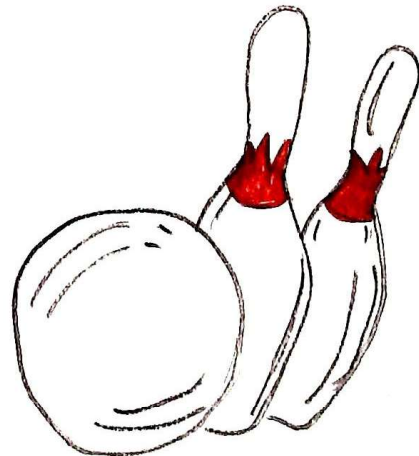

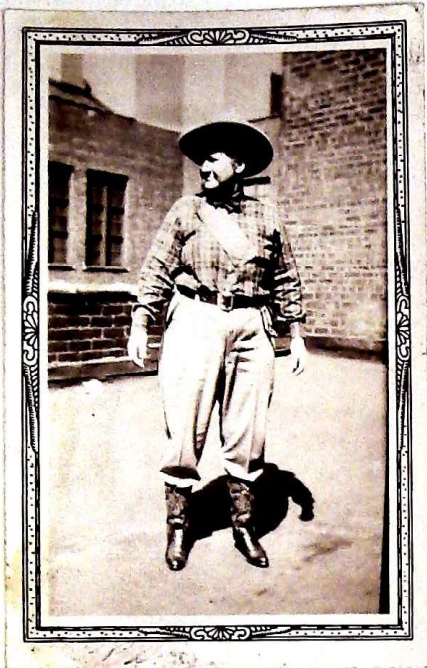

## Las Vegas WIBC Entry Totals 7993 on July 23

Entry total for the 1983 WIBC Championship Tournament in Las Vegas, Nevada, reached 7993 on July 23, already ranking the event seventh largest in tournament history. A record 10,000 five-woman teams -- 50,000 women bowlers -- are expected to enter the 64th annual showcase of womens bowling.

Since the first completed entry form was received June 14, entries have flooded into WIBC headquarters. Five months still remain before the January 7 entry deadline, unless the schedule is filled sooner. The tournament will open April 7, with the last day for team competition tentatively set for May 29 unless the tournament is extended.

Las Vegas also was the tournament site in 1973, when 9644 teams entered. The largest WIBC event before that had been the Rochester, New York,

tournament in 1967 with a 6094 team entry. Showboat Lanes hosted the first Las Vegas event when the center had only 48 lanes. The tournament ran a record 107 days. Now with 106 lanes, Showboat again will be the host.

The field for the 1983 Avon/WIBC Queens Tournament, prestigious companion event to the WIBC Championships, was filled on July 7, earliest date ever. Additional entries have been placed on a waiting list. The field of 481, an increase of 80 over past years, filled unexpectedly fast despite the expansion.

## Bowling Ranks As # One Year Around Sports Activity By Women

Bowling was given extremely high marks by the nation's women 18 years and over in a recent National Bowling Council survey of women.

The survey was undertaken for the Council by Market Facts of Chicago. Interviewed were nearly 1,000 women 18 and over on a special Market Facts panel.

The major findings revealed that bowling was the number one year around sport in which participate. Bowling followed card playing and table games, going to the movies and swimming in the list of most popular leisure activities, according to the study. Sports such as jogging, tennis, racquetball and golf did not place in the top ten activities.

The survey also indicated a revised profile of the female league bowler. This individual is 43 years old, married, lives with two other persons and has a median

household income of \$24,250. 37% have attended college.

Most interesting from a marketing standpoint, is that this is a group of women who can be reached at home during the day. The survey revealed that only 28% of all league bowlers are employed and of those only 15% are employed full time.

Women league bowlers are also more active than their female counterparts. A comparison of bowlers and non-bowlers found that non-bowlers are less outgoing, prefer to stay home and undertake less active sports than those in a league.

Finally, all women stated that given less restraints of work and family activities, they would bowl more. However, in the next five years it is the league bowler who will have the time, money and interest in getting out of the house to bowl more.

## State Jamboree Next Weekend at Temple

State bowling Jamborees are one of WIBC's and ABC's most important cogs in the machinery geared to keep bowlers as the most informed sports participants in the country.

A Jamboree is an annual get together of national, state and local bowling officials to discuss the sport. WIBC and ABC send representatives to answer questions, and talk about legislation and rules changes that resulted from action taken at the Conventions in the spring.

It also is the time when the state's many local associations can share information among themselves, develop ideas and bring back a new wealth of knowledge to their home areas.

Jamborees vary from state

to state. Some utilize the event to coincide with the state association's annual business meeting and perhaps the state hall of fame inductions. Our Jamboree - which is open to anyone interested in the game of bowling - begins with registration and a poolside buffet next Friday at the Ponderosa Motor Inn in Temple, followed by a Happy Days Party Sweeper at Action World Bowl.

Saturday morning brings a two-hour session on the new YABA - Young American Bowling Alliance - the new organization for our youngsters, and state leaders will learn of all the new changes of the now united junior program.

After a break for lunch, YABA, WIBC, ABC and

proprietor representatives come together for a general session, after which the groups are divided into separate sessions.

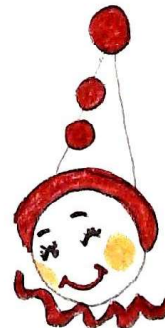
All Jamborees, no matter what the size, stress the sharing of information between local, state and WIBC and ABC representatives.

The whole basis for having Jamborees is to exchange ideas and a lively question and answer session is one of the keys to a successful jamboree.

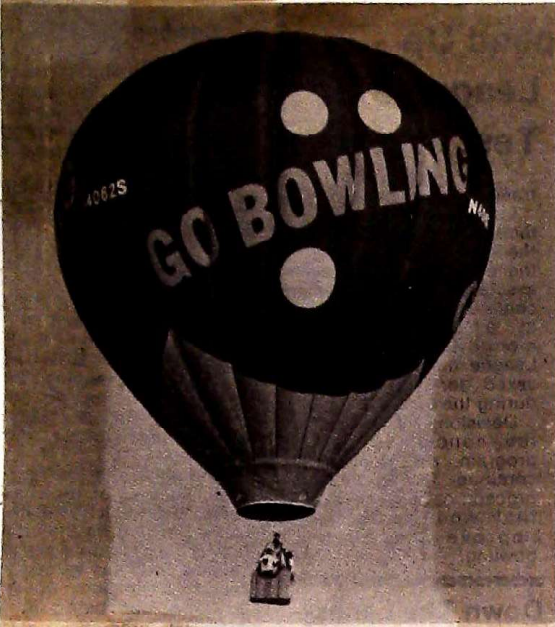
In addition, workshops provide a means whereby local association members can provide valuable input in the implementation of ideas and programs that can increase and improve service to bowlers

Jamborees where the national, state and local bowling people gather to discuss ideas keep the bowler up to date with their sport and it gives valuable "grass roots" input to the Congresses.

It's still possible to attend, although we understand the Ponderosa Motor Inn is now filled. Other lodging facilities are available in Temple. Cost is minimal: \$5 for the buffet on Friday; or \$12.50 for the Rules Session, Dinner and Dance (Saturday night); or \$12.50 for dinner and dance only (with a cash bar); or \$4.00 for the Rules Session only. 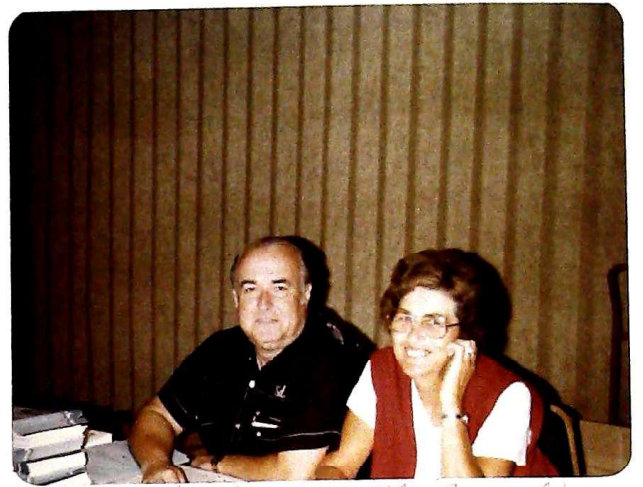

Our weekend jaunt began with a poolside buffet and even the lengthy serving line (which so rattled the local hosts) didn't dampen the spirits of the Jamboree registrants.

After a quick bite it was off to Action World for a little colored pin singles with more than \$2,000 in cash and merchandise gifts provided by Temple businesses for downing

those colored beauties. To top it off, Temple chose as their theme the fifties - and the dress code called for poodle skirts and bobby socks, tee-shirts with sleeves cut off and slicked down hair-dos for the guys, and the panel of judges had difficulty in selecting winners of the costumes. The night was filled with music of the '50s and Gary Tompkins stayed on the microphone for 2½ hours calling colored pin shots, keeping a line of entertaining patter throughout the first shift and then stayed with us until 9:30 AYEM until everyone had completed their play.

Then it was up in the early hours of Saturday for a quick donut and cup of coffee for the new Your American Bowling Alliance meeting - you know there's no more AJBC - and please don't say "Yah-Bah", it just might cost you a quarter, it's "Why-Be-A". Ebullient Jim Beleele, YABA Field Director, led Jamboree guests through the changes in the new program which now united all junior programs under one banner. Billed as a birthday party for the new arrival, balloons were released over Temple to mark the event - and Jamboree guests returned to the meeting room for cake and coffee. Sylvia Broyles, a WIBC Board member and YABA board member devised a couple of fun-word games for Jamboree participants and Beleele showed all the new material available, patches which may be won, and otherwise promoted the new program.

After a break for lunch Jamboree-ites gathered again for a general session and to meet with bowling officials from across the country. Representing ABC was head man Roger Tessman, of Bowling Headquarters, and for WIBC it was warm and wonderful

Mrs. Lo Borschuk of Iowa, with YABA's Jim Beleele. Texas was represented by Jim Miller of TSBA, and Doris Coffman, TWBA president from Wichita Falls; Jack Shuffler and Lil Poole, secretaries of our state offices, Jamie Brooks of the proprietors, Janie Palmer of Texas YABA, and the new proprietor's executive director, Jack Martin of Austin.

Beleele noted this new YABA will be successful if all of us work together. "It can't help but be successful if we all sit down together and communicate our thoughts. Forget "them" -- forget "us" - - and just remember the youngsters. They are our future!"

Mrs. Borschuk quoted from WIBC President Helen Baker emphasizing "Communication and Cooperation in all we do." She said, "Don't quit. We have done a tremendous amount of work for the National Bowling Hall of Fame and Museum. Groundbreaking is over, and construction has begun, but don't quit raising money for this worthy venture. Continue your support of BVL, continue to bring new bowlers into our game through our senior league program - it's a fertile field and by all means support YABA."

"With all the wonderful things that have happened in our game we also have a few concerns and one of them is the pace of bowling. She advised Jamboree guests of the tests now underway to improve the pace of bowling. Complete reports on the tests reported last week in the Kegler.

After remarks by Tessman during which he thanked local and state officials for their input into the overall program of ABC, the sessions were split with ABC members in one room, WIBC in the other.

Both Tessman and Borschuk urged support of the Budweiser Tournament which helps generate funds to the National Hall of Fame. With more than 4 million members in WIBC and a like number or more in ABC, the support last year was great according to the sponsoring organization, but a disappointment to Bowling Headquarters. More on this exciting event will be covered in later issues of the Kegler.

During the WIBC portion of the Jamboree Mrs. Borschuk covered a

multitude of questions from attendees; urged everyone to follow the "Bring A Friend" idea and get new bowlers on our membership rosters (both Texas WBA and San Antonio WBA membership is up - but else where in the nation, many associations are down."

Many of the questions from delegates concerned league rules and Mrs. Borschuk was emphatic when she said "get a good set of league rules adopted by league members - use WIBC suggestions - then follow them."

Questions were rapid-fire and answers from Mrs. Borschuk were equally fast in coming. Obviously enjoying her first trip to Texas as a Jamboree speaker, the talented 3rd vice president of WIBC - the

largest sports organization for women - could be considered nothing short of a "hit" by the state bowlers. Jamboree guests gave her a lengthy standing ovation at the completion of her remarks.

Governor Bill Clements recognized the staging of the Jamboree with a Mail-O-Gram and the San Antonio Bowling Council's bid for the 1984 Jamboree was accepted.

The weekend was capped off by a lovely banquet at the spanking new Temple Convention, and as we took to our cars for the drive back, Jamboree guests were taking to the dance floor. Not a one could complain about hospitality -- hard work -- and thoughtfulness of the Temple Associations. It was a great Jamboree!



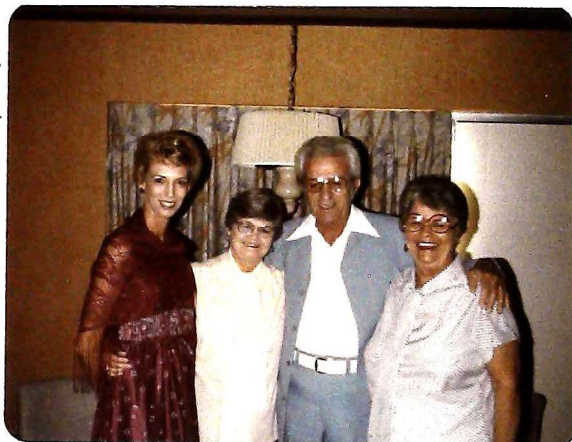

## WIBC TOURNEY IN VEGAS ENTENDS DEADLINE AS ENTRIES HIT 10,000 MARK

The 64th WIBC Championships, scheduled for Las Vegas, Nev., next spring, has been extended 12 days due to an unprecedented number of entries.

All existing records were shattered August 6 when entries reached 9,861 five-player teams, topping the previous mark of 9,688 teams which competed in Milwaukee in 1977. The first mail on Monday, August 9, pushed the count over 10,000. The 1983 championship event now will open April 7 and close on June 10. Tentative closing date had been May 29.

The closing date for submitting entry forms and fees is January 7, unless the schedule is filled sooner. The possibility of further extensions exists, but team captains should not wait as they could be shut out.

The 1983 tournament will be held at Showboat Lanes which has 106 lanes. That is 58 more lanes than when it hosted in 1973. That year, a record 9,644

teams were entered and the tournament ran a record 107 consecutive days. No other bowling event, men's or women's has attracted so many bowlers, nearly 50,000 for a scheduled tournament.

The first million dollar prize fund in women's bowling could result if entries continue at their present pace.

Rocky Boubel, now in the Air Force stationed in Germany, but remembered by many local bowling fans.

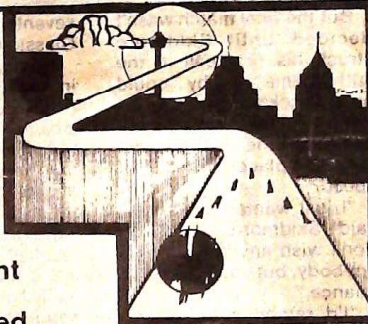
Rocky's latest victory came not for her bowling, but for her baseball prowess...and she was also known as one tough softball player while here.

# The Summit Officially Open Now !!

## And...It's Gorgeous!!

Once in awhile in this writing game you just can't grab the proper words-- and that was the feeling Kegl staffers had when visiting W. F. and Dan Sutton's spanking new Summit Bowling Lanes and Billy Dan's Country and Western Club.

Official opening was Friday the 13th out at Universal City with a horde of Universal City business and civic officials on hand for the champagne bottle breaking over a bowling ball!

But Wednesday night was Grand Opening -- and again there were more than 300 guests and visitors on hand for a sumptuous buffet, cocktail hour and open house, a tour of the magnificent facility and a street dance out on the parking lot immediately afterward with hot dogs, beer, sodas, free balloons and lots of fun for everyone!

With a smile which was seemingly uneraseable young Dan Sutton greeted guests with his uncle, W. F. Sutton and lane manager Frank Hunt. Flashing equally warm smiles were the Mayor of Universal City, Bruce Bernard, numerous members of the Randolph area Chamber of Commerce, SABA secretary Bob Martin and life member

Charlie Mize, former president E J Crabb, SAWBA officials Sylvia Broyles, president, Tip Pfeiffer, secretary, a multitude of proprietors, press and many many friends.

From the moment you step onto the red indoor-outdoor carpeting through the electric-eye doors you get a feel of spaciousness and elegance. As San Antonio Bowling Proprietor president Floyd Henry termed it, "it's just more evidence of what you can do with an existing building by utilizing it to its best advantage."

The Summit is truly gorgeous! As you enter, on the right is the video game room with its eerie black lighting (my "experts" tell me they are the greatest machines on the market today). On the left are the executive offices and the control counter where Toni Donna Madsen will greet you with a friendly smile - day and night.

On the right, still on the spacious concourse is an "open-air" snack bar area, and the menu posted will tempt the appetite of any hungry bowler. Pat Tatum will oversee the food operation and if the buffet was any example, she's in for some busy busy

breakfast, lunch and dinner times!

In the far left corner is the free nursery for league bowlers which can accommodate 30-35 wee ones. Cribs, toys and games are now awaiting the arrival of the tots while mom and pop bowl.

For the convenience of the handicapped, ramps have been installed both for easy access into the center from the parking area, and down to the pit area, where tables have been installed for the comfort and convenience of bowlers.

House balls are out of sight under the counter which divides the concourse from the bowler area. The pro shop is yet to be installed but everything else is operational and ready for the first league -- which incidentally, is the Booker Hookers, a new league originally formed by League Coordinator Jeannette "Jeanie" Fields, an attractive brunette with a winning smile. Over 2,000 bowlers have already signed up for league play and just a few

openings remain. "With the beginning of school for the youngsters, emphasis will be on ladies morning or afternoon leagues, so mom can enjoy a few hours relaxation," said Hunt. "We still have a few openings in our daytime leagues, so anyone wishing further information may contact Jeanie and I'm sure we can find just the right spot."

"Our bowling program has something for everyone," said Sutton. "There

But there's still more! Two doors off the concourse area lead to the fabulous Billy Dan's Country and Western Club and a visit there is a real eye-opener. Overlooking the 800 square foot dance floor is the sound booth for the deejay -- and the sound can be heard throughout the club. A magnificent bar serves guests to Billy Dan's with special service windows to serve those in the bowler's area. Tables with comfortable chairs, high stools surrounding intimate smaller tables are already in place (in fact many were filled throughout the evening Wednesday). The decor is highlighted with natural cedar and gleaming glass, mounted animals, cactus all add touches of western wonder to the club's decor. Upstairs in the loft are



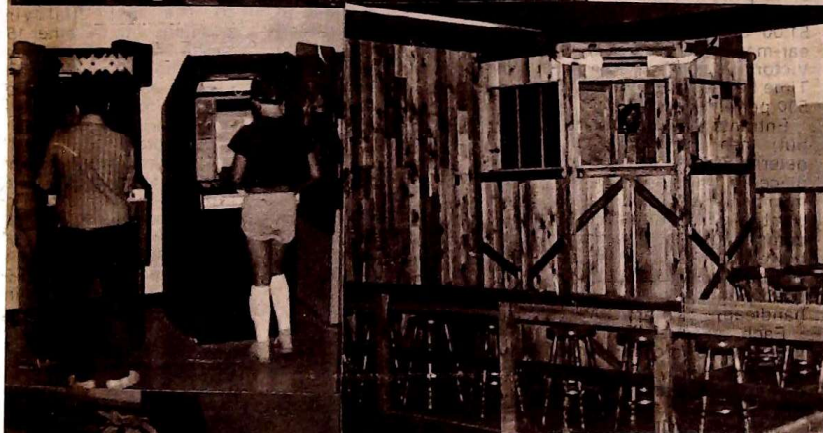
View from the parking lot of the Summit and Billy Dan's Country & Western Club in Universal City.

## 600 Club Annual Tourney Set

## '83 WIBC Extended 2nd Time

With more than 12,000 five player teams already entered, and more expected, the 64th WIBC Championship Tournament scheduled for Las Vegas next spring, has been extended for a second and final time---to July 1.

Entries will be accepted and processed on a day to day basis to fill the schedule through that date. The earlier extension called for a June 10 tournament closing date. The original deadline for entries was January 7, unless the schedule was filled sooner.

The tournament opens April 7 at Showboat Lanes, site for the record smashing event which is destined to stand unmatched anywhere. The tournament will run for 84 days, taking breaks June 11, 18 and 25 due to uncancelable previously scheduled Showboat activities.

If the full 84 days are filled, more than 14,000 teams---70,000 women---will be competing for a prize fund well over a million dollars for the first time.

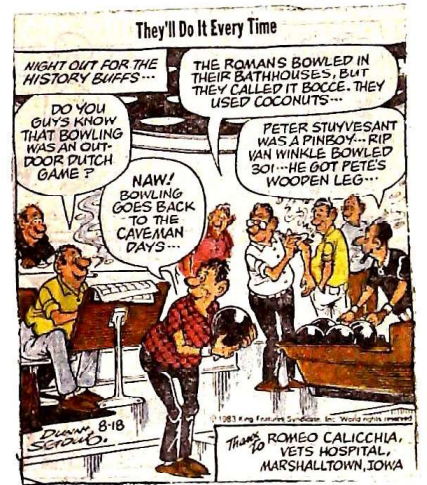
Team captains still face the prospect of being shut out if they delay further in submitting entry forms and fees.

"The response we have had for the 1983 tournament is unbelievable," said Miss

The Showboat bowling center has 106 lanes. Five team squads and seven doubles and singles squads are scheduled daily from 8a.m. to past midnight. The 1973 WIBC, also held in Las Vegas, drew a tehrn record 9,644 teams and ran 107 days across 48 lanes at Showboat which has been expanded twice since then.

Due to the length of the 1983 tournament, the top 10 nonprofessional leaders in all events as of June 10 will qualify for the U.S. Team Trials to be held July 14, 15, and 16th. Anyone with higher scores in the last 21 days of play will be invited to the 1985 team trials.

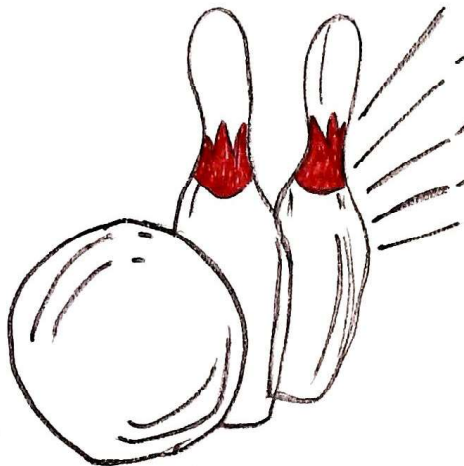
Serving on the Reading of the Minutes Committee for the Open meeting, President Broyles named Roxie Shamp, Irene Wigginton and Donna Wallace.

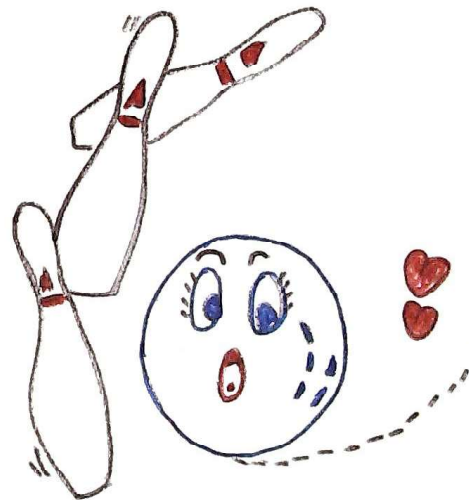

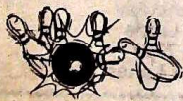

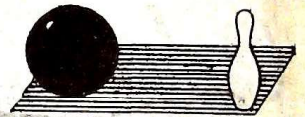

champions in team, doubles, singles and all events in each class.

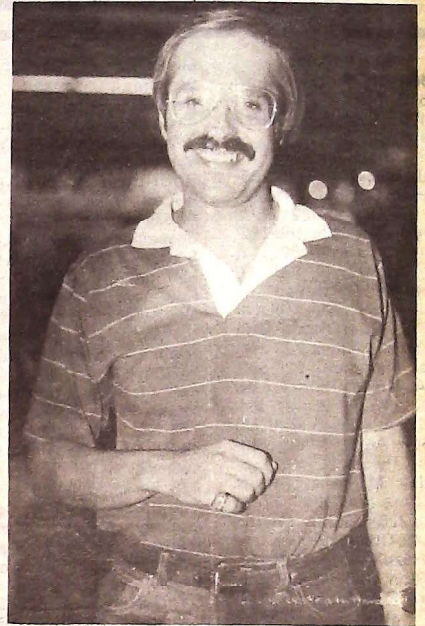
Curt Elliott, with three series over the 700 mark - and a SABA tournament record - received the first gold City Champion's Ring accompanied by the applause of those attending the picnic.

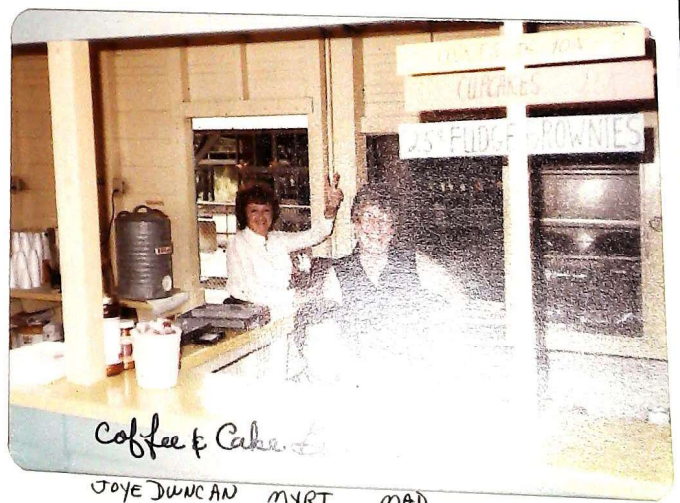
portable television, donated by the San Antonio Bowling Proprietors Association, and lucky winner was Oak Hills lane man, jovial Hiram Walker.

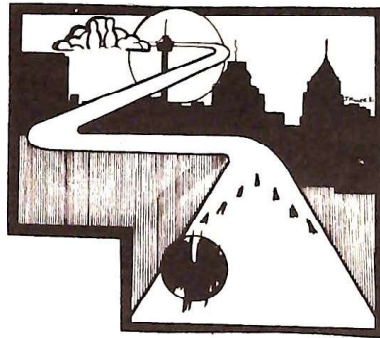

**Come Watch Sunday Thunder Bowl 10a.m.-1p.m.**

This is the weekend that local bowlers roll for the cameras of the new Sports Channel 37 and the action takes place at Thunder Bowl first.

The feeling is high for those sixteen who qualified last weekend at San Pedro and those participating proprietors who make up the River City Bowling Proprietors Association are anxiously awaiting their first sponsored television show.

According to Orville Downs, president of River City BPA and general manager of Brunswick Thousand Oaks, seven local centers - San Pedro - Astro Bowl - Hacienda Bowl - The Summit - Thousand Oaks - Ponderosa Bowl and Thunder Bowl - have had qualifying throughout their leagues during the week for spots in the semi finals. Each league member may pay a \$1.00 fee, receive 90% handicap added to his or her score and the top three men and top three women from each center attempt to advance. The fortunate trio will represent their centers in the semis - and hopefully in the finals.

Semi finals are three game matches and the finals utilize a 8-person stairstep format. The finals are filmed by Sports Channel 37 to be shown later in the week.

Qualifying in most of the seven centers runs from Friday through Thursday with Qualifying Sweepers for those bowlers who roll in centers now joining the promotion at this time. Qualifying Sweeper times vary in each of the centers, so bowlers wishing to participate should contact the seven centers for further details and times.

Sweeper charge is \$6.00 per person and there are no additional charges for participating in the semis or the finals.

One man and one woman from each of the Sweepers join the top two men and top two women from each of the seven centers.

Activities began last Sunday at San Pedro for semi-finalists. Vying for eight spots in the women's ranks and eight spots in the men's. At the completion of three games these are the first finalists and the centers they represent: For the

# Brennan- Halfacre Win First Sports Ch 37 Finals

Local bowling history was made again last Sunday when 16 nervous qualifiers from seven local centers became instant "celebrities" by rolling for the cameras of Sports Channel 37.

Twenty-three year old Edward Brennan of Thunder Bowl and Holly Halfacre of Astro Bowl were the first TV winners - and they're \$200 richer to help soothe their jangled nerves.

Totally, eight men and eight women had advanced to the finals after qualifying in their leagues or in the special sweepers. The show uses the PBA TV format, except there are eight finalists rather than five.

In spite of a few technical "bugs", it was really an exciting experience for all involved in the first venture the professionals from the Channel, the proprietors who are bringing the show to local bowlers, the amateur contestants and the spectators, who were generous in their applause and acceptance of the bowler's performances.

It was also a harrowing experience for any of those who had never witnessed any actual television filming. But with nerves literally jingling they rolled their games -- and not a bowler was lost throughout the filming. Most admitted afterward, with big laughs, they WERE nervous -- but thoroughly enjoyed the experience and are starting to calculate how to qualify

again.

In this paper's opinion the show is a shot in the arm for the game of bowling -- and it's available to every bowler in the city - either through leagues in the seven participating centers or through weekly sweepers at the seven centers.

Patrick Kelly of Ponderosa kicked off the action and has the distinction of rolling the first frame for the Sports Channel 37 show even though his nervousness showed just a bit when he left the 1-2 pins on his first ball. He went down to defeat in the match to John Salem, Thousand Oaks, but we think he'll be back trying again later.

Charlie Walker, also of Ponderosa, was Salem's next victim 195-156 before Ron Korda, Thunder Bowl, slammed in a final turkey in the tenth to pull out the victory, 175-164.

Korda then advanced to meet Charles King of San Pedro who was rolling with three pins handicap (actually it's the difference between the two competitor's handicaps), and took that match 223-121. In the ensuing game he received ten sticks handicap rolling against Astro Bowl's Barry Borlinghaus, rolling with a 176 average. It was one of the closest matches with Ron eventually taking the win 191-188.

seemed more happy and relaxed than any of the finalists, but again the match went to Korda 161-148.

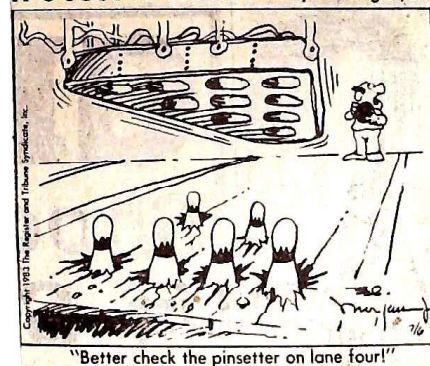

Three men and three women from each of the participating centers were attempting to earn the top 16



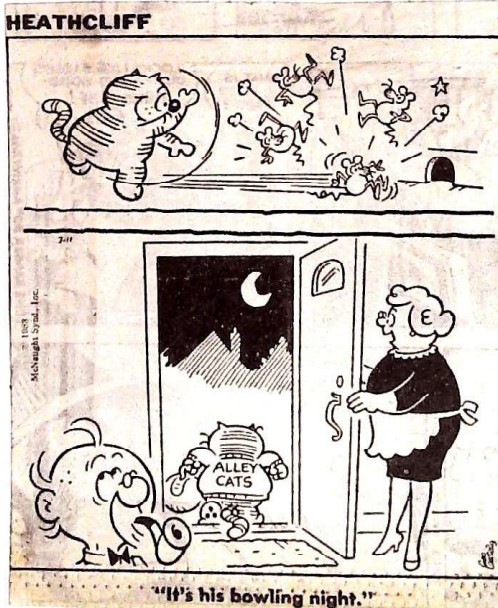
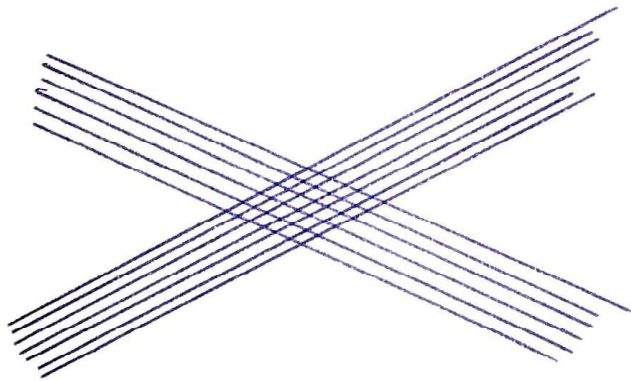

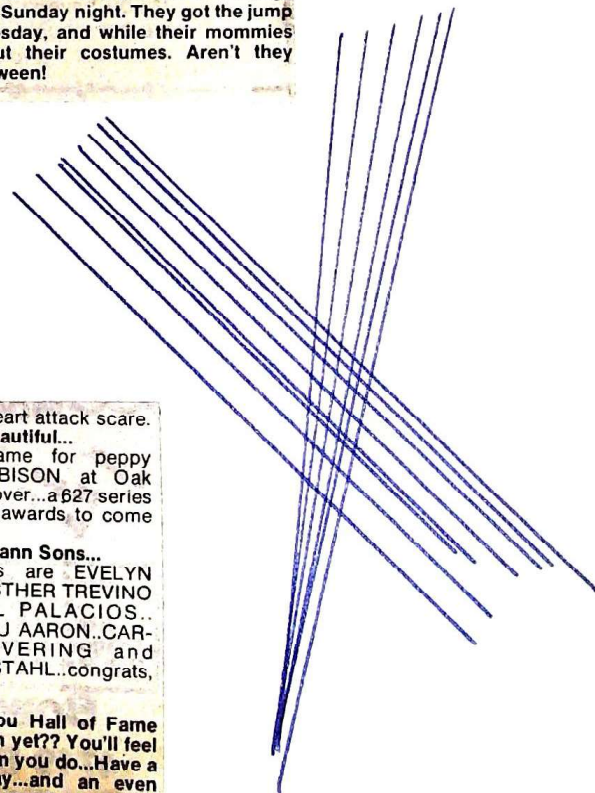

# Records Topple In SAWBA Tourney

Records toppled right and left for the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association Championship Tournament and not a ball has yet been rolled!

According to tournament director Mary E. Pfeiffer and publicity chairman Joye Duncan, the ladies of the city will be shooting at a record prize fund of \$21,042.60 (up \$4,414.55 from the previous record set last year.)

The 46th annual event which will roll the first three weekends in November will also feature a record number of doubles and singles entries as well as a record number of all events entries.

Totally this year 354 five-woman teams will be competing at Spare Time Lanes. The record entry was 365 teams in the 1977-76

event.

There will also be 722 sets of doubles in the four classes, 1,444 singles entrants at Wonder Bowl, and 1,316 all events participants.

The record doubles, singles and all events totals were set in the 1975-76 tournament. Doubles, this year, are up 66, singles 122 and all events 128.

Last year's championships drew 292 teams, with 604 sets of doubles and singles and 1120 all events.

The first team action begins at 12 noon on November 6 and at the same time the first shift of singles and doubles begin their competition across time.

Special daytime squads are also held on Friday, November 12, at noon (team event) and on Monday,

November 15, also at noon (singles and doubles).

For the first time the ladies will roll for Instant Cash but only in their team event.

The League Visitation committee of Dorris Tanner (chairman), Joye Duncan, Irene Wigginton, Lue Best, Betty Holzmann, Louise Mangelsdorf, Elfi Tomczyk and Clara Grimes, with help from the SAWBA Board members and numerous volunteers, attempted to reach every woman bowler in the city encouraging them to participate -- and their efforts generated the near-record participation.

Scorekeeping assistance is needed at the team center (Sparetime) which does not have automatic scorers. Volunteers who would like to help should contact Clara Grimes, 923-3551, or the SAWBA office (824-1321), as quickly as possible, giving the times they can assist.

Defending champion Glenda Recker will be attempting to earn her fourth city crown when she bowls with the Unpredictable Five on Friday noon, November 12. She'll be bowling her singles and doubles on the Monday noon squad.

To earn her crown last year, Glenda swatted 1713 all events in Class A, having 575 in team, 595 in doubles and 543 in singles.

Complete schedules will be available next week but the SAWBA office has sent confirmations of all events.

The SAWBA Ways and Means Committee will install the popular Bowler's Boutique in both centers, utilizing a "I Love Bowling in San Antonio" theme, and a dazzling array of gifts will be available for selection by the bowlers and their friends.

Handicap remains the same - 90% for bll men and women - but the new format should provide added excitement as the qualifiers reach for the top without bowling so many games to get there

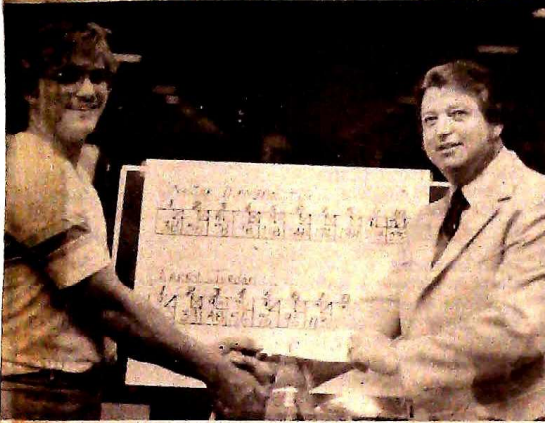
The men's show rolled for the cameras last Sunday at Thousand Oaks and with just seven month's experience on the lanes, Walter Mangan captured the men's

If I was asked to give the eulogy this morning at the funeral of **Clarence M. "Sonny" Baetz** who died Wednesday after a lengthy illness, I would have to talk of a life of service, a life of dedication to mankind and a life of love.

I'm sure Clarence never dreamed back in 1932 when his precious Helen said "yes" to his marriage proposal that they would give 32 years of their married life to the game of bowling and to bowlers. But that was their fate and as the years went by and they became an integral part of this great game, with Helen taking the lead, but always with Clarence by her side, they touched more bowler's lives than any other couple.

Clarence's dream was to celebrate their 50th anniversary with friends and family. And, on June 21 of this year this dream came true as he came out of his wheelchair to stand by Helen's side to cut a magnificent 50th anniversary wedding cake...surround by friends of a lifetime and a loving family. It was an unforgettable evening.

Clarence was the first bowler in the Baetz family, and Helen just came to watch. Years later she was to say, "I can't say I enjoyed the rough atmosphere surrounding the dingy lanes, but once I bowled myself, I enjoyed the fellowship and the people in the bowling game. I still do."

Clarence continued his bowling - never really a star as we mean the word today - but

the greatest of good sports and a man who enjoyed the fellowship that is so much a part of this game.

As Helen became more and more involved in the women's bowling administration, there, always, was Clarence to lend a helping hand - with the paper work - with the hauling of tournament supplies - and even taking more than his share of time on the typewriter in the tournament offices.

When Helen became a WIBC Director with the many many meetings, travel and conventions, along came Clarence sharing the work and the eventual honors which came Helen's way

Thousands of women who attend WIBC Conventions became his friends as well as Helen's. He and his good friend, Lee Kelone of Arkansas, husband of WIBC Vice President Theresa Kelone, were the unofficial cheering section of the women delegates - they listened attentively during legislative sessions and joined in the fun of the social functions.

But Clarence's entire wasn't just bowling. He joined the Optimist Club and lived the Optimist Creed to the fullest. A dedicated worker on all their projects, and this time with Helen at his side lending support and hours of work. Clarence was a past director and vice president of the San Antonio Optimist Club.

In 1952-53 he was named Outstanding Member, and then served as director, vice president and president of the Petroleum Center club. District-wise he was a past secretary-treasurer and Lt. Governor of the 6th District Optimist International.

During these many years he also worked with Lew Levinson at San Pedro Lanes, there again sharing the lives and loves of bowlers until a crippling stroke curtailed his activities.

One of the fondest of my memories of this gentle man came in 1970 when we worked

together on Optimist Youth Appreciation Week. Clarence was the coordinator of the week's activities for the youngsters and no stone was left unturned to really recognize the outstanding accomplishments of the youth in our high schools that year. It was the most successful project for the youngsters of the city ever held, mainly because Clarence gave it every ounce of his strength, energy and talent.

As it will to all of us, death claimed our Clarence this week, but nothing can erase the memories of this beautiful man who shared so much of himself with all of us.

Clarence and Helen had one son, Richard, who with his wife Peggy, gave Clarence and Helen three lovely grandchildren, and one great grandson, all the apple of Clarence's eyes. They had a

As in life Clarence desired no flowers. The family asks that those who desire may send memorial contributions to Boysville for further work with the youth, or to the Alamo Heights Methodist Church, a vital part of Clarence's life.

Perhaps Longfellow said it best: "Lives of great men all remind us that we can make our lives sublime, and departing, leave behind us footprints on the sand of times."

**Mrs. Phaler Dies**

Mrs. Emma Phaler, who served 38 years as WIBC executive secretary until retiring in 1965, died October 12, a week before her 100th birthday. She was a resident of St. Luke's Convalescent Home in Columbus, Ohio, and had been in poor health for several years.

Special plans had been made to honor her on her birthday, October 22.

Mrs. Phaler was elected WIBC secretary in 1927. She served in that post during a period when WIBC experienced tremendous growth. The Congress counted 5,357 members in 1927 but grew to more than 2.7 million by 1965. She worked closely with and carried out the policies of the two WIBC presidents who had the strongest impact on the development of the Congress, Mrs. Jeannette Knepprath and Mrs. Alberta E. Crowe. Mrs. Phaler was inducted into the WIBC Hall of Fame in 1965.

Mrs. Phaler was born in Junction City, Ohio, and moved to Columbus in 1888. She was married October 30, 1915, and her husband, Harry, died in 1956. Survivors are three nieces, Virginia Elskan and Lillian Henning, both of Columbus, and Edna Linn, Hollywood, Fla., and a nephew Robert Knies, Columbus.

## Senior Mixed On Tap In January

The tournament our Senior age bowlers wait for - the 14th annual Mixed Tournament for senior league bowlers is set for January 21-22-23 at San Pedro Bowling Center.

Entry is open to all members of senior citizen (those 55 years of age or older) leagues sanctioned by WIBC and ABC, provided the member has at least nine games prior to the closing date of entry, which is January 6.

The tournament features team event, doubles, singles and all events. Teams are four member - and each team must have at least one man or one woman on the roster. No more than two players may bowl together more than once and the bowler's first appearance shall count toward all events.

Doubles - either two men, two women or mixed - may be entered only once. Likewise Singles may be entered just once and singles and all events are divided into two divisions - Men and Women.

The sanctioned event

carries an entry fee of just \$5 with \$2.05 going into the prize fund. All Events are optional at a cost of \$1.00.

Each Team is handicapped - 80% from 800, doubles from 400 and singles from 200. Entering averages in most cases are 21 or more games taken from the previous winter leagues or as of midnight, May 31 as listed in the Yearbook. For others, information concerning entering averages is spelled out on the entry forms which are available at all lanes.

Action will begin at 1 p.m. on January 21 for team event, and there's another squad on Sunday, January 23 at 11 a.m. Doubles and Singles will roll on Saturday, January 22 at 1 p.m. and again on Sunday, January 23 at 2 p.m. If necessary, additional squads will be added if warranted.

Completed entry forms with fees are to be mailed to the SAWBA office, P.O. Box 16427, San Antonio, Tx. 78216.

# Kathy Kirst Takes SAWBA Local Tournament Title

The SAWBA 46th Championship tournament may go into the record books as the "tourney of the lefties", after three of the top spots, including Local Champion, went to distaff bowlers who pound the 1-2 pocket.

Kathy Kirst, who won the 42nd SAWBA City title with a 1796 All Events total (when the tournament was at Oak Hills and Southside in 1977-78), repeated the feat this year with 506 in team event, 640 in doubles and 614 in singles--for a 1760 scratch all events total. With her 179 book average she received 151 pins handicap to also capture the first spot on the handicap list with 1911.

The flu bug on the first weekend prevented Kathy from rolling but she came back as a sub with the "5" Lefties team (where she had the 509) but on her second effort put in the tournament high series of 653.

In doubles Kathy, rolling as the defending Cl. A Champion with her mother (who didn't help much this year with games of 149, 138 and 182) put in a whopping 640 series.

Kathy was not selected in the Women's Top 20 this year--and rightly so--after rolling just 33 games in league (according to the Yearbook) to post her 179 average, but lately has seen more action in TTBA tournaments and house events.

The Class A singles scratch title went to Pat Rinn, who like

Kathy, aims at the 1-2 pocket. The personable Northeast Baptist Hospital employee, put in her 626 scratch score on opening weekend, and no one in the class was able to top her. Pat also is in second in A Singles, behind Pat Martin who rolled with 79 pins handicap to post a 692 total (614 scratch).

Cl. A doubles were won by the talented left-handed duo of Amy Edison and June Miller who swatted 1150 scratch and 1277 handicap in Class A. Amy contributed 538 and June slammed in 612 to grab the title.

The Top Choice quintet of Liz Smith (555), Linda Townsend (543), Nancy Dwyer (592), Laura Hampton (459) and Donna Wallace (610) captured the Cl. A team scratch title with 2759 on the second weekend.

On the final day of the tournament the Middle Age Crazies went crazy to grab the first place handicap title when they swatted a 3088 team total.

All Champions will be guests of SAWBA at an annual award party set for January 9 at Hermann Sons Rathskellar.

The near record tournament featured \$21,042.60 prize fund for the 354 teams, 722 sets of doubles, 1444 singles and 1316 optional all events.

The new feature - Instant Cash - once the bugs were worked out after the opening weekend, proved to be a popular feature with the bowlers. Approximately \$2,000 was paid out to those lucky enough to string out a few strikes or convert splits.

200 pins were handed out by the hundreds as Kay Schreefer claimed hers for a beautiful 258 game (tournament high). Kay is a 157 averager and additionally will receive a WIBC Century Patch for 101 pins over her average, plus a SAWBA 250 award for her "first".

In the Senior standings, Virginia Clifton carded the high game (238) and the high series (576). SAWBA gives just one award therefore the second high game, which was rolled by Billie Lindeman, who had 212, will also receive a trophy.

Other WIBC awards were earned by Dolly Mampel who converted the Big Four in doubles; All Spare Games: Chris Onofre (182), Beverly Hollowich (183), and Triplicate Scores: Shirley Curry 132 and Nancy Geiger 146.

The SAWBA Board extends thank to all the members who participate in the tournament and to the many many volunteers who helped make it a success.

The Official Prize Fund will be posted at all lanes as quickly as tournament director Mary Pfeiffer has again re-checked all the scores and placings.

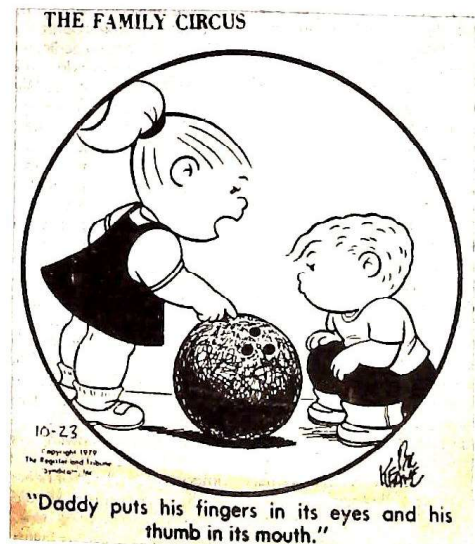

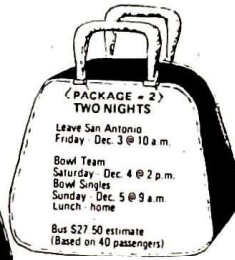
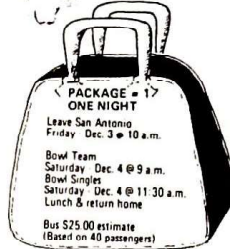

## State Senior Mixed Rolls In Dallas This Weekend

Tournament manager Sylvia Broyles advises that the Council officials are delighted with the increased entry in the second outing for the Seniors. There are 168 four-member teams scheduled, an increase over last year's opener of 58 teams. Additionally there are 310 singles entries in the men's

division, a big increase over the 186 entered last year, and 307 women's singles entrants, also an increase over last year's 176 entries.

Defending champions, expected to roll again in Dallas are the Academy Surplus team

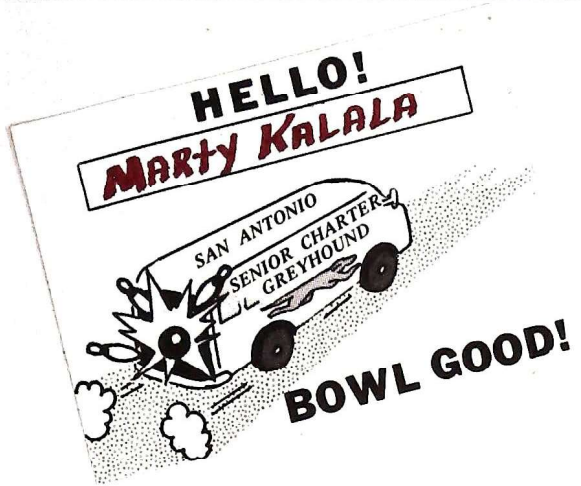
of Austin who posted a 2505 to win the first title.

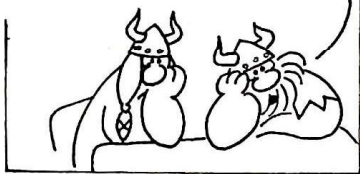

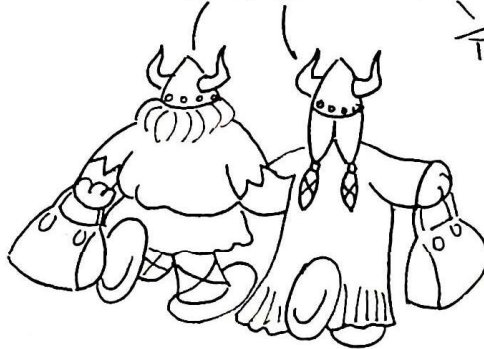

Individually in women's singles it was Dollie Hoskins on top for the ladies with a 720, and in third was Larry Porrini, with 698, holding down the third spot in men's singles.

In optional all events Doris Lewis has 1301 to lead Class C and SAWBA Director Jean Jenkins has 1354 to lead Class D.

Larry Porrini's 1489 is tops in Class B for the men.

In the 2nd staging of the State Senior Mixed, men and women ranging in age from 55 to 90 displayed their bowling talents and proved that the game of American tenpins is for all ages.

Lil Poole, President of the Texas State Bowling Council, served as Mistress of Ceremonies, and Fay Browning, Garland, gave the invocation, followed by the official welcome from Mayor Pro-Tem Don Hicks of Dallas. Members of the State Bowling Council were introduced by Poole. She announced also that the tournament would continue to be a project of the council and expressed her pleasure at the record entry of 168 teams, 617 singles, a considerable increase over

the first tournament.

Tournament director Sylvia Broyles welcomed the bowlers and reminded them that they are qualifying for the National Senior Championship Tournament with their six game all events in age classifications of A-70 and over; B-65 to 69; C-60-64 and D-55-59. The National Tournament will be held in Niagara Falls in May of 1983.

Competition will continue next weekend when more senior bowlers from around the state will attempt to reign as a champion senior bowler from Texas.

The TWBA and TSBA have paid the entry fees for the state qualifiers participating in the national event. The Council sold pins for the purpose of assisting with the travel expenses of the national participants.

Apple was an added member from the same league, after regular teammates were unable to compete.

Apple, a 162 averager, had games of 182, 183 and 148 for 513. Jeanette Samuel, who joined the team with a 106 average a few years back, swatted games of 115, 136 and 189 with her 146 average. Roy Alvarado, 160 average, had 209, 184 and 139 for 528, and anchor and captain, Harry E. Neff, president of the Oak Hills seniors, was fantastic with 226, 173 and 215 (614 scratch) in spite of leaving the "lily" during his play. Neff was rolling with a 173 average.

Neff credits the acquisition of a new bowling ball a few weeks ago with his success during the tournament. All four of the new senior champion team are retired. "We weren't thinking about winning anything," said Captain Neff, "we were just enjoying the tournament and having a good time together. It was a great feeling when our scorer (Jim Flanner) told us we had just taken over first place," he added.

The team was royally saluted by their league-mates when it was announced Monday at Oak Hills that they were the new city champions for the seniors.

Lois Daniells will share her Senior, Singles honors with Elden H. Yarbor, who won the men's division. It was quite a thrill for the 57-year-old Yarbor, who's bowled for many years, but had a 15-year sabbatical from the lanes. It was his first senior attempt, and he won the division in flashy style.

Yarbor slammed in an opening 230 game, which was 75 pins over his average and an award score for the seniors. He went on to a 183 and a 144 for a scratch 557, 679 handicap to capture the title.

Yarbor rolls in three leagues and he and his wife, Mary, have been married 29 years. They have three children.

Dolores Cavazos, a 145

average, earned a WIBC patch for a triplicate score of 152 in her singles event.

Jesse Cuellar had the top game of the senior tournament, when he entered with a league average of 163, and swatted a 246 game - tournament high for the men.

Dollie Hoskins, state senior mixed champion, whose trophy was presented by Sylvia Broyles, tournament director, for the State Bowling Council, prior to the local competition,

slammed in the women's high game of the tournament - a 223.

According to tournament director Helen Kalala of SAWBA, a record 64 teams competed this year for a prize fund of \$1,753.20. Prize lists will be posted at all lanes for seven days after which checks will be mailed by February 10. First place team and individual winners will receive their trophies during their regular league play.
