At The Summit:

Debbie Lauzon Hits 300

It's been just a year since a woman rolled a 300 game in our city, but Debbie Lauzon turned the trick last Tuesday night at The Summit - and it was not only Debbie's first 300 game, but the first for the city's newest center at Universal City.



Debbie opened her league play in the Ladies Classic league with a 192 game then put in twelve perfect balls into the pocket for her 300 and completed her series with a 181, for a 673 series.

Well -- maybe not quite 12 perfect balls -- since manager Frank Hunt tells us he almost had a heart attack when the 7-9 on Debbie's final ball were "slow to fall". "It was really ther," said Hunt, in describing Debbie's game, "but I don't even know what tripped the 7-9, but the noise when they fell was near-deafening."

Hunt presented Debbie with a \$300 check for her brilliant bowling.

Debbie, who's been away

from San Antonio for a year or so, working in Colorado, was using an old Bonanza and rolling with a 177 average. She's also in line for a WIBC Century patch for her game.

Debbie was the 1978 SAWBA local champion with an 1804 all events total, and has been a finalist in the Texas Women's Bowling Association Bluebonnet Queens tournament, scheduled to roll March 4-5 at Wonder Bowl this year. She's also signed up for this weekend's Top 20 Challenge at All Star.

Only six other women have accomplished Debbie's feat and rolled sanctioned 300 games: Myrt DeFily in 1958, Dottie Overstreet in 1962, Shirley Mansfield 1967, Bettie Jo Geisler 1973, Rita Dalton in 1981 and Liz Smith last season.

Queens Deadline Is Tuesday

Tuesday -- February 1 -- is the last day for ladies to get their entries in for the Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament and all entries MUST be postmarked by that day -- so if you gals have been hesitating -- don't do it any longer. Entry blanks are at the SAWBA office or from Sylvia Broyles, tournament director, at 497-3031 -- and a quick trip to the post office before Tuesday. Sylvia's mail box has been packed with last minute entries each day -- and San Antonio wants that Queens entry record of 207 -- let's go get it.

The tournament is open to all women across the state, and with just a \$42.50 entry fee, it's an opportunity to pit your skills against all the ladies of Texas. Action will begin at Wonder Bowl at 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 5. Semi finals are at 8 p.m. that night, and the 14-game match game finals begin Sunday, March 6 at 10 a.m.

The format calls for Squad A to bowl four games qualifying, beginning at 10 a.m. Saturday, and returning for the second four-game block at 3 p.m. Squad B begins action at 12:30 p.m. and returns at 5:30 p.m.

The field will be cut to the top 36 for the semifinal round and the field is cut then to the top 14 who follow a 14-game schedule bowling headsup match play. Finalists begin at zero and earn 30 bonus point for each match won.

The Queen is awarded \$525, a trophy and the jeweled necklace symbolic of the Queens title.

Special prizes are awarded by TWBA for the high four game block and for the high game by a non-semifinalist.

Based on 185 entries, the total prize fund is \$4612 plus \$50 for the special awards.

According to Sylvia the majority of the former Queens and the defending champion Regina Hillier, Amarillo, who has won the event three times, are expected.

It's not too late to enter -- but ladies must hurry. Deadline is Tuesday, but entries may be obtained by calling Sylvia or the SAWBA office (824-1321). Completed entries -- postmarked prior to Tuesday -- are to be mailed with fees to Sylvia at P. O. Box 32024, San Antonio, TX 78216.

Candy Malone And David Grasshoff Win Top Twenties At All Star

The two Top Twenty Invitationals staged by Bobby Scales at All Star were all anyone could have asked for, outstanding bowling and exceptional scoring.

Candy Malone copped the women's title over 54 of Texas' most outstanding fems, and David Grasshoff of Houston, walked away with the \$1,000 in the men's event which featured a full field of 90 bowlers.

Overall in the women's event there were 70 games over the 200 mark and in the men's 216. Gloria Cichon had the women's high game of 262.

The tournament offered \$5,000 for the first 300 game shot in the event, and big George Lee, who rolls at Astro Bowl, nearly gave Bobby a heart attack in game number 2 when he strung 11 in a row before failing to strike with his 12th ball. He left the 2-10.

The men's champion is the current Houston "Bowler of the Year" (they select based on highest series rolled during the year, and David had an 822). He averaged 225.7 for his 10 games in the Top 20 to earned his biggest single paycheck to date.

The affable 21 year old lefty was rolling with a Columbia Yellow Dot and opened with 193, 205, 278, 290 (when he left the 2 pin) and 225. In his second five he had games of 203, 199, 212, 231, and 221 for 2257.

David bowls at Del Mar Lanes in Houston carrying a current league average of 223 (215 year book). After bowling in the DBA tournament in Houston Saturday night, the fresh new talent to our scene, drove from Houston leaving at 7:30 a.m. He's a former runner up in the DBA, who has seven 300 games

to his credit (2 turned down). He also has a 299-815 in league play.

Known as "Grasshopper" in Houston, he's an Accounting Assistant for Occidental Life.

An absolutely beaming Candy Malone at tournament's end, was just six sticks ahead of Dallas' Susie Reichley in the final standings. She had an opening five game block which included games of 226, 203, 191, 174 and 176 before the 30 minute break allowed for the ladies.

She came roaring back with 201, dropped to 164, then polished off her ten games with 186, 204 and 234 for a nifty 1959.

Candy's competed in California semi-pro events, and came to San Antonio two summers ago. She was transferred to Colorado for a short spell before returning to action on San Antonio lanes. She's currently employed at Fort Sam Houston's Brooke Army Medical Center.

Reichley, the first Bluebonnet Queen, an All Events Champion for WIBC (1968), and former state team champion, is well-known in San Antonio. She and her partner Merrill Alexander, also in the Top 20 field, but just out of the money, set a WIBC record doubles score last year when they posted a 1498. Alexander has the highest triplicate score in WIBC, a 268.

But Saturday, Susie says she just missed to many spares. Her first five games were 180, 193, 209, 225 and 181 for a 988. After the break she had 169, 202, 223, 187 and 184 to take the runner up paycheck of \$250.

Both Candy and Susie will be

in the field again when the Bluebonnet Queens tournament is held March 5-6 at Wonder Bowl.

Runnerup for the men's Top 20 was 19 year Eddie Dzierzanowski who does his bowling at Ponderosa Bowl. Eddie D's been in the ABC ranks just two years and bowls in four leagues, carrying averages from 199 to 215. He just had a 288 game with a 775 high series in league play, and he proudly says his coaches are his parents, Sharon and Ed, Sr.

Eddie got off to a slow start with a 155 game Sunday, but then he put his game in high gear and added 185, 201, 258, 280 in the first five. He closed out with 228, 224, 225, 188 and 225 to post a total 2170. He earned 1600 for his showing.

The men were really on target Sunday swatting 16 games over the 250 mark. George Lee's 298 of course led the list, followed by: David Grasshoff 290; 280 by Eddie Dzierzanowski, a 279 by Larry Reynolds, 278 by Grasshoff, 267 by Larry Syring; 266 John Williamson; 264's by Al Vasquez and Carl Jenkins of Kerrville, and 258's by Eddie D, Williamson and Luis Benavides of Kerrville.

George Nino popped in a 257, Danny Broadway, Houston, had a 256; Brian Teeters 255 and 252 by Larry Syring.

In addition to the hefty guaranteed first places was a sidepot for the competitors. Fifty of the women participated and \$50 each was awarded to these gals: Donna Wallace 247, Pat Rinn 225, Gloria Cichon 262, Stevie Piotrowski 231, Debbye Berry (Ft. Worth) 236, Ursula Webb 225, Margie Rountree (Houston) 225, Shannon Bell 246, Candy Malone 204, (tie for 10th game) Merrill Alexander, Dallas, and Malone 234.

\$82 side pots for each game were paid to Luis Benevides, Kerrville; 258 game, George Lee 298, David Grasshoff 278, David Grasshoff 290, Eddie Dzierzanowski 280, Danny Broadway (Houston) 256, Carl Jenkins, Kerrville, 264, Larry Reynolds 226, George Nino 257, an da tie on the 10th game; Jay Hild and Milt Syring 267.

In the women's event out of towners were from Dallas, Houston, New Braunfels, Fort Worth and Killeen. The men came from Bay Town, Houston, Pleasanton, New Braunfels, Kerrville, Highlands, Richmond, Crosby, College Station, Rosenberg and Magnolia. In the men's competition there was a "waiting list" for a spot in the tournament, and Scales,

Linda Sovo and Edgar Dear operated in a smooth and efficient tournament manner as they handled the office procedures for the two big events. Scales also generated additional sponsor-money to enrich the prize for the bowlers who participated.

Bluebonnet Queens Has Record Entry

We said in our first issue of the New Year that San Antonio was in store for a GREAT year in bowling -- and it's already proving true.

Bobby Scales had a record field in his men's Top Twenty - the San Antonio 600 Club is expecting a full field probably with one added squad -- and now the Texas Bluebonnet Queen entry record has been broken, according to tournament director Sylvia Broyles.

The Queens is TWBA's premiere event for the state's women, and since San Antonio already has the all-time high Championship Tournament entry, set in 1981, when 3086 teams rolled here, it's not surprising that there should also be a Bluebonnet Queens record when San Antonio is hostess.

At press time, according to Sylvia, 221 entries have been

received, and she has to wait a day or two for any mail postmarked February 1. The previous record was held by Austin when the Queens drew 207 entries.

Ladies from the SAWBA Board will be contacting bowling friends to help provide food for the Queens Hospitality Room, which will be open at Wonder Bowl for the Queen's convenience.

The Queens tournament is open to all Texas women bowlers and features a first place prize of \$525 plus other royal gifts from TWBA.

Local associations are encouraged throughout the year to send their local champions or the lady with that city's highest average. San Antonio will be represented by Local Champion Kathy Kirst in the competition.

It's a grueling two days of competition for the distaffers. Each lady rolls eight games of qualifying on Saturday (in two four game blocks). The top 36 advance to the semi-finals for another 4 game block Saturday evening. The field is then cut to the top 14 finalists who engage in heads-up-match play for 14 straight games.

TWBA president Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls, secretary Lil Poolle, Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi, Beverly McLendon, Houston, join Sylvia in the tournament office, and the pace is rapid and efficient as they process scores and keep the squads running on time.

There's no admission charge for the Queens competition and bowling-watchers will be treated to a great show as the state's finest womens bowlers demonstrate their skills for two days.

Defending champion is Regina Hillier, Amarillo, a perky righthander who is a former Alberta E. Crowe "Star of Tomorrow". Regina has the distinction of being the only Texas woman to earn the Queen's crown three times. She earned the title in 1979, 1981 and 1982 and will be in the field on March 5-6.

BVL On Tap Feb 13-26

Would you pay one dollar for a chance to earn \$100 --- that's a pretty fair investment on your money.

You'll have that chance when the annual BVL Tournament begins to roll during your league play. All San Antonio bowlers can enter by paying one dollar at the night's beginning, and scores will count toward the sizable BVL prize fund.

You may enter the BVL Tournament each time you bowl in your regular league from February 13-26. League secretaries will be asked to assist the two associations by distributing the entry forms to their league members and collecting the \$1 fee.

The event is handicapped 80% for women, 75% for men and all bowlers will use their average as of the night they participate.

From the one dollar entry fee each contestant will be generating 70¢ for the BVL Fund which is administered by the National Bowling Council.

San Antonio had a record donation last year and with your help we can surpass that donation this year.

Three Enter Hall Of Fame At Gala Banquet

"We thank you for the memories and contributions to the game - for without you Hall Of Famers - Bowling wouldn't be the same"...that was part of the poem Boerne's Ray Minor read Saturday night at Woodlake Country Club, as Tom Dugosh, Bettie Jo Geisler and Wes Merck were formally inducted into the San Antonio Bowling Council Hall of Fame.

The ballroom at Woodlake was jammed to capacity - with old friends renewing friendships - proud family members meeting honoree's friends - and bowlers enjoying the recognition of their friends.

Council president Ed Crabb opened the evening's program and presented each of the inductees with their Hall of Fame pins. The invocation was given by Charles Altman of the San Antonio Bowling Association, and Columbia's Senior Vice President of Sales, Pepper Martin, served as the evening's master of ceremonies.

Ray Minor traced the career of Tom Dugosh from his birth in Bandera to his arrival in Boerne in 1927 - his work with the youngsters of the day stressing his patience in teaching and working with the youngsters before there was an organized junior program.

Dugosh's trade was as an automobile mechanic and he advanced to dealer status in Boerne having one of the most successful small auto dealerships in the country. Upon retirement he volunteered his time at the Boerne Turn Verien Club. He has the enviable record over his 16 years at the club of never having a mechanical failure which postponed or delayed a tournament or league play.

He was the financial savior of the Club after a disastrous fire destroyed their lanes and his expertise in lane maintenance was shared with bowlers in Mexico on a goodwill-educational and bowling trip.

He was quite a bowler in his day - advancing from a two finger grip with a wooden ball - and carrying averages in the 190s and a career high series of 726.

Veterans of the game chuckled at his escapades on his first trip to the ABC tournament in Minnesota in the 40's.

As his proud family - his lovely wife, Mary, two sons and a daughter, a sister and other relatives - listened the now frail 83 year old attempted to tell the banquet guests of his pride at receiving Hall of Fame honor. Much of the program which was tape-recorded he was unable to hear, but a copy of the remarks will be presented to him. "I can't wait to read all the lies Ray just told you," he joked, "but I just want to thank everyone who had any part of this night. It is really the greatest thing that has ever happened to me."

Tears of joy appeared in many eyes as banquet guest

gave Dugosh a standing ovation for his years of dedication to the game and his outstanding bowling accomplishments.

Bob White, former manager of Oak Hills Lanes, called radiant Bettie Jo Geisler to stand beside him as he told that Bettie Jo, too, was a Bandera native, who's bowling career may not have been begun had not the roof of the old Tips Bowling Center needed repair.

Bettie Jo's father was a building contractor who was repairing the roof when Bettie Jo tried her hand on the lanes-- which led to an illustrious career, which is continuing today.

Bettie Jo's won team championships, city championships and tournament championships," said Bob. And that doesn't nearly tell her story. Her finest year may have been in 1963 when she won the Mr. & Mrs. Tournament, the Texas State Match Game Doubles, the

City Championship, the City Match Game singles and the Martha Washington all events title...all in one season.

More than ten times she's been included in the Top Twenty and won that tournament in 1974. Twice she has won the 600 Club singles title and was a doubles champion (with Jerry Johnson, who had tears in her eyes over the honor being bestowed on her partner) from 1963 through 1968.

There have been so many bowling accomplishments in her life, but one of their biggest thrills must have been the 300 game rolled in 1973. She also has a 299 to her credit and she has two series over 700.

Bettie Jo was a former Perry Shankle employee, and a member of the staff of Columbia Industries before coming to Oak Hills lanes 12 years ago with Harold Stone. She not only takes care of

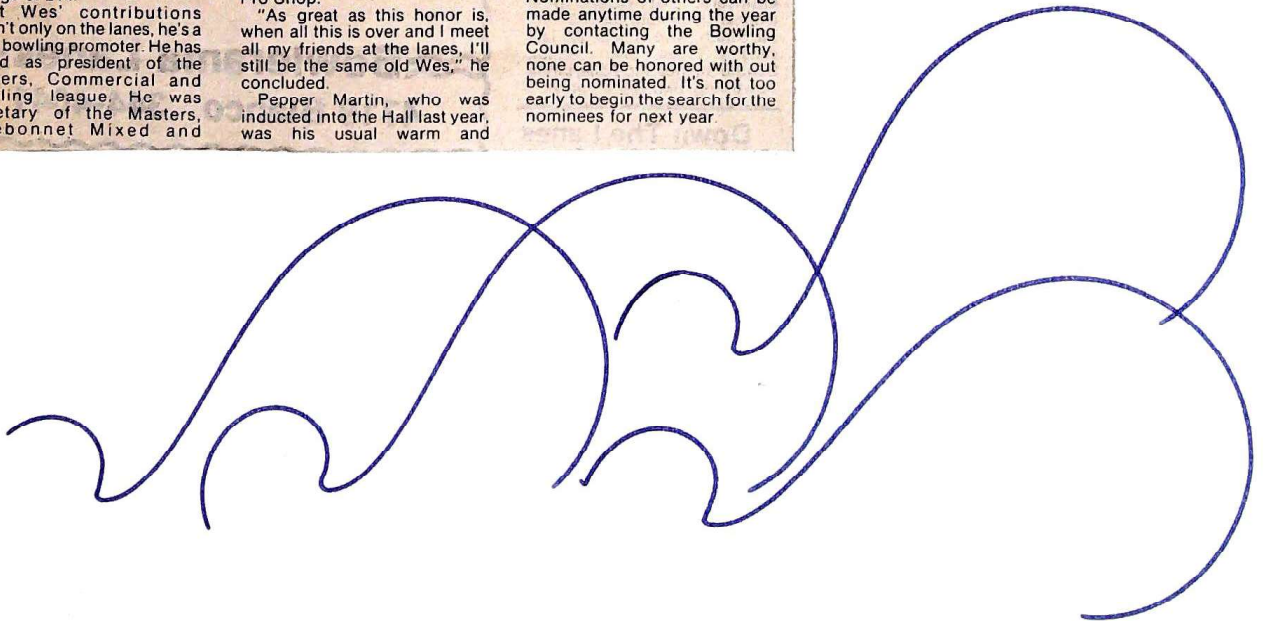
"As great as this honor is, when all this is over and I meet all my friends at the lanes, I'll still be the same old Wes," he concluded.

Mande, Alma Miller, Tootsie Phillips, Stevie Piotrowski, Ida Lynn Quinters, Pat Rinn, local singles champion, Cindi Smith, Liz Smith, who shot a 300 last season, Jaye Jean Smith, Scottie Steines, Flo Tolle, Linda Townsend, and Gene Vineys.

Completing the local list are Gertrude Vorpahl, Darlene Wallis, Annie Webb, Jean Wentz, Brenda K. Whitley and Carolyn Wilcoxon.

Tournament director Sylvia Broyles expressed delight over the record entry and extended thanks to all the local participants who are making the Queens such a success.

The 1983 Queens hopefuls will roll eight games of qualifying (in two-game four blocks) on Saturday, March 5, at Wonder Bowl. The top 36 ladies will advance to the semi-final round (4 additional games) that night at 8 p.m. After the semi-final round the field is again cut to the top 14 who will begin play on Sunday morning (10 a.m.) using a head-to-head match game format with the winner receiving 30 bonus points for each match won. After 26 games in two days, the 1983 Queen will be the lady with the highest pinfall, plus bonus points.

The 1983 Queens will be a star-studded affair statewide featuring seven past Queens, nine previous State Champions and representatives from 35 different bowling associations across the state making up the 235 spots in the field.

On the final squad Sunday, 143-averager Josie Lopez hit 520, while partner, Gloria Lopez, had 529 to capture fourth with 1286.

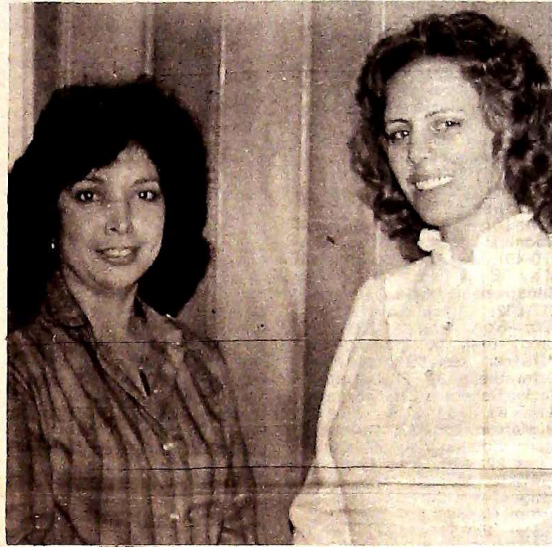
Low to cash on the unofficial list was 1217, and 41 places will be paid.

\$1.6 Million Prize Fund for WIBC !!

\$215,000 Added for Las Vegas

Entrants in the 64th WIBC Championship Tournament in Las Vegas got an unexpected bonanza today when it was announced that \$215,678 is being re-allocated to the already record prize fund.

Helen Baker, Cocoa Beach, Fla., WIBC president, revealed that the additional prize money will create a total prize fund of \$1,617,878, surpassing any payoff anywhere in bowling history.

The final entry figures show 14,430 five-woman teams entered, compared to the

previous record of 9,688 in Milwaukee, Wis., in 1977.

WIBC received 17,696 entries but refunded 3,266 due to lack of time in the schedule. When the 1973 WIBC was held in Las Vegas, the entry was a record 9,644 teams.

Thus, more than 75,000 women will bowl in the 83-day event across the 106 lanes at the Showboat, starting April 7 and concluding July 1. The schedule was extended twice but ultimately had to be closed when it became physically impossible to handle more

teams.

Two factors helped produce the extra \$215,678 in prize money. The volume of the entry resulted in the total expense, fees exceeding the more constant expenses of tournament operation. In addition, high interest rates at the time entry fees were deposited and invested produced extra revenue. More than 3,000 checks were returned to team captains without depositing.

The re-allocation was \$1 per bowler per event in the team, doubles and singles.

"It goes without saying that we are overwhelmed at the magnitude of almost everything connected with our 1983 tournament," said Mrs. Baker. "And we are delighted to be able to return a portion of the entry fee in the form of prize money."

First place prizes in all divisions were revised upward because of the tournament entry and added money. For example, first place in Open and Division I team events will be \$5,000 and Division II \$3,500, compared to \$2,700, \$2,900 and \$2,300, respectively, last year.

Hall Of Fame Honors To Former Queen Evelyn Lanier

Evelyn Lanier of Austin has been selected as the twenty second member of the Texas Women's Bowling Association prestigious Hall of Fame.

There are two categories in the Hall of Fame - meritorious service and performance of the game. Mrs. Lanier was selected in the outstanding performance category.

Evelyn Lanier has been an active bowler for thirty years. During this time she has won many awards, bringing honor to her

hometown of Austin and to the State of Texas. She has a lifetime high game of 300 and a high series of 734.

The first year she bowled, 1953, Evelyn won Class B doubles in her city championships. Since then she has gone on to win team championships, be City Champion as all events winner, roller her first 700 series (also the first for Austin), became State Champion in 1962 with an all events score of 1833 pins, won and placed in Texas All Stars and competed in National All Stars competition.

In 1963, Lanier was the first woman in Austin to bowl a 300 game. That same year she won State Class A Doubles. Later she was to be a State Team champion as a member of the Columbia 300 team, third in the nation with a 198 average, received Honorable Mention for Women's All America team, and was one of only fifty women invited to participate in a World event in Chicago.

Mrs. Lanier is a former winner of Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament, a grinding two day event for high average women bowlers.

In 1977, she was chosen as Texas Woman Bowler of the Year. She has bowled and placed in the U.S. Open and in 1974, received recognition from the Women's International Bowling Congress for having maintained a composite average of 192 over a ten year period.

In addition to her outstanding performances on the lanes, Lanier has been an active bowling administrator, having served in league offices since 1954, as a member of the Austin association Board of Directors, and has assisted with two State Tournaments when they were held in Austin.

She is married to Chris Lanier and the mother of four children. Most outstanding about Evelyn Lanier, however, is her personality and her attitude toward the game she loves. She has unbounding enthusiasm, is cheerful and outgoing - revels in the accomplishments of her peers, and is ever ready with encouragement for beginner bowlers and youngsters.

Lanier's formal induction into the Texas WBA Hall of Fame will be on May 20, 1983 at the San Angelo convention center, site of the state annual meeting.

Led by Kathy LeCroy, Fort Worth, and Doris Covington, of Montgomery County (Conroe), who have two each listed in the TWBA record book, other perfect game shooters, and the year they shot them, are: Myrt DeFily, San Antonio, 1958; Evelyn Lanier, Austin, 1965; Luci Bonneau, Houston, 1977; Margie Rountree, Houston, 1978; Gloria Alderman, Fort Worth, 1979; Gerry Brock, Houston, 1979; defending Queen Regina Hillier, Amarillo, 1980; Connie Heard, Houston, 1980; Reita McDonough, Tyler, 1981; Liz Smith, San Antonio, who's 300 came last season; Sammie Pope, Wichita Falls, also last season; and Debbie Lauzon, San Antonio, who just had her 300 game approved by WIBC.

Also in the field this year will be these ladies who have rolled 299 games (with the years the games were rolled): Merrill Alexander, Dallas 1972; Margie Rountree, Houston, 1976; Mickie Archer, Arlington, 1981; plus... Kathy LeCroy and Fran Lary each have sanctioned 298s to their credit. Kathy's was in 1979 and Fran's was at Burkburnett, the same year.

The first 300 game rolled by a TWBA member was in 1946, when Beryl Cox (she's not in the field this year) turned the trick in Houston.

Only Merrill Alexander, Dallas, is in the field with an 800 series to her credit. Merrill, Sharon Graff (Johnson County) and Sue Sewell (Houston) have reached that plateau in Texas. Sharon and Sue are not in this year's field. Merrill's 804 came in 1980 when she shot a 268 triplicate at Hart Bowl in Dallas in a doubles league with Susie Reichley, the first Bluebonnet Queen, and they posted the highest doubles score to that time in WIBC history.

San Antonio Welcomes The Queens!

It's bluebonnet time - even before we've seen the lovely state flower blooming on the highways -- but this weekend, it's a different kind of bluebonnets -- the prestigious TWBA Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament with a record entry of 235! The 235 entrants have their sights set on the total prize fund of \$5,822.00 - the first place check of \$600 - the gorgeous diamond-studded pendant made into a Queen's crown--And the prestigious title earned by just ten ladies previously.

Many eyes will follow the progress of Regina Hillier, the defending champion from Amarillo, who holds the distinction of being the only three-time queen. The pert brunette, who's indeed easy on the eyes, won the crown in 1979, 1981 and 1982.

She has her work cut out for her this year as there are six other former queens - the first, Susie Reichley, Dallas, who just placed second in San Antonio's Top Twenty Invitational, Beverly Pantuso, the 1972 Queen, and our only monarch; Fran Lary, Burkburnett, Evelyn Lanier, Austin, 1976 Queen; Donna Dillon, Dallas, whose dazzling display of pin topping in 1977 and 1978 earned the first back-to-back title; and bubbly Gloria Alderman, Fort Worth, the only lefthanded Queen, who won her title in 1980.

Kathy Kirst, as local champion from the 1982 SAWBA City Tournament will lead the San Antonio delegates onto Wonder Bowl lanes and 55 more local ladies will follow. Local entries totalled 53 at closing time, February 1, however, Tournament Director Sylvia Broyles has placed four more in the Queens field as substitutes bringing our total to 56, our largest entry. Those substitutes are Robin Bush, Maggie McFadden, Ann Martin and Ann Perkins.

The field is also dotted with previous State Champions: Sue Kingham, Houston (1960), Evelyn Lanier, Austin (1962), Beverly McLendon, Houston (1970), Fran Lary, Burkburnett (1976), Nell Jordan, two-time champion from Killeen, and the reigning State Champion entered by TWBA; Sherrie Slaughter, Fort Worth (1978), Jane Galbreath, Austin (1980) and Laurie Jo Scales of our city who won the 1981 State title when the tournament was at the Palace in 1981.

It's a tough two days of

bowling when the ladies roll 26 games in two days. In addition to the 36 places paid in the tournament, special prizes are awarded to non-semi-finalists. The woman who rolls the high four game block but does not make the finals, and the person with the highest qualifying game who does not make the finals, each earn \$25.00.

In addition to the Queen's many other awards, she also receives a paid entry into the 1984 event set for Pat Dickey's Super Bowl in Conroe (Montgomery County).

There's no admission to watch Texas finest -- and best looking -- women bowlers, so drop by anytime during the day or night on Saturday and for the finals on Sunday which begin promptly at 10 a.m.

Bluebonnet Queens time could be a time for tournament managers to watch the efficiency and speed which the TWBA Queens Committee displays as they smoothly move more than 200 contestants across the lanes from qualifying through the finals.

Chaired by Sylvia Broyles, since 1972, the Committee work is almost year-round, as she promotes Queens entries wherever she goes. Texas woman bowlers rewarded her this year with a record-entry in her own home town.

"The amount of work

involved in staging this type of event for our members never bothers us," said Syl graciously. "It's been a joy to watch the Queens grow, and each year we have set our sights on a new record entry -- and the ladies have responded. I truly am pleased that we have a new record right here in San Antonio, but even more importantly, we thank all the ladies who participate."

Sylvia's work began late last year when hundreds of entries were mailed out across the state to local associations - urging them

to enter their City Champions or the lady with their association's highest average. Hundreds of entries were mailed to past participants as well.

Working closely with Sylvia throughout it all have been TWBA president Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls, whose nimble fingers fly lighting over the calculator keys as scores are tabulated after each game in the qualifying and the finals.

Lil Poole, TWBA secretary, Beverly McLendon, Houston and Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi, all take turns handling the

mounds of paperwork involved, and keeping the tourney moving smoothly.

Scores are checked in the office in record-time and the huge standings board is kept up to date after each shift - names in black are in the "plus" column - those in red are in the "minus" column.

Their hours begin long before the first Queens hopeful arrives and last long after the Queens have departed the center.

But it's always with wide smiles - and usually a hug - that they greet contestants and happy winners late

Sunday afternoon after the bowling is completed, checks awarded and of course, the placing of the Queen's crown on the head of the winner.

Scheduling this year's record entry alone would send most tournament directors to the Excedrin bottle several times -- but the TWBA Bluebonnet Queens Committee takes it in stride -- smiles happily -- and plans for an even greater event for next year!

Here's the Time Schedule for the 14th Annual TWBA BLUEBONNET QUEENS TOURNAMENT at Wonder Bowl - March 5-6

QUALIFYING ROUND:

The qualifying round will consist of eight games across sixteen lanes -- bowled in two four-game blocks on Saturday:

Squad A: 10 a.m. returning at 3 p.m.

Squad B: 12:30 p.m. returning at 5:30 p.m.

SEMI FINAL ROUND:

The semi final round consists of four games across eight lanes Saturday night beginning approximately 8 p.m. Should a tie result for the final spot, a one game rolloff will be bowled immediately after completion of the round. Bowlers will draw for starting lanes, and the bowler on the odd numbered lane will start the rolloff. In the event a tie exists after this match, one extra frame will be rolled.

FINAL ROUND:

The finals begin at 10 a.m. on Sunday, March 6. Pairing in the initial round is according to qualifying position. All carryover of pinfall from qualifying will be dropped and finalists begin from zero.

All finalists will bowl 13 games of head-to-head match play, using the regular 14 team schedule, with a one game position round.

Should a tie occur for first after the finals, one full game will be bowled by the tied bowlers. Bowlers draw for starting lanes and the bowler on the odd numbered lane will start the roll off. If needed to break the tie, extra frames will be bowled.

All finalists received 30 pins bonus for each game won, and the bonus is added to the finalists total score. If a match is tied, each contestant receives 15 bonus points.

There will be a 10 minute break declared at the end of the 13th game before starting the Championship Flight.

Looking Back At Past Tourneys

The 14th annual TWBA Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament returns to our city for the second time this weekend -- but, what a long way that tournament has come, baby!

Such as an illustrious past this tournament has! In the 1960s Texas women bowlers urged TWBA president Estha Perkins, San Antonio, to form an event similar to the WIBC Queens.

So, President Perkins appointed a study committee of Jackie Jackson of San Angelo, Gladys Maxwell, Fort Worth, and Mary Bishop, Houston. They suggested the first format, and suggested that the first event be held in 1967, but since San Antonio WBA was hostess to WIBC in 1968, they TWBA Board felt that all efforts should be directed toward a huge entry for the WIBC. The plans were tabled.

The year following WIBC's visit to Texas (1968) chairman Jackson proposed the name BLUEBONNET QUEENS TOURNAMENT which the delegates approved. The first dates selected were February 6 through April 4, 1970 - to run concurrently with the TWBA Championships in Beaumont.

Entry for that first event was just \$25 with no extra fee for the finals. Entrants rolled six games of qualifying the same time they bowled their TWBA events. The first tournament drew 35 entries, leading President Perkins to comment, "A baby has to crawl before it can walk."

The 35 initial entrants competed under a winners-losers double elimination bracket format when they returned for the Queens finals in Beaumont at the conclusion of the Championships.

Susie Reichley came from the loser's bracket to win two matches 597-572 and 602-586 against Anna Belle Wilson of El Paso to become the first Texas Bluebonnet Queen.

In 1971 the crown went to blonde Carolyn Layne Anderton of Fort Worth, when she tied Houston's

Gertie Schmidt for the last spot in the Queens after qualifying. This necessitated a 6-game rolloff which Carolyn won, averaging 202.

Taking the eighth spot in the finals Carolyn then dominated the field in the finals winning 5 matches, tying one, while losing two by a small margin. She averaged 213 with a 1708 scratch series and added 137.5 bonus points to her score (1845 J) when the event was in Houston's Stadium Lanes.

One of San Antonio's brightest stars fresh out of the junior program and already the SAWBA city champion Beverly San Marco Pantuso moved into the spotlight at Red Rooster Lanes in El Paso putting in a 1749 scratch score, plus garnering 180 bonus points.

It was at this tournament that TWBA found a "goldmine" in their midst, in the person of Sylvia Broyles, who served then -- and every year since -- as Tournament Director of the Queens.

The city of San Antonio put in a new Queens record for entries the next year

when 70 state women competed. The format was changed requiring all contestants to roll six games across six lanes in qualifying. The semi final round called for the top 32 qualifiers to roll four games across four lanes, and finals were eight games of match play.

The title that year went to Houston's Gertie Schmidt after her come-from-behind victory over defending champion, Beverly Pantuso, who was seeded in the finals by virtue of her previous win.

Gertie totalled 1711 and earned \$350 plus gifts from TWBA.

Moving into the Capitol City of Austin in 1974, the event attracted 107 of the best women bowlers in Texas. The format was changed calling for contestants to roll ten games across 20 lanes - with the first seven games of the Finals to be rolled on Saturday night - the final seven on Sunday.

Petite Bobbie Thomas Munsell, 23, Fort Worth, captured the crown by winning ten of her 14 matches including rolling a

final game of 238 for a scratch 2805. From her opening game of 234 and throughout the finals Bobbie never relinquished her lead. She averaged 207 for her semis and finals (24 games).

At the request of the contestants, TWBA altered the format again in 1975. Each bowler rolled ten games across 20 lanes with the first five games of the finals on Saturday night, nine on Sunday. Waco was the scene for Fran Lary's triumph.

The Burkburnett lass earned the \$500 first place check after winning 10 of her 14 matches in the finals. She had a total pinfall of 3212 (including 300 bonus points), and her high games included 268 and 258.

The Gulf Coast beckoned the Queens in 1976 and 156 entrants answered the calls of the seagulls. Entries totalled 156 and the prize fund was \$3500.

Women bowlers in Austin rejoiced when Evelyn Lanier captured the crown.

The effervescent brunette came from second place

after qualifying on Saturday and held the lead throughout the finals. She averaged 208.8 for the Finals, and accumulated 300 bonus points for her ten wins.

The crown in 1977 was placed on the head of Irving's Donna Dillon after she topped 2837 pins, winning 9 of her 14 matches. She added 270 bonus points for a 3107 total. The field totalled 170 who shared in the \$3570 prize fund.

Additional TWBA history was made in 1978. The format was changed so that

all bowlers rolled eight games across 16 lanes in two four game blocks. The first four games of the finals were rolled Saturday evening and the final nine were rolled Sunday.

Defending champion Donna Dillon, then residing in Waco, successfully captured the Queen's crown and Donna became the first Texas woman to wear the crown two consecutive years. She swept through the 14-game finals at a 200.3 clip. She won nine of her

matches again and earned first money of \$500. Total prize fund divided among the 36 finalists was \$4,393.

The current format was adopted in 1979 with each bowler rolling eight games across 16 lanes (in two four game blocks); a semi-final round on Saturday night (4 games) and 14 games in the finals on Sunday. The format calls for heads-up-match play on Sunday with 30 bonus points for winning a match, 15 for ties.

The two-time defending champion, Donna Dillon, relinquished her crown to 22-year-old Regina Hillier of Amarillo at Imperial Lanes in Lubbock.

Flashing the brilliance which earned her the Alberta E. Crowe "Star of Tomorrow" award, Regina slammed in a three-game block of 712 for her Panhandle fans in Lubbock. She bowled 2787 scratch, earning 270 bonus pins for a 3053 total in the 14-game finals, when the tournament drew 172 entrants.

The Texas Queens first visited East Texas for the staging of the 11th annual competition and Tyler was the hostess.

Racing through the 14-game match finals at a 206.3

clip was stunning lefty Gloria Alderman of Fort Worth, who graciously wore the Queens crown for a year.

She accumulated 300 bonus points and posted a 3189 total with her scratch 2889 score.

Four finalists in the Tyler event, including Queen Alderman had previously had 300 games. The tournament featured a record prize fund with \$4186 paid out to the 182 entrants.

It was a happy time for TWBA when a record 207 entries were received for the 1981 event at Highland Lanes in Austin, and the prize fund, including special awards, escalated to \$4,235.

That year TWBA established two new awards for the Queens contestants: \$25 for the high four-game block and \$25 for the high game by non-semi-finalists.

Regina then carved her name again in the TWBA record books by becoming the second woman to win the Queen's crown in the grueling 26-game tournament. In 1979 she withstood a late charge from defending champ Gloria Alderman, and Kathy LeCroy, both of Fort Worth.

Regina had 2911 scratch, winning ten finals matches

and posted the highest total of 3241. She averaged 207.9 scratch in the finals to earn the largest single Queens prize check of \$525. The TWBA award for the Queen was also new. Previous jeweled lapels were awarded, but now the Queen is presented a diamond studded necklace in the shape of a queen's crown.

In 1982 it was again "hallelujah" time for TWBA as Regina returned to defend her title at Expressway Lanes in Dallas -- and annexed her third Queen's crown!

Regina averaged 201.2 in 1982 winning nine of her 14 matches to earn the first place check again - of \$525.00.

Her path wasn't an easy one as she faced 193 entrants all seeking to earn the prestigious crown.

Now the Queens are in San Antonio - and again it's a record entry of 235 rolling at Wonder Bowl. First place this year will be \$600.00 and a record prize fund is also in store for the competitors.

It's not only a record field - it's tough - and no one can predict who will wear the 1983 crown until the final ball is rolled late Sunday

Mary Wolfe Wins Queens On First Try All Scoring & Entry Records Fall!!

The majority of the very top women bowlers of the state were in our city last weekend for the Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament, conducted by TWBA - and what a show they put on for the spectators.

A refreshing new talent - Mary Wolfe of Mt. Calm - previously honored by TWBA as "Miss Texas Junior Bowler" today wears the crown of the Queen after devastating the record field of 235 at Wonder Bowl.

The 21-year-old left-hander, a senior at West Texas State University at Canyon, shattered the scoring record of the Queens, as she swept through the 14-game match finals at a record setting 223.7 clip, winning all but four of her matches. She totalled 3133 scratch for her 14 games, and earned 300 bonus points for a winning total of 3433.

Early Sunday morning when the finals began it appeared that Houston's sparkling brown eyed beauty, Luci Bonneau, who was named Texas "Woman Bowler of the Year" the same time Mary was "Miss Junior Bowler" (1979), was determined to capture this year one of the few Texas titles which have eluded her. She opened her finals play in ninth place, and quickly slammed in games of 256, 268 and 266 for a Queens record 790 series.

Luci is a former two-time State team champion and two-time Houston champion, who has a 300 game and a career

high series of 747. Sunday, she dominated early play and remained in first place until Mary, who fired her own

sensational opening salvo of 217, 276 and 254 (747) met her in the ninth match. The 30 bonus points (for each

win) were of great importance in their match since Mary had pulled to within 13 points of Luci in the games preceding their match. With two opportune doubles Mary took the win 202-171, and grabbed the tournament lead. Luci remained in the runnerup spot thereafter, and at tournament's end had averaged 215.7, winning 10 matches and a paycheck of \$475.

Once Mary grabbed that lead she bowled like an avenging tiger. Following her opening 747, she had 617, 650, then with games of 47, 224 and 215 a 686, before closing out her 14 games with 213 and 220.

She was so far in the lead, that even with a 300 game and the 30 bonus points, Luci couldn't top her.

In their match, however, in the position round Luci recaptured her early form and slammed home a 241 game, which brought that dazzling smile back - and the crowd rewarded her performance with a rousing round of applause. Both ladies shot superb scores for the Queens.

In addition to Mary's first place prize check of \$625 (also a record first place payoff), she received a huge trophy from TWBA secretary Lil Poole, the Queen's crown from defending champion Regina Hiller, her teammate at WTSU, the diamond studded necklace symbolic of the honor from TWBA president Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls. She will

also receive a paid entry to the 1984 event scheduled for Super Bowl in Conroe.

Mary will graduate from WTSU this summer and plans a wedding immediately afterward to a young man, who's also quite a bowler. He's had a 300 game as a junior, and another as an adult.

Next on Mary's agenda is the ACU-I collegiate competition in Las Vegas. Mary is the current Texas state collegiate champion.

A member of an all-bowling family, her parents are Sandra and Dave Wolfe of Mt. Calm - a metropolis 24 miles from Waco, and Mary proudly says, "population 360". She's attending WTSU on a bowling scholarship, and rolls in league with three time Queen Regina Hiller.

"Regina's been my idol," said Mary after the presentations. "I have never beaten her in any tournament, and I was really hoping she'd win again. I was in awe of all those women I'd just read about (meaning the finalists). I didn't expect to win, but I just wanted to bowl with them. I didn't expect, but I DID

want to win. You know what I mean," she bubbled happily.

"All those ladies were so nice, and I was so excited about winning. I think I forgot to say thank you for all the beautiful awards. I'll never forget this, it was a great thrill."

As well as "thrilling" it was almost unbelievable, since this was Mary's first entry into the Queens since becoming a WIBC member in 1979.

Mary's idol, Regina, topped her previous Queen's average by winning eight of her matches and averaging 209.3 for the 14 games. Her previous record high average was 207.9 in the Austin Queens. "Mary didn't tell you that she has already topped by high series at home (Amarillo) when she shot a 773 series. She's really a great talent with a super future ahead of her. I really enjoy bowling with her on our college team." Regina is also a WTSU student who is planning to enter Texas Christian University school of law, after a brief fling out on the women's professional tour.

Leading qualifier was Janice Eisenhut of San Angelo, who was brilliant on Saturday

during qualifying. During the finals she won 8 matches (she tied Luci with 190) and averaged 201.2 in the finals to earn \$350 of the \$4230 finals prize fund.

WIBC's highest triplicate shooter, Merrill Alexander of Dallas was fifth, averaging 201.5.

Even though the qualifying ran a little over time, Sylvia Broyles and her committee of Gloria Newman, Corpus Christi, Beverly McLendon, Houston, Doris and Lil handled the record event in near record time. The smoothness and efficiency of this committee was appreciated by participants and spectators alike.

Even though there were no women from San Antonio in the finals, seven cashed in the

semis: Kathy Kirst -78, 19th; Linda Mande -87, 21st; Liz Smith Williams -100, 24th; Cullene Vaughn -11, 29th; P. It Rinn -136, 33rd; Myrt DeFily -195, 35th; and Laurie Jo Scates -208, 36th.

The special prizes for non-semifinalists for high game and high block were won by Doris Covington, Montgomery County and Michelle Henson, Waco, who each had 255 games, and Covington also took the high block with an 826. They split the game pot and Covington pocketed the series.

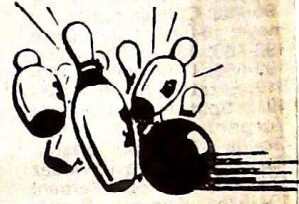

Lanes. Each senior lady will receive a specially designed dress pin and the high game and series shooters will receive special trophies.

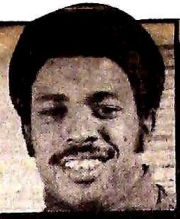
Overall the 1983 event drew 1876 five-woman teams, 4808 sets of doubles, 9616 singles and 9220 optional all events.

Entries overwhelm WIBC event, but . . .

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y. — A news story can be analyzed in many ways.

The subject content could be as everlastingly powerful and perpetually magnificent as one of nature's beautiful waterfalls, or it could be as passive as a brook in the country.

The Women's International Bowling Congress announced its 64th annual National Tournament has attracted an all-time record of 14,430 five-woman teams for its tournament in Las Vegas, Nev., which officially opens April 7 at Showboat Lanes.

The WIBC event will entertain 73,760 women, including 1,610 bowling only doubles and singles. The 1983 event will have a total \$1,617,878 in prizes.

Wrong indication

So overwhelming were the entries that the WIBC returned requests from 3,266 teams because of the lack of time on the schedule.

This news would indicate that the WIBC membership has been increasing as formidably as the tons of water that punish huge boulders beneath the American and Canadian or Horseshoe wonders. Right? Wrong.

"Actually, for the last two years, we have been decreasing in membership," said Helen Baker, the WIBC president. "Our membership last year was down 2.0-something percent and, right down, we are down 3.0-something over two years ago."

The WIBC envelopes more than four million bowlers. An exact current count was unavailable.

"Our membership has been going down," Mrs. Baker continued. "Of course, we attribute it to the economic factor. So many women have gone back to work and it has hurt the daytime leagues."

Didn't hurt

"We are concerned. We have been trying to encourage our local associations to work with proprietors to go out and get new members for our sanctioned leagues. We have also been urging increased activity for signing up seniors leagues, on the basis that they could fill up daytime spots perhaps left vacant by our ladies going back to work."

"The decrease in membership didn't hurt our tournament in Las Vegas," said Mrs. Baker with a confident smile. "This year, I have heard from a few states that their state tournament entries are down, but I would rather think that the ladies opted to bypass state events to go to Las Vegas. I hope that is a one-time thing and that the WIBC national tournament was the reason."

Mrs. Baker's observations are demonstrated by the Texas Women's Bowling Association state event, which opened this weekend in San Angelo. The TWBA event attracted 1,876 teams — the lowest since 1977 when 1,688 competed in Amarillo. Last year, the event had 2,135 teams in Lubbock and a record 3,086 in San Antonio in 1981.

"We thought the economical situation would hurt our national tournament this year," Mrs. Baker continued. "It's hard to answer the question about the economy and our tournament in future years."

"Just look at the ABC tournament right here. This is the largest American Bowling Congress tournament that they have had on the eastern side of United States, and, again, they say, the economy is bad. They just got the entry out, and they have 72,000 teams I believe. So, we are anticipating a good entry for our tournament here in 1984."

For answers to the problem, the congenial Florida native displayed the calmness of the docile Niagara river that separate two nations, and the firmness of the deafening roar of the falls for which the two tourist and industrial cities on either side of the border are named.

"We have got to advertise, and, by that, I don't mean the type of adds you take out in a newspaper," said Mrs. Baker. "We have got to advertise by word of mouth, the enjoyment, the pleasure and the sport we can get from bowling."

"We also have to educate the media about our organization and tournaments. Already, one has heard much about the ABC tournament. It has over 70,000 bowlers. We have more than 73,000 women in our tournament and some areas of the country won't be aware of those figures."

"If the written, television and radio media would recognize women bowlers in total and publish the WIBC news as it presented, it would attract more women bowlers and help our membership also. There are more than men bowlers in this country as the tournament in Las Vegas shows."

Spell it out

"The women would like to be treated as equally as the men as far as the media is concerned. We have to educate the media on our successful our programs are, and how well women enjoy the sport."

"We have to get more women into bowling to maintain our membership. We have to be able to furnish them with something that will enhance their enjoyment in bowling that they don't get through casual bowling. Whether it is the competitiveness of the league, whether it is the awards they can earn or something."

"We have to enhance and spell out to people our services which make league bowling attractive. That is where the future of the WIBC lies."

The current nation's economic situation and the WIBC membership are parallel. WIBC realizes it must embarked on a concerted effort to change its woes.

The news of the WIBC's entries in Las Vegas echoed elation. However, the women's governing body would prefer to reverse the eroding trend of its overall membership — that would be the good news.

Now the format for the Channel 37 bowling show encompasses the majority of the centers in the city -- and all bowlers have an

No entry fee is required to participate at the first level -- just become one of the top five men or women in your favorite center. Using your league average of 21, qualifying begins on Wednesday and ends on Tuesday nights. Handicap is added at 90% of 200.

Those top five men and women from each center then advance to the semi-final round -- and the schedule of the centers is shown at the end of this article.

Entry fee then is just \$10, and semi-finalists roll three games on a pair of lanes (still handicapped at 90%), after which the top 8 men and top 8 women advance to the preliminary rounds of the finals, using a bracket system with each person rolling one game. The cut is then made to the top 4 men

Nominated by the committee for Director's posts, in alphabetical order are:

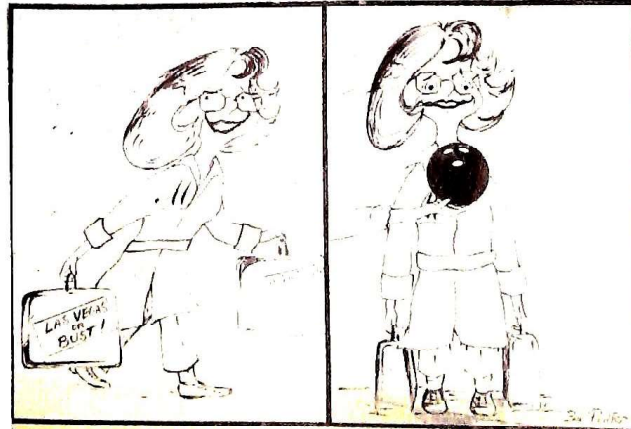

Sylvia Broyles Re-Elected To WIBC Board

Record Delegation: "Look Ahead"; New Awards In Store

From the moment the WIBC Board of Directors walked down the center aisle of the convention in Las Vegas to their seats on the podium, to the in-unison hand clapping of the delegates, and Mrs. Helen Baker of Florida rapped the 66th annual meeting to order last Monday, the agenda was jam-packed with excitement and activity.

It was a very special annual meeting to all of us in San Antonio as Wednesday's election brought a unanimous re-election of our SAWBA president Sylvia Broyles to the WIBC Board of Directors for a three year term.

And Columbia Industries' queen of bowling, Betty Morris, although she resides in Lodi, Calif., belongs in part to us, went into the WIBC Hall of Fame in the Superior Performance category.

With the calmness we have learned to enjoy with Sylvia, she graciously accepted the applause of the record 3,772 delegates, pledging to continue her efforts for the benefit of all

women bowlers and for the good of the game of bowling.

In contrast, Betty was anything but calm and totally overwhelmed by the honor. She was reduced to tears and almost unable to speak, as Connie Smoot of Columbia, Don Johnson of the Columbia staff, her sister, mom and son looked on with a few of her professional travel-mates.

The gorgeous redhead, who was the 1970 "Bowler of the Decade" and seven-time All American female bowler, joined Ferndale, Michigan's Doris Knechtges in receiving the performance honors.

National delegates were ecstatic over the record breaking number of entries in the Las Vegas event -- which puts the WIBC tournament into the Guinness Book of World Records. Likewise, the 3,772 delegates registered was a record.

Before the Vegas event is completed 14,430 teams will have bowled, far surpassing the record set by Las Vegas of 9644 when WIBC first visited in 1973.

If there was any sad not during the three-day conclave, it was Executive Secretary Flora Mitchell's report that membership (as of April 22) was slightly down, compared to the same date last year. Membership as of April 22 was reported as 3,878,236.

The theme of the 1983 annual meeting was "look to the future" and something new and exciting is in store for women bowlers with the addition of a new idea -- "The Spotlight Award" -- to be given in 1984 to five local and two state associations. The awards will be for an association's service to its membership, promotion of the game, public relations and other items which generally promote the game. The WIBC July mailing will include additional information on the Spotlight Award, and deadline for entries will be in November. The first Spotlight Awards will be given at Niagara Falls.

Of special interest to league bowlers -- almost all

WIBC emblem awards will have a new look in the 1983-84 season...new designs and new colors for the awards. The only exception will be in the senior awards which are reasonably new, and WIBC has an adequate inventory to carry over until the 1984-5 season.

Too, the 1983-84 league high series award will be an enamel pin instead of an emblem.

ABC and WIBC have produced a joint version of the bowling average calculator, and the only difference in the two calculators previously issued will be the identifying information, logo and brief history of the organization.

Sanction applications will also have a new look, and all secretaries were requested to dispose of those on hand as quickly as the new ones arrive.

Delegates also listened to reports on league problems and action by the WIBC legal department, on the National Bowling Council, pace of bowling, the BVL Fund, which reflected another record contribution of \$863,245.28 in the 1981-82 season, with Syracuse N.Y. leading the way. The state of Georgia led the amount on a per member basis with \$1,389 for their 33,772 members, but California grabbed a bit of glory with an outstanding donation of \$208,388.61, a first for them. They continued to collect during the convention.

The National Bowling Hall of Fame/Museum, of course, was much discussed and members were encouraged

The record 3,772 delegates elected Agnes Duffy, 1st vice president; Joyce Deitch, 4th; Elaine Hagin 7th; and directors Jo Smith, Clara Morton, Irene Kreidler, Margaret Howell, Eleanor Meeks and Sylvia during the balloting.

On the first ballot Hartford, Connecticut was named to be hostess for the 1987 WIBC championships and the annual meeting.

Emphasis was placed on international competition, the YABA, senior activities and the 1983 LTS III Schedule. Texas' sole LTS (a leadership training seminar) will be in Abilene on July 23-24.

Next on the agenda in Las Vegas will be the WIBC/Avon Queens tournament scheduled for May 10-14 with a field of 481 -- another new record.

It truly was another great WIBC happening, and as the space is available we will be reporting on many of the other items covered during the 3-day meeting in depth.

the SAWBA annual meeting on Monday, substituting local names for those on the TWBA Board -- and again the delegation received generous applause for their "talent?"

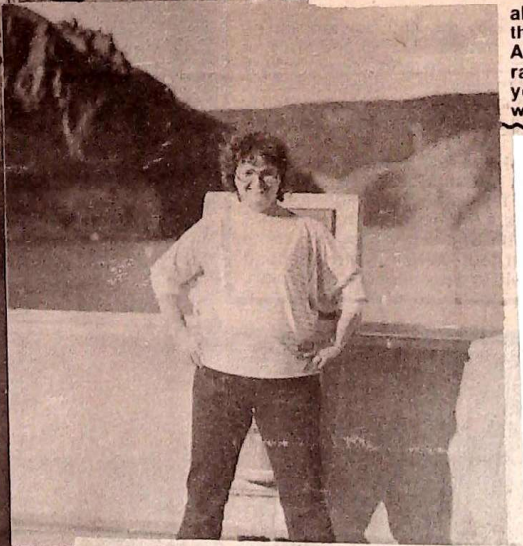

SAWBA Elects New Board--Honors Members

The 86 SAWBA members including three Life Members, who attended the annual meeting Monday evening at the Sheraton Motor Inn sped through a 14-point agenda led by association President Sylvia Broyles, who had just returned from the WIBC annual meeting and the Angelo TWBA Championship Tournament.

The packed agenda covered activities of the association since August 1 when the 1982-83 season began.

Of prime importance was the report that membership in SAWBA is in excess of 13,000 for this season, well over the total of 12,252 for last year. SAWBA has sanctioned 520 ladies and mixed leagues.

Sylvia advised in her President's report that plans are already underway for the 1983-84 bowling year -- which will include a very special event for SAWBA members--the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the association.

President Broyles has appointed Helen Baetz and Rosalie Bushick as co-chairman, plus all officers and members of the Anniversary Committee to plan "something special" to commemorate the occasion. She called on all members to become involved in the festivities.

"Oooohs and aaahs" greeted secretary Tip Pfeiffer's report of the high scoring thus far in the season, with three months remaining. Li Williams has the city high series to date, a 729, followed by Donna

Wallace's 721. In the high game category Debbie Lauzon was "royally" rewarded for her 300 game, rolled at The Summit, with a 675 series. Second high game to date is Nancy Mihalski's 290.

Treasurer Helen Kalala's report reflected that the association was well-with in the adopted budget and that the many functions planned and staged by the Board, the new Board uniforms, donations to the Bowling Council and Southwest Texas JBA, the Bluebonnet Queens hospitality room and many other items were adequately funded.

Legislatively the members approved keeping the director's count at 20; approved the amended rule for candidate eligibility for a director's post; deleted unnecessary paragraphs dealing with the nominating committee; and by a vote of 53-17 approved increasing dues to \$2.50. The additional 25¢ per card will allow the association to meet increasing supplies costs, provided additional office assistance as a new secretary begins her term, allows adequate funding for delegates attending the WIBC in Niagara Falls, and the staging of various activities to celebrate SAWBA's 50th anniversary. WIBC sanction cards for the new season will be \$5.00.

All SAWBA members can point with pride to the generous donation that San Antonio is able to give to the BVL Fund. Co-chairmen Unice Powell and Clara Grimes reported a donation

to BVL of \$3,136 from the BVL Fund Tournament which was won by Donald Palmer of Eagle Lanes.

Joye Duncan in her Publicity Report added that a check in the amount of \$2300 plus eight color televisions from the National BVL Fund were presented to Dr Jose R Coronado of Audie Murphy Memorial VA Hospital late in March. The National Bowling Council administers the BVL Fund.

After all reports had been given it was evident that SAWBA had had another great year - with even bigger and better happenings on the drawing board for the coming year.

Eight of our most talented - and most delightful juniors competed against 31 other graduating seniors from the junior program to earn \$3,000 in scholarships available in the Billy Simon Junior Scholarship Tournament, sponsored by the San Antonio Bowling Council.

First place winners, in both scratch and handicap, earned \$500 scholarships and runners-up earned \$250 in scholarships to the colleges or universities or trade schools of their choice.

The juniors rolled five games against their peers at Astro Bowl to earn their scholarships, and although some are still undecided at this time as to their schools, all plan to remain in the junior program and continue their educations.

Scratch Winners

TERRY SAMMONS: might be one of the brightest stars on the bowling scene -- if you could get him off the bandstand where he drums a couple of nights during the week for the Circle C country/western band, and plays in the school band for East Central High School when he's not on the lanes.

He's a very "on the run" teen, handsome enough and with a pleasantly warm smile and personality to pursue a show-biz career. But his bowling speaks for itself. Carrying a yeabook average of 184 a year ago, but now rolling in the Young & Olde league with a 170 and in the High School Mixers at Ponderosa with a 189. Terry previously carried a 209 with a career high game of 289 at Ponderosa and a 696 series.

Bowling just four years, this righthander truly doesn't have time for many tournaments, and joined the Simon Scholarship competitors because some of his friends were bowling. He had the highest scratch score of the 31 entrants - 1065 for the five games (213 average), and placed second in handicap with 1135.

If his parents - Mr. and Mrs. V. C. Sammons - can keep up with him, they'll find him studying computer science next year at San Antonio College, and probably continuing his bowling in the junior program. Unfortunately for us, when he came by the Kegler office as usual he was on the run - and couldn't remember all the tournament credits he has. At age 18, he's an impressive, involved young winner!

LISA RIDDLE of Poteet, who attends Somerset High School, posted not only the girl's high game of 246, but was the scratch champion with 993 (5 games). Lisa is 189 and a B student who plans to enter UTSA with an eye to a law career.

Lisa was third in singles in the local tournament with a 656, was in first (scratch) in the King & Queen with 926, and bowls at Hacienda and in the Roadrunners. As well as being a talented bowler, pretty Lisa has served two years as league secretary (summer) and one in a fall league. She has a book average of 169 but currently shoots with a 172. She has a career high game of 246-616, which she rolled in the tournament.

Joey began his career 6 years ago and already has a 248 high game with a 648 series to his credit. He has a career high average of 175, currently, 173. Competing in just one league this season since he is also employed by W. C. Franks (23-24 hours per week). Joey had games of 194, 177, 169, 233 and 216 to top the field. He has his eye on a career in computer science but hasn't finalized entrance plans.

Joey credits Mark Ross with a great deal of his success on the lanes (for instilling confidence and sharing lane knowledge with him). Joey is an Optimist Tournament doubles champion who is a B student at Oliver Wendell Holmes High. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Castillo.

TAMERA L. MCKOWN, a most attractive 17 year old teen, captured the girl's handicap title with 1003. She was second behind Riddle who was awarded the scratch title.

The petite blonde is a senior at Lackland High School and intends to pursue a career in Criminal Justice at Midwestern State University at Wichita Falls, where she began her bowling career nine years ago.

Rolling with 55 pins per game handicap, Tamera had games of 167, 135, 140, 139 and 147 with her 138 book average. She has to her credit a career high game of 204, rolling at Skylark lanes at Lackland. The shy righthander is the daughter of Sr. M/Sgt. and Thomas R. McKown.

\$250 Scholarship Winners

ALEX RAMOS RIOS, the "personality kid" of the scholarships winners, has been bowling since age 5, and has not only a 276 high game to his credit, but TWO series over 700 -- 711 last summer and 736. He carries the highest average of the finalists, 187, in his Oak Hills league and in the Roadrunners.

Alex is a native San Antonian who is one of the favorites of the youngsters and adults as well. His out-going personality belies the serious talent hidden behind. Alex placed sixth in singles in city, was runnerup in the King & Queen at Sparetime and was 6th in the Junior Invationals in Denver. He will also be competing in the nationals at Arkansas in July.

The Holmes High senior at age 17, had games of 202, 199, 183, 201 and 182. He says, "I'm just a normal student," but he hasn't committed himself to a college as

yet. His parents are Robert and Gloria Ramos Rios, popular members of several Oak Hills leagues.

RENEE SMITH, a most poised 17 year old, who'll soon become a "lady Aggie" at Texas A&M to study computer engineering. She's employed now as a computer operator after school hours.

Renee carries the second highest average of the scholarship winners, a 182 in two leagues (Oak Hills and World of Sports). She's had a 278 game with a 692 high series after bowling just four years.

And what a wealth of titles this slip of a gal has to her credit! The 1982 Queen in the King & Queen; first for girls in Top 20 in 1982 (averaging 196 for 10 games); 1st in all events in the 1983 city tournament (scratch, averaging 184 for 9 games); 2nd in 1982 in State Scratch singles and 1st in the Texas State Senior Scholarship in Austin, which also earned her a \$500 scholarship. Renee had five games of 245, 242 and three games of 157 in that event.

She'll be bowling the Top 20 again this weekend at Oak Hills and is on her way to YABA national finals in Fort Smith, Arkansas, in July. At Clark High School, Renee is an A and B student who is president of the school bowling club. She is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Harry Smith.

DAVID BACK will be missing the Top 20 this weekend to compete in a base invitational for all Air Force Bases this weekend. He carries a 168 high average, but rolls in three leagues (Randolph averaging 163, Wonder Bowl 168, and Roadrunners, 167).

David had the Simon Scholarship high game of 279 in which he left the 7-pin on the 10th ball. His first three games were a 645 (157, 209, 279) and he added 140 and 170 to earn the second spot in Handicap.

The confident 18-year-old also has a wealth of credits in his young career. He is a regional doubles and team champion (1980), he was on the Cl. B state champions team and was in the finals in combination doubles. He was 4th in Class A Doubles in 1980; 5th in Cl. B in 1978 and in Class C in 1979 was doubles champion, 11th in singles and 13th in all events. Prior to his 279 game in the tournament, David had a career high game of 26 with a 645 series. President Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls, conducting her first TWBA business session since assuming the presidency, brought together all integers of the bowling game into the one-day session.

Special reports came from Mrs. Lavonne Hodgson, Kansas, who brought a special message from WIBC; James Miller, president of the Texas Bowling Association, Jamie Brooks of the Texas Bowling Centers Assn., and Mrs. Georgia Biggs, Lubbock, vice president of the Texas YABA.

Secretary Lil Poole reported a growth in membership right now, over the same period last year, with some two and one half months remaining in the season.

Two new associations are now affiliated with TWBA - the Giddings Assn. and the Eastland Assn., again became active now that they have a bowling center. Houston again leads in membership, with Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth close behind.

Astro Expansion Begins

The long-awaited expansion plans of Astro Bowl are now under way.

According to owner Duke LaDuke and manager Jim Pestello, the renovation plans have been on the drawing board almost a year.

Last summer La Duke Enterprises, Inc., Astro Bowl's parent corporation, purchased the adjoining property to Astro Bowl on Harry Würzbach road for the expansion plans.

The addition of 20 lanes will make the center one of the largest in San Antonio with 44 lanes.

New Brunswick AS-80 computers will serve each lane. The new computers will provide almost error free automatic scoring for league and open bowling with the greatest ease of operation.

DUES INCREASE

At the annual meeting of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association on May 2, the delegates voted an increase of 25¢ in the SAWBA dues.

Since the change is effective August 1 - the new season - new members joining summer leagues must purchase sanction cards for \$5.00 - apportioned SAWBA \$2.50; WIBC \$1.25 and TWBA \$1.25.

Friday, June 3, 1983

Final Average Sheets Due

League secretaries of women's and mixed leagues have a very important date to observe -- June 9 -- the day all final average sheets are due in the SAWBA office.

WIBC Rules (102.e) call for final averages sheets to be submitted to the local association office at the completion of league play. For leagues extending beyond the cut-off day of May 31, averages must be submitted as of that same day and this can be done on a regular league standing sheet.

City Mixed Entries Due

It's not too early to be thinking about the 8th annual Mixed Tournament, sponsored by the San Antonio Men's and Women's Bowling Associations -- in fact to assure your spot in the popular tournament, it's best to get those entries - which are at all lanes into the SAWBA office pretty quickly.

Entries in team event will be accepted no later than one hour prior to shift time - and in doubles, entry is also one hour prior to shift time, provided the lanes are available.

Astro Bowl will be host for the 8th annual event, and entry is just \$8.00 per person per event.

In team event bowlers may compete as often as desired, but not more than three members of a team may bowl together more than once.

In doubles a bowler may enter as many times as desired, but cannot cash more than once with the same partner.

Handicap is computed at 80% from 1000 for Class A team and from 400 in doubles. In Class B its from the top of the class (799) and for doubles, from 319.

In most cases 1981-82 Yearbook averages are to be used - no ten pin increase in average is in effect. Other entering average rules are spelled out on the reverse of the entry form which are available at all lanes or from either association office.

Pire money in the tournament remains in its respective class and payoff will be at not less than 1-10

ratio.

Team squads are at 3 and 8 p.m. on July 30 and August 6, and again on Sunday July 31 and August 7 at 1 p.m.

Doubles squads are on the same dates at 1 and 6 p.m. on Saturdays and at 11, 4 and 6 p.m. on Sundays, July 31 and August 7.

Mixed teams will be three men and 2 women or vice versa, and all doubles must be mixed - one man, one woman.

Are you a handicap-average bowler who's finding it hard to win money in some of our city's tournaments? Now there just may be a way -- if you've got the will!

A new tournament makes its appearance on July 9-10 at Astro Bowl -- billed as a 199 average & Under Handicap Tournament -- it's offering a \$1,000 first place guaranteed prize (regardless of entries) -- and -- if you hurry there's no membership fee.

Local bowlers Ken and Tracy Beeler are the general managers of the Tournament Bowlers Organization (TBO) who are making their first trek into the world of tournament management.

Similar in format to the popular TTBA tournament, the TBO members will bowl four games across eight lanes. The top 10% of all entries (minimum 20) will qualify for the semifinals and all semifinalists will cash.

Semifinalists roll three games across six lanes with the top five advancing to the stairstep finals. A tie for any position will be determined by bowling a 10th frame with handicap included. Handicap is based on 80% of 200 for both men and women.

Ken and Tracy are offering something new to tournament bowlers. To the first 200 members who join, the \$5.00 membership fee will be waived for the first year. All membership dues thereafter go into the "Bowler of the Year" fund.

In addition to the \$1,000 first place prize check the winner of each tournament also receives a giant trophy from TBO.

Prize payoff is immediately after the finals and TBO will award \$100 for a perfect game or to a member who goes 100 pins over average. Awards will be limited to one per bowler per tournament.

Additionally, to the first non-casher, there's a special prize of a spanking new Columbia bowling ball, and with at least 100 entries, \$25 cash awards will be given to men and women non-cashers.

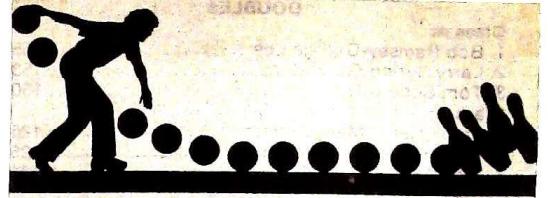

State "Mixed" Set For Houston

The members of the Texas State Bowling Council dreamed of a Texas State Mixed Tournament for the men and women of Texas -- and this year that dream is a reality!

Entries close September 22, so there's plenty of time to get your entry in. The first tournament will be October 22-23, October 29-30 and November 5-6 and 12-13 at Stadium Lanes (8200 Braesmain) in Houston.

Bowlers must be sanctioned in this handicap event, which includes competition in two classes in team, doubles and singles. Bowlers competing in all three events may also participate in All Events by paying a fee of \$2.



Entry fee is \$11.00 per person (plus \$2 optional all events) with \$3.75 going into the prize fund, and the total prize fund, less the cost of plaques or trophies, will be distributed at the rate of 1-10 (at least) in team, doubles and singles, and at least one cash prize for each 20 entries in all events.

New Yearbook averages (1982-83 season) will be used and if no Yearbook, averages of 12 games or more as of date of participation will be used. Verification must be submitted at time of participation.

Participation shall be limited to one time in each event and there will be two classes in each of the events.

Team event for Class A is 801 and up; and in Class B it's 800 and down. Doubles are 331 and up in Class A; and in men's singles it's 171 and up and for the women, 161 and up. Handicap in Class A is 80% within the class set at 1000 for team; 400 in doubles and 210 in singles and all events.

SAWBA State Senior Mixed Trip Plans Finalized

If you are 55 years of age and older, and looking for tournament action? The 3rd annual Texas State Senior Mixed is where to find it and it's just around the corner. This year's action will be taking place at Palace Bowling Lanes (4191 Bellaire Blvd) in Houston.

The rules are simple: grab three other seniors (just make sure you have one man and one woman) and make up a four-person team; put two of them together (but it must be one man and one woman); get \$9.00 from each and an additional \$2 for those who participate in all events and you just might make a little extra spending money - or a trip to the National Senior Championships!

Here in San Antonio it's not as big a hassle as some places. The SAWBA Senior Mixed Committee, under the chairmanship of Dorris Tanner, has made arrangements for bus transportation so you can "leave the driving" to them.

If you want to participate in this third annual event, make your plans to do it the weekend of October 29-30. There will be three loading locations - Astro Bowl, Oak Hills and Ponderosa - for the Senior bus which will arrive Friday (October 2) at approximately 4 p.m. and return Sunday afternoon.

After arrival in Houston there's about two hours for rest and relaxation time, then the group heads for a shopping mall for shopping and dinner.

Team bowling will be at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Saturday, but only 15 teams will be accommodated on the 2 p.m. shift. Then everyone returns to the lanes at 9 a.m. on Sunday, October 30, with lunch following, then departure for home.

As usual there'll be refreshments on the bus to break the monotony - and we won't guarantee there'll be any if past trips are any gauge.

Seniors on the bus are automatically insured while ON the bus, however, others may purchase OFF BUS insurance for \$1.00 per day. The total fare is \$27.50 per person for the first 88 folks to send their checks. A third bus will be added if needed and will be charged based on the number of passengers.

Senior bus transportation deadline is September 22, as is the closing date for entries into the State Senior Mixed.

Since the tournament calls for last season averages and the Yearbook is not yet completed, seniors are asked to complete their lineups, leaving the averages blank. Payment of the optional all events is very important in this tournament, because if the bowler has the greatest handicap score for his or her two events (team and doubles), this could qualify

that person in an age classification in the National Senior Championships in 1984!

Seniors are classified according to age: Class A-70 and over; B-65-69; C-60-64; and D-55-59. Singles have two divisions - men and women and handicap will be figured from the following scratch figures: Team - 800; Singles 210. The payoff is at least one prize for each ten entries.

There are additional dates and times for those who do not avail themselves of the bus arrangements. The tournament begins on October 22-23 with team squads on the 22nd and 29th at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. On October 23 and 30, squads are at 11:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

Singles squads on October 22 and 29 are at 11:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. and on Sunday, October 23 and 30, they are at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Fees should be paid by cashier's check or money orders payable to the Texas State Senior Mixed Tournament, but remember, that no entries will be accepted after September 22.

Squads on October 22 and 29 are at 12 noon, 3 p.m., 6 p.m. and on November 5 and 12, squads are at 9, 2 and 3 p.m.

Doubles and singles squads will be on Sundays, October 23 and 30 at 8 a.m., 11:30 a.m. and 3 p.m.; and on November 6 and 13, they are at the same times.

No more than three members of a team entered may bowl together more than once. In doubles a bowler may enter as often as desired but cannot cash more than once with the same partner.

Women's City To Astro Bowl & Bowlerama

Instant Cash Remains- New NBHF/M Feature Added

Astro Bowl for team event and Bowlerama Lanes for singles and doubles was the decision of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association Board of Directors for the 47th annual local championship tournament.

The Board also approved a new award for the local championships- a Local Handicap Champion's Award - to be given for the highest all events handicap score winner, regardless of class in the tournament.

This is not changing the Local Scratch Champion award, but adding the local handicap award.

Instant Cash will be continued this year using the format below:

Other cash awards will be given according to averages: \$5.00 will be awarded for converting these splits: Big 4; 4-6; 8-10 and 7-9; 4-6-7 and 4-6-10.

\$3.00 will be given for converting the 4-10, 4-7-10, 6-7 and 6-7-10, and for any women fortunate enough to convert the 7-10 or 5-7-10, there's an instant \$50 payoff. All other splits not listed will receive \$1.00 for conversion.

Instant cash awards will be on an individual basis and there's no limit as to the number of cash prizes for an individual. Consecutive strike payoff will be based on the chart above and payoff will be at the end of the strike-string.

But -- there's still more for the SAWBA, which will be celebrating its 50th anniversary this season. At the singles and doubles

center, there'll be no instant cash, but participants will be eligible to enter a special National Bowling Hall of Fame/Museum feature. By payment of a \$1.00 additional fee, paid prior to completion of the first game, bowlers can earn a little additional cash and help a worthy cause. Of the \$1.00 special fee, 50¢ will go into a prize pot and 50¢ will be donated to the NBHF/M.

The bowler rolling most pins over average for the second game will receive that prize money, and all who participate will be helping to building bowling's shrine.

building was enveloped in flame, but at least the man and the boy were safe," Delma said quietly.

With the burned-out couple safely in the hands of neighbors and the city police, Delma went on home -- and by then it was near 5 a.m.

A jangling telephone awakened her shortly after 8 a.m. and it was Jean Frugia of San Pedro, asking Delma to come into work because another employee had been injured.

After explaining her frightening experience to Jean, Delma was asked not to come, but Delma's not your average teenager, and she quickly told Jean, "That's all right, if you need me, I'll be there."

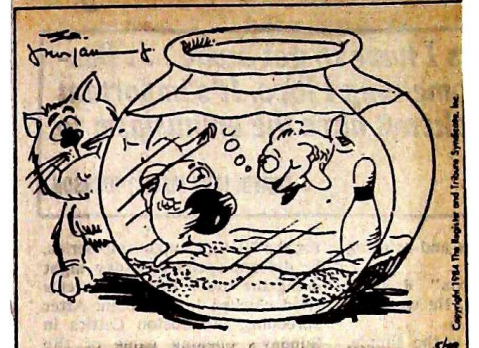
And she was. Never did she say a word to us as we visited the snackbar (it was Jean who "squealed" on her).

After talking with her and shooting her picture, Delma was hard at work again making sandwiches and flashing that shy smile of hers - but still wondering why we wanted her picture.

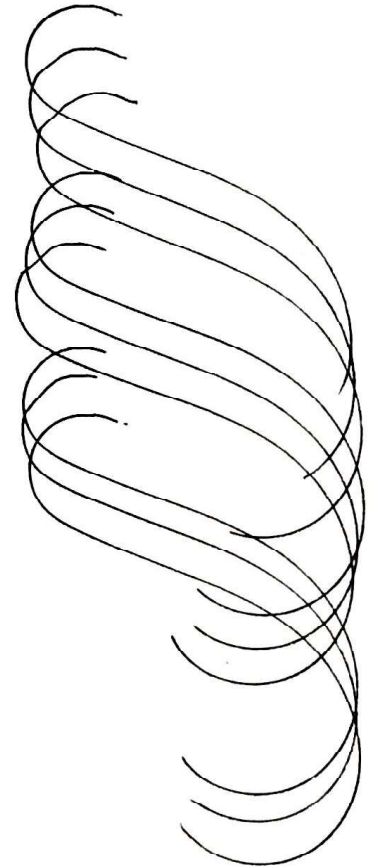
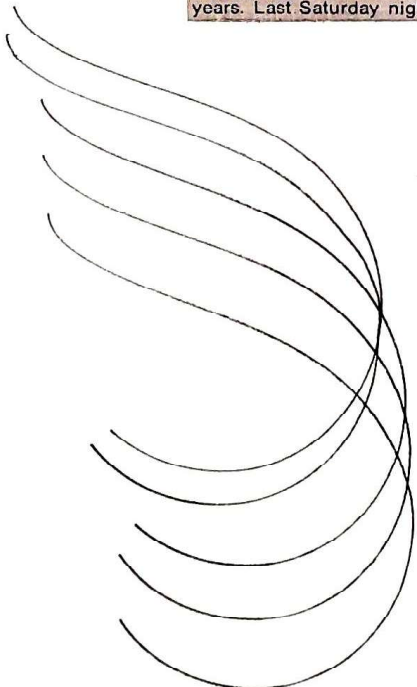
She's truly a Good Samaritan, this pint-sized teenager, and one we'd want in our corner in any emergency!

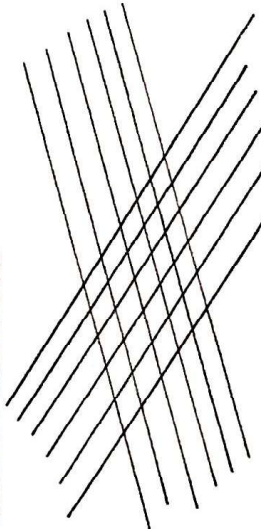

Women Involved In "Train The Trainers"

Bowling has class. Literally. The bowling industry has combined forces to develop and sponsor classes on lane inspection in an attempt to create uniformity among lane inspectors across the country.

And just guess who was in one of the first classes to become a "Trainer" of "Trainers" -- SAWBA President Sylvia Broyles!

For the first time, women were included in the training program. Previously, inspections were handled almost solely by males. Students from these workshops will go throughout the nation and train bowling association representatives to inspect lanes.

Three "Train the Trainers" workshops were held in Bowling Headquarters in Greendale, Wisconsin - July 19-22; August 16-19 and one will be held September 27-30. Two and a half days were devoted to training the class to inspect; another day and a half in training them to teach.

The purpose of the classes is two fold: provide all inspectors with a high degree of training to improve their skills; and train the inspectors to be more uniform and consistent in carrying out their responsibilities.

The classes include an in-depth look at lane construction and maintenance; certification tools and

procedures; lane dressing inspections; high score award inspections; and miscellaneous safety and public relations procedures.

A subcommittee of the National Bowling Council's Education Committee authored the workshop's script. The subcommittee consists of chairman Remo Pichetti, president, DBA Products Inc.; Elaine Rebatzke, WIBC tournament sanctions department manager; Hank Harris, Brunswick representative; Al Joyner, BPAA representative; Ted Mars, AMF representative; and Dave Lumley, ABC equipment testing and research department manager.

Proprietors Withdraw From SWTJBA Form New Junior Program

Charles F. Hall, executive director of the Young American Bowling Alliance at Bowling Headquarters was in town last week, and when he left San Antonio had a new junior bowling association.

The Greater San Antonio River City Bowling Proprietors requested Hall's presence so that they could withdraw from the Southwest Texas Junior Bowling Association, which currently services the junior bowlers of San Antonio, Boerne, Del Rio, Fredericksburg, Kerrville, Luling, New

Braunfels, Pleasanton, Seguin and Uvalde.

Of the 13 bowling proprietors, five military base lanes, three from the SABA, and three from SAWBA, the vote to withdraw was 14-3, with the remaining abstaining.

The proprietors cited the following as their reason for withdrawing from Southwest Texas JBA: 1. the jurisdictional area is too large and all cities outside of the Greater San Antonio area have their own adult bowling associations, and (2) they felt the youth could

better be served and promoted in the more confined area.

The new organization will be known as the Greater San Antonio Assn. of the YABA, and elected President, after the by-laws were approved, was Gary Tompkins of San Pedro Lanes. Linda Quayle of Wonder Bowl junior program was named vice president, and proprietor executive secretary Betty Field was named secretary.

The new group will be governed by a Board of Directors which will include 3 members from SABA, 3

from SAWBA, one from the Alamo Bowling Proprietor's association, 20 from each participating center and three in a yet-to-be-formed Youth Leaders group.

An executive committee of 2 from SABA, 2 from SAWBA, 2 from the Alamo Bowling Proprietors Assn., and the president and secretary of the GSAYABA and one from the youth group will be named on the Executive Committee.

The annual meeting of the group will be in April, and at least one meeting will be held in October and January of each year.

Col. Bruce Canright Succumbs to Coronary

It seems as if it was just yesterday, when actually it was June of 1979, that we listened as Colonel Bruce Canright expressed his feeling about retiring from the bowling business.

It was then that he looked over the remodeling plans for Bowlerama Lanes and signed the legal documents turning Bowlerama over to Harold Stone and Sons. Col. Canright had operated the center for 22 years. He talked poignantly of the day he opened the center on December 14, 1957, and of the joy of being a part of the lives of so many men, women and children who had enjoyed bowling in his center. Today we mourn Col. Canright's passing at age 84.

A massive coronary felled the retired Air Force Colonel who made San Antonio home for 34 years. The Colonel was stationed at Lackland Air Force Base after serving overseas from his home in St. Paul, Minn.

His military travels took him around the world. He was an Army veteran of World War I. From 1945 to 1948 he served in the Air Force in Japan during the American occupation. He was a troop commander, president of general court-martials and judge of occupation forces. Col. Canright served on the Court at the trial of Japanese Premier after the war and his uniform was adorned with multi-rows of Military honors.

The Colonel was a businessman, an innovative inventor of a barbecue smoker, operator of a nursing home and of course, bowling proprietor. As a proprietor he served as President of the San Antonio Bowling Proprietors Association and on the San Antonio Bowling Council at the time plans were made for the San Antonio Hall of Fame. Having no children, Col. Canright was greatly interested in the youth program and the future of the bowling business.

Courty and gentlemanly, this gentle man had an artistic flair and love of the places he lived and visited. It was just last Christmas that he provided a warm story for this newspaper when he invited us to his home to view lovely works of art in his own backyard. Col. Canright commissioned artists to paint 6' high murals of the scenic views of cities where he lived. His love of this city was evidenced by the many scenes depicting historical sites in San Antonio.

Extremely active and lively until his death, Col. Canright was a pioneer in the ongoing revival of lighter-than-air ships. He was an inventor, designer and consultant after he designed a 300-passenger blimp capable of traveling at 100 mph. He proposed the blimps as an alternate to high-speed bullet trains. His production proposal will continue at an industrial firm in Ohio.

Col. Canright is survived by his lovely wife of 55 years, Bertha T. Canright, who was at his side at his passing.

Final services for this respected and beloved member of our bowling family were September 15 at Fort Snelling National Cemetery in Minneapolis, Minnesota, with full military honors.

He will be so sadly missed.

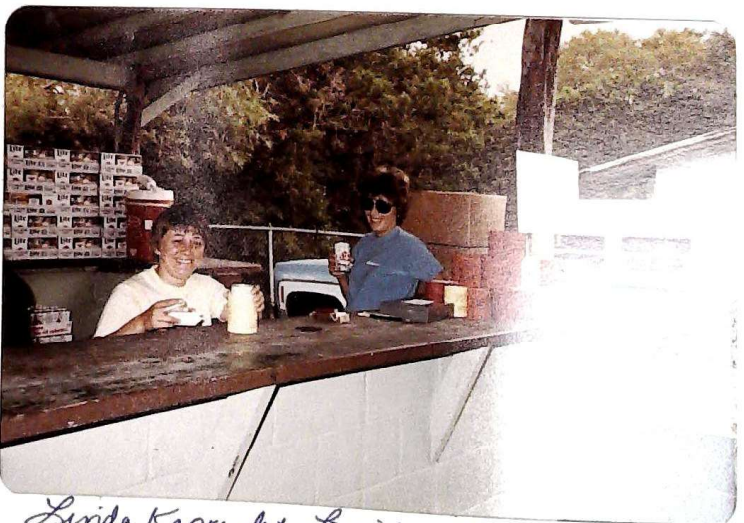
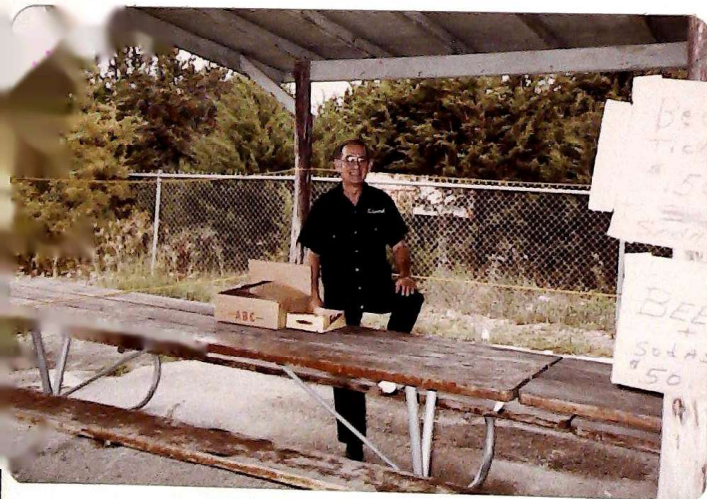
