high game, 236, and Jo Ann Ballard, December winner, for series, 788. Although she didn't make the cut after the semi-finals, Fay Tidrick registered the

tournament's high game, a 275. Jerry Johnson, president of LATA, stated that 66 ladies have now joined the monthly tournament association. All tourna-



Kathy Kirst Named 1977 Alberta Crowe Star of Tomorrow

"This is Kathy" — "Yes, ma'am" — (pause) "Oh my gosh, I can't believe it"—those were the first words out of the mouth of Kathy Kirst when she received the telephone call from Mrs. Kay Heggie, president of the National Women Bowling Writers informing her she had been named to receive the 1977 Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow Award.

For a young bowler known for her concentration on the lanes, Kathy completely lost her composure as she listened, and at one point dropped the phone from her ear only to replace it still repeating "I can't believe it."


Kathy may never be able to fully recall that conversation, but she realizes what it means.

The Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow award is given by Mrs. Crowe, president of the Women's International Bowling Congress, to a young lady whose bowling ability, sportsmanshiplike qualities, pleasant personality and scholastic accomplishments set her apart from her peers.

There is no monetary value, but this extra special honor is given annually to the most promising young woman bowler in the United States, and the selection for the highly coveted honor is given to bring recognition and inspiration to the upcoming young women bowlers of the country.

Kathy's accomplishments on the lanes are familiar to most San Antonians. Officially she holds the record for the highest series ever bowled by a girl in the American Junior Bowling Congress in its 29 year history. Kathy performed that feat at age 15.

Based on a long string of junior bowling accomplishments, Kathy's name was submitted to the AJBC office for the award upon recommendation of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association's board of directors.



Mrs. Heggie advised Kathy that Mrs. Crowe normally presents the Star of Tomorrow Award at the annual WIBC Convention, however, Mrs. Crowe would be happy to make the presentation at the NBC Bowling

Spectacular at Wonder Bowl, May 4-7, before her friends and family. Without a moment's hesitation Kathy opted for the latter.

"It's like a dream coming true. I was so happy when Mom came home and told me the Women's Board voted to send my name in, but I never really expected to get it. I've read a lot about Mrs. Crowe's award and the ladies who have received it before, and all the women I know who worked on the WIBC when it, was here in 1968 have talked about it. Mrs. Crowe's selection of me is really great."

"I'm still so happy about that telephone call," she said Tuesday, "I still can't believe it, but I know that this makes five times that Texas girls have won it and I am a native you know, and it is good for all the women bowlers of Texas."

"I want to write to Mrs. Crowe and tell her how happy I am, and how much I appreciate her coming to the Spectacular to present the award. I just hope she doesn't find out how poorly I bowled in the city tournament," she laughed.

Kathy now joins the ranks of some of the nation's most prolific bowlers. The list of past winners of the Star of Tomorrow Award are





A capacity crowd was on hand to open the 40th annual championship tournament of the Texas Women's Bowling Association at Amarillo Bowl Friday night (March 25). Bowling officialdom from all segments of the industry joined TWBA officials and ladies of the Amarillo WBA in colorful ceremonies in the Panhandle city.

Amarillo Mayor John Drummond welcomed guests and joined TWBA president Mrs. Dorothy Cornelison, Houston, and secretary Miss Lil Poole, Hurst, in cutting the ceremonial ribbon to officially open the 10weekend event for the women bowlers of Texas. Miss Poole is also Tournament Director for the event.

The 1977 Championship Tournament drew 1688 five-woman teams from across the state who will be vying for more than

Mrs. Pat Lauder, president of the Amarillo WBA, forged the past with the present when she asked an Amarillo pioneer, Mrs. Ruby Wagner to join Miss Regina Hillier, also of Amarillo, in rolling the opening balls. Mrs. Helen Baetz is one of five women to be inducted into the WIBC Hall of Fame this year.

Seventeen year old Kathy Kirst, who rolled the highest series by a girl in the 29 year history of AJBC, will be honored by WIBC and the National Women Bowling Writers when WIBC president, Mrs. Albert E. Crowe, presents her the Star of Tothorrow award for 1977 during the Writer's Meeting. When election time rolls around at the Convention, the 1977 Nominating Committee has proposed the name of SAWBA City Secretary, Mrs. Sylvia Broyles, for the WIBC Board of Directors.

Mrs. Baetz joins another illustrious San Antonio lady in the Hall of Fame. Billy Simon, a legend in her own time, was enshrined in 1962, and will be in Milwaukee during convention time to help welcome Mrs. Baetz into the Hall.

Mrs. Baetz became involved in bowling after her Cl. B team won the city tournament in 1943. From league involvement came local association leadership roles where she has served as secretary, director and vice president. In 1944 she was elected secretary of TWBA, a position she held for 21 continuous years.

1952 was the beginning of her 24 years of service to WIBC on the national board where she served as 5th and 3rd vice presidents prior to her retirement last year. Mrs. Bactz was named a WIBC member emeritus at the time of her retirement.

Our Helen has spread her special brand of sunshine through out the country in all phases of the bowling game.

For these services, plus untold others, the nearly 4 million members of WIBC will bestow their highest honor, Hall of Fame membership.

Kathy's 'plum' will be given Sunday at the Writer's brunch. Kathy made headlines across the sports pages of the country for her prowess on the lanes when she registered her all time record score. The coveted honor is given annually to the most promising young woman bowler in the country by President Crowe.

Kathy's games in her record series were 236, 278 and 248, rolled just 16 days after she had set another national record with a 729 for top honors among junior division girls, ages 13 to 15.

The Star of Tomorrow award is given not just for bowling accomplishments. Its recipients, such as Susie Reichley, Millie Martorella, Judy Soutar and Cheryl Robinson, were all real 'All American Girls' possessing outstanding qualities such as good sportsmanship, scholastic ability and a pleasant personality. Kathy filled every hill.

With Kathy's selection this year, Texas has now been fronored five times. Beginning in 1965 with the naming of El Paso's Karen Linton to Susie's selection in 1969, Rosalyn Raab (also of San Antonio at the time) in 1971, and Regina Hillier of Amarillo last year the Star list now is completely dominated by Texas girls.

Kathy's story is the feature article of the current Junior Bowler magazine, and officials at AJBC have advised that her background has also been sent to the National Bowling Council for further publicity for the perky miss.

Sylvia's election to the WIBC Board would culminate many years of dedication to the bowling game. She is, of course, the city secretary and a member of the TWBA Board. Her WIBC credentials list chairmanship of the Credentials Committee and service on the Tellers Committee in 1974 and 1975. She was also the Finance Committee chairman and Scorekeeping Committee chairman when San Antonio hosted the WIBC in 1968. The Director's spot for which she has been nominated by the 1977 Nominating Committee is #13, and local women are hoping that it will be a 'lucky number' for her, and San Antonio.



There was a lot of happy news made at Monday's opening session of the 60th annual meeting of the Women's International Bowling Congress. But as the happiness increased, so did the crying at Convention Hall.

It became obvious soon after the gavel sounded that women towlers best express their happiness with tears of joy.

By the time the record first day gathering of 3,195 delegates was dismissed, the tissue business was booming. The previous first day record was 3,159.

The delegates represented women bowlers from all 50 the delegates represented women towners from an states and several foreign countries. The farthest local association represented was Guam. Although she was not a delegate, one woman came all the way from The Netherlands to compete in the WIBC Championship Tournament, currently in progress at Red Carpet Celebrity Lanes.

The tears began flowing with the induction of five women into the WIBC Hall of Fame.

LaVerne Carter, perhaps the game's most colorful performer, was honored in the Superior Performance division. For nearly 30 years, Mrs. Carter has been one of the highest scoring players in the country, With numerous WIBC and pro ti-tles, the Las Vegas, Nev., bowling proprietor has a high series of 741.

"I am so happy," Mrs. Carter said upon her induction. Translated, that means "I'm going to cry."

"I said I wasn't going to cry," she said. "You're supposed to cry after you win a tournament. But I'm so happy I can't keep

"I used to feel like I was living in a shell behind Don Carter (former husband) and Marion Ladewig (former doubles part-ner). They were the true champions," Mrs. Carter continued. "Maybe some of them rubbed off on me. It's just a thrill to be in this hall today."

Nina Burns, Pompano Beach, Fla., and Helen Shablis, Brooklyn, Mich., were inducted into the Star of Yesterday di-vision. Mrs. Shablis shared in three championships in the 1963 World Tournament and her 191 average for 10 WIBC tournaments ranks third.

Before moving to Florida, Mrs. Burns was one of the top players in Chicago and was named the area's "most popular bowler" in 1948. Her highest league average was 191.

"What do you say? Oh, golly, I'm going to cry," Mrs. Burns said as she was introduced. "I hope all of you can share this spot as the years go by. Do your best. Always do your best.

"I never dreamed I'd be here," Mrs. Burns said. "I can't talk much because I just can't say much more."



WATA-175 Forming

The rules and hy-laws of a new monthly tournament association are being distributed to ladies with averages under 175. The Rules and By-Laws which would he adopted at the organizational meeting call for the new association to be called the Women's Amateur Tournament Affiliation, (WATA-175).

Members of the non-profit organization must be WIBC members with current yearbook averages of 175 and under. They may eside within a 50 mile radius of

Officers who are to be elected at the organizational meeting will e a President and five directors

as well as a tournament director who will be compensated at the rate of \$2.00 per entry plus 10% of any subsidies acquired for any and all tournaments.

Membership fee will be \$12 per year, payable in one lump sum or \$3 for the first four tournaments. The membership fee funds will be used for the prize list for the annual Tournament which will also carry a \$25.00 entry.

The amount paid by each bowler per tournament, excluding membership payments, will be \$17 of which \$2 will go to the tournament director. Five dollars is bowling fee and \$10 will be placed in the prize fund. Members reaching the Finals will defray the lineage costs themselves. All prize money will be returned 100% with a minimum of one prize for every five entries.

The Qualifying Rounds will consist of five games with total pins determining the player's position in the standings. Bowlers may attempt to qualify only once and the top ten advance to the Finals.

Finals will be match play with all qualifying scores dropped. Ten games of round-robin finals are called for with 30 bonus points awarded for each win, and fifteen pins to each bowler for a tie

Strict sportsmanship rules will be in effect with fines levied by the tournament director or board for infractions.

The WATA for 175 and under ladies offers an intermediate form of competition for those women with the potential ability for higher levels of competition.

Until such time as the officers are elected and Rules and By-Laws adopted, information re-garding the WATA-175 may be obtained by calling the Kegler office 828-5745, or Southside Lanes, 927-3701.

SABA/SAWBA Mixed Meet Near

San Autonio Bowling Associations are notonio Bowling Association Mixed Tournament! The event initiated last year at Billy Mitchell lanes was virtually a dream come true for the two associations.' After much discussion and planning the first venture was highly successful.

Several alterations have been made this year. The 1977 version will be divided into two divisions

— Classic and Regular. Sanctioned by both WIBC and ABC the tournament will be staged at All Star Lanes on July 16-17, July 23-24 and July 30-31.

In the Classic Division averages will be 825 and over in Team event and 330 and over in Doubles. In the Regular Division averages for teams are 824 and under, and in Doubles 329 and under.

Entry fee is \$7 per person per event (bowling fee \$2.40, expense \$1.30, prize fee \$3.30). Deadline for entries is midnight June 30, and entries are to be mailed to the SAWBA office at P.O. Box 16427 (78216). Prize money remains in its respective class and the prize fee is returned 100%.

Mixed Teams will consist of 3 men and 2 women or 3 women and 2 men, and doubles are mixed competition. In team event, bowlers may enter with as many teams as they wish, however, not more than three members of a team entered may bowl togethet and cash on another team. A bowler may bowl as many doubles as they wish, cash only once with the same partner. Three-fourth handicap will be

figured from 400 in doubles and 1000 in team events. Handicap based on three game totals.

To bowl in the City Mixed Tournament, a bowler must be a current member of SABA. SAWBA or Boerne Women's Bowling Assn., using the highest league average as of May 31, 1977. If no 21 game average as of May 31 the highest 1975-76 Yearbook average will be used. If the bowler has neither, entering average will be 200.

Entry blanks will be available at all lanes giving full details. Team squads will be July 16, 23, 30 at 10 a.m., 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. Doubles will be rolled on Sundays July 17, 24, and 30 at 10, 12, 2 and 4 p.m.

BVL \$\$\$ Return to VA Hospital

America's bowlers have made donations in excess of a million dollars to the BVL Fund (Bowler's Victory Legion) and hospitalized veterans nationwide.

The funds, collected by volunteer bowlers, are distributed to the nation's 160 Veterans Administration Hospitals for the purchase of much needed recreation materials and equipment.

Mrs. Albert E. Crowe, president of the National Bowling Congress, which administers the Fund, joined local bowling officials in making a presentation of a \$1500 check to Jose Coronado, Director of the Audie Murphy VA Hospital, during her recent visit to preside over the Council's 1977 Bowling Spectacular. The check was the second received for use by the VA Hospital in as many months. The first, received in Marchi, was presented by SAWBA Vice President, Mrs. Madelyn Spreng, and SABA president elect, Arthur Johnson.

Mfs. Crowe attributed the dramatic increase in funds to the hard work of local men's and women's bowling associations. "These kindhearted individuals banded together and did a tremendous job. It is their joint efforts that makes possible the work of BVL with our VA hospital patients."

Following the presentation, Mrs. Crowe joined SABA and SAWBA officers in a tour of the Audie Murphy Room at the hospital. All the many medals, citations, equipment, and correspondence of the country's most decorated soldier are displayed just off the lobby of the facility. Dur-

ing her visit Mrs. Crowe viewed the sound/film presentation citing Murphy's lifelong accomplishments.

Talking with Robert Williams, Director of Volunteer Services, Mrs. Crowe learned that many patients of the Audie Murphy Hospital are afforded an opportunity to bowl on the local lanes as part of their rehabilitation program. A portion of the funds allocated from the Hospital Recreation Fund are used to transport the patients and to cover their bowling fees. It is hoped that eventually Audie Murphy will have its own bowling lanes for patient's use as is done in several other cities in Texas and throughout the country.

San Antonio has an annual BVL Tournament, sponsored jointly by SABA and SAWBA, and the San Antonio "600" Club's annual tournament carries an additional \$1.00 fee designated as a donation to the National BVL Fund.

At the recently completed Texas Women's Bowling Association state convention all satellite clubs of the association made donations to the BVL fund as well.

The BVL Fund, formed in 1942, is the official bowling charity and the only one of its kind in providing so many of the necessary "extras" to hospitalized veterans. BVL provides a variety of services to VA Hospitals including the purchase of recreation equipment, reading materials and television sets. Through the work of Alamo City bowlers, Audie Murphy Hospital received five color televisions last year, plus a generous cash donation.

What began at 6:30 March 25 is now history. The 40th annual Texas Women's Bowling Association Championship Tournament rolling at Amarillo and Western Bowls at Amarillo ended Sunday night but not before three state records toppled and several unusual happenings took place for the 1688 five-women teams.

San Antonio had one first place winner. June Muskopf, forced to bowl with a neck collar because of injuries suffered in an auto accident, took the Class A Singles title with a 607 score. City Secretary Sylvia Broyles, serving as the Amarillo Tournament Office Manager, relayed the good news to Mrs. Muskopf just after midnight Sunday after all Class A scores had been verified. The happy winner was advised that her Champion's Trophy will be awarded October 1 in Dallas at

the TWBA Awards Party for Tournament Champions.

A new State Champion was crowned and for the second consecutive year the spotlight was on Killeen, Texas. Mrs. Nell Jordan, 45-year old mother of two, slammed in a 1797 All Events total in the Open Division.

To earn her State Championship, Mrs. Jordan registered a 502 in her Team event, 651 in her Doubles to tie the 1977 tournament high series, and a 644 in Open Singles.

The first State record to topple was the Novice Singles which fell on April 17 when Barbara Berry, Borger, rolled in a 546. The previous record was set in 1975 by Carol Johnson, Houston, a 536.

On Saturday the Class C Dou-bles record fell robbing Darlene Schneider and Pat Sheehy of their

lead when Mary Scheele and Judy Gano, Garland, teamed up to pop in a 1159. Their fantastic performance topped the old record by 42 pins, a score which stood since 1965. The final state record was put together by Connie Villarreal, McAllen when she combined her team, doubles and singles series during the final weekend of play for a 1537. Mrs. Villarreal, weighing just under 100 lbs. and rolling a 10 lb. ball had novice games of 150, 244 and 159 in team; 150, 158 and 157 in Doubles; and 180, 163 and 176 in Singles. Her entering average was 111.

The only other local women to stay in the top three on the TWBA board were Debbie Hinton who had 1554 in Class D All Events and Betty Biediger who tied Vivian Berry, Tyler, for second in Novice All Events with 1393.
