rural areas no longer have to seek a place to bowl. Those who handle the business end of the game have sought out the small areas.

The women's state tournament here is a fine example of that condition which exists in the game. There are women from Dallas and Fort Worth, from Houston and San Antonio.

Also there are women from Earth and Liberty, from Friona and Littlefield, and from Steel City and Spearman.

There are big girls and little girls, old girls and young ones, glamor girls and plain girls, pretty girls and then again those not quite so good looking.

But here looks don't mean a thing.

It's an even battle to smash the pins down and take home a share of glory and even less important than the honor the cash that goes with the group in the prize money.

Nowhere in the world of sports is democracy so evident.

Only a limited few have the physical ability to compete in football or to blast their way into other professional sports such as baseball, boxing, or basketball.

Bowling alone presents an outlet for all—from infants to octogenarians. Some men and women bowl for a half century in this crade to the grave activity that prevents many from reaching the grave stage until well past their allotted time

Bowling tournaments are unlike any other form of athletic endeavor.

The pastime of socking tempins creates great and lasting friendship but it also brings heavy business to the locality in which it is held. It provides endless hours of entertainment for those fortunate enough to be on hand as spectators.

No bowling trip is the same.

As a rule the trip to the tournament is one of dreams and promises. It whets the appetite for the game and on this journey never a bad ball is thrown and never a split to mar the series.

The way back is vastly different.

It's a long road back for those who fail and as a rule it's a quiet trip.

For those who score well it's a short and happy return. The scoresheets are read and reread. The pocket hits that failed to carry are shrugged off, but of course there always are those pins that should have carried to make the totals swell and well.

For the bowling fraternity, despite tough breaks or bad bowling, or a combination of both, there remains another day. There will be more tournaments and more trips.

There will be reunions with old buddies and new acquaintances will be developed.

The banker and the preacher may strike up warm friendships, maybe with the truck driver or the liquor salesman, the mechanic or the barber.

Only a few in bowling are ostracized.

Bowlers learn quickly of the chisellers or those jacking good sportsmanship.

Bowling is a game of skill and concentration. But also it is a game of fun and true friendships. It's one sport where the old axiom of "win at any cost" is tossed out with disgust.

It's the great American sport, whether it be league bowling, a friendly match, or a big event.

In a sense, however, tournament play is the icing on the cake.

S. A. Women Bid for 1964 WIBC Tournament; Chances Appear Good

The San Antonio Women's city bowling association has voted to invite the Women's International Bowling Congress to have its 1964 national tournament in San Antonio.

In a meeting last Friday the idea was passed, as expected, but it's a long road to the culmination of the dream of local bowling boosters. However, San Antonio has many advantages working for it even though there also are difficulties.

There is a feeling that if San Antonio gets the meet it will be held in the Joe Freeman coliseum. For many years the ABC has installed new lanes for its annual tournament but the WIBC has not used this method. It has bowled on regular lanes in an established bowling center.

By 1964 the women's national meet will have reached the point where no San Antonio bowling house would wish to act as host. It would mean losing all league play for many weeks and at the termination of the tournament

new league bowling would have to be developed.

This, however, should not be too much of an obstacle. The Joe Freeman coliseum could be obtained with new lanes to be installed. No doubt these lanes would be sold to some bowling house long before the WIBC would close. The cost would be nominal, since the WIBC could use the money ordinarily spent on lineage at the commercial house.

Joe Freeman coliseum has ample parking room and is easy enough to reach from the center of town.

Next year's tournament will be at Phoenix Ariz., and already plans are being made for a major delegation from the Alamo City to compete. At the Phoenix tournament the site of the 1964 meet will be announced, since the national is awarded two years in advance.

San Antonio has two women who carry a lot of weight in WIBC circles. They are Helen Baetz, the local representative of the WIBC and Billy Simon, long a leader among the women bowlers of the nation.

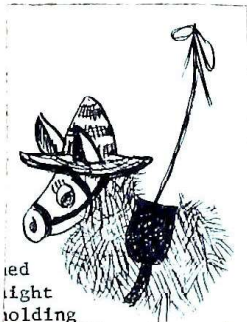

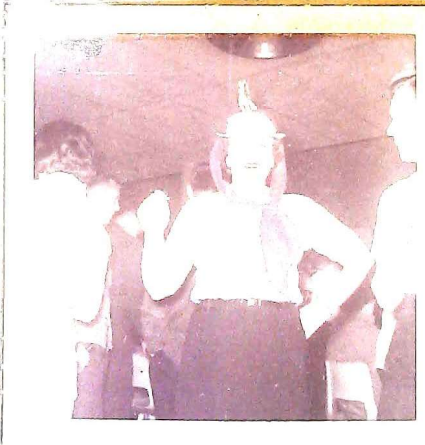

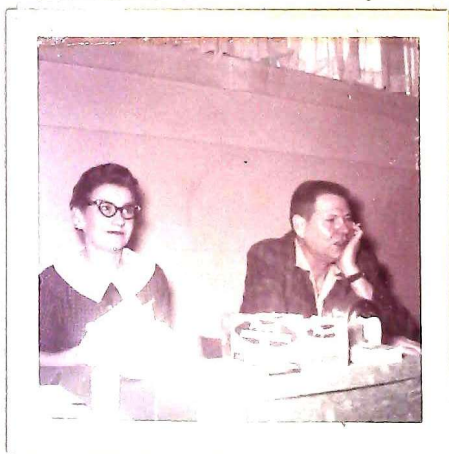

This was approved. #5 was withdrawn by request of Midland WBA. #6 deleted the requirement of the Hostess city to furnish a tournament office in the hotel of the hostess city. Carried. Recommendation #7 was approved changing the time from 10 days to 30 days in which credentials of delegates had to be in the hands of the State Secretary.

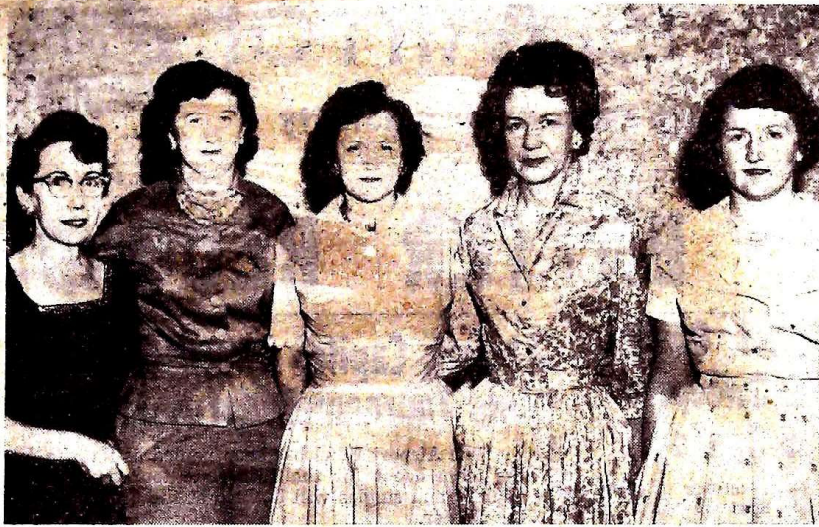

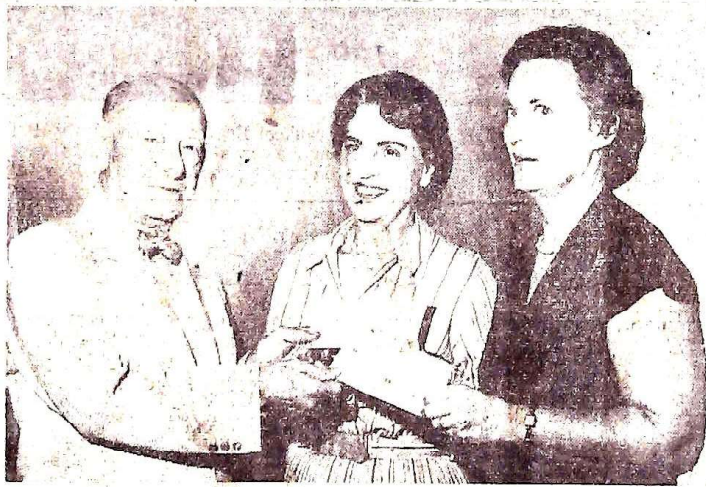
