Roast sirloin of beef with cheesecake is on the menu for the evening, but you can't wait much longer to order tickets -- deadline is Sunday, January 31, or until reservations reach 200.

600 Club members may enter only once using their highest yearbook average and "friends" also use highest yearbook averages.

Entry fee for the event is \$6.50 with one dollar of each entry earmarked for the Billy Simon Junior Scholarship Fund, administered by the San Antonio Bowling Council.

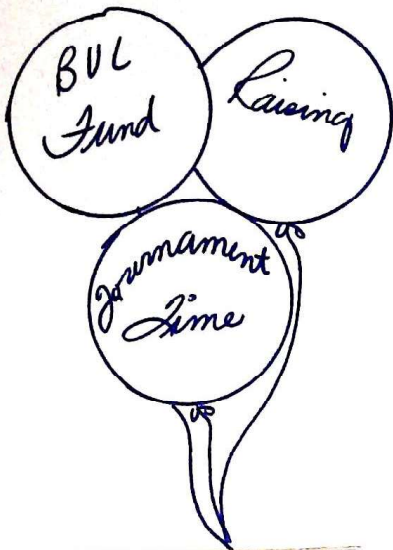

## BVL Love Affair Set For Feb. 8 - 21

Our annual love affair with the Veterans of previous wars and conflicts is about to commence!

THE BVL Fund drive for both men and women is set for February 8 through 21 at ALL bowling centers -- and for ALL leagues!

Handicap for the ladies is 80% from 200 and for the men, it's 75% of 200. The event is sponsored by both the Men's and Women's Associations and it's your way of saying "We Do Care" to those men and women who are confined in our Veterans Administration hospitals.

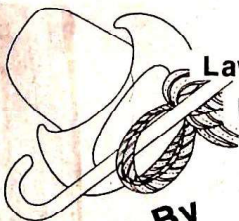

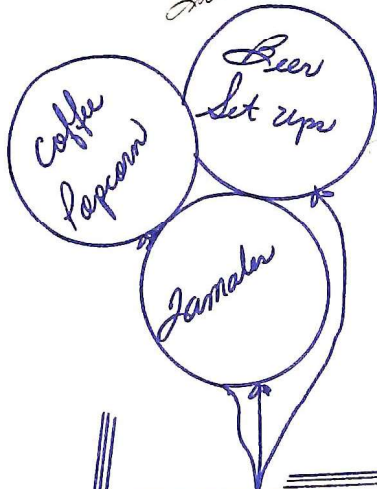

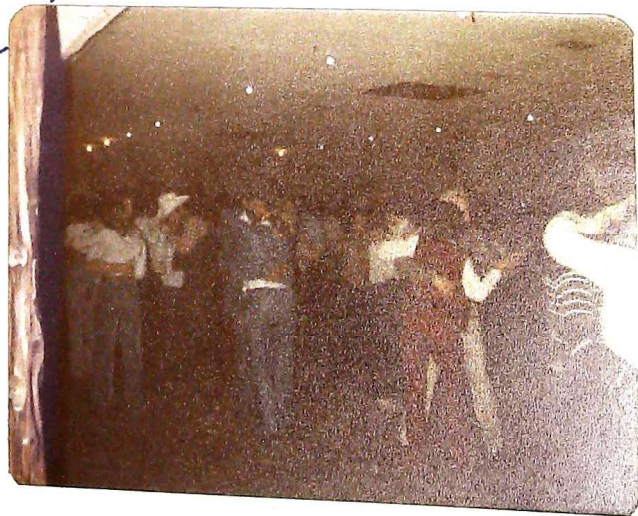

Harold Stone will be assuming increased administrative duties in the Stone organization which operates Bowlerama, All Star and Oak Hills lanes.

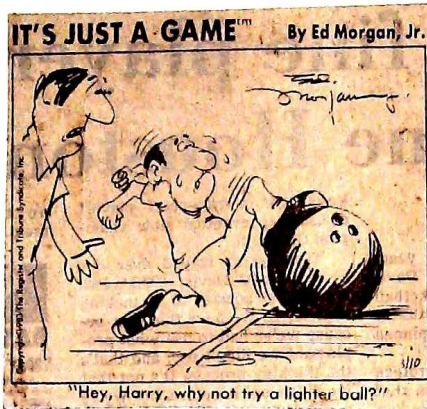
In accepting his new position, Mal invites all his friends to visit the center pledging increased tournament activity, more of everything good for the bowlers and increased variety at the center's new snack bar.

Fifty-two four-member teams of the peppy, unpredictable senior-age (55 and over) bowlers have entered the event in addition to 97 singles, 194 doubles and 185 optional all events entrants!

The Senior League Mixed is sponsored by the San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn. with an entry fee of just \$4.50 plus \$1 for all events.

Teams are handicapped from the following figures at 800: Team 800; Doubles 400; Singles 200. Prize money is to be returned at a 1-10 ratio.

Returning to defend their team championship is the Old Timers team from Hermann Sons, with one new addition. The team posted a 2069 scratch last year with 355 pins handicap. Original team members are Erna Trenkelbach, Phyllis Walters and big Otto Neitzke. Also set to defend his title is 1981 Men's Singles champion, Douglas Anderson of Oak Hills senior league activity who

slammed in games of 223, 285 and 190 to capture his title. He was rolling with a 167 average.

Neither all all events champions from the 1981 tourney is expected to participate this year.

Senior Mixed chairman Anne Broyles of SAWBA asked for volunteers to help with scoring for the seniors. Team squads are at 1 p.m. on Friday, and 11 a.m. on Saturday. Doubles and singles squads are at 2 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday, and all help will be greatly appreciated.

She died of cancer just a few months after her name was considered for Hall honors. A past SAWBA and TWBA president Estha casued more innovations in the structure of TWBA than almost any president before or since.

Past TSBA and SABA secretary, Gus Pfeiffer did the honors for Lois Scott, who led the SAWBA during the time San Antonio was hostess to WIBC bowlers in 1968. Lois' list of civic accomplishments is legion and she is the first and only woman vice president of the Frost National Bank.

Sylvia, obviously enjoying her duty, inducted Pepper Martin, a long time friend, and vice president of sales for Columbia Industries. A large contingent of Columbia Industries folks were in attendance plus Woman Bowler of the Year Donna Adamek and Hall of Famer Don Johnson, both affiliated with the firm.

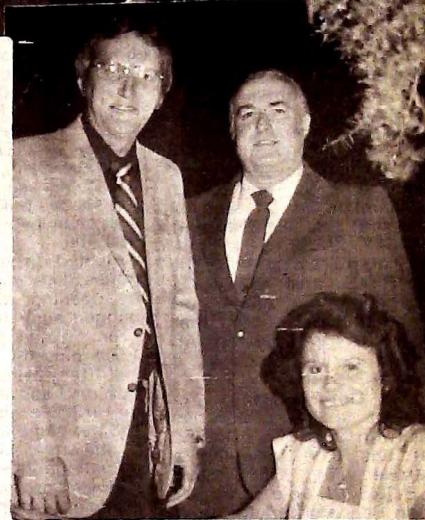

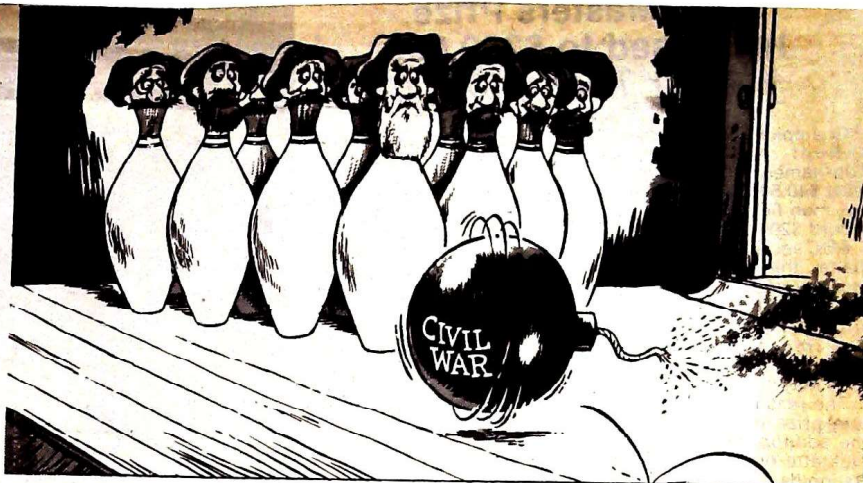

## Columbia 300 Launches New High Performance ORANGE DOT !!

It took 16 months of research and development, including field-testing by some 40 pros and league bowlers across the country, before Columbia 300 said "This is it", and locked in the formula to produce the ball that now bears the name "Orange Dot."

The deciding factor was response to a final prototype by bowlers who said "You got it", "Don't change a thing", "This is it", and unanimously, "It really hooks".

When asked why a new ball designed to hook more

was considered Pepper Martin, Senior Vice President, Columbia 300 sales, said, "It began to be apparent a few years ago that many of today's lanes were hard, heavily oiled, and so slick that some balls that should be breaking more, just were not. We posed this problem to our Research and Development people, who began experimenting with modified weight positioning in shell formulation, without destroying Columbia's criteria of excellence found in the White Dot and Yellow

Dot."

As one pro said, "This new ball really hooks. It gives me all the breaks I'll ever need". And that statement is becoming a slogan for the Orange Dot.

Unlike some other new balls, the Orange Dot is a medium hard, very durable ball that is resistant to chipping and cracking.

Additional weight has been positioned in the outer shell to produce more dynamic impact. There is less deflection and more pinfall. Pepper added that the Orange Dot formula

keeps the pins low on impact to give you more pinfall.

Throughout 1981, Columbia research included input from members of their advisory staff, as well as other professional bowlers. An original green color shifted to cinnamon and finally the preferred brown-tone with enlarged Orange Dot.

When asked if they thought the Orange Dot would replace Columbia's tournament-winning prestige Yellow Dot, opinions varied from "no way" to "maybe". All felt the Orange

Dot would probably be an addition to the high performance Yellow Dot, for those lanes where you have trouble getting that consistent hook.

It will be available only in 15 and 16 pounds, and only at lanes and pro shops. Literature, pricing and availability information is being processed now.

The unique formula developed to produce this new ball necessitated creating new equipment designs, massive installation, and even some new patents.

Entry blanks will be distributed this week and should a secretary no receive his or her entry, they may call Cantu or the SAWBA office.

### New Senior Champs Named

Is 22 degree temperature too cold to stage a Senior Mixed Tournament. No Way! The seniors rolled right along on schedule with very few substitutes and the city now has some new champions to applaud.

Capturing the 1982 team was Bauman's Keglers of sub Frank Clifton, Mayselle Bauman, Joseph "Carl" Anderson and Lenora Rose with 2559.

The team combined for games of 708, 712, and 791 for a scratch 2211 with 348 pins handicap to earn the first place prize money of \$110.

They were 86 pins over the second place team of the

The 1982 champions bowl together in the Oak Hills senior league and together they compete in nine leagues...Frank 3, Carl 1, Mayselle 2 and Lenora, 3.

Anderson will be in line for an ABC award for going 125 pins over his average series wise.

New doubles champions are 71 year old William Hohner who rolls with a 166 average, and Charles DeLa Garza who rolls with a 161 average. They popped in games of 337, 407 and 341 for a scratch 1085, receiving 175 pins handicap for a total 1260 score.

Although they bowl in the same league, they are not team mates in their Palace Senior league. Peppy William carded the tourna-

ment high game during his singles, a 248. To it he added 175 and 166 for a nifty 589. He was runner-up during the 1981 senior tournament in men's singles. Charles celebrated his 60th birthday yesterday, and it was the first time he has cashed in the Senior tournament.

Their winning total was just pins ahead of runners-up Joan and Clem Clement who posted their score on the opening squad Saturday in the 22 degree temperatures outside.

Ever smiling Edna Rose Reed, long one of the top senior competitors gained the Women's Singles title with games of 162, 163 and 242, the high for the ladies in the tournament, for a 567 scratch series.

Bud Musser, the men's singles champ had three big games with his 166 average. He opened with a 212, moved to 186 then slammed in 244 for a scratch 642, receiving 81 pins bonus, for a winning 723, the only 700 plus series recorded. He will also receive a special Senior award for his series, as will Edna Rose for her 242 game (more than 75 pins over average).

Runner-up in men's singles was Joseph Makarsky who had nice games of 228, 222 and 193 for a scratch 643. He received just 50 pins handicap with his 179 average for a total 693. Musser is the tournament

All Events Champion with 1900. In team he had 490, 524 in doubles, his 642 in singles, plus 244 handicap to take first money of \$22.

Ladies All Events champ is a new-comer to the champions ranks - Audrey "Polly" Atkinson, a retired Army nurse who entered the tournament with a 129 yearbook average (although she now has her average up to 136). Polly is an Astro Bowl senior who had 446 in team event, 438 in doubles, 455 in singles. She received 511 pins handicap to post an 1850 total, for a prize check of \$22.

Runners-up were Joseph Makarsky with 1881 and Louise Wright, 1849, for prize checks of \$17.

According to tournament manager Anne Broyles of the SAWBA Board of Directors who sponsored the Senior Mixed, there were seven ABC or WIBC Senior Awards won during the tournament including an All Spare game patch for George Mooney for his 185 game.

In the 1982 edition of the Senior Mixed there were 52 teams, 97 sets of doubles and singles and 185 all events - a new record for the event.

As quickly as averages are verified the prize list will be posted in the lanes for 7 days to allowing times for protests then checks will be issued on February 22nd. Trophies will be awarded to winners during their regular league play.

Plaques will be awarded to each member of the first, second and third place teams and there are shift prizes for the most pins over average on each shift.

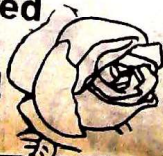

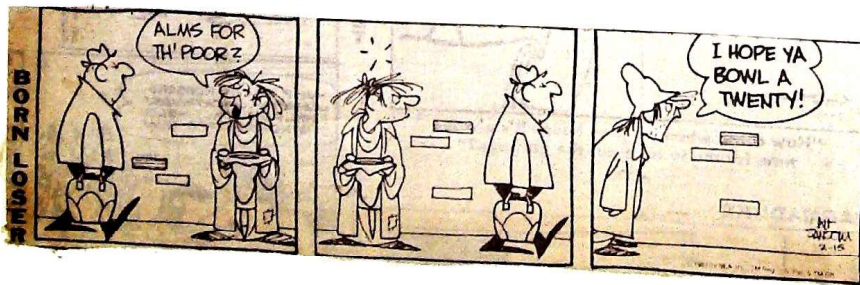

## 24 Local Gals Entered Bluebonnet Queens To Roll Next Weekend In Dallas

It's Bluebonnet time--and bowling enthusiasts of Texas will be treated to one of the state's finest tournaments when the Texas Women's Bowling Association stages its 13th annual Texas Bluebonnet Queens Tournament at Expressway Lanes in Dallas on March 6-7.

According to tournament director Sylvia Broyles, San Antonio, the 1982 edition of the Queens will feature 193 contestants who will be competing for Texas' most prestigious women's bowling title and a total prize fund of \$5,047.95. The entry figure is just short of the record-breaking 1981 total of 206 when the Queens was held in Austin.

The Queens, second in stature only to the TWBA Championships, is open to all Texas WBA members, also features a first place prize of \$550, plus trophy, tiara, and the Queens necklace. 35 local associations from 66 different cities will be represented, but only 36 competitors will cash during the two day event.

Bowlers will be divided into two squads on opening day with squad A to open qualifying at 10 a.m. with a four game block and return for another

four game block at 3 p.m. Squad B will begin play at 12:30 p.m., returning at 5:30 p.m., rolling four games each time.

The top 36 high qualifiers will enter into the semi-final round (Saturday, March 6) at 8 p.m. and roll an additional four games across eight lanes in their drive to the championship. Sunday morning at 10 a.m., the top 14 finalists begin head-to-head match play single game matches, pitting each opponent for 13 games. A final position round completes the 14 match finals. The scoring system includes total pin count, plus 30 bonus points for each victory.

1981 Texas Woman Bowler of the Year, Regina Hillier, Amarillo, one of the two Texas women to earn the Queens title twice, will lead the star-studded field. Hillier won the Austin event by averaging 207.9 for her 14 games in the finals. She won ten of her match play games to receive 330 bonus points to post a 3241 total.

On hand to challenge the talented right-hander will be former Queen, and runner-up in last year's event Gloria Alderman, Fort Worth, and four other former queens -- Susie Reichley, Dallas, the first Queen in 1970 and part of the WIBC record breaking doubles

duo (with Merrill Alexander, Dallas) which posted a 1479 in league play last year -- Gerlie Schmidt, Houston, 1973 Queen -- Fran Lary, Burkburnett, 1975 -- Evelyn Lanier, Austin, 1976 Queen.

Also in the elite field will be several current State Championships from the record-breaking TWBA Championships held last summer in San Antonio.

State Champion Laurie Jo Scales, San Antonio, no stranger to Queens competition is expected, as are members of the first place Open Division team, Luci Bonneau, Houston, and Kathy LeCroy, Fort Worth. The Open Singles champion Rosita Cook, San Antonio, will be there as will Open Doubles champions Sandy Crenshaw and Jan Erenshut, San Angelo, plus the Texas 600 Club Champion June Miller, San Antonio. Julia Halve, Waco, who shot the highest game in the Championship, a 278, is also entered in the Dallas event.

Serving on the TWBA Queens Committee with Mrs. Broyles are Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls, Beverly McLendon, Houston, and Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi. TWBA president Fay Browning, Garland, and TWBA Secretary Lil Poole, Hurst, serve as ex-officio members.

In addition to the 36 places paid in the tournament, special prizes are awarded to non-semi-finalists. The woman who rolls the high four game block and the high game but does not make the finals will each earn \$25 checks. In addition to the Queens many other awards she also receives a paid entry into the 1983 event which is scheduled for San Antonio.

Former Queens not expected to compete this year are Carolyn Anderson, Fort Worth, 1971; Beverly Pantuso, San Antonio, 1972; Bobbie Thomas, Fort Worth, 1974; and the only queen to defend her crown two consecutive years, Donna Dillon, Dallas (1977-1978).

Wearing the colors of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association and representing the association by virtue of her All Events win in the Local Tournament will be Glenda Recker. And, in addition to Laurie Jo Scales and Rosita Cook, and others entered are Shannon Bell, Liz Smith, Gloria Davis, Beverly Hollowich, Patti Davenport, Tootsie Phillips, Shelley Buchholtz, Alma and June Miller.

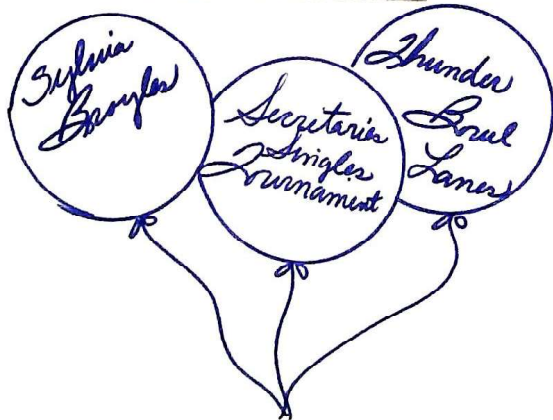

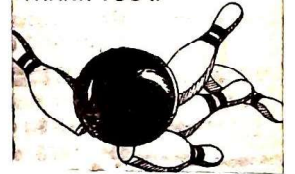

## Regina Hillier Wins 3rd Queens Crown!

Laurie Jo - Linda Fox 4th and 13th

TWBA will NOT re-name the Bluebonnet Queens to the "Hillier Open" although another win by petite Regina Hillier of Amarillo may make it mandatory!

Regina joined the Ladies Professional Bowlers Tour last August and has competed in three pro tournaments, cashing in all three. She will be attempting

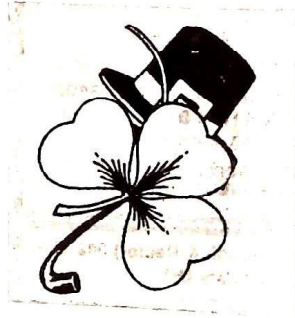

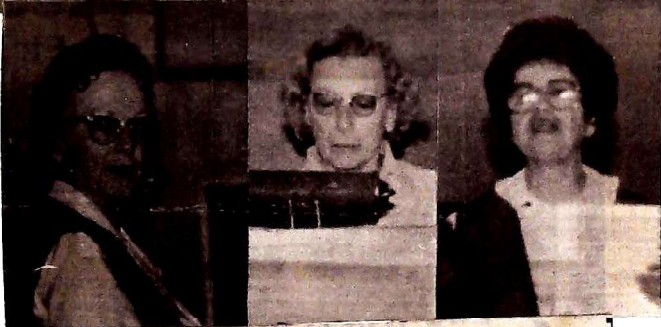

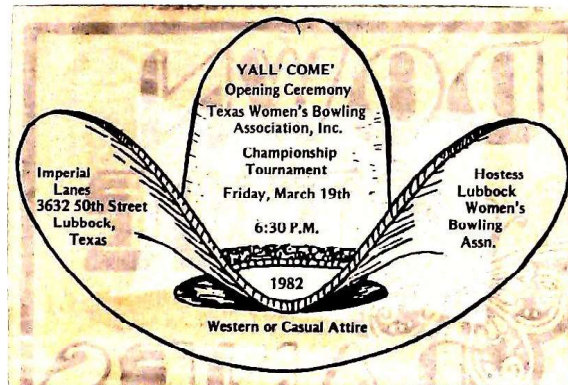
A very generous donation toward the expense of the bus trip was given by Billy Simon in the amount of \$1,000.

# Bowling Hall of Fame Groundbreaking Set for April 20 in St. Louis

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new National Bowling Hall of Fame and Museum will be held at the site in downtown St. Louis on April 20, it was announced today (March 19) by Hall of Fame President Milton Rudo, Group Vice President of Brunswick.

The \$7.2 million facility will be located at 8th and Walnut Streets adjacent to the Busch Memorial Stadium and is expected to be opened to the public during the summer of 1983.

The triangular shaped building will contain 50,000 square feet on three levels. While primarily a museum depicting the history and evolution of bowling, and featuring an Old-time Bowling Alley, the facility will also contain a large-screen theatre, a variety of exhibits and plaques and portraits honoring bowling greats.

It will house the Halls of Fame of the sports world's two largest membership-services organizations, the ABC and the WIBC. The WIBC will be holding its convention in St. Louis during the week scheduled for groundbreaking.

The land for the National Hall of Fame Museum, valued at \$1 million, was donated by Centre Bancorporation (formerly First National Bank of St. Louis), IBM and the Equitable Life Assurance Society, which are jointly developing nearby Centre Plaza.

St. Louis was selected as the site for the National Bowling Hall of Fame Museum following competition with a number of American cities. The new Bowling Hall of Fame Museum is expected to attract an estimated 150,000 visitors annually.

The building was designed by the St. Louis architectural firm of Saunders and Thalden. Exhibits are being designed by deMartin-Marona-Cranstoun-Downes, Inc. of New York. General contractor is the Kloster Company of St. Louis.

President Browning introduced to first nighters TWBA Board Members in attendance which included San Antonio's Sylvia Broyles who is TWBA treasurer.

She told the visitor that there will be 2,135 five-woman teams entered with 5,377 sets of

doubles and 10,754 singles plus 10,327 women paying optional all events.

They are the only local gals on the board at this time, although, in team event, Cl D. John's Rock Shop with 2273

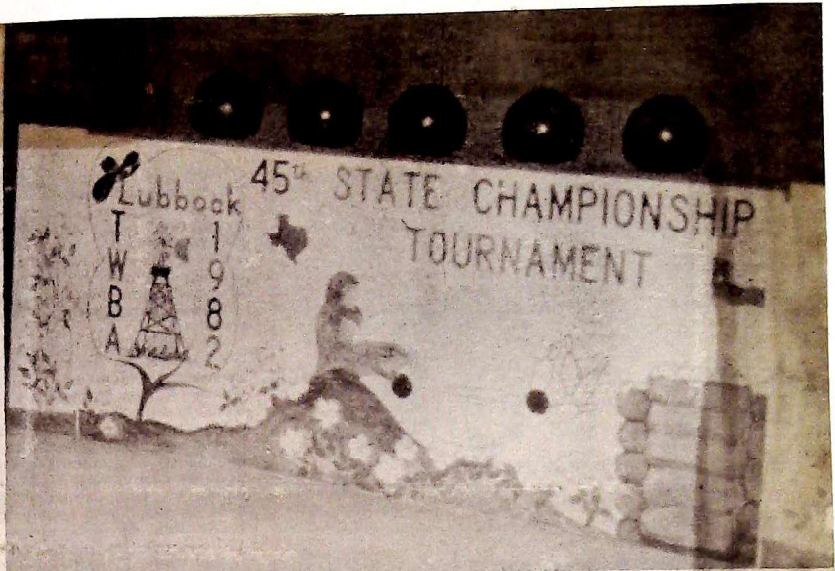
went on the board briefly.

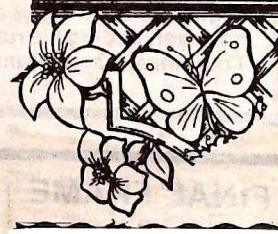

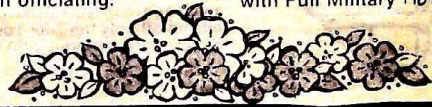

Oak Hills lanes, sponsors of the Martha Washington for 21 now offers a **George Washington Tournament** for the fellows.

It's to be run concurrently with the "Martha" with basically the same format.

Entry fee for both events is \$7 per person per event with an optional \$2 all events fee. Entry deadline for both events is **June 7 midnight**.

In the George Washington teams in Class A are 875 and up; doubles 350 and up, and singles 175 and up, with handicap set at 80% within the class. from 225.

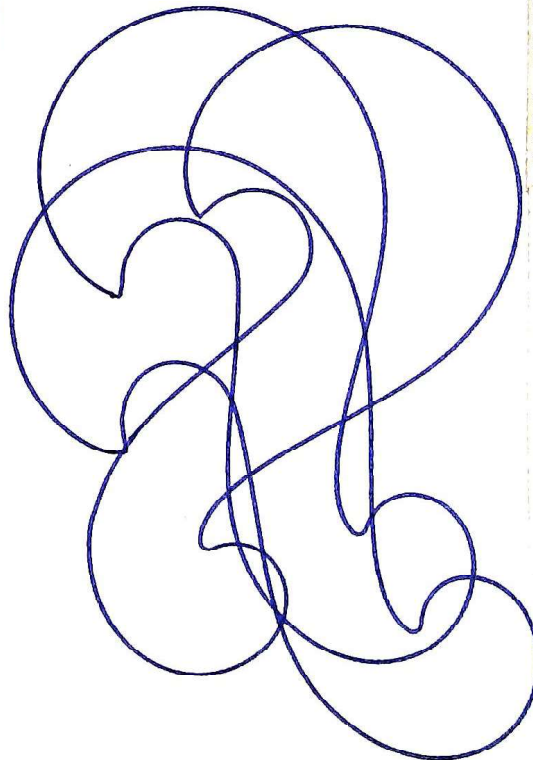

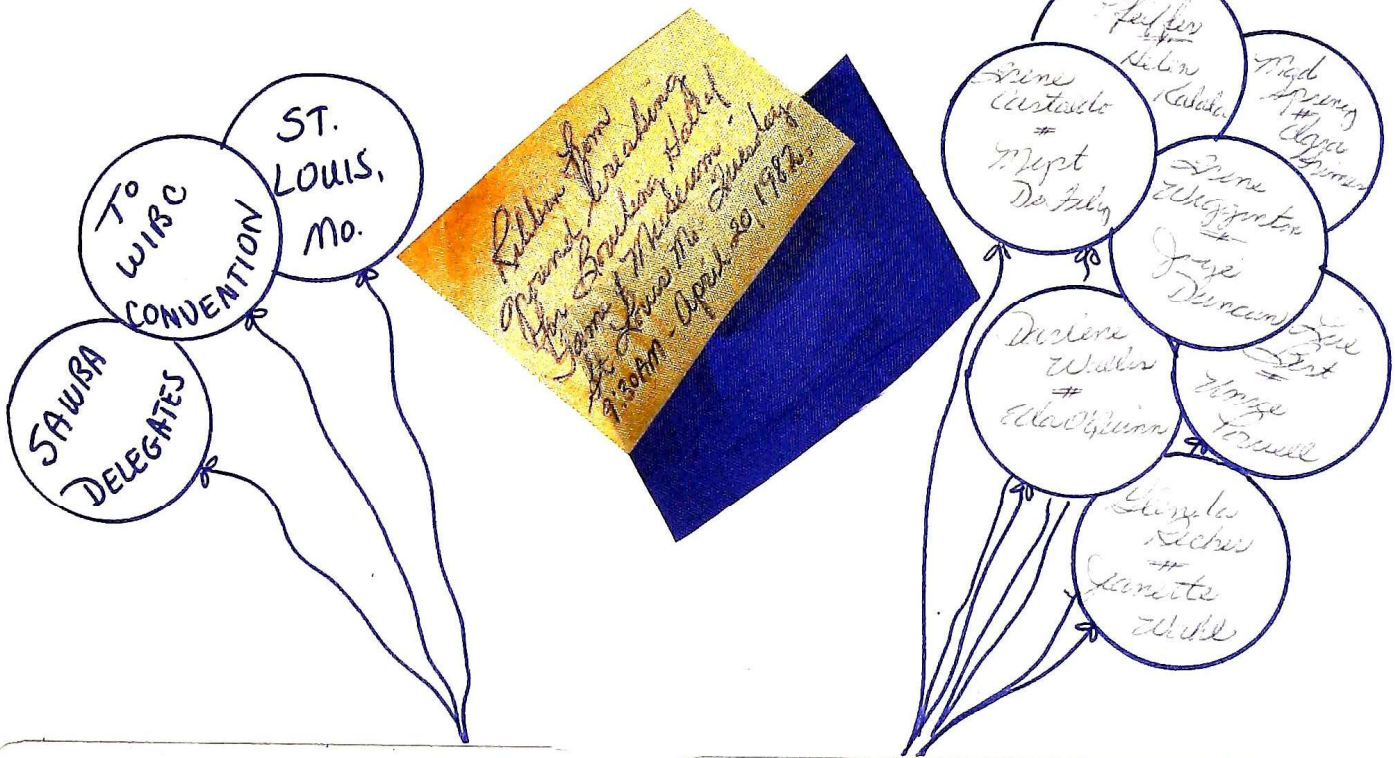

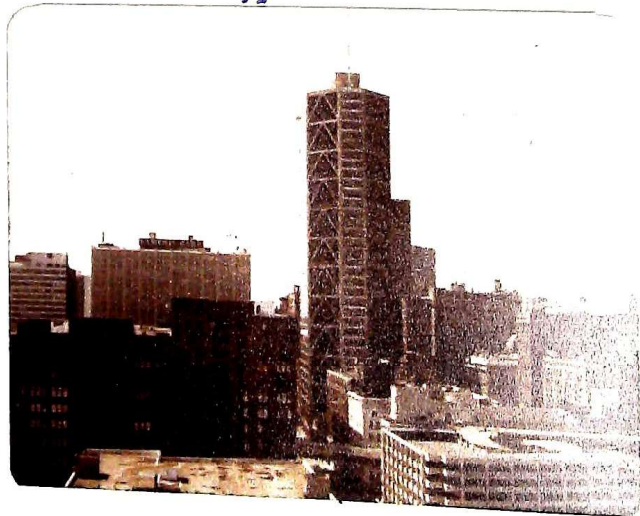

# Helen Baker's First WIBC Meeting - Smooth and Productive

## Alberta Crowe-Donna Zimmerman Enter "Hall"

A near-record delegation of 3,466, second largest ever, turned out for the 65th annual meeting of the WIBC, April 19-21 in St. Louis. It was the first time Helen Baker of Cocoa Beach, Fla. had presided over the mammoth meeting - and she was smooth and efficient throughout the three days.

In addition to conducting the Congress' annual business, delegates inducted two into the Hall of Fame and selected Orange County (California) as their hostess for 1986...only the fourth time WIBC has held its convention and tournament in California.

Convention delegates adopted 14 proposed amendments - 5 were rejected and one withdrawn.

Climaxing the convention, the 5th to be held in St. Louis where WIBC was founded in 1916, the delegates returned 9 incumbents to the 27-member Board.

Alberta E. Crowe who stepped down after 42 years on the board, the last 21 years as president, was inducted into the Hall of Fame for Meritorious Service. Mrs. Baker made the presentation of awards. Donna Zimmerman, Huntington Beach, Calif., was inducted into the Hall for Superior Performance.

Mrs. Baker, calling attention to the birth of WIBC 65 years ago just two blocks from the convention center, opened the convention with appropriate birthday sentiments and audio-visual accompaniment. Welcomes to St. Louis were by civic officials, the St. Louis and Missouri WBA presidents, and special guests were the sons of WIBC founder Dennis J. Sweeney and their families. Forty women and Sweeney organized the now 4.1 million-member Congress at his Washington Recreation Parlor in November of 1916.

Two of the bowling family's leader - Ken Hurley of ABC and William Lacy, president of BPAA, both reminded delegates of the problems the game faces and the need for continued cooperation.

"It is time to stop blocking lanes," said Hurley, "to stop

making excuses. Unless we curb runaway scoring trends, positive programs will not help." He urged that bowlers at the local level take a firm stand and discuss the problem.

Lacy cited the success of the unification of program into the YABA and maintained the same can be done on the lane-blocking problem. "The road was bumpy, but we have done it," he declared.

The delegations later adopted a resolution that calls for a committee of WIBC and ABC leaders in cooperation with BPAA and bowling manufacturers to test various procedures to improve the pace of bowling in sanctioned leagues in 1982-83 and to permit modifications or variances for leagues participating in the test program.

Charles Hall, new YABA executive director, reminded the convention that on August 1, 1982, when the new youth group becomes active, "the same kids will be playing there as

were there on July 31, 1982."

One of those is Vicki Parker of Nashua, N.H., who was named Alberta E. Crowe "Star of Tomorrow" award. The award is being continued by WIBC and was presented by Mrs. Baker to the 17 year old bowler who sports a 184 average and rolled New Hampshire's first 700 last season.

The delegation needed only 64 minutes to handle their proposed legislation. Among amendment approved were appraisals involving collegiate membership, transfer of delegate credentials, election procedures, nominating committee requirements and hostess city and association procedures.

Many of the delegates took time out Tuesday morning to attend the historic groundbreaking for the National Bowling Hall of Fame/Museum. They say Myrtle Schulte and Ray Bluth, St. Louis members of the WIBC and ABC halls of

fame, roll bowling balls down two simulated lanes to knock over pins which triggered a discharge of fireworks which "broke" the ground.

During the elections incumbent officers LO Borschuk, Iowa, Joyce Deitch, Las Vegas and Anne Simon, Mass., sergeant at arms were re-elected. All incumbent directors were returned to their seats, but Houston's Beverly McLendon and Writers President Pearl Keller, New York, had close races with the incumbent directors. It was Beverly's first race for the WIBC board and she came within 435 votes of the incumbent.

Voting for the site of the 1986 event was overwhelming for Orange County which includes Anaheim, Santa Ana, Garden Grove and Huntington Beach as its largest cities and Disneyland "where Mickey Mouse waits for you". Orange County polled 2379 votes to 388 for Tucson, 1979 hostess; and 360 for Indianapolis, 1975

hostess.

The 1983 events are slated for Las Vegas with the tournament set for Showboat Lanes, a 106 lane center, Niagara Falls, N.Y. and Toledo, Ohio, were previously awarded the 1984 and 1985 events.

Concluding events of the busy agenda were the solemn Memorial Service, with a beautiful remembrance in memory of TWBA past president and former WIBC Vice President Rae Fisk of Houston. The symbolic gold ball ceremonies passed from St. Louis to Las Vegas.

Sutton plans to have league bowling by the first week in September, but league sign-up will immediately when a portable building will be put on the parking area this week for current bowlers to make inquiry and for signing up new bowlers.

More than 40 people will be employed by the center, to include an assistant manager to work with Hunt, restaurant and lounge manager, cooks, waitresses, porters, mechanics, desk personnel and of

course, a league coordinator will be interviewed. The energetic new personal-ity in San Antonio's bowling family readily admits, "I don't

even know how to keep score," has visited many of the local facilities — bowling centers, night clubs, and other entertainment spots.

"I spent the majority of my life in civic service and while visiting in Laredo I visited a bowling center for the first time. I was impressed and began to look into the bowling

business for a future career. My uncle agreed with me that there was a need and a desire for a recreational facility in the Randolph area. My uncle has great faith and concern for that area and expressed strong enthusiasm for business growth and success there."

Sutton added, "we expect to start installing the lanes next Monday (May 10) with a target date for completion about July 15. It'll take an additional two weeks or so to fine-tune the equipment (non automatic at present) prior to the grand opening."

Hunt, who has 28 years experience in the bowling business will guide the day-to-day operation of the center, with several thoughts in mind: to have a premiere center — offering quality service — extreme courtesy and cleanliness at all times. Just to make it even more palatable for the seasoned bowlers of the area, Sutton and Hunt have already established an awards program: \$300 for the first sanctioned perfect in the center and first place team awards (when leagues have 10 or more teams) and special

awards for those leagues with less than ten teams.

When completed The Summit will contain 37,000 square feet of space in the former grocery chain location.

Sutton's business experience is wide and his financial knowledge is vast. Prior to entering the bowling business he's been overseeing the operation of a 3-building office complex and prior to that (since 1965) he's been involved in all facets of YMCA work including city wide membership drives, endowments, trust funds and public relations. "I always wanted to be a coach," said Sutton Tuesday while talking with the Kegler editor, but "once I became involved in Y-work, that became my life. I like sports-oriented organizations so I guess that's why I'm so excited about getting into bowling. I know I have a lot to learn but I really welcome the challenge, and look forward to being an asset to San Antonio's great bowling future."

The extremely pleasant 42-year old attended high school in Oklahoma, received his

Bachelor of Science degree from North Texas State and has had additional growth and personal certification courses at Texas Christian University, George Williams, Lee College at Baytown, Dale Carnegie Courses, financial and management seminars.

He's been on the Jaycees Board of Directors, Beaumont; was first vice president of Finance, Beaumont Symphony Society; Board of Directors of the Beaumont Kiwanis Club; El Paso Kiwanis Club and in addition to many other honors was nominated and selected as one of six Outstanding Men in Beaumont. He's listed in Who's Who in the South and Southwest and several times has been cited for his YMCA work.

Sutton and his wife, Delia, have three children.

No phone has yet been installed at the portable building but it should be operational in a day or two. Give them a call if you're interested in signing up for September leagues — or just drop by the location to say "howdy"

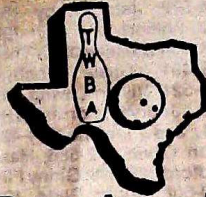

# Doris Coffman - New TWBA Prexy

## Tip Pfeiffer Goes On Board

The Lubbock ladies attempting to have an extra special TWBA annual meeting weekend - were almost devastated over a malfunctioning microphone at the annual banquet and a temperamental air conditioning unit during the meeting - but to the delegates and guests at both, the "things that could go wrong - and did" didn't really matter. All 433 guests to the banquet and the 286 Texas delegates at the annual meeting felt that it was a wonderful weekend.

TWBA local delegates, life members, officers and directors elected Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls, current TWBA second vice president,

to the office of president to succeed Mrs. Fay Browning, Garland, who chose not to seek another term.

Although Doris is short in stature, standing just a scant five foot tall, Doris is "tall" on experience. She's been active on the state level since 1957, served ten years as Treasurer, two years as second vice president and three years as 3rd vice president. She also served on her local board many years, including six years as President, and she currently serves as a Board member.

Upon Coffman's acceptance of the TWBA President's gavel, her friends on the board took a moment to "good-naturedly rib" Doris about her height.

They presented her with a two-foot high carpeted box - complete with carrying handle - so she can reach any microphone.

During the time Doris served as second vice president, she became a familiar face at the TWBA Bluebonnet Queens Tournament. The rapid fire pace of competition (26 games in two days with nearly 200 competitors) requires a hard-working committee who devote endless hours to the efficiency and accuracy of the tournament office. Doris with her nimble fingers on the adding machine keyboard and her calm demeanor under fire, was a natural, and with committee members, the Queens is one of the premiere events of the year.

During the 1969-70 season Doris was one of three TWBA members selected to attend the WIBC Workshop for state leaders, and she later served with Lil Poole, the chairman, on the all-important Credentials Committee. Last April at the WIBC convention Mrs. Helen Baker, WIBC president, selected Doris as Chairman of the Credentials Committee, which registered more than 3,000 delegates from around the world. Doris has also attended 16 WIBC annual meetings.

The soft-spoken, affable and dedicated association worker has served on a dozen TWBA special and standing committees, most importantly, the budget and finance, audit and advisory, membership pin, tournament rules, site policy, Hall of Fame, nominating, resolutions, state Bowling Council, secretary, retirement and of course, the Queens.

Just a few years ago, the esteem in which Doris is held by the state's bowlers was evidenced. When Wichita Falls was almost devastated by the tragic twister, hundreds of calls and letters concerning her welfare were received by the TWBA office. Several days passed before word was received that the Coffman was safe, and soon state bowlers knew that "Dependable Doris" had performed an almost unbelievable concerned action prior to going into their storm

cellar. One of the possessions she took into the cellar with her were the priceless TWBA record and ledger books left in her keeping.

Doris has been a valuable asset to the Tournament Office during the run of Championships. She has worked in the team center and has been in charge of the singles and doubles center, posting, typing and tending to the multitude of duties inherent to such a duty. She always has a cheerful word. Always there's a wide smile to greet novice bowlers, entering their first tournament, and there's always a warm greeting to the veterans who have come to know her over the years. Each receives individual and caring attention to their every need.

More than just bowling, however, fills Doris' life. She has been assistant corporate secretary and office manager for the Henry D. Mason & Company for 29 years.

TWBA is the largest sports organization for women in the state, and the members feel that the association is in capable hands.

Coffman will assume her duties on August 1 after serving with five previous presidents and two previous state secretaries. She succeeds Mrs. Fay Browning, Garland, who has served since 1980.

Also elected by the delegates were incumbent officers Mona Loper, El Paso, Sergeant at Arms, and incumbent directors

Mollie Barber, Longview, Director No. 5; Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi, Dir. No. 6 and Eleanor Rice, Port Arthur, Dir. No. 7.

Current SAWBA secretary Tip Pfeiffer's qualifications were read by Helen Baetz and she was elected to the post of Director No. 8.

Lil Poole was named State Delegate for the WIBC Annual Meeting in Las Vegas in 1983 with Doris Coffman to serve as alternate.

# Adios, Palace -- Hello Country Lanes!

Yes, it's goodbye Sports Palace - and hello, Country Lanes! Officially the change will take place in about a month. The Palace won't cease operations until near August 1st and the Country Lanes construction won't begin until approximately July 1st.

Plans revealed Tuesday by Floyd "Hank" Henry at World of Sports to the press gives the message that Country Lanes will have 48 lanes, six fewer than the Palace, but will have all new AMF equipment - and the center will be fully-AMF.

Hank Henry, his son, David, and general manager Bob Freehauf expressed extreme pleasure at the new plans with Henry adding, "We had a lot of problems at the Palace location, but this time we're going to profit from our mistakes and this center will be the ultimate in modern centers. This time we're doing it right - from beginning to end. With the changes on Loop 410 we found ourselves in a trap. Access was poor and the building left much to be desired. At the new location our bowlers can find more than ample parking with easy access - coming and going - and in either direction. We can benefit from the experience we gained at the Palace, and Country Lanes will be a far superior operation."

The Palace first began operations in 1976 in an existing building which was made for retail operations. The Woolco building is just four years old and is located in a thriving well-populated area.

Henry revealed that the plan is to have the 24 lanes on the north divided by a 16' concourse from the 24 lanes on the south. From settee area to the foul line, it's to be 17 feet. There are 90,000 square feet inside the complex and when completed, there's to be seven small retail shops, one large auto parts retail store, and three already-familiar (to those who visit World of Sports) shops - the gold shop, hair salon and the candy store will each open their second stores at Country Lanes.

Inside and separate from the bowling facilities will be the 8,200 square foot skating rink, this time with a new fiber glass floor (70 x 135') which is larger than the rink at the Palace.

Located in the out-going Woolco facility at San Pedro and Bitters Road, just north of Loop 410, the complex will also feature a set-down game room, restaurant and lounge, meeting room, nursery, management offices, lockers, control counter and pro shop to be

operated by Scho-Mar.

A low decorative divider wall separates the bowler-area from the concourse and for those who have been concerned about the heat at the Palace, there's to be 80 tons more air conditioning than previously. At the beginning - and the center is set to be operational the Monday after Labor Day in September - the center is to be open 24 hours per day. Leagues will begin at 6:10 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Henry expressed his regret at losing Debbie Kirst as Palace manager, and no decision has yet been made as to the new manager of Country Lanes. Kirst has returned to Thousand Oaks Bowl Leagues or individuals seeking information for the Fall schedule are requested to contact Helen Shasteen at 699-6235.

Henry concluded, "A Dallas construction firm will demolish the existing Palace building and erect an eleven story office complex."

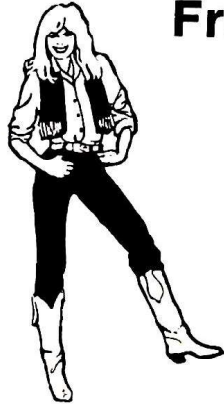

# Weekly Bowling Shows Set For Sports Channel !!

"Would you bowl on television if you were one of the high bowlers of the week in your favorite center?"

"Would you watch local bowlers if they were featured in a tournament on cable TV?"

These were two of the questions we asked some friends after we attended a luncheon with Jerry Moon and Bob Bass of the San Antonio Spurs this week -- as we thought back to the 'good old days' of Saturday afternoon "King of the Hill" matches when Channel 5 was in its infancy.

After receiving a resounding "yes" to both questions, we'll now tell you what prompted the questions.

Expanding on the format used by the PBA, officials of a city's new Sports Channel announced twice-weekly bowling shows for the fall beginning in October.

Jerry and Bob are the prime movers in the formation of the new channel.

Local bowlers will remember Jerry as one of the top bowlers of the '60s although he's not as active now as then. Plans call for one show for the women and one for the men. "We want to produce a show with a

format devised by bowling center proprietors," said Jerry. In two meetings, representatives from 14 centers voted to adopt a format similar to that used by PBA -- except that there will be eight finalists each time rather than five.

Some 10 hours of bowling will be aired most weeks, with both Moon and Sports Channel President Angelo Drossos, also of the Spurs, expressing a sincere desire to feature bowling as an important part of the new channel. "We will make available 2 1/2 hours for each show," said Jerry, "and when possible we will repeat the shows later in the week. The channel also hopes to provide coverage of other important bowling events, such as the men's pro tour, ladies and perhaps -- even the city tournaments if possible.

As producer for the shows, Moon brings 25 years of bowling experience to Sports Channel. He has won numerous league and tournament titles; has 14 perfect games including six in ABC sanctioned play; has four 800s including two in ABC events and a wealth of on-the-air experience. Jerry previously produced a

highly successful TV bowling show in Amarillo.

The new weekly show would be open to all league bowlers in San Antonio from participating centers. The method of entry is yet to be determined by proprietors,

or perhaps the bowlers themselves. However entries probably will be through league play to help hold down costs for the bowlers.

Here's how it would work: Each week, from the participating houses, the two top men and two top women would qualify for and participate in a semi-final round on Sunday morning. From the semi-finals, the top eight bowlers in each category would then bowl a week later on the TV show. The participating proprietors already have decided that qualifying scores would be on an 80% handicap from 210 basis. You can't have a tournament with no prize money-- so prize money from Sports Channel itself would be \$500 for the weekly men's show and \$500 for the women. The telecasts will emanate from a different center each week with a random drawing to determine the rotation order.

Centers with representatives at the planning sessions include All Star, Astro, Bowlerama, Hacienda, Oak Hills, Ponderosa, San P.Oedro, Spare Time, Country Lanes, The Summit, Thousand Oaks, Thunder Bowl, Wonder and World.

Needless to say, the conversation around that luncheon table (Harry Page of the Express and Johnny Campos of the Light were also guests) was spirited and lively, and we think that we could speak for the majority of you in saying that it was one of the most exciting announcements since we got the pro tour back on TV.

And, even though extensive plans are in the works -- there is much work yet to be done and Jerry is receptive to all suggestions and ideas. Let him know how you feel by contacting him at the Spurs office - 224-4611 or by writing P. O. Box 530, 78292.

And for all sports-minded bowlers -- there's even more in store -- Sports Channel will go on the air in mid-October and will be offered to all UA Columbia Cablevision subscribers for just \$10 per month. Already under contract to Sports Channel are 60 road games of the Houston Astros, weekly professional and amateur boxing cards, and all-preseason and regular season Spurs home basketball games. Other sports shows are expected to be announced in the next few weeks.

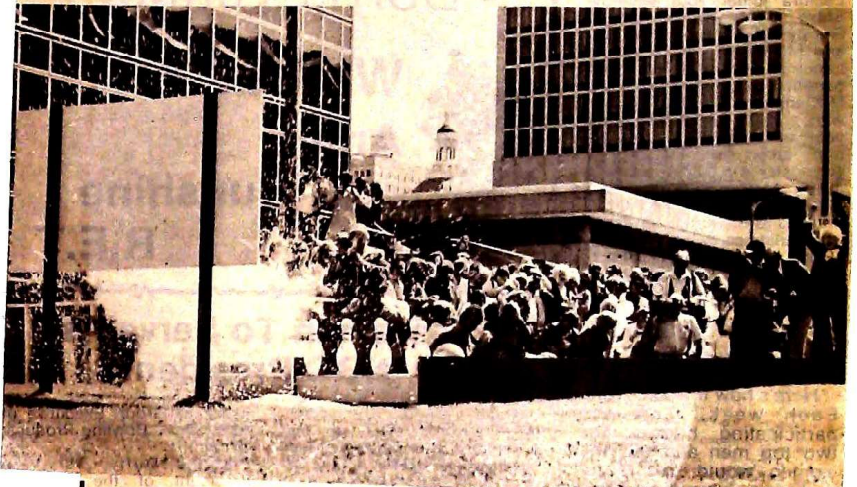

Last February across the city adult bowlers plunked nickles into a bucket which was passed through all leagues. Funds derived were to be used by the San Antonio Bowling Council to give \$3,000 worth of scholarships to local juniors.

Thirty graduating seniors took advantage of the opportunity and last Sunday rolled in the competition, named in honor of San Antonio's greatest woman, Billy Simon.

82-year-old Billy Simon also kicked off the campaign with her personal check for \$1,000, but was unable to attend the Scholarship Tournament competition.

She would have loved it! The youngsters really fought for the eight top places - 4 in boys and girls scratch - and four in boys and girls handicap.

To add to the excitement, when final scores were tallied, there was a tie for the top spot in handicap, necessitating a one-game roll-off for the top Scholarship.

"Those kids were really in pain," said Council Secretary Helen Kalala. "They had sore arms, and hands, but they kept right on bowling."

Tied for the top two spots (hdcp) were Richard Wheeler and Timothy P. Cooley. And at the end of the second regulation game, they were still tied!

Rules call for a third 9th and 10th frame until the tie was broken, and at the end it was Wheeler with a 225.6 against Cooley's 201.

With pride - and with congratulations to all who entered - we present the winners:

### Boy's Scratch

With games of 225, 187, 169, 167 and 173, eighteen-year-old Jeff Everman captured the \$500 scholarship for the high scratch boy in the Billy Simon Junior Scholarship Tournament.

The extremely quiet and modest teen who's been bowling about 13 years, plans to attend University of Texas at San Antonio to major in Communications with an eye to sports broadcasting on television.

Everman is the current King of the San Antonio juniors, following his victory in the King and Queen tournament last December at Oak Hills with a 971 five game block (194.2 average). It was only the second time he had entered the event.

A former Highlands High School graduate Jeff has two shirts-ful of AJBC patches and 41 trophies at his home. He's been a league secretary three years in two difference junior leagues including the Highlands Bowling League. He also placed third in boy's state. He's a righthander who uses a 4-step approach.

Rolling in three leagues, Jeff carries averages from 180 to 190 and has to his credit a 268 game with a 685 series. He placed 14th in the junior Top Twenty.

Jeff is the son of Mrs. Lawrence Everman and he has two brothers.

### Girls Scratch

Graduating with distinguished scholastic honors and a 99.1 grade point average, the girl's scratch champion of the Billy Simon Junior Scholarship tournament, Susan Roth, 18, has been bowling since she was

eight years old.

Currently carrying a 165 average the extremely poised Susan, previously bowled at Fort Sam Houston, but now bowls out of Wonder Bowl. She has a 237 high game to her credit.

She rolled a scratch 851 for her five games in the Scholarship Tournament, and earned a \$500 scholarship which she will use while attending University of Texas in Austin. The pretty teen has her eye on the communication field and possibly entering the public relations field.

Extremely active in high school activities, Susan was President of the National Honor Society, President of the Latin Club (previously treasurer), and was involved in numerous competitions; was Secretary of the Future Business Leaders of America as well as being a member of the Literary Club working as a staff member on the Literary Magazine at James Madison High School.

Susan's also quite prolific at baseball, being the first girl to compete in Little League (in California) where she played various positions - shortstop, third base and catcher. She's a staffer at McDonald's.

The daughter of Col. Joel Roth, member of a Thousand Oaks league, Susan also was a member of the Madison High School league runner-up team.

### Boy's Handicap

Richard James Wheeler, is the first place winner in the Simon Scholarship Handicap division. He graduated May 25th from Judson High School in Converse.

Richard first started bowling in the AJBC program in 1975 at Randolph. For the past two years he has bowled on teams from Judson as well as continuing in the AJBC program in the city and at Randolph. He intends to enter San Antonio College in the fall for his first year with hopes of transferring the second year to Southwest Texas State University where he will major in Agriculture.

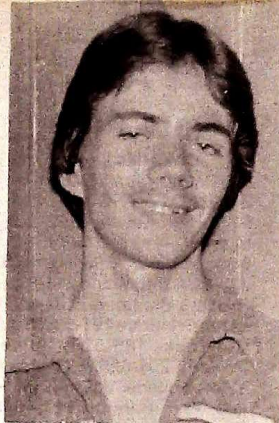

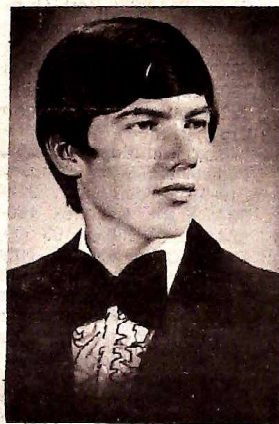

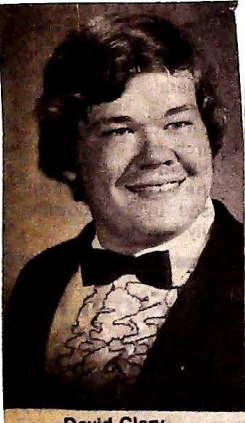

State's Bowlers Pro Shop team - Lois Lantgen, Shirley Ann Dak, Anna Marie Konecsof, Jean Kwapel and Shirley Sibila - held onto their top spot in Class B team event and are now (unofficially, yet) the 1982 State Champions of the 45th annual TWBA Championships which concluded in Lubbock Sunday night.

Elfi Tomczyk is a dual-winner! She carded the tournament high game of 279, and posted an all-time high score for seniors to earn the Billy Simon award.

TWBA secretary and tournament manager Lil Poole may be a living prophet.

14 years ago when Lubbock was hostess to the Championships the first time, Poole told delegates, "It's not necessarily the largest entry which makes a tournament one of the best."

The Lubbock event this year was the 5th largest in history. It featured 2135 five women

teams, vying for the second largest prize fund in history, and during the 14 weekend run of the tourney FOUR all-time records went by the wayside.

According to Poole, the 1982 State Champion Nell Jordan of Killeen rolled identical scores in both the 1977 and 1982 events for her nine game all-events titles.

Copperas Cove went into the record book with a 2490 total, just two pins higher than the previous score logged in 1970 by the Amcoettes of Fort Worth.

Team members and their scores were Helene Hendrickson 507, Betty Mullins, 434, Frances Bluntzer, 447, Emmy Bock, captain, 516, and Elfi Blazier 586. The team added their names to the all-time champions list on May 23.

Hutchison's team, of Longview, by a margin of 16 pins, toppled the previous record set by Nat's of Cameron in 1978. Led by captain Sandy Greer's 551 series, the East Texans were Marilyn Johnson 424, Suzanne Mehrens, 408, Ann Fuller 389, and Sandra Taylor 529.

On opening weekend Katherine Smith of Borger with a 259 game first broke the Senior high game record in the

Lubbock event. Three weekends later it was Elfi with her 279 game. Opening with a four bagger, Elfi, on a pocket hit, left a four pin which she spared. Seven consecutive strikes followed and Elfi's name was engraved in the TWBA record book.

"I am pleased and delighted with the many exciting events occurring in this year's championships," said Director Poole. "In addition to the 5th largest entry in our history, there were 5377 sets of doubles, 10,754 singles and 10,327 all events. Total prize fund will be in excess of \$149,386."

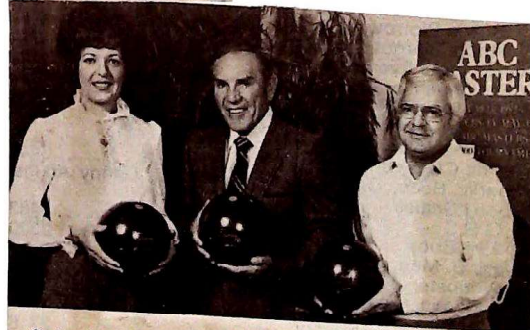

## Seven Centers To Join TV Bowling

San Antonio bowling proprietors committed to the first 26 weeks of Sports Channel bowling shows met this week to draft rules for entry by bowlers, and to draw lots to determine the rotation for televising the shows. The TV shows will originate from a different establishment each week.

Thunder Bowl will host the inaugural show. After that, in order, are Thousand Oaks, Ponderosa Bowl, Summit Lanes, Astro Bowl, Hacienda and San Pedro.

Those seven centers comprise the Charter Members of the TV bowling program and will be the only centers having the TV show from their establishments

during the first round. Others have expressed interest, and may be involved in qualification rounds.

The Charter houses voted to permit entry by bowlers, both men and women, through two methods: league scores or sweepers. A bowler may register with the desk and pay a one dollar entry fee before the third frame of the 1st game, and his or her score will be entered for competition from that center.

An unattached membership may be used to enter a sweeper for a \$6.00 fee (3 games) and the unattached member may qualify that way. Each center will send an equal number to first-round qualifiers from each method to a semi-final rolloff.

All scoring will be with a 90% handicap from 200.

A bowler who bowls leagues in more than one center may enter in each league, and if he/she qualifies in more than one house the earliest entry qualifies, and the second center moves up the next highest score.

A bowler may not bowl in a member house where he or she does not bowl in a league, unless that person bowls only in non-participating centers. In that event, he or she may enter sweepers in any member house.

Each center will determine their own method of conducting qualifying sweepers.

All the house qualifiers will meet in a semi-final sweeper each week, from which the eight TV finalists will be chosen. Those eight men and women will then go on to the TV program the following week and bowl in a

format identical to that used by the Pros. The 8th finisher will bowl 7th in a head-to-head match, with the winner advancing through seven TV matches.

Both the men and women will be bowling on TV for a total of \$500 cash. According to Sports Channel bowling coordinator Jerry Moon, there may be prizes for semi-finalists who don't make the show.

The Sports Channel goes on the air October 16th and the first bowling show will be on the channel the very next day, Sunday, Oct. 17. Tentative plans call for the men's show to be telecast on Sunday nights and the women's program on Mondays. The Sports Channel will be available soon to U.A. Columbia cable subscribers for a monthly fee.

# Jan Goodwyn Loses Final Game To Cancer



Jan Goodwyn City High Series of 754

The great game of bowling lost one of its most dedicated and tireless workers and one of its most proficient stars this week with the passing of Janet Elizabeth "Jan" Goodwyn.

Never a quitter during a league match or tournament Jan was known for her "tough competitiveness" on the lanes and her "softness" when dealing with people. Her last game was one she couldn't win. But, against unsurmountable odds her battle against the ravages of the dreadful disease of cancer was a gallant one.

Jan will be remembered

for many things during her bowling career which began in 1960. But most of us will remember her dedication to the youth of the city and her 754 series, which was rolled on January 5, 1972, and remains the highest series ever rolled by a woman in San Antonio. Jan had game of 216, 259 and 279 for her super series, which was ranked in the top ten in the nation that year.

The Sports Mirror reported at that time, "Jan, who has been hitting in brilliant style for several months, smashed in a new city record for women bowlers in the Twilighters league at Southside. Her third game (the 279) started with an open frame; then she drove home eleven straight strikes and not only earned TWBA and WIBC awards but a WIBC century patch as her game was 106 pins over her 173 average".

Just a few months later in the TWBA Championships in El Paso, Jan joined Sally Mills, Paula Wagner, Rhoda Marmolejo and Patricia Godfrey in winning the Class A Team Championship.

In addition she had trophies which read, 678, 693 and 653.

She was named to the City Top Twenty list several times and just last year when the TWBA was at the Palace, Jan helped move her team into first place early in the tournament, and their score held up for several weekends.

Because of the many series over the 650 mark, Jan earned several state honors

and at one point in her career she carried a 183 high average. But it was her devotion to youth bowling which partly cemented her claim to fame. In the very early 1960's, Jan became a TABY coach. She moved into the AJBC coaching ranks in the mid-60's and became one of the most respected junior coaches in the programs.

She loved all aspects of this bowling game and always "gave it her all" - on and off the lanes - fighting like a tiger for anything that was good for the youngsters and the integrity of the game.

She went on to become an employee at Billy Mitchell lanes; worked as secretary to Rusty Pope at Scotchman Industries, and most recently as league coordinator at the Sports Palace.

As a mother of an active bowling family she proudly basked in the sunshine of

her children's victories. Her eldest, Carl, 27, is a bowler, son Chris, 25, has earned a goodly share of plaudits and tournament titles, and daughter, Gayle, 21, seems destined to follow in Jan's footsteps in the high scoring category.

Jan sincerely enjoyed the success of others on the lanes and was proud of the youngsters whose lives she touched so lovingly during her coaching years.

The Holy Bible, John 3:14, says, "We have passed out of death into life..." and Jan Goodwyn just joined a beautiful new league. She left us a legacy of fun and a stronger love of this sport we enjoy. She was a shining example of fair play and integrity, and we have remembrances of many thoughtful acts and deeds. Jan Goodwyn will be an inspiration to all for many years to come, and the "lady in black" will be sadly, sadly missed.

## Message From ABC/WIBC To be Repeated At Workshops

Accepting any office in an ABC or WIBC sanctioned league carries some responsibilities. And many of those responsibilities will be covered in the League Officers Workshops set for Tuesday and Thursday, August 10 and 12.

Location for the southside Workshops is the Pecan Valley Country Club at 4711 Pecan Valley at both 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Northsiders' Workshops are at the Sheraton San Antonio Inn, 1400 Austin Highway, also at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Workshops are not just for league officers - any interested bowler may attend and learn more about responsibility of officers and rules changes.

For example, to protect fellow bowlers, a president has the duty to check the league's bank account once per month. If he/she follow the simple procedures spelled out in the ABC/WIBC rule books, those funds will be covered 100% by the 'Congress' league bonding program.

But, if the president doesn't follow the rules, it could result in the league being covered for only 50% of any loss. And if there is a problem, both the president and the treasurer could be suspended by ABC/WIBC.

That it why it is important that leagues elect officers who will do their jobs. It isn't a matter of not trusting the person responsible for the league funds. It's just good common business sense to see that things are in proper order.

Good officers protect the league in other ways. An alert secretary-treasurer will keep the other officers informed if one of the teams is having trouble by team members not being able each week or by falling behind in league fees. Many times problems can be worked out to help such a team before it develops into

something serious, such as dropping out of the league halfway through the season, disrupting the entire league schedule.

Good officers also see that the league prize fund does not take the fun out of bowling. Expensive weekly fees to

support an unrealistic prize fund can cause many league problems.

So, when your fellow bowlers pick you to be an officer, give them a good job. Your reward will be having a good league operation that brings enjoyment to each member.

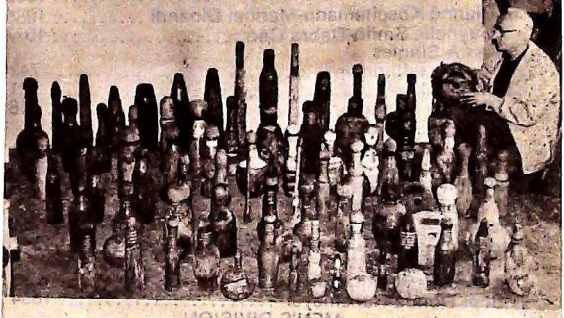

# Joe Vito - Liz Smith Take "Washington" Titles

Joe Vito Buenrostro put another star behind his name as the first George Washington champion and David Henry took the handicap all events title. Joe had 2109 with 682 in team, 673 in doubles and 754 in singles to earn the first "George" trophy. Henry receives a \$60 check plus his title.

In the Martha Washington it was Liz Smith's third title with an all events total of 1793. She had 616 in team, 637 in doubles and 540 in singles. She will be presented her third Martha trophy for the feat. Taking the Martha handicap title is Marilyn Lampmann, a 156 bowler from Turner Club who also annexed the Class A Singles title with games of 213, 205, and 219 for a scratch 637, 742 handicap.

Class B champions are Donna Hansmeyer and Ruben Sanchez taking both the handicap and scratch titles. Donna had 1633-1654 postino 561 in team, 508 in doubles and 564 in singles. Ruben, a 173 averager, who was late for every event (which almost destroyed his partner) won with a 599 in team, 602 in doubles and 598 in singles. He took the handicap title with 1805. They will receive \$110 and \$70 respectively.

An 823 average team known as the Thirsty Maw'n Ladies took the Martha Class A team title with a handicapped score of 3168 - games of 909, 914 and 922. Members and their series are: Nina Weber 610, Vickie Egbert 536, Dottie Graves 566, Pat Scribner 561 and Ernestine Harris 472. The quintet will earn \$250 for their victory.

In Class B, five gals from Turner Club with a 763 team average posted a 2556 to take the title. With team games of 875, 900 and 753, individually the ladies posted: Jean Winters 500, Betty Dossett 445, Evelyn Herrera 585, Pat Serena 499 and Jane Roden 499. They will receive \$250 as well.

For the first George Washington team title, five of the city's toughest scratch bowlers teamed together for Architectural Millwork to take the Class A team title. Led by Jerry Merck's 718, team members with scores were Joe Vito 682, Curt Elliott 652, Bobby scales 622 and Carlos Castaneda 612. The team entered with an average of 1049 and had games of 1153, 1058 and 1077 to post the winning score of 3470. They earned \$170. Scales was also a member of the second place team, "The Class" of All Star Lanes, which posted a 3448 total.

George Class B team champions were the Pindusters who carded games of 804, 1007 and 860 to post their handicapped total of 2853. They entered with a 798 team average and individually it was Tim Mason 434, Garland Kinard, a 142 averager who posted 542, Ray Kirby 516,

Steve Schuman 572 and Duane Meese, 607. They will receive \$175.

Action in doubles each weekend in the tournament which ran throughout June and July, was brisk.

In Class A Martha, it was newcomer to the city, Beverly Barron, a 173 average transfer who'll be bowling in local leagues in the fall, posting a 541 and partner Margot Duncan who posted 600 even. They had 1299 to earn \$150.

In Class B, 160 average Nanette Luckich had 554 with partner Pat Schafer (150 avg) who had 535. They were at the top of the class and received no handicap when they posted their 1089 score. They will split \$200 first place prize money.

Men's Class A doubles winners were Robin Wallace and Corkey Smith, and Corkey was a last minute sub for Ron Day. Robin entered with an 182 average and posted 574 while Corkey entered with 186 and posted 696. Their combined doubles tally of 1466 will earn \$100.

Men's Class B doubles winners were Ramiro Moreno and Higinio Mena Jr who put in 1218. Ramior is a 156 averager who had 589 and Higinio is a 163 averager who had 557. They earned \$120.

Rolling with the maximum average in Class A women's singles Marilyn Lampman took the honors with her 156 average. Ruth McCammon, 147 average, captured the Class B title with games of 178, 212, 191 (551 scratch) and 600 handicap. I receive \$175.

The San Antonio Light bowling columnist, Johnny Campos took top honors and the first George Singles title with a nifty 807 handicap total. Johnny had games of 205, 244 and 253 and received 105 pins handicap to make certain that

history didn't repeat itself. Just ago in Bobby Scales 4th of Julys Singles at All Star Johnny and Jim Butcher were rolling on the same squad. Jim finished first and took the tournament lead with 1210 handicap. Johnny finished his play and knocked Jim out of first with 1267.

In the George, Jim was the leader with 791 (games of 246, 210 and 225 for a 681 scratch) and Johnny was the only Class A bowler rolling Sunday when he knocked nice Jim off again! Johnny'll receive \$80 for his victory but Jim may be cancelling his subscription to the Light.

One of the many out-of-towners entered in the George became a champion when Allen Sampson, Port Lavaca, who wasn't supposed to compete in anything but team event, subbed for a friend in doubles

and singles, and grabbed the singles title with 688. He told Bettie Jo Geisler, tournament manager, "I've never bowled that well in my life," as he happily watched his name being put on the standings board. Allen had games of 236, 180 and 229 (645 scratch) with his 156 average. He earns \$100.

Bettie Jo expressed pleasure at the turnout for this year's Martha and she was equally delighted with the 60 teams entered in the George on its initial run. From all indications the George should grow -- and grow -- and grow -- once the men realize that the name is no joke -- just a little Oak Hills history from the days when Billy Simon devised the Martha Washington Tournament for a little February action for the ladies. The growth and success of the tournament has caused the move to the summer months.
