# Shirley Shines in LATA

Shirley Mansfield, who has been on one of the hottest streaks of her career, swept through the Ladies Amateur Tournament Association monthly tournament at Oak Hills losing only one match and downing a field of 42 entries.

Shirley stood third after Saturday's qualifying rounds behind Linda Fox and Jerry Johnson.

In her first match on Sunday morning she met Roz Porrini in one of the better matches in the tournament. With thirty points at stake for a win in the match game finals, Roz slammed in a 235 to give Shirley her only loss of the day. Shirley registered a 205 game.

After match #1, Roz's bonus points and plus-pins moved her into first place in the standings, a position she kept until Shirley took it in game five.

From her first losing match Shirley moved through the field of Finalists including teammate Mary Falconer, Patsy Pendarvis, Rayne Mitchell, Linda Fox, Cindy

Johnson and Jerry Johnson earning the thirty bonus points each match. Her games were 205-194-190-191-228-212-184 and 220, a fantastic 203 average.

In the position round, game

seven, she faced Mary who was charging to the top in spite of a bout with the 'bug'. Their positions could have changed when they met on lanes 23-24, as Shirley was leading with a

plus-170 to Mary's plus-150. Shirley rolled her lowest tournament game, 184, to defeat the three-time SAWBA Superior Performance winner by seven pins.

As fate would have it, the two then faced each other in the final game, standing one-two on the board. In the final game Shirley found her line after the fifth frame and went on to win the match 160-220. She became the LATA's fourth tournament winner.

In other position round action Roz maintained her third place spot defeating Patsy 175-159. Jerry Johnson zapped in a 202 to move Rayne Mitchell down in the standings and Cindy Johnson and Linda Fox battled for the last spot, with Linda taking the match 189-186 for the bonus points.

The tournament paid sixteen places plus \$25 for high game by a non-casher and \$25 for the high series by a non-casher. Dolores Hagelgans won the award for

high game, 236, and Jo Ann Ballard, December winner, for series, 788. Although she didn't make the cut after the semi-finals, Fay Tidrick registered the

tournament's high game, a 275. Jerry Johnson, president of LATA, stated that 66 ladies have now joined the monthly tournament association. All tourna-

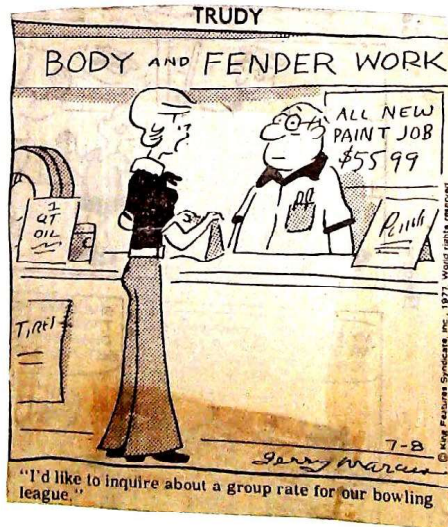


ments have carried an expense fee in the total entry fee, which has not been used, due to the many volunteers working at the tournament. The expense fee is being used as added prize money for the January, February and March tournaments. In April when a meeting is held for election of officers and plans are made for the remainder of the year, the matter of expenses will be taken up with the entire membership. "We feel that by putting the expense fee back into the prize fund is the only fair way to return the original member's money. After April new members and officers can make the decision about the use of that money in the future," Mrs. Johnson stated.

"I am so pleased with the acceptance of the association. We now have 66 paid members for our first six months, and the interest in the association is growing with each tournament," she concluded.

The next tournament stop will be at Southside on February 19th and 20th.

Her list of assistants read like a who's who of local bowling. She encourages young junior bowlers to help by becoming student coaches in the AJBC program.

Her title officially is Junior Coordinator, but her duties are many and varied. She is responsible for the coordination and implementation of new leagues, she holds instruction classes, she carries out the awards program for AJBC, plans special events and in-school programs and directs house and other tournaments.

In her fifth year of AJBC coaching, Lu, a name all her charges use, is a bundle of organized energy. She has leagues every day of the week except Thursday and Friday. She is a member of the SWTJBA executive board and bowls in two leagues with her husband Roy. Lu carries a 156 and 162 average and Roy, 164 and 174.

Her newest project is formation of the Girl Scouts league for Troop 102 in Universal City. The girls are fourth and fifth graders who will attend training classes on the fundamentals of bowling, then graduate to on-the-lanes di-

In the plans for the future are instructional classes during the summer for beginners. The successful program instituted by Wonder Bowl last summer will be open to youngsters of all ages in the hopes of teaching the very young the fun of bowling and more importantly the fun of league bowling in the fall.

Lu believes in teaching the junior bowlers that there are duties to be assumed in the game. The officers of her leagues learn to conduct the business of a league, juniors assist with the bookkeeping chores for the younger bantams and by doing, emerge from the junior ranks to become responsible, thinking, contributors to the parent organizations of ABC and WIBC.

The Plano City will be filled with bowling dignitaries from across the state and nation, and bowling action will range from the juniors to the senior citizens.

Heading the list of national and state officials is Jim Beleele, field representative of the American Junior Bowling Congress, Greendale, Wisconsin, Mrs. Dorothy Cornelison, Houston, president of the Texas Women's Bowling Association, and Miss Lil Poole Hurst, secretary of the more than 125,000 members of the TWBA.

Beleele, Mrs. Cornelison and Miss Poole will be on hand for the opening ceremonies of the Southwest Texas Junior Bowling Association championship tournament on Saturday. Tonight local officials will fete Beleele with a social gathering at the Rathskellar at Hermann Sons lanes.

Mrs. Cornelison and Miss Poole will be attending a meeting of the TWBA Service Award Committee, chaired by Mrs. Helen Baetz. The first Service Award recipients, named last year at the TWBA convention at Longview, Mrs. Hope "Tizzy" Tisdale, Austin, and Mrs. Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi, also now serve on the committee. The Service Award, recommended by Secretary Poole is given to recognize the accomplishments of a member of TWBA (other than a Board member) who has given valuable service to the organization. Mrs. Tisdale is a former board member who has contributed greatly over the years to TWBA and the youth bowlers of the State, and Mrs. Newman was an invaluable volunteer on most of the TWBA projects over the years. Mrs. Newman was elected to the Board after the 1976 com-

mittee had selected her for the Service honor.

The Junior Leaders Board, under the direction of president Ken Fridley, will conduct the Opening Ceremonies of the SWTJBA championship tournament. Local association officials of the adult and junior bodies will join outstanding junior bowlers in officially opening the tournament which will continue through this and the next four weekends.

The junior meet has registered 216 teams of youngsters from the surrounding area who will compete in five classes at Goliad lanes.

The Seniors meet is a handicap affair for teams, doubles and sin-

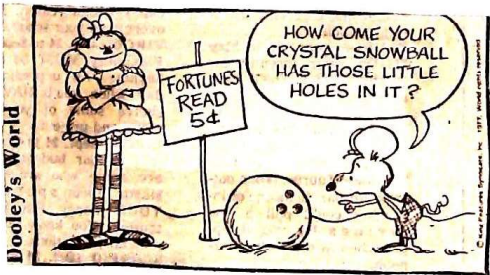
gles with an optional all events with divisions for both men and women.

The San Antonio Women's Bowling Association membership is growing by leaps and bounds, according to city secretary, Mrs. Sylvia Broyles.

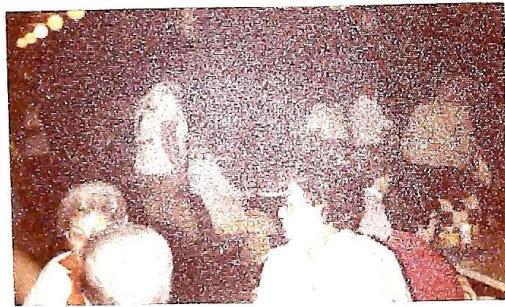
Membership to date is 10,590, approximately 75 more than the same period last season.

# Pert Pair in 'Over 90 Set' Still Bowling Along

Only a faint rain or hint of gloom of the day kept Melitta Wied Grosse and Otilie Augusta Goering from attending their weekly San Antonio Social Bowling Club meetings. The two ladies, both members of the "over 90 set," are still bowling strong.

San Antonio Social Bowling Club? A new socially elite group? Far from it. Formed in 1905, the club has been reduced to 15 members, most of them over 80. "We want the young ones, honey," one woman offered, "but, they don't want us. Anyone can join. They just have to apply."

The women meet in rustic old Beethoven Maennerchor Hall on Pereida, a tree-lined street tucked away from the hustle and bustle of growing San Antonio. A small building behind the main lodge houses the bowling alley, as it were, an older and much smaller version of modern ones. There are two lanes, and balls and pins are retrieved manually, with the aid of two teenage boys paid by the group. Bowling is done with balls approximately the size of cantaloupes called hand balls.

Of German descent, Melitta and Otilie are amazingly active and alert; both own their own homes, and do their own housework. Ninety-one-year-old Otilie says of her companion, "Melitta is one of those clean as a pin people. Last week, she cleaned out every closet and cabinet, and scrubbed every piece of china in her house." Melitta explained her church group at St. Paul's Lutheran "surprised" her with a 94th birthday party last Saturday, thus the cleaning rampage.

Born in Gonzales, Mrs. Grosse has lived in San Antonio 51 years. Her husband "had a dry goods store, and a dry cleaning store, when he was alive," she said. Described as a night owl, Mrs. Grosse often stays up past midnight, which causes her to "oversleep 'til 9:30 a.m." She loves to cook, and still puts her all into homemade bread, stuffed cabbage heads and coffeecakes. She is quite a crocheter, and has "drawers and drawers of handwork."

Mrs. Grosse admits to growing up in the horse and buggy days, and says life is so different now, she "can hardly recognize it." Queried about politics, she said, "I hope Carter is as good as Ford was." And Amy? "There are still so many things I haven't decided."

Otilie, who doesn't look a day over 80, is very active in St. John's Lutheran

Church Women, and gardening is her passion. She is also an avid fisherman, and plans to make a fishing expedition in the spring. She was raised in Waring, in a family of nine. Her father owned "a big general merchandise store." According to the pert lady, things have changed drastically, but for the better. Of youth, she quips, "Once they know it all, then they have to learn what's practical, and what counts in life."

Although Mrs. Goering never worked the proverbial 8-5 day, on women in the work force, she says, "I think it's no more than right." And, she hastens to add, "Until six months ago, I handled all aspects of private real estate. I had six tenants, and four houses, for which I took care of all repairs, taxes, rent, just everything."

Her favorite television shows? "I like the funny ones, like the Jeffersons. I also like the Waltons, Little House on the Prairie and Who's Who." And, by her own testimony, she can't get enough turkey, fresh vegetables or homemade peach ice cream.

As the interview drew to a close, so did the San Antonio Social Bowling Club's business meeting. When the treasurer announced the group had \$48.36 in the bank, one delighted bowler shrieked, "We're rich!"

### No pressure to win

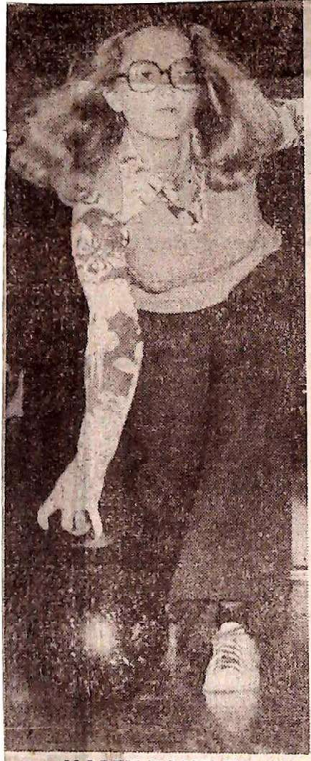
"There is no pressure to win," Jane said. "Everyone is out to have a good time. The gals I have met are really nice. And, you know, there are really quite a few super bowlers here."

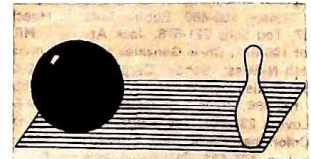
After Saturday's qualifying rounds and the semi-finals, Mary was second in the standings behind Linda Fox.

The easiest-to-enter tournament staged in the city, all bowlers are urged to participate at least one time. The BVL (Bowlers Victory Legion) is administered by the National Bowling Council. It helps provide recreational and entertainment services for our men and women in the Armed Services. Known as the Bowler's Charity, it offers an opportunity to say that we remember — and we do care. # Kathy Kirst Named 1977 Alberta Crowe Star of Tomorrow

"This is Kathy" — "Yes, ma'am" — (pause) "Oh my gosh, I can't believe it"—those were the first words out of the mouth of Kathy Kirst when she received the telephone call from Mrs. Kay Heggie, president of the National Women Bowling Writers informing her she had been named to receive the 1977 Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow Award.

For a young bowler known for her concentration on the lanes, Kathy completely lost her composure as she listened, and at one point dropped the phone from her ear only to replace it still repeating "I can't believe it."

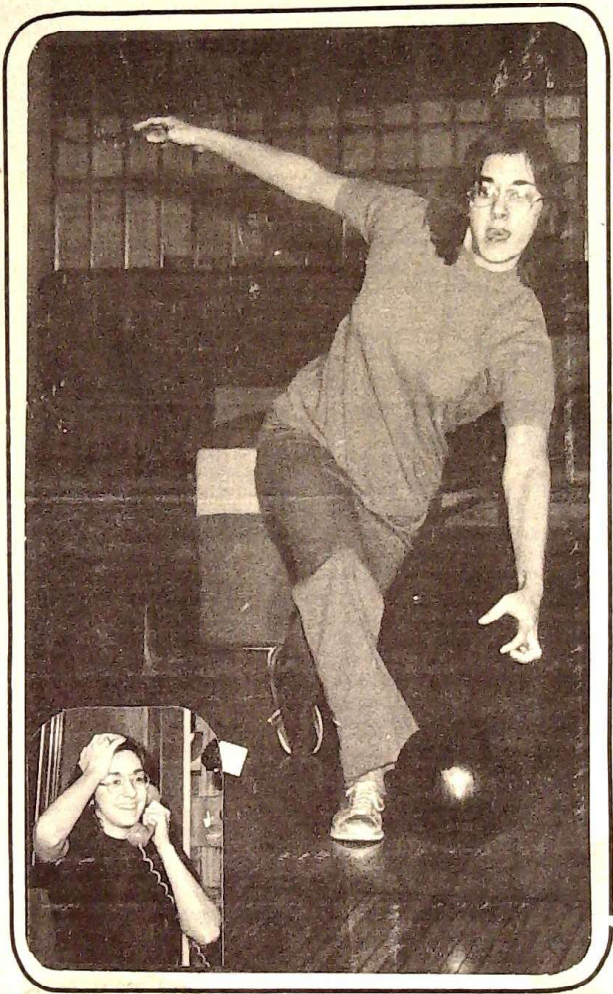
Kathy may never be able to fully recall that conversation, but she realizes what it means.

The Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow award is given by Mrs. Crowe, president of the Women's International Bowling Congress, to a young lady whose bowling ability, sportsmanshiplike qualities, pleasant personality and scholastic accomplishments set her apart from her peers.

There is no monetary value, but this extra special honor is given annually to the most promising young woman bowler in the United States, and the selection for the highly coveted honor is given to bring recognition and inspiration to the upcoming young women bowlers of the country.

Kathy's accomplishments on the lanes are familiar to most San Antonians. Officially she holds the record for the highest series ever bowled by a girl in the American Junior Bowling Congress in its 29 year history. Kathy performed that feat at age 15.

Based on a long string of junior bowling accomplishments, Kathy's name was submitted to the AJBC office for the award upon recommendation of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association's board of directors.



Mrs. Heggie advised Kathy that Mrs. Crowe normally presents the Star of Tomorrow Award at the annual WIBC Convention, however, Mrs. Crowe would be happy to make the presentation at the NBC Bowling

Spectacular at Wonder Bowl, May 4-7, before her friends and family. Without a moment's hesitation Kathy opted for the latter.

"It's like a dream coming true. I was so happy when Mom came home and told me the Women's

Board voted to send my name in, but I never really expected to get it. I've read a lot about Mrs. Crowe's award and the ladies who have received it before, and all the women I know who worked on the WIBC when it was here in 1968 have talked about it. Mrs. Crowe's selection of me is really great."

"I'm still so happy about that telephone call," she said Tuesday. "I still can't believe it, but I know that this makes five times that Texas girls have won it and I am a native you know, and it is good for all the women bowlers of Texas."

"I want to write to Mrs. Crowe and tell her how happy I am, and how much I appreciate her coming to the Spectacular to present the award. I just hope she doesn't find out how poorly I bowled in the city tournament," she laughed.

Kathy now joins the ranks of some of the nation's most prolific bowlers. The list of past winners of the Star of Tomorrow Award are

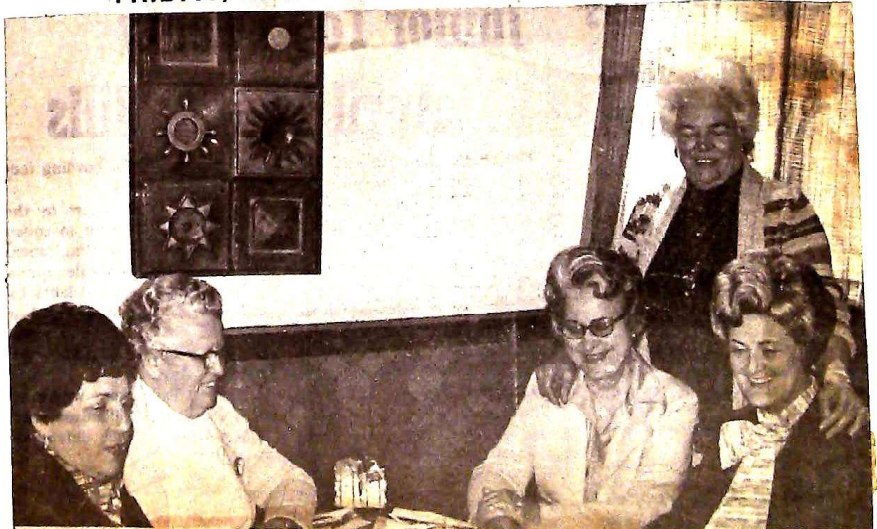

# WBA Reports to Members

Their contributions to the game are well known on the local, state and national level.

Following the announcement Mrs. Judy Stephenson, president of the more than 11,000 members of the local bowling association, presented a single red rose to Mrs. Baetz, symbolic of the honor.

"SAWBA is a truly special association, with a strong foundation," declared Mrs. Stephenson to the 68 women attending the meeting. "With your increased involvement and dedicated selfless support, it can be even greater in the future."

Another milestone was reached during the current season when the membership mark reached 11,000. Secretary, Mrs. Sylvia

Broyles, announced in her report that SAWBA Board members would be working closer with bowling proprietors and the companion San Antonio Bowling Association. 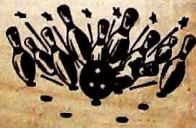

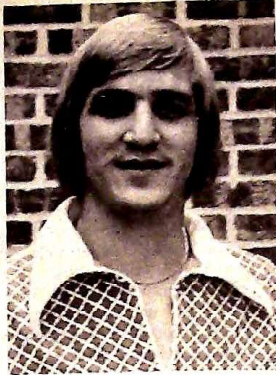
# Burns-Noska BVL Winners

the National Women Bowling Writers association. The Billiard and Bowling Institute of America is represented by president Donald Ingerman.

AMF, BPAA and Brunswick also are members of the official Hall of Fame and Museum committee. Chairman of this operating body is Mrs. Helen Baker who is joined by fellow WIBC vice presidents Gladys Banker and Agnes Duffy, executive secretary Flora Mitchell and Mrs. Crowe. Paul Mohn, vice chairman of the committee, is joined by fellow ABC vice president Wesley Bogler, directors Max Weinstein and Dale Diamond and assistant

secretary-treasurer Ken Hurley.

Design firms from Dallas, Indianapolis, Milwaukee and New York have begun work on concepts and ideas for the Hall of Fame. 12 cities — Akron, Cincinnati, Detroit, Knoxville, Memphis, Milwaukee, Nashville, Oklahoma City, St. Louis, San Diego, Springfield, Ill. and Tampa — are interested in being the site and all have been informed that the selection will be made after the major fund drive in February, 1978.

The Hall of Fame presently is squeezed into a wing of Bowling Headquarters, the administrative home of ABC, WIBC and the American Junior Bowling Congress in Milwaukee. Space is not available for a major expansion to pay tribute properly to the long history of bowling and to the many who have contributed so much — bowlers, proprietors, manufacturers and others, or as they are popularly known, "the bowling family."

# Local Gals to Be Spotlighted by WIBC

It is one often that just one state out of the 50 great states which comprise the United States of America can completely dominate a national organization's awards program.

In 1977, Texas is doing exactly that during the WIBC National Convention. More importantly, San Antonio, a little off the beaten-path bowling-wise, will have three of its bowling family members spotlighted during the 1977 WIBC National Convention in Milwaukee April 25-27.

Mrs. Helen Baetz is one of five women to be inducted into the WIBC Hall of Fame this year.

Seventeen year old Kathy Kirst, who rolled the highest series by a girl in the 29 year history of AJBC, will be honored by WIBC and the National Women Bowling Writers when WIBC president, Mrs. Albert E. Crowe, presents her the Star of Tomorrow award for 1977 during the Writer's Meeting.

When election time rolls around at the Convention, the 1977 Nominating Committee has proposed the name of SAWBA City Secretary, Mrs. Sylvia Broyles, for the WIBC Board of Directors.

Mrs. Baetz joins another illustrious San Antonio lady in the Hall of Fame. Billy Simon, a legend in her own time, was enshrined in 1962, and will be in Milwaukee during convention time to help welcome Mrs. Baetz into the Hall.

Mrs. Baetz became involved in bowling after her Cl. B team won the city tournament in 1943. From league involvement came local association leadership roles where she has served as secretary, director and vice president. In 1944 she was elected secretary of TWBA, a position she held for 21 continuous years.

1952 was the beginning of her 24 years of service to WIBC on the national board where she

served as 5th and 3rd vice presidents prior to her retirement last year. Mrs. Baetz was named a WIBC member emeritus at the time of her retirement.

Our Helen has spread her special brand of sunshine through out the country in all phases of the bowling game.

For these services, plus untold others, the nearly 4 million members of WIBC will bestow their highest honor, Hall of Fame membership.

Kathy's 'plum' will be given Sunday at the Writer's brunch. Kathy made headlines across the sports pages of the country for her prowess on the lanes when she registered her all time record score. The coveted honor is given annually to the most promising young woman bowler in the country by President Crowe.

Kathy's games in her record series were 236, 278 and 248, rolled just 16 days after she had set another national record with a

729 for top honors among junior division girls, ages 13 to 15.

The Star of Tomorrow award is given not just for bowling accomplishments. Its recipients, such as Susie Reichley, Millie Martorella, Judy Soutar and Cheryl Robinson, were all real 'All American Girls' possessing outstanding qualities such as good sportsmanship, scholastic ability and a pleasant personality. Kathy filled every bill.

With Kathy's selection this year, Texas has now been honored five times. Beginning in 1965 with the naming of El Paso's Karen Linton to Susie's selection in 1969, Rosalyn Raab (also of San Antonio at the time) in 1971, and Regina Hillier of Amarillo last year the Star list now is completely dominated by Texas girls.

Kathy's story is the feature article of the current Junior Bowler magazine, and officials at AJBC have advised that her background has also been sent to the National Bowling Council for further publicity for the perky miss.

Sylvia's election to the WIBC Board would culminate many years of dedication to the bowling game. She is, of course, the city secretary and a member of the TWBA Board. Her WIBC credentials list chairmanship of the Credentials Committee and service on the Tellers Committee in 1974 and 1975. She was also the Finance Committee chairman and Scorekeeping Committee chairman when San Antonio hosted the WIBC in 1968. The Director's spot for which she has been nominated by the 1977 Nominating Committee is #13, and local women are hoping that it will be a 'lucky number' for her, and San Antonio.

Regardless of all else during the WIBC convention, San Antonio and Texas will be in the limelight several times during the convention activities.

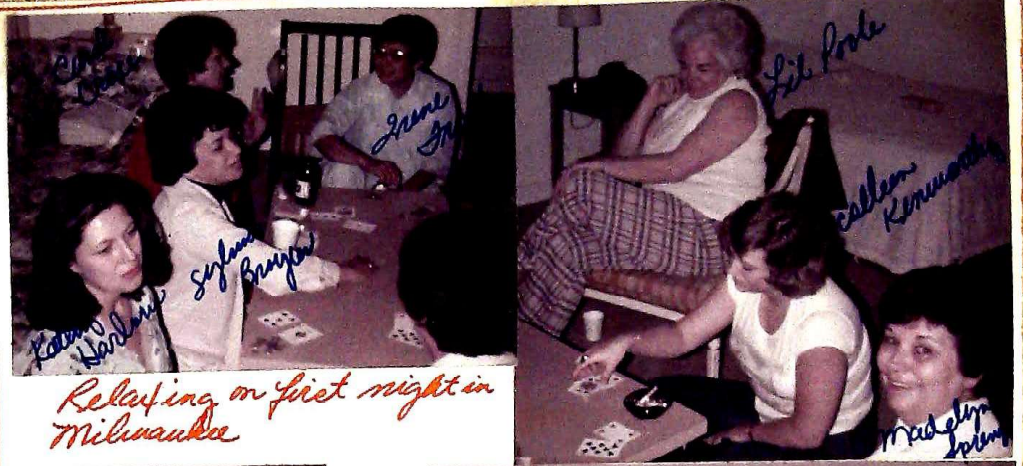

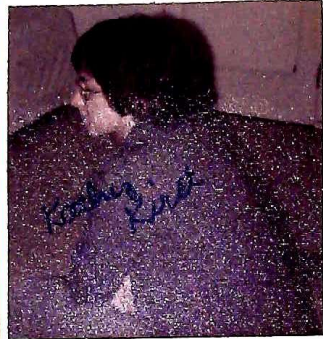

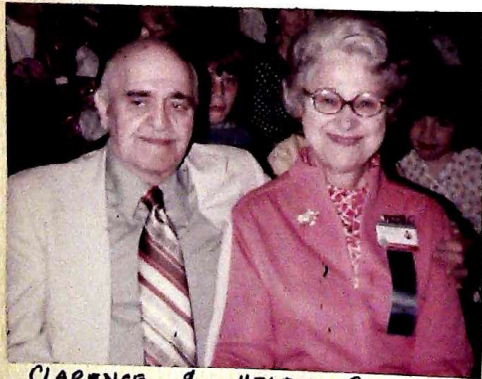

# Bowling Fame Brings Tears

There was a lot of happy news made at Monday's opening session of the 60th annual meeting of the Women's International Bowling Congress. But as the happiness increased, so did the crying at Convention Hall.

It became obvious soon after the gavel sounded that women bowlers best express their happiness with tears of joy.

By the time the record first day gathering of 3,195 delegates was dismissed, the tissue business was booming. The previous first day record was 3,159.

The delegates represented women bowlers from all 50 states and several foreign countries. The farthest local association represented was Guam. Although she was not a delegate, one woman came all the way from The Netherlands to compete in the WIBC Championship Tournament, currently in progress at Red Carpet Celebrity Lanes.

The tears began flowing with the induction of five women into the WIBC Hall of Fame.

LaVerne Carter, perhaps the game's most colorful performer, was honored in the Superior Performance division. For nearly 30 years, Mrs. Carter has been one of the highest scoring players in the country. With numerous WIBC and pro titles, the Las Vegas, Nev., bowling proprietor has a high series of 741.

"I am so happy," Mrs. Carter said upon her induction. Translated, that means "I'm going to cry."

"I said I wasn't going to cry," she said. "You're supposed to cry after you win a tournament. But I'm so happy I can't keep from doing it."

"I used to feel like I was living in a shell behind Don Carter (former husband) and Marion Ladewig (former doubles partner). They were the true champions," Mrs. Carter continued. "Maybe some of them rubbed off on me. It's just a thrill to be in this hall today."

Nina Burns, Pompano Beach, Fla., and Helen Shablis, Brooklyn, Mich., were inducted into the Star of Yesterday division. Mrs. Shablis shared in three championships in the 1963 World Tournament and her 191 average for 10 WIBC tournaments ranks third.

Before moving to Florida, Mrs. Burns was one of the top players in Chicago and was named the area's "most popular bowler" in 1948. Her highest league average was 191.

"What do you say? Oh, golly, I'm going to cry," Mrs. Burns said as she was introduced. "I hope all of you can share this spot as the years go by. Do your best. Always do your best."

"I never dreamed I'd be here," Mrs. Burns said. "I can't talk much because I just can't say much more."

Mrs. Burns is the third member of the famous Logan Square Buick in Chicago team to enter the hall. The others are Tess Small of Wisconsin Rapids and Catherine Fellmeth of Lake Geneva.

Helen Baetz, San Antonio, Tex., and Dorothy Haas, Perth Amboy, N.J., joined the hall in the Meritorious Service category. Both were long time members of the WIBC Board of Directors.

"Wow!" Mrs. Baetz began her acceptance speech. "This is a feeling like nothing else, I'm deeply moved and greatly hon-

ored. Just to be considered with the great ladies in the hall... This is the ultimate for me."

Mrs. Baetz was asked to recall any amusing moments over her 24 years of service to the WIBC. The moment proved more than amusing. It seems her most famous team was sponsored by a funeral home. During one season she bowled in three leagues, all sponsored by undertakers.

"When we bowled in Syracuse my sponsor shipped my ball there in a pine box," she recalled, "and he had it delivered to the lanes in a hearse."

"It's no wonder I never became a superstar bowler," she went on. "I've always howled with a dead ball."

Mrs. Haas, known as "Sarge" after many years as the WIBC sergeant at arms, called Monday the second most important day of her life. "The only thing more important happened 40 years ago when I married my husband Charlie," she said. "I say that because if it wasn't for his loving care and encouragement I wouldn't be up here today."

The honors (and tears) continued. Theresa Kelone, the first vice president from Little Rock, Ark., and Mabel Marrs, fourth vice president from Vancouver, Wash., were made members emeritus after deciding not to seek re-election.

Even one presenter broke into tears. There was a special presentation (silver platter) to one of the oldest delegates in the crowd, Eva Gerleman, 81, was honored for 50 consecutive years as treasurer of the St. Louis, Mo., association. She was recently re-elected to another three-year term and she still carries a 140 average.

There were few surprises in the opening session. However, Flora Mitchell, secretary-treasurer, had some unexpected good news for the delegates.

As of April 22, Mrs. Mitchell said the WIBC had increased its membership by more than 100,000. There are 3,973,827 members, an increase of 4.22% from last year and the number of sanctioned leagues has risen to 128,878.

Mrs. Mitchell also had some bad news. The entry fees for next year's tournament will be increased \$1 per event to \$10 per person per event in Divisions I and II and \$12 in Open Division.

She also announced the basic bond coverage has been increased from \$5,000 to \$7,500 for officers and directors of certified local and state associations and for the officers of sanctioned leagues. The WIBC has been granted a group tax exemption by the Internal Revenue Service for all local associations.

In her president's report, Alberta Crowe revealed that the league dropout rate increased this year and urged a "grass roots" campaign to eliminate the problem.

There were awards and honors for the great and the small. One award went to the Slinger Women's Bowling Association. There are only 48 sanctioned women bowlers in the small Wisconsin town, but it produced six teams (62.5%) in the championship tournament.

That gave the Slinger women the award for most teams entered from a local association in the host city in proportion to membership.

Tuesday's session will deal with legislation. There are 20 proposals to be decided.

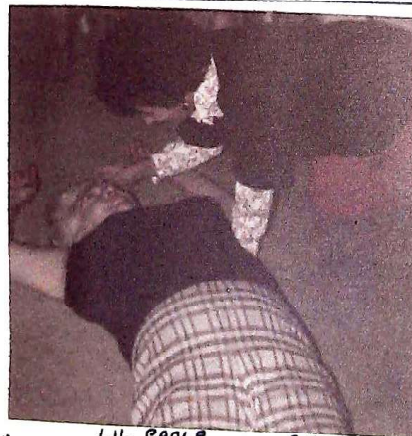

# Bowling keeps body rolling

No one would argue that Sandi Kane is in good physical condition.

But that is the name of Sandi's game — physical fitness. The other is bowling.

Sandi visited the Alamo City Monday to promote Bowling Spectacular '77 and physical fitness.

"I suggest an around physical fitness program daily," said Sandi, who was born in San Antonio. "The combination of daily exercise and a diet helps everyone."

"Bowling is a good physical exercise. The main benefits from bowling are balance and agility. Bowling, tennis, swimming, or whatever, are substitutes to body building, not substitutes for it. You've got to stay on something daily — bowling or whatever it may be."

"I'm also promoting the Spectacular," she continued. "I'm basically promoting the affair through the press and television media. I've been talking about physical fitness and stressing that bowling is for all ages."

## Competition

"Bowling can be a very competitive sport. Some people bowl in two or three leagues a week. Others just go to the lanes to have fun. I'm in it more for fun than to win — and to keep fit. Bowling can help work off some calories. And it's great at teaching eye-to-hand coordination, especially if you're a spot bowler."

Sandi is the National Bowling Council's roving ambassador on bowling and physical fitness. She has been a bowler for 23 years.

The Spectacular '77 is scheduled for May 4-7 at Wonder Bowl.

"The Spectacular is going to attract the best men and women professionals in the business," Sandi said. "Also, the top non-pros and men's and women's college teams will be here."

"Bowling is a year around activity or sport, and a great family activity. And, as compared to other sports, it is inexpensive."

"As far as physical fitness, a person must have a good program to work with," the pretty blonde continued.

"You've got to have self-discipline and determination. It takes a long time to

see the benefits, and a lot of people give up. You've got to give the program a chance to work."

## Eating habits

"When I speak of diets, I'm not speaking of starvation. A lot of people mistakenly relate a diet to starvation. I'm talking about three well-balanced, well-proportionate meals, and eliminating the in-between meals — like potato chips, drinks, etc."

"You must realize that a good physical body will help you live longer, make you feel better, and make you look better," said Sandi, who resides in Atlanta, Ga.

"Anyone can bowl. You know we have some handicapped and deaf leagues across the country, and, in some areas, there are leagues for the blind. It's a great sport for everyone. Bowling and physical fitness go hand in hand."

Here are a few exercises Sandi suggests that will help the bowler improve his game and physique:

**The Kneel-Back:** Good legs are the key to good bowling. Start this exercise by kneeling with legs apart and top of feet flat on the floor. Hold the ball against your chest. Keeping your body rigid, lean slightly backward, then return to the starting position. Repeat — slowly — eight times, each time leaning a little further backward. If you're doing the exercise correctly, you'll feel a good pull first in the thighs, then in the abdomen and seat muscles.

**The Side-to-Side Roll:** This exercise will help keep your wrist, legs and upper arms in shape. Lie on your back with legs apart for balance. Arms straight, hold the ball with both hands high above your face. Slowly move the ball toward the left, count to four, then bring ball back to starting position. Rest for three counts; repeat four times. Follow the same procedure moving the ball to the right. You should feel the stretch through your waist, legs and feet.

**The Press-Back:** Assume the same starting position as for the side-to-side roll, but instead of spitting the ball sideways, lower it slowly toward the floor behind your head. Keep it slightly off the ground for a count of three then raise it again. Rest for three counts; do four times. As soon as your arms are strong enough, use one arm at a time to support the ball. For further variation, practice swinging the ball a quarter-circle to the side (so your arm is perpendicular to your body) before returning it to starting position. In addition to strengthening the arms, this exercise does wonders for chest (or bust) development, as well as firming up flabby underarms.

**The Roll-Back:** Here's an exercise to lighten and strengthen the abdominal muscles. (Try it first) without your bowling ball until you can control your balance. Sit on the floor, knees bent and close to your chest. With arms outstretched (your elbows should almost touch your knees), gently roll backward extending arms and legs over your head. Eventually you should be able to do this with straight legs, too. Start with two roll-backs (with the ball) and gradually work up to eight.

**The Press-Up:** Lie on your back, with knees bent and slightly apart. Hold the ball close to your chest. Then slowly press it upwards, inhaling deeply. Support it on straight arms for a count of three. Lower the ball and exhale completely. Repeat four times to start. This is great for strengthening the shoulders, chest and abdomen.

Bowling's First Lady, Mrs. Alberta E. Crowe, Liverpool, New York, president of both the Women's International Bowling Congress and the National Bowling Council, will return to the Alamo City next week. Mrs. Crowe will be in the city for the staging of the third annual Bowling Spectacular at Wonder Bowl.

Under Mrs. Crowe's leadership WIBC has shown a gain through 30 consecutive seasons. Most localities were introduced to the gracious lady in 1967 as plans progressed to hostess the 1968 WIBC Convention and Tournament. Ironically, the '68 tournament was held at Wonder Bowl, as the 1977 Bowling Spectacular will be.

Millions of people around the world have marveled at Mrs. Crowe's great fortitude in her application to purpose. Mrs. Crowe has, for more than 30 years, attempted to elevate the stature

and membership of WIBC by improving its internal operation and by expanding its external influence.

To the delegates in attendance Mrs. Crowe reported on the new Headquarters building, the test facility, the Bowler's Guide, the audio-visual techniques, and the new program on local workshops and the Leadership Training Seminars II which will be instituted next summer.

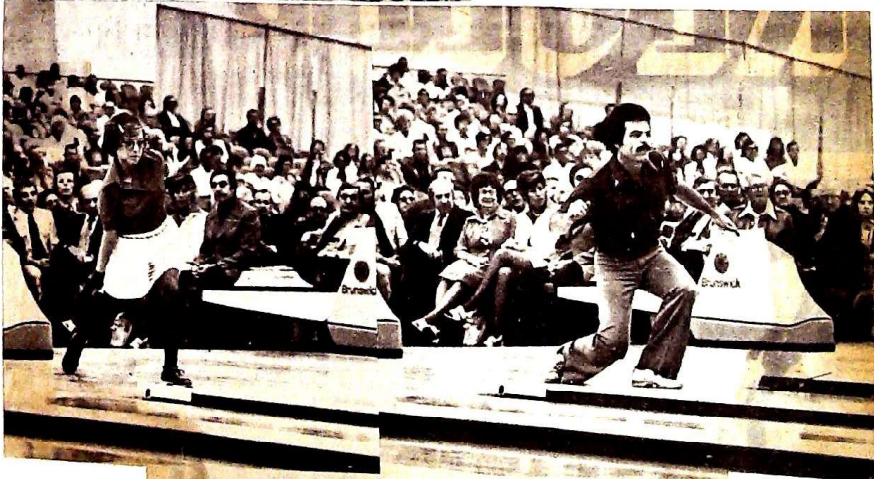
Mrs. Crowe stated that \$633,586 had been donated last season by America's bowlers bringing the total to more than \$9 million since the inception of the program in 1942.

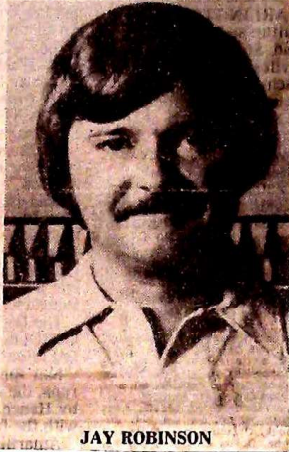

"It will be the luck of the draw and how we bowl, if we hope to be bowling together. I hope we can both make the



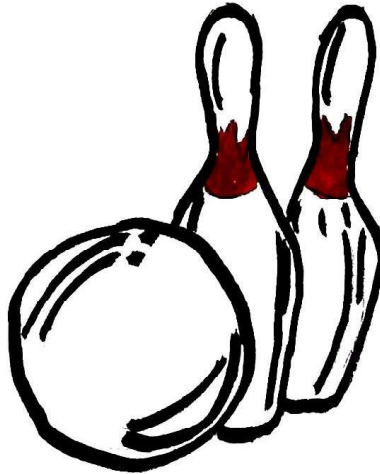

top 10, then we'll go from there.

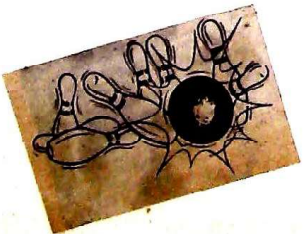

# NBC "Spectacular" Was!!!

National Bowling Council, its president, Mrs. Alberta E. Crowe, Liverpool, N.Y., considered 'the best in bowling' during the 1977 Bowling Spectacular at Wonder Bowl, and for its bowling buffs it was just that.

In sports' most unique tournament, Patty Costello, Scranton, Pa., and Paul Colwell, Tucson, Ariz., teamed together to earn the \$10,000 championship check Saturday beating the team of Pam Rutherford, Oroville, Calif. and Tommy Hudson, Akron, Ohio, 215-203 in the final match.

Carl White of Michigan won the State Champs men's division over Gil Rousseau of Massachusetts. Carl, an assistant manager at a bowling center, had a 175, far below his 204 average at home, to trump the good-looking New Englander by 21 pins.

In the women's state champ field, Cindy Pearl of Kentucky, who never stopped chewing her bubble gum or blowing bubbles

throughout the competition, stared away from the pins each time her opponent, Audrey Walker of Louisiana, rolled her ball. In a closer and more exciting match than the men's division, Cindy topped Audrey 180-175.

West Liberty State College of West Virginia, and Wichita State University Shockers were crowned kings and queens of the Collegiate division. West Liberty nipped their counterparts from California-Davis 168-165 and the Shockers downed defending champions San Jose State 165-157.

In the unique format used by NBC for the Pros, Patty and Paul opened with a double, had two spares, another double, then marked out to take the victory over Pam and Tommy. Going into the 10th frame Paul and Patty had 175 and a strike, while Tommy and Pam had a 143 and a strike. When Paul spared in the last frame the runners-up were closed out, although following a brief pause for photo-taking, Tommy rolled two consecutive strikes, just for the record.

Two of the happiest spectators had to be Roger Zeller and Pepper Martin of Columbia Industries, as both Hudson and Colwell are members of their professional Advisory Staff.

Colwell averaged 225-plus for his 20-game preliminaries (4501), and Patty had 214-plus (4281). Pam and Tommy finished third in the preliminaries and faced Earl Anthony and Pat Costello. Defeating them 213-192, they moved on to outscore defending champions Judy Soutar and Steve Neff 202-195.

Throughout the four days, Spectacular visitors were treated to sensational scoring, climaxed by Mark Roth's perfect game Thursday night in the final game of the pro mixed doubles competition.

Rolling on 13-14 where he had registered a 237 game in the first match, Mark slammed in the 'perfecto' to become the first 300-shooter in the Spectacular's history.

Earlier in the preliminaries Pam Rutherford hung a solid seven in the 10th for a 277 game, Mark Roth finished with a 275 after rolling eight straight strikes, and Steve Neff, who made a 'howdy' call at Oak Hills after being away from the Alamo City for almost a decade, slammed in eight in a row for a 278 game to set a new high-game record in the non-mixed qualifying rounds. Pam's 277 game and leading block of 918 were also new Spectacular records.

Eddie Ressler, Allentown, Pa., 1975 ABC Masters winner, had the packed gallery ooh-ing and aah-ing on Friday night when he smashed in a 289 game in the second game of the position round.

Earl Anthony gave fans exactly what they came to see during the qualifying. He led the men's qualifiers with games of 202-267-259 and 237. After the second block he was second behind Colwell who slammed in a 969 block to Anthony's 901. Ironically in the match-play on Thursday, Pat Costello and Anthony defeated Patty Costello and Colwell twice.

Texas' two entrants in the pro division of the Spectacular were Gary Dickinson and Ann Slaughter, both of Fort Worth. Gary was 12th after the second 4-game blocks with 1628. Ann was seventh in qualifying and paired with Roy Buckley, Columbus, Ohio, in the mixed doubles. Ann's first block was a 812, her second 760 and during match play she logged a 798 block.

NBC's format of having each bowler roll one frame with the anchor man rolling the 10th seems to work fine for the Collegiates, but those in attendance Saturday with whom we talked would prefer watching complete games by the pro partners.

Expensive as the staging of the Spectacular may be, somewhere in the elite neighborhood of \$150,000 to \$200,000, it is truly a fantastic show and a fitting climax to the season for all bowlers. Rumors spread throughout Wonder Bowl early in the week that this could be the Council's swansong,

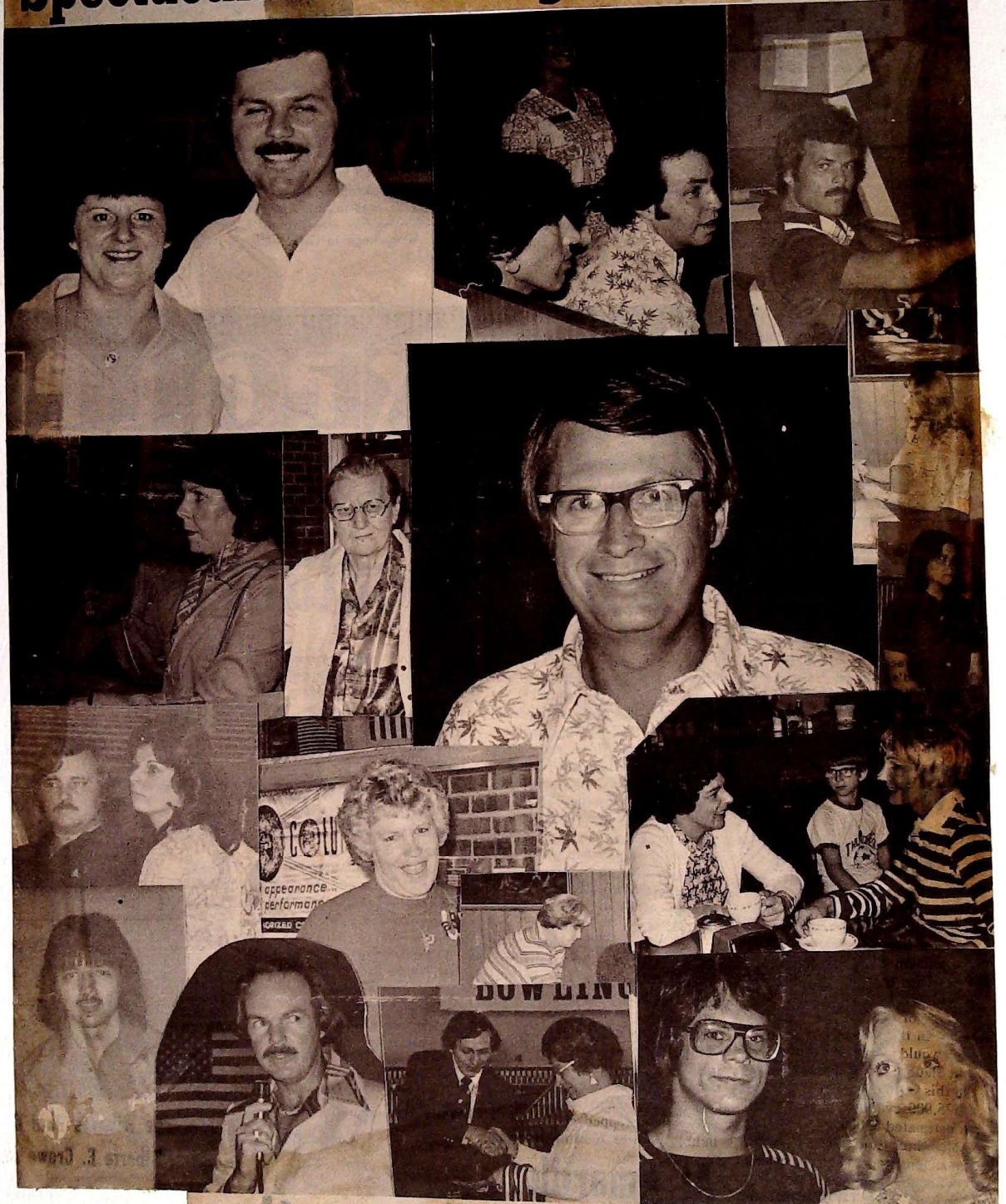
were disheartening. However, Mrs. Crowe's casual remark to friends that "next year when the WIBC staff becomes even more involved" leads us to believe that the 1978 Bowling Spectacular will be even greater.

But, regardless of the outcome, Joe Carmack and his entire Wonder Bowl staff were impressive in the staging of the 1977 event and local bowling fans and the tremendous crowds attending daily made a distinct impression on members of the nation's media. The 1977 Spectacular may just have been the lever needed to get San Antonio into the swim of national professional bowling.

Localites cashing were Myrt DeFily, 11th, with 3076 for \$125, Lori (Braden) Steussey swatted 3073 including an 842 four-game block was 13th, \$100, and Nancy Prather was fifteenth with 3065 for \$75.

After Kathy made up for her first game loss against Laurie Jo in the position round, 238-192, Jane met Debbie Kirst on the adjacent lanes. Jane zapped in a 180 game to easily outdistance Debbie who went to 'split-city' and finished with a 145 game. The win and the bonus points allowed Jane to move into second ahead of Laurie Jo. Debbie won just five of her matches and averaged 181.1.

In order of finish following the top four were Patsy Pendarvis who won five matches and averaged 180.8; Judi Brothers 176.0, five matches; Linda Fox 176.9, four matches; Sher Dunlap, another new name in the LATA Finals, 178.9 winning two matches; Roz Porrini, winner of the April sweeper, 167, three wins and Jackie Jackson who returned to the lanes last month following a two-year absence with an ailing elbow, 168.4, two wins.

Myrt DeFily was alternate, and the Billy Simon Award for high game by a non-casher went to Nancy Huber for her 215 game.

The first running of the LATA under the new format of eight games qualifying and ten games of Finals drew only 27 entries. The response to the marathon-type format may be too heavy for the average woman bowler of our city. Lack of communication from

tournament management and LATA members could also be a factor in the low attendance.

This publication was given and printed a squad time of 2 p.m. for the May tournament. Flyers circulated in small numbers to the membership gave the starting time as 1 p.m. In an executive session prior to the 1 p.m. squad it was voted that all members who arrived at 2 p.m. would be allowed to participate in the tournament. In this editor's opinion, a fair decision in light of the confusion. However, tournament officials were reduced to tears following an individual's angry outburst over the decision.

The reason and thinking of the tournament's management was to give the women more tournament action on a monthly basis. Penalizing members because of an unavoidable error is ridiculous. This publication gives unsolicited support to the executive decision to remedy the communication error, and calls for a good sportsmanship-like attitude from all LATA members. The tournament with a few minor adjustments, such as stricter enforcement of conduct rules and a lesser number of qualifying games, is good for the city's women bowlers. Let's don't send it down the tube.

In closing, I especially wish to commend Sylvia (Broyles) for her ever-present assistance and encouragement. I ask each of you to afford Madelyn (Spreng) the wholehearted support you have provided me during my tenure as President. To the members of S.A.W.B.A., I wish you all the best!"

In addition to her duties as president of the women's group Mrs. Stephenson is also president of the San Antonio Bowling Council, a position she will retain until her term expires. Mrs. Stephenson has served the ladies of SAWBA for more than ten years on the Board and became extremely active on the state and national women's scene, as well as in the American Junior Bowling Congress field.

# Ladies WATA-175 Forming

The rules and by-laws of a new monthly tournament association are being distributed to ladies with averages under 175. The Rules and By-Laws which would be adopted at the organizational meeting call for the new association to be called the Women's Amateur Tournament Affiliation, (WATA-175).

Members of the non-profit organization must be WIBC members with current yearbook averages of 175 and under. They may reside within a 50 mile radius of the city.

Officers who are to be elected at the organizational meeting will be a President and five directors

as well as a tournament director who will be compensated at the rate of \$7.00 per entry plus 10% of any subsidies acquired for any and all tournaments.

Membership fee will be \$12 per year, payable in one lump sum or \$3 for the first four tournaments. The membership fee funds will be used for the prize list for the annual Tournament which will also carry a \$25.00 entry.

The amount paid by each bowler per tournament, excluding membership payments, will be \$17 of which \$2 will go to the tournament director. Five dollars is bowling fee and \$10 will be placed in the prize fund. Mem-

bers reaching the Finals will defray the lineage costs themselves. All prize money will be returned 100% with a minimum of one prize for every five entries.

The Qualifying Rounds will consist of five games with total pins determining the player's position in the standings. Bowlers may attempt to qualify only once and the top ten advance to the Finals.

Finals will be match play with all qualifying scores dropped. Ten games of round-robin finals are called for with 30 bonus points awarded for each win, and fifteen pins to each bowler for a tie game.

Strict sportsmanship rules will be in effect with fines levied by the tournament director or board for infractions.

The WATA for 175 and under ladies offers an intermediate form of competition for those women with the potential ability for higher levels of competition.

It's time for the second annual San Antonio Bowling Association-San Antonio Women's Bowling Association Mixed Tournament! Mixed Teams will consist of 3 men and 2 women or 3 women and 2 men, and doubles are mixed competition. In team event, bowlers may enter with as many teams as they wish, however, not more than three members of a team entered may bowl together and cash on another team. A bowler may bowl as many doubles as they wish, cash only once with the same partner. Three-fourth handicap will be

figured from 400 in doubles and 1000 in team events. Handicap based on three game totals.

To bowl in the City Mixed Tournament, a bowler must be a current member of SABA, SAWBA or Boerne Women's Bowling Assn., using the highest league average as of May 31, 1977. If no 21 game average as of May 31 the highest 1975-76 Yearbook average will be used. If the bowler has neither, entering average will be 200.

Entry blanks will be available at all lanes giving full details. Team squads will be July 16, 23, 30 at 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. Doubles will be rolled on Sundays July 17, 24, and 30 at 10, 12, 2 and 4 p.m.

# BVL \$\$\$ Return to VA Hospital

America's bowlers have made donations in excess of a million dollars to the BVL Fund (Bowler's Victory Legion) and hospitalized veterans nationwide.

The funds, collected by volunteer bowlers, are distributed to the nation's 160 Veterans Administration Hospitals for the purchase of much needed recreation materials and equipment.

Mrs. Albert E. Crowe, president of the National Bowling Congress, which administers the Fund, joined local bowling officials in making a presentation of a \$1500 check to Jose Coronado, Director of the Audie Murphy VA Hospital, during her recent visit to preside over the Council's 1977 Bowling Spectacular. The check was the second received for use by the VA Hospital in as many months. The first, received in March, was presented by SAWBA Vice President, Mrs. Madelyn Spreng, and SABA president-elect, Arthur Johnson.

Mrs. Crowe attributed the dramatic increase in funds to the hard work of local men's and women's bowling associations. "These kindhearted individuals banded together and did a tremendous job. It is their joint efforts that makes possible the work of BVL with our VA hospital patients."

Following the presentation, Mrs. Crowe joined SABA and SAWBA officers in a tour of the Audie Murphy Room at the hospital. All the many medals, citations, equipment, and correspondence of the country's most decorated soldier are displayed just off the lobby of the facility. Dur-

ing her visit Mrs. Crowe viewed the sound/film presentation citing Murphy's lifelong accomplishments.

Talking with Robert Williams, Director of Volunteer Services, Mrs. Crowe learned that many patients of the Audie Murphy Hospital are afforded an opportunity to bowl on the local lanes as part of their rehabilitation program. A portion of the funds allocated from the Hospital Recreation Fund are used to transport the patients and to cover their bowling fees. It is hoped that eventually Audie Murphy will have its own bowling lanes for patient's use as is done in several other cities in Texas and throughout the country.

San Antonio has an annual BVL Tournament, sponsored jointly by SABA and SAWBA, and the San Antonio "600" Club's annual tournament carries an additional \$1.00 fee designated as a donation to the National BVL Fund.

At the recently completed Texas Women's Bowling Association state convention all satellite clubs of the association made donations to the BVL fund as well.

The BVL Fund, formed in 1942, is the official bowling charity and the only one of its kind in providing so many of the necessary "extras" to hospitalized veterans. BVL provides a variety of services to VA Hospitals including the purchase of recreation equipment, reading materials and television sets. Through the work of Alamo City bowlers, Audie Murphy Hospital received five color televisions last year, plus a generous cash donation.

# June Muskopf TWBA Singles Champ

What began at 6:30 p.m. March 25 is now history. The 40th annual Texas Women's Bowling Association Championship Tournament rolling at Amarillo and Western Bowls at Amarillo ended Sunday night but not before three state records toppled and several unusual happenings took place for the 1688 five-women teams.

San Antonio had one first place winner. June Muskopf, forced to bowl with a neck collar because of injuries suffered in an auto accident, took the Class A Singles title with a 607 score. City Secretary Sylvia Broyles, serving as the Amarillo Tournament Office Manager, relayed the good news to Mrs. Muskopf just after midnight Sunday after all Class A scores had been verified. The happy winner was advised that her Champion's Trophy will be awarded October 1 in Dallas at

the TWBA Awards Party for Tournament Champions.

A new State Champion was crowned and for the second consecutive year the spotlight was on Killeen, Texas. Mrs. Nell Jordan, 45-year old mother of two, slammed in a 1797 All Events total in the Open Division.

To earn her State Championship, Mrs. Jordan registered a 502 in her Team event, 651 in her Doubles to tie the 1977 tournament high series, and a 644 in Open Singles.

The first State record to topple was the Novice Singles which fell on April 17 when Barbara Berry, Borger, rolled in a 546. The previous record was set in 1975 by Carol Johnson, Houston, a 536.

On Saturday the Class C Doubles record fell robbing Darlene Schneider and Pat Sheehy of their

first place lead when Mary Scheele and Judy Gano, Garland, teamed up to pop in a 1159. Their fantastic performance topped the old record by 42 pins, a score which stood since 1965. On Sunday Darlene and Pat were pushed one spot further down when Cheryl Unger and Eulalia Treesch Alvin, slammed in a 1040 in the division standings.

The final state record was put together by Connie Villarreal, McAllen when she combined her team, doubles and singles series during the final weekend of play for a 1537. Mrs. Villarreal, weighing just under 100 lbs. and rolling a 10 lb. ball had novice games of 150, 244 and 159 in team; 150, 158 and 157 in Doubles; and 180, 163 and 176 in Singles. Her entering average was 111.

The only other local women to stay in the top three on the TWBA board were Debbie Hinton who had 1554 in Class D All Events and Betty Biediger who tied Vivian Berry, Tyler, for second in Novice All Events with 1393.
