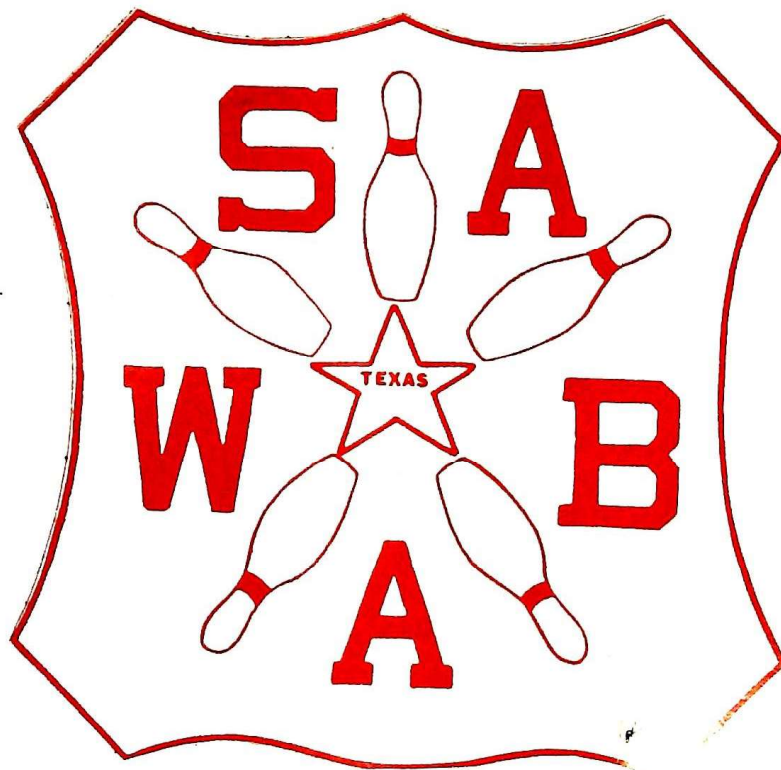

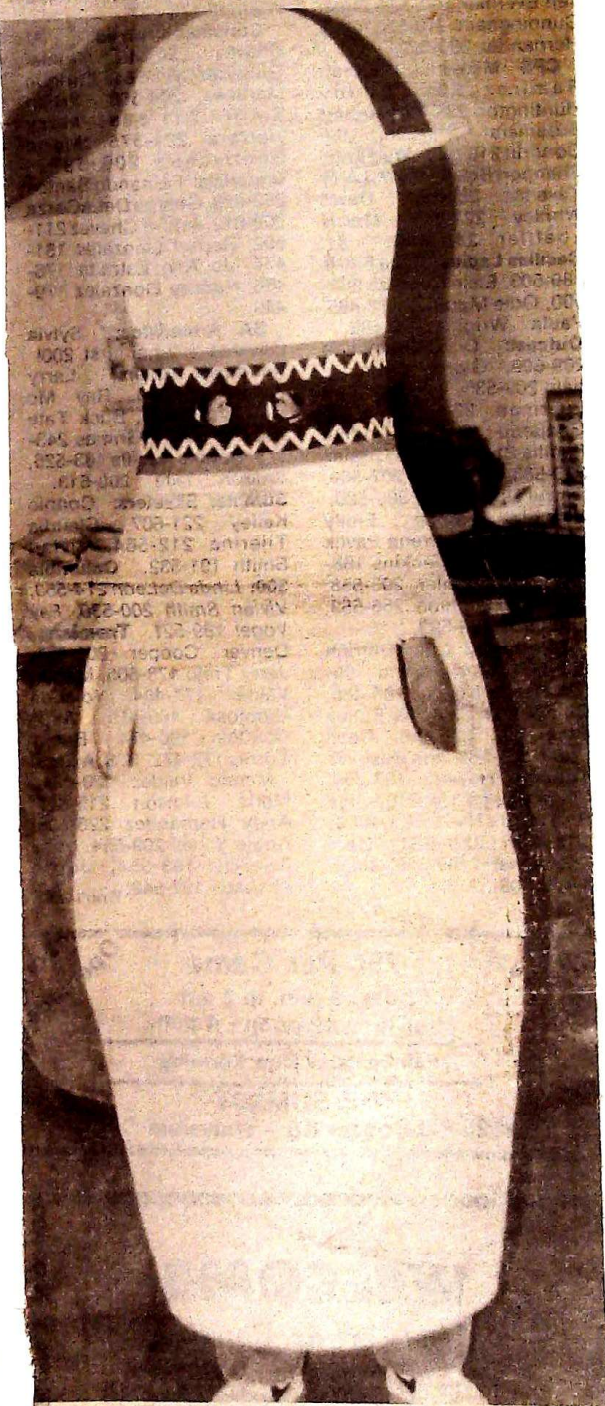

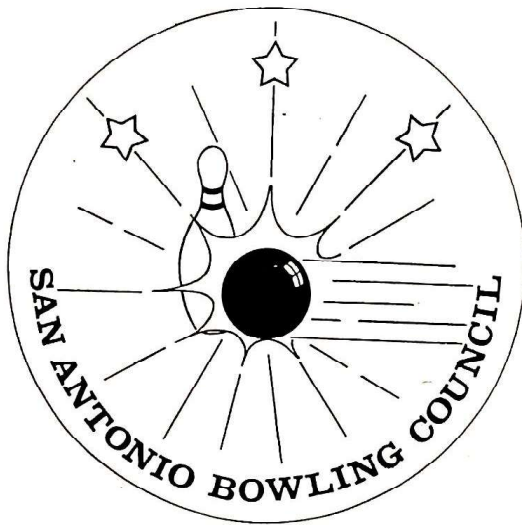

State Bowling Council Stages Jamboree This Weekend

It's Happy Birthday-time for the Texas State Bowling Jamboree this weekend at El Tropicano, the hotel on the river downtown, for bowlers across the state.

Festivities begin tonight for those registered at a Mini-Fiesta - Amigas En Fiesta - at poolside on the second floor of El Tropicano, which will serve as a get-acquainted session for guests.

The San Antonio Bowling Council, led by president Ed Crabb, has coordinated all the activities of Jamboree weekend, which is sponsored by the Texas State Bowling Council for the first time.

Special guests arriving today are Norvell Kirsch, Group Executive, Membership Services of ABC, Jim Belesle, Director, YABA National Tournaments and Mrs. Margaret H. Howell, representing WIBC.

Purpose of the Jamboree is to give local association members an opportunity to visit with state and national leaders to discuss items of mutual interest to all bowling family members.

It's an opportunity to get answers to questions to assure smoother running leagues, efficient association operations and to learn all that's new on the national scene.

The first of the all-day sessions begins with the YABA portion, followed by a general session with discussions aimed at mixed leagues. The assembly will divide into separate groups for the WIBC and ABC portions of the Workshops.

During the afternoon session a 12-minute film will be shown by ABC.

The weekend will be

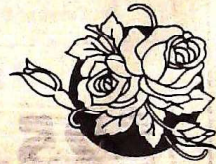
climaxed by the Jamboree annual banquet and the 25th birthday celebration of the Jamboree. Stan Schoenfeld will serve as Emcee for the banquet.

Nearly 300 guests are expected at the conclave.

Oh, what a gala birthday the Texas State Bowling Council Jamboree had last weekend when more than 300 Texas bowling officials invaded our city.

Mrs. Margaret Howell, of WIBC, Norbert Kirsch of ABC and Jim Beleele of YABA were special guests at the Jamboree from Bowling Headquarters in Greendale, Wisconsin, and they found Texas hospitality to their liking.

Festivities began Friday evening with a Mini-Fiesta at poolside, with a too-heavy pinata and the clever "Mr. Ten Pin" from Super Bowl greeting guests complete with a Mexican sombrero and marachas -- and dispensing a generous of pinata candy to one and all. Guests munched on tamales, tacos, quesadillas, chiii conqueso and received a complimentary margarita plus a souvenir cup. A lively band of Mariachis entertained joined by a very talented dancing waiter from El Tropicano who intrigued the guests with his authentic Mexican folk dances. Even Mr. Ten Pin took a turn on the stage dancing to the lively music.

But on Saturday is was down to work on a full agenda as Jim Beleele, YABA National Tournament director, brought his message of activities on the junior and collegiate bowling scene.

Delegates to the general session met State Council representatives who advised that San Antonio had been selected as the site for the 1985 State Senior Mixed Tournament; advised that Fort Worth would host the 1985 State Mixed Tournament, and Beaumont was selected as the site for the 1986 Jamboree. Del Rio will be host next year for the Jamboree, handing out lapel pins which encouraged "Head For the Border".

Selected as president of the State Council was Ray Loffland, a Fort Worth proprietor, with TWBA president Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls to serve as vice president and Jack Shuffler, Dallas, Secretary of the Texas State Bowling Association named secretary. Sylvia Broyles is tournament director for the State Council.

During the general session guests were treated to a film on the new device suggested by ABC for checking award scores, and more information on this will be forthcoming in the future.

Mrs. Howell brought warm greetings from WIBC to the ladies at the session and gave everyone a quick lesson on parliamentary procedure with Sylvia and Beverly McLendon, both WIBC Directors, giving a humorous recitation to make the points. Afterward four teams of guests participated in a rules question/answer game using a Family Feud format, which was well received by the delegates.

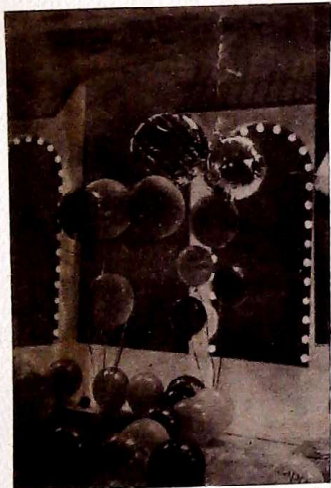
After a busy day of learning, questioning and advice-getting, delegates retired to change for dinner. Happy hour was exactly that as the dinner guests socialized and enjoyed a marvelous dinner and dancing to the great music provided by the Sagebrush band.

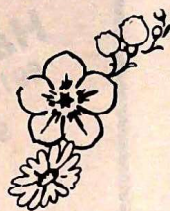

"Skittles" Delightful New Addition

The first forms of pin bowling in North America were variations of Nine Pins, patterned after Skittles, which was popular in England, and Nine Pins popular in Europe.

Mary and Joe Carmack of Wonder Bowl opened their own "Skittles" last weekend -- and what a gala celebration it was! And their Skittles is not one pin short - it is gorgeous!!

Oldtimers will remember that the space now to be occupied by Skittles was the squad room built in 1967 in preparation for the WIBC tournament in 1968. Once known as the El Toro Rojo room the space has held various ventures since that time -- but nothing can compare to what it is now.

The Carmacks commissioned talented Mark Patterson of Alegre Interiors Inc to completely remodel the west side of the 40-lane center. Outside additions

were several attractive planters to add not only dimension, but color to the front. The almost unused entrance which was the entrance to the billiard room now leads directly into the area which was the 11th frame lounge -- and it's been paneled, with glass highlights and half a dozen magnificent hanging baskets.

To your left as you enter is a delightful disco room where George Basset spins the platters each Tuesday, Friday and Saturday evening. To your right as you enter is an attractive billiards area featuring six regulation size tables. And now added are backgammon games for anyone's pleasure, a juke box with all types of music for listening pleasure (whenever the d.j. is not on duty) and a complete list of regular and exotic drinks from the lounge.

One new addition will be most popular with the bowlers entering the building through the main doorway -- sliding glass electric eye doors -- no more door handles to grope for while trying to juggle multiple bowling bags! It's going to be heaven!

"We are always delighted when other centers are remodeling their centers for the city's bowlers," said a proud Joe Carmack, "whenever they do, we can always to a little more."

The center has also revised its snack bar menu and added are daily luncheon specials - and a few of the tasty items listed

now are chicken fillets, mushrooms, cheese stiks and cheese and bean nachos.

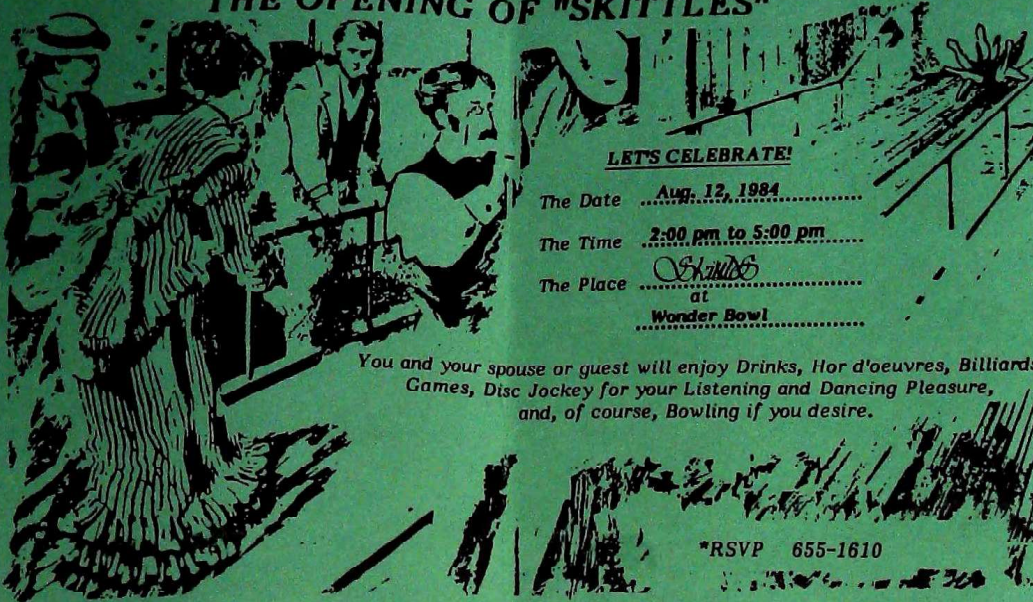
Enjoying the Carmack hospitality and the new look and signing the guest book Sunday were several local association dignitaries and many of the center's league secretaries and presidents.

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League Officers Workshops Lively and Informative

By the time you read this the San Antonio Men's and Women's Bowling Associations will have completed four highly successful League Officers Workshops -- and that was the only word to describe them -- successful!

Hundreds of league officials gathered for two sessions of the Workshops at Pecan Valley Country Club on Tuesday and many more came to the Sheraton Motor Inn on Thursday to receive their league supplies for the coming season and to learn about the rules changes; what's on the calendar for bowlers in the months ahead and to learn more about the abominable tax imposed on bowling.

Each session was lively and productive as the two

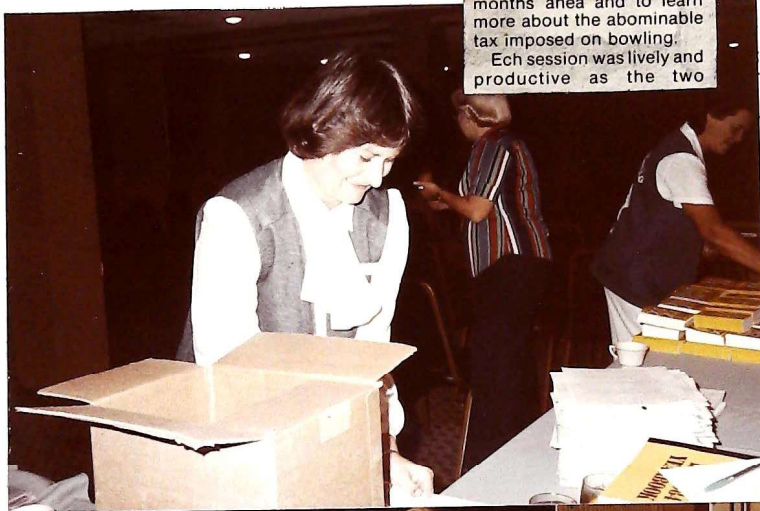
association secretaries were available for guidance in completing sanctions, membership applications, and explaining each of the required forms for smooth running leagues. The awards programs were covered as well as upcoming tournaments and events.

Officers and directors of both associations dispensed bowling materials by the pounds, and secretaries were urged to obtain an Employer Identification number at the banks where league funds are deposited to avoid paying personal taxes on league bowling

accounts. In the past many secretaries have used personal Social Security numbers in dealing with their league accounts and the Employer I.D. number eliminates this added paperwork. Proper forms are in the material from ABC or may be obtained by contacting the SAWBA office.

The newly imposed sales tax on bowling was much on everyone's mind, and both Bob Martin of SABA and Louise Mangelsdorf of SAWBA brought the league officers up to date on the new contracts to be signed by the leagues to avoid payment of this new tax on league play. Secretaries who did not attend the workshops, should contact their bowling centers immediately for these contracts so that their exemption is on file prior to October 2.

There's a wealth of new information from ABC and WIBC for use by leagues, and prior to the beginning of any league, secretaries or presidents should contact the association offices for all the details.

Time for bowlers to unite over tax

Wake up, bowlers! Can you imagine what nearly a half-million people could have done if they had answered the alarm? Plenty.

No one listened to the bowling hierarchy, including concerned proprietors, who said that the sport was going to be included in the \$4.5 billion tax package passed by the Texas Legislature during its June special session.

As a result, bowlers will be paying 5.7 percent per game more to bowl, and the same figure is attached to all rental equipment, including shoes. That's about 25 cents more per series.

Even the centers with lounges and arcade games were affected. The tax on gross receipts from the lounges went from 10 to 14 percent, and the games tax was doubled.

The law takes effect Oct. 2. And, consequently, bowlers will share the burden of the tax.

The functions of the tax-exempt organizations, those affiliated with the American Bowling Congress and the Women's International Bowling Congress — local associations, church groups and school groups — will not be affected.

Only taxed sport

The revenue generated by a half-million regular bowlers in league and open play would be enormous. The state lawmakers saw this and, apparently, that's why bowling is the only sport directly taxed.

Individuals are taxed for attending other sport functions, via a sales tax on tickets. However, there is not

a tax for swinging baseball or softball bats, golf clubs or tennis racquets, or throwing a football, shooting a basketball or kicking a soccer ball for recreation.

The odd thing about the entire proposal is how the state expects to police each center. Or, will every league become a church or school-related tournament?

The ultimate repercussions have not yet been felt. Indeed, the extra expense could virtually destroy the 'open-play' concept by keeping bowlers away. It could also eliminate the special considerations centers give to the handicapped and special olympic bowlers.

It is unfair to see a regular form of fun for nearly 500,000 juniors, adults and senior citizens taxed because they did not have a sympathetic ear in the Legislature.

Didn't consider impact

Apparently, all the politicians saw were the participation figures and the number of centers. They did not consider that a percentage of bowlers are senior citizens, who are on fixed incomes. Can they afford to bowl now?

Nor was the non-working junior bowler considered. The lawmakers should have asked themselves if they could afford an extra 25 cents for lineage for their youngsters three or four times a week. Nor was impact on the middle-class citizen, which the game basically attracts, considered.

Who's to blame? The bowlers.

Where were the half-million letters to state legislators denouncing the plan? Where were the people in

the galleries protesting the action? There were a few but not nearly as many as there should have been.

Bowlers have become too apathetic. There is not much concern for situations affecting the game when a bowler leaves a center. Too many bowlers have taken that 'I bowled, that's it' approach.

With the prices of lineage and other bowling accessories steadily increasing each year because of equipment, production and maintenance costs, a tax certainly was not needed.

Bowlers, we should have voiced our opinions. It is way past time to stand up collectively to protect this outlet of relaxation and fun. Too often, we sit back and delegate others to voice our opinions, or hope that someone else will do the protesting.

It is time for the silent majority to stand together and be concerned. Who knows what's next? The game has been one of the most inexpensive forms of entertainment and recreation available, but for how long?

Bowlers missed the alarm this time, but there is hope. If enough bowlers voice their disapproval by

writing their representatives, the tax could possibly be repealed.

"We can't afford the tax," admits Orville Downs of Thousand Oaks. "We have to pass it along to the bowlers. We don't understand why we were the only sport taxed after being exempt all these years.

"We should have had the galleries full when the vote was taken. Either tax all sports or take the tax off bowling.

"We were exempt after the first round of voting," Downs continued. "However, as I understand it, Governor Mark White talked it back into the package, and it passed the next time. Each center has a voting box and are registering bowlers to vote in the next election. We want to get the tax repealed."

John Moore of the state comptroller's office would neither deny nor confirm that leagues signing three-year contracts with a house before Oct. 2 would be tax-exempted also.

Nevertheless, bowlers will have to live with the tax package for at least the next three years.

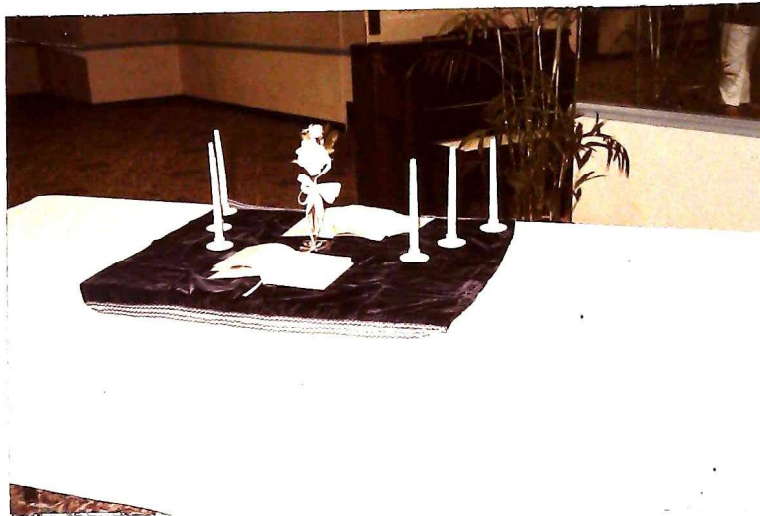
Highlight of the meeting will

New President In Office New Life Member Named

For the 73 members attending the Open Membership Meeting of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn. at the Sheraton Monday night it was a night to applaud fellow bowlers, to show appreciation for a new Life Members contributions, to remember departed members, to renew acquaintance with the State Secretary and a night of fellowship and love.

Members eagerly awaited the announcement of the name of the lady who would receive the coveted SAWBA Superior Performance Award. The award is SAWBA's highest honor, based on performance during the immediate past season and is given on a point-basis based on each accomplishment.

Members applauded as Awards Committee chairman Madelyn Spreng, announced that for the second time Donna Wallace earned the award for four series over the 700 mark, 60 series over the 600 mark, two individual games of 278 and numerous tournament placings.

"I really didn't expect to win this year," said Donna modestly. "So many ladies had great scores, but I am grateful for the honor and it means as much to me this year as it did the first time."

Donna was Superior Performance winner in 1981-82 season. This year she compiled a composite average of 186-83 for the six leagues in which she competed. Her highest averages came in the Alamo City All Stars (where she was also a member of the first place team with Lynda Martin, Gail Cantu, Janice Bean and Ella O'Quinn), and in the Bluebonnet league with yearbook averages of 189. range of 650 to 699, and an all spare game of 188 in the Majors. Her accomplishments included five first place finishes, two seconds, a fourth and two fifths.

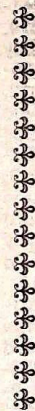
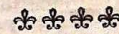

Dinner stop was prior to arrival at the lovely Sherwood-Forest Inn then

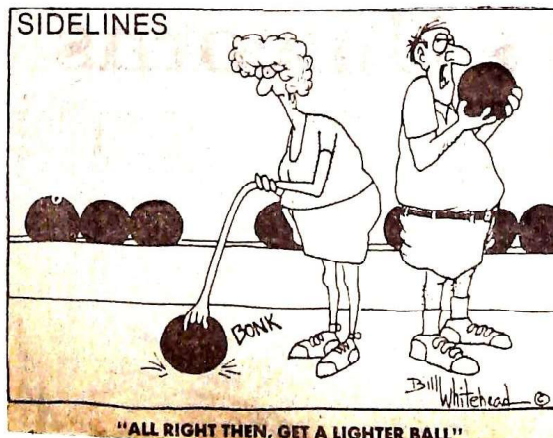
everyone was on his/her own.

Bowling talent reaps rewards

"I dropped all my averages pretty bad," she notes.

Too busy

Wallace had reasons for the drop in average. She was secretary in three leagues, as well as tournament director for three San Antonio 600 Club tournaments. And, she serves on the 600 Club's board of directors.

"I am just delighted to have won it again," said Wallace, who earned the honor in 1982. "The feeling is just as great as it was two years ago."

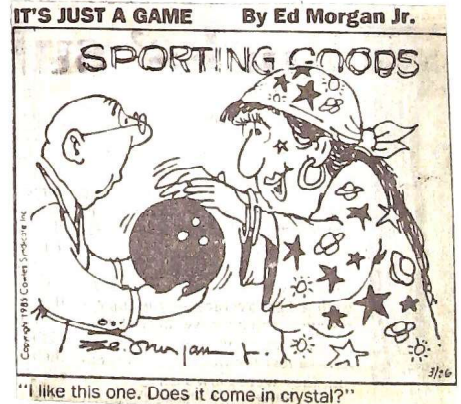
Wallace had series of 719, 712, 707 and 702, and high-games of 278, twice. She was also a member of the first-place team that set an all-time record in the city women's tournament, and her team earned first place in the city mixed tournament.

Other honors include winning the Martha Washington doubles title with Lynda Martin, and being a member of two league champion squads. Her highest composite league average was 188.

"I'm looking forward to a better season this year," warns Wallace, who bowls in six leagues. "I will have more time for bowling instead of league work. I am going to concentrate on building my average. Now, I have that extra incentive to improve on my statistics."

Liz Williams earned the 'Superior Performance' award last year. Mary Falconer had held the award for eight seasons before Wallace won it the first time. Other winners were Myrt DeFily and Elfi Tomczyk.

Despite the 'extra work,' Wallace's skills still put her at the top of the class.



An Insight To What's Ahead When The Pros Arrive At Ponderosa Bowl -- October 16-20

Local bowling fans will get a rare opportunity to watch the bowlers from the PBA's regular tour team up with the senior members of the PBA (50 years or older) when the PBA opens its Fall Tour with the Columbia Seniors/Touring Pro Doubles tournament at Ponderosa Bowl, October 16-20.

It will be only the fourth time that the touring players will be paired with the senior bowlers, the first three being the Great & Greatest tournament. But for the first time, nobody will know who will be paired with whom when the tournament begins.

All of the bowlers -- 80 seniors and 80 touring pros -- will roll 18 games of qualifying, just like a regular PBA event. After the first three rounds, the

top 18 seniors will team up with the top 18 touring pros for the match play competition. The top senior will bowl with the top touring player, the second with his counterpart, and so on down the line.

Earl Anthony, the retired "Million Dollar Man" who won 42 PBA events before quitting the tour last year, will be in town only as the color commentator for NBC-TV. But the fact that he is not on the top of the money list this year and is not a shoe-in for Sporting News PBA Player of the Year honors probably will help make this a strong field.

Several of the touring pros who are eligible for the tournament probably won't make the trip down because of the location. The second stop

on the Fall Tour is in Indianapolis. So coming down to San Antonio and then turning right around to go back up to the midwest would be a long haul for some of the players from the Eastern region.

But because there is no clear favorite for this year's Player of the Year honors, which Anthony three straight years prior to 1984, most bowlers in contention will probably show up.

There are six two-time champions this year -- Mark Roth, Gary Skidmore, Rickie Sajek, George Pappas, Wayne Webb and Pete Weber.

Roth, of course, leads in the money race, which puts him ahead of the rest of the pack.

But Marshall Holman, who has won one tournament this year, leads the average list by two pins over Roth and is on top of the points list by about 5,000 points. So he is not out of the race if he can add one or two more titles to his 17.

Of the seniors coming in for the tournament, the obvious favorite will be Carmen Salvino, who won the Hammer Seniors Championship in Canton, Ohio a few days ago in his "rookie" senior season.

Salvino and Teata Semiz, a three-time PBA champion, were the two newest PBA members who were eligible for

the Canton event, having turned 50 earlier in the year.

"But the main difference between Teata and me is that he has the body of a 79-year-old and I have the body of a 29-year-old," quipped Salvino, who averaged 220 to win his 18th title.

Dick Weber, a 27-time champion and father of Pete Weber, also will be one of the stronger senior bowlers. Weber won the seniors championship last year.

"It was nice to see an old man like that win again," said Salvino of the 54-year-old Weber. "But the only thing he's got that I want is hair."

With their senior titles, Weber and Salvino became the only two men to win PBA titles in four decades.

In the San Antonio tournament however, Salvino has the choice of bowling as a senior or a touring pro. "I might just bowl in both categories and have them double my score," he said after winning the seniors title. "But I think I'd better shut up before I say something I can't back up."

There will be other names from the past participating at Ponderosa Bowl. Thirteen-time champion Bill Allen, who was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame last year; 10-time winner Harry "The Tiger" Smith, the PBA's assistant tournament director who is a member of the ABC and PBA Halls of Fame; Glenn Allison, who rolled the 900 series a few years ago and has won five titles; Ed Bourdase, Bob Strampe and

Buzz Fazio will be just some of the seniors who will be trying for the \$25,000 prize that will be split by the winning team.

Salvino and Weber will be hard pressed by a "rookie" who will be making his first appearance as a senior just one day after his 50th birthday -- Les Zikes.

Zikes, one of the best amateur bowlers in the world before joining the PBA ranks, owns two PBA titles, both coming in Waukegan, Ill., a record 14 years apart.

Like Salvino, Zikes will be eligible to bowl in either division of the San Antonio event.

Locally, only Louie Blancarte is eligible, while Cecil Caddel of Dallas, the tournament director for PBA's Southwestern Region, also will be in the field.

In the Canton Seniors event, Caddel doubled in the final frame of his last game to grab the last check -- \$1,000 for 36th place.

Some of the other big names, such as Don Carter, Buddy Bomar, Dick Hoover and Houston's Bill Lillard, won't be in the field because they have chosen not to attend the PBA school, which is a requirement for all the members before they bowl in a national event. There is a school scheduled here in San Antonio October 13-14 and 15 at the Ramada Inn at the corner of Loop 410 and San Pedro, but none of the seniors mentioned is signed up for it.

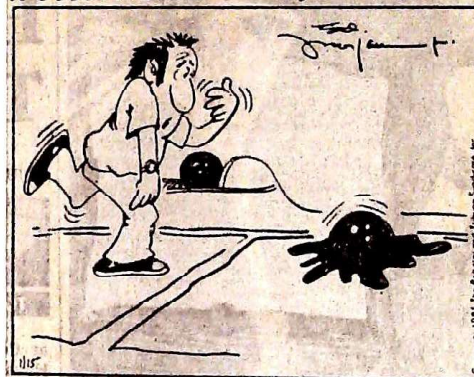
Local fans will be able to bowl with the seniors and the touring pros during the Pro-Am event

on October 16. The entry fee is \$70, which is a small price to pay to bowl with some of the legends that helped built the PBA to its current size.

After seeing the scores from the seniors event in Canton, in which there was a 299, a 298 and a couple of 1,400 six-game series, it's safe to say that the seniors can still find their way to the strike pocket.

And after a good warmup in August, they probably will be more than ready to show today's touring players that they haven't forgotten how to be fierce competitors, especially when it's for more money than they sometimes had to bowl for in an entire year!

Press Selections Features Newcomers

It only took six hours -- and a lot of delicious egg rolls at Chung King restaurant on Blanco -- to select the Women's Top Twenty for the 1983-84 season. Selections again were by Johnny Campos, Harry Page and this writer. Primarily it took that long since there wasn't as much activity for the gals as there was for the guys.

As with the men's selections last week, there was no doubt about the first place -- Donna Wallace -- rolling more games in league play than any other person listed in the new and unique Yearbook.

One wonders how she could cram so much in just a short time. In addition to her four 700 series, Donna showed 575 total games during the season in her six leagues. She also had time to serve as tournament director for three highly successful 600 Club tournaments, AND she was secretary of three leagues.

During her leagues she had 60 series over 600, with numerous tournament placings. She was also a member of the first place, record-setting team in the local tournament.

Eleven of her series were from 650 to 699 and her four 700s were 702, 707, 712 and 719. Her high games were 278s, one in the Misfits, one in the Living Tribute 600 Club event. Additionally she had a 188 all-spare game in the Astro Ladies Majors.

Donna was, of course, named SAWBA Superior Performance Award winner for her splendid year.

There was no doubt also that the gal with the second-best credentials was Kathy Kirst -- the TCBA Bowler of the Year, who averaged 184 in the many centers visited by that ladies traveling league.

Also most impressively, Kathy had a 729 series in that travel league when it visited Comal Bowl, and she had a season high game of 269. She became the local Scratch All Events Champ of the SAWBA Championships last season at Astro Bowl and then-Bowlerama.

Her other accomplishments included a runnerup finish in the Bluebonnet Queens at Conroe, and she was the

scratch all events champ in the Sherwood Lanes ladies tournament. Kathy was 8th in the Top Twenty locally. She had 33 series over 600 while bowling in five leagues. Her highest league average was in the Bluebonnet, 192, her lowest 183 at Thousand Oaks.

Deborah Lauzon and Liz Williams were close for third and fourth, but some of Liz's time was devoted to having and taking care of a new daughter.

Debbie averaged 191 in the Bluebonnet and 179 each in the Majors and Classy Ladies. She had about 15 series over 600, but also two 700 series, one in Bluebonnet and one at Hacienda Bowl. Her best performances were in the TWBA Championships where she won the Open Division Singles with a 656 series. She was also the scratch all events champ of the Martha Washington and fourth in the Queens at Conroe.

Liz earned the city high composite average again as well as slamming in a 277 game, 711 series for the record-setting championship Class A team in

the SAWBA Championships.

Laurie Jo Scales grabbed the fifth spot basically -- on her league averages of 198 for 108 games in Alamo City All Stars, the city's toughest match point league for ladies, and the 193 in the Bluebonnet Mixed. She also had 189 in Super Scramblers and Ladies Majors. Her tournament time was curtailed a bit due to changing employment, but she was also runnerup in the Top Twenty last year behind Gayle Goodwyn.

Two new comers to the Top 20 were Linda Bray, taking sixth, and Lynda Martin, 7th. Bray had the city high season game of 299, averages of 195 (33 games), 184, 182 and 180. She was 17th in Top 20 and won the Martha handicap singles and all events.

For Lynda Martin it was two leagues averages of 179 and 178, but a first place finish in the Living Tribute tournament, and the season high series of 753, one pin shy of the all time city record.

The next five were nip and tuck: Shannon Bell, Linda Stahl, Mary Falconer, Shelley Buchholtz and Pat Rinn -- tough anytime they're on the lanes. Shannon carded her first 700 series just before the close of the season and had averages ranging from 177- to 187 in five leagues.

Linda Stahl, a former local champion, had three super averages -- 184 in Sundown Mixers -- 184 in Good Neighbor Mixed at Hacienda and 184 in Alamo City All Stars.

Mary Falconer earned her spot, although she devotes most of her time to hitting that small round white ball, with a win in the 600 Club Singles, and two league averages of 189 and 182 in Bluebonnet Mixed and Wed Ladies Classic.

Shelley Buchholtz slammed in five league averages of 187, 182, 178, 177 and 173 for a total of 379 games in spite of full time employment at Ponderosa Bowl, and Pat Rinn averaged 184, 182 and 179 and 178, popped in in 19th in Top 20 and did a lot of tournament management.

She was on the first place Martha Washington team.

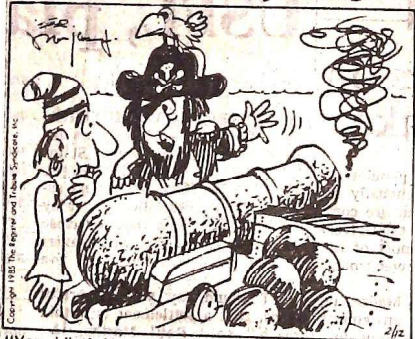
We couldn't ignore those weekly tournaments either -- and the two most outstanding tournament performers were Toni Otto and Jane Roden -- who seemed to cash in all tournaments -- such was the improvement in their games this season.

Both cashed in TTBA, SWABA, one or more 600 club events and Martha, plus putting in improved averages in the Yearbook, and doing well in local and state tournaments. Toni sparked in the Amistad Open and Jane probably was the largest single female casher in SWABA but she also placed high in the Martha.

The last five were the toughest to select this year and there's not a hair's difference in our placings: Beverly Hollowich and Jo Ann Mitchell are previous Top 20 selections and their averages again were outstanding. Anita Melancon is a "dedicated to improvement" bowler who rolled with 170 averages two years ago, now rolling with a 181 with tournament placings. Linda Goode, who throws one of the strongest balls in the city made the selection list for the first time. Carole Poff, who's outstanding in all her leagues and was 7th in the Top 20; and Laura Robinson, based on really good league averages received the nod for the final spots.

Many more ladies' performances were reviewed and some were not included this year based on inactivity on the lanes and in some of the tournaments available to them...but as was the case last year... anyone, of any average, may challenge our selections in Bobby Scales Top Twenty tournament, set for Saturday, October 20 at 2 p.m. at All Star Lanes. Complete information and entry forms will be forthcoming in the weeks ahead.

Texas Ladies Show Only Growth in WIBC In Top Ten

Take a bow, ladies! Texas showed the only membership growth among the top ten state associations! The Texas total jumped by 238 over the 1982-83 season.

Membership overall in the WIBC for the 1983-84 season which ended July 31 totaled 3,886,718, eighth highest in 67 years.

While the figure was 80,506 under the previous season, the percentage of decrease was only 2.04 compared to 2.89 for 1982-83. Leagues for 1983-84 totaled 157,607, a decrease of 2,662. That decrease was only 1.66 percent, compared to the previous season's 2.06 percent drop.

Michigan topped all state associations for the fourth consecutive season, toaling 322,505 members. California led in number of leagues, 15,879. Detroit led in members with 109,023 and leagues with 3,370.

Michigan's membership lead increased to nearly 12,000 over the second largest state association, New York, which totaled 310,876 members. California led the Empire State, also runner-up in number of leagues, by nearly 4,000.

Interestingly, membership leader Michigan ranked fourth in number of leagues, while league leader California ranked fourth in membership. Michigan's total decreased by nearly 9,000 members, but that was nearly 2,000 less than the previous season.

The top ten in order of membership are Michigan, New York, Ohio, California, Illinois, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Texas, Florida, and Indiana. Texas was 7th in number of leagues, and no Texas city was in the top ten in local associations number of associations; nor in number of leagues in local associations.

Blomenberg Sets WIBC Record In Local Association Event

Alayne Blomenberg, Cranston, RI, bowled the way all bowlers dream of bowling last March in the 1984 Greater Providence (RI) Women's Bowling Association tournament.

Blomenberg totaled 2240 to snare four titles in the event plus a new WIBC individual nine-game mark. Obviously, she won the tournament's all events title.

The righthander rolled a 300 game and an 800 series as part of her total. Both came in team competition, where Blomenberg anchored Patriots Plus Two to 2978 and the team handicap title.

Alayne powered games of 300-279-233 for 812, 11th highest three-game total bowled in a WIBC

sanctioned tournament. She recorded 20 consecutive strikes in that series, sixth longest string on record.

With partner Loretta Zoglio, Blomenberg earned the handicap doubles title with 1315. She bowled 729, rolling games of 256-194-279, as her part of the pair's 1297 actual score.

Blomenberg won her fourth title, scratch singles, with the lowest of her three tournament series, 699, as she bowled games of 225-239-235.

Her all events total surpassed the previous record, 2111, turned in by Emma Preambo, Scranton, PA, during the 1981-82 season.

Blomenberg's performance in the local associa-

tion event was the highlight of what turned out to be an excellent season for her. She bowled three 300 games in all during 1983-84, as well as the 800 series. And she finished third in the 1984 WIBC Queens Tournament in Niagara Falls, NY.

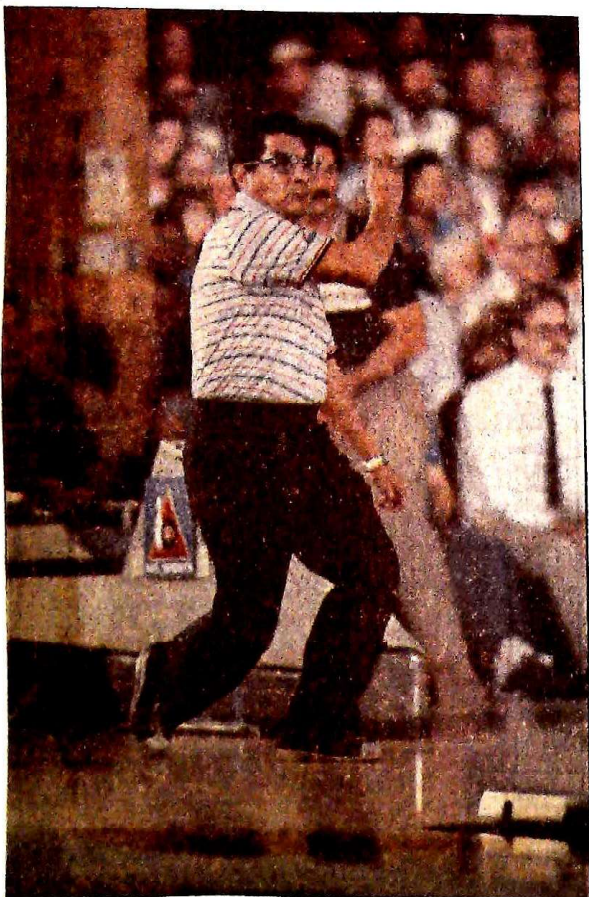

SAWBA Championships To Feature Record Prize Fund

There's a fascination in bowling almost unique to the sport. It's the magic that is Local Tournament-time! And the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association is ready for that fascination and magic!

The local tournament for all women bowlers is set for the first three weekends of next month at The Summit (team event) and Thousand Oaks Bowl (singles and doubles). The ladies will have an opportunity to share in a \$22,397 all-time record total prize fund this year.

According to SAWBA local secretary Louise Mangelsdorf, who is also tournament director, there are 332 five-woman teams entered with 5,877 sets of doubles; 5877 singles and 1,181 optional all events entrants.

Kathy Kirst will be attempting to defend her Scratch All Events crown, after winning the 1983 event with a 1796 total to earn her third city title. Kathy also won the 1977-78 tournament with a 1796, and again captured the 1982 title.

In addition to the scratch all events crown there is also a Handicap All Events title now awaiting the lady, regardless of class, who shoots the highest all events total, plus handicap. Last year's winner, the first to earn the title, was Mary McIntosh, who rolled 1792 scratch, 1779 handicap from Class B.

Defending team champions are the Monarch Trophy #1 team which set a record score in Class A of 2945 last year. Members of the team were Stevie Piotrowski, Patti Hines, Jaye Jean Smith, Donna Wallace and Liz Williams.

Another SAWBA record set last year was by Kim Grell who swatted 529 in Class D singles.

Williams had the tournament high game and series of 277-711 when the event was staged at Astro Bowl and Bowlerama.

Largest SAWBA championship tournament was staged in 1976-77 when the event drew 365 five-woman

teams and largest previous prize fund was in 1982 when ladies shared in a \$21,042.60 prize fund.

In the local Championships scratch score winners in each class are declared Champions. The member with the highest all events total (scratch) regardless of class is designated as Local Scratch Champion and represents San Antonio in the Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament in the spring. Handicap Local Champion is the lady with the highest handicap total, regardless of the class.

The 332 teams entered in the Championships are broken down as follows: Class A: 46 teams rolling for \$1,311; Class B: 132 teams, \$3762; Class C: 131 teams, \$3733.50; Class D: 23 teams, \$655.50.

In Doubles where a \$5,877 prize fund is at stake for the 653 sets, the breakdown is as follows: Cl. A: 80 sets \$720; Cl. B: 268 sets, \$2,412; Cl. C: 220 sets, \$1,980; and Cl. D: 85 sets, \$765.

In Singles, 1306 ladies will roll for \$5,877 with Cl. A featuring 224 ladies rolling for \$1,008; Cl. B: 489 for \$2,200.50; Cl. C: 377, \$1,696.50; and Cl. D: 216 for \$972.

Optional All Events are entered by payment of a \$1.00 entry fee. Totals are 218 in Class A; 457 in Class B; 335 in Class C; and 171 in Class D for a total prize fund of \$1,181.

As usual when the championships are rolled, emergencies occur. Any SAWBA member wishing to place her name on the substitute list should contact the SAWBA office at 824-1321 in the event a sub is needed.

The popular Instant Cash for converting splits or strings of strikes will be conducted at The Summit only and at Thousand Oaks a side pot will benefit the National Bowling Hall of Fame/Museum. 50¢ of each entry goes to NBHF/M and 50¢ from each entry is utilized for a local prize fund for the woman who rolls most pins over average the

second game.

During the run of the tournament the ladies will have the concession stand in operation where bowlers and friends can purchase unique souvenir items of the tournament. Chairman Betty Holzmann advises that one concession stand will be open at each center. In addition the items donated for the Country Store and the items for sale, there'll be an opportunity for ladies to take a chance to win two gorgeous bowling pin lamps created by Henry Briggs, a colorful afghan, shawl and a sweater. Tickets for the drawing, which will be held

after the final team squad at The Summit, may be purchased from SAWBA Directors or at the tournament sites, priced at 50¢ each or three for \$1.00.

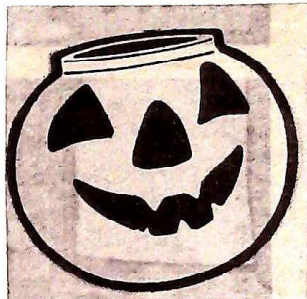

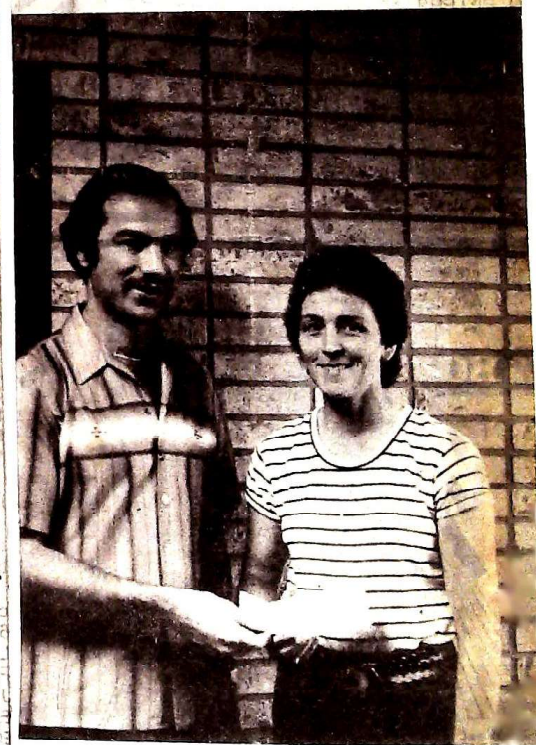

The San Antonio Women's Bowling Association's city tournament has attracted 332 teams.

The event is scheduled to begin its three-weekend run Saturday, with the team event at Summit and the doubles and singles at Thousand Oaks.

Tournament Director Louise Mangelsdorf said there will be \$22,397 in the prize fund.

The doubles competition has 653 competitors, singles 1,306 and all-events 1,181. There are four classes, and there is a special "Instant Cash" feature for the team event only.

Kathy Kirst is the defending champion. Last year, Mary McIntosh, a Class B bowler, earned a record seven titles.

The 48th edition will be dedicated to WIBC and local Hall of Famer Helen Baetz, who will be honored during opening ceremonies at 11 a.m. Saturday at Summit.

That is not the only tournament going on next weekend. The Astro Scratch Match Singles tournament is scheduled for Saturday at Astro, and the men's Top 20 tournament is set for Sunday at All Star.

Cash incentives

The Astro meet, which has a \$50 entry fee, will offer \$1,000 for first place, and the men's Top 20 will have \$1,200 and a trophy for its winner. An extra feature to the Top 20 will be \$2,500 for the first 300 game bowled during the tournament, which has a \$65 entry fee.

Louie Blancarte and Gayle "Rookie" Goodwyn have two things in common: Both won tournaments last weekend and neither was selected on this year's media Top 20 list.

Blancarte teamed with pro John Forst of La Grange, Ill., in the \$130,000 Columbia PBA Seniors/Touring Pros Doubles last weekend at Ponderosa. Blancarte earned \$12,500.

Goodwyn is another story. The little right-hander, who celebrated her 24th birthday Thursday, captured the women's Top 20 championship for the second straight year last Sunday at All Star.

"Since I did not make the Top 20, I promised myself that I would shoot high this season," said Goodwyn, who did not bowl much last season. "I just hope I can keep it going."

Goodwyn averaged 197.3 for 10 games to win the top prize of \$500. The meet attracted women from as far as Dallas and Houston.

Doris Fox of New Braunfels won \$250 for second place, Kirst \$125 for third, and LPBT pro bowler Luci Bonneau of Houston \$75 for fourth.

Donna Wallace, No. 1 seed in the Top 20, ended up fifth for \$60, fol-

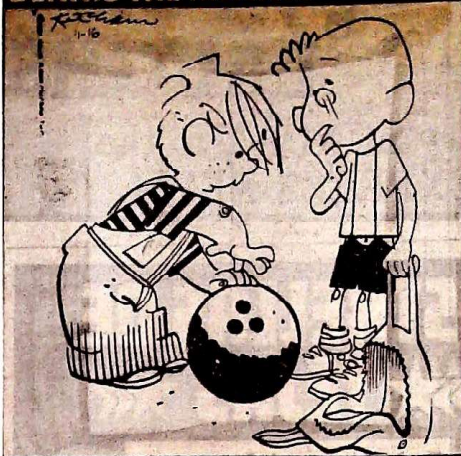
lowed by Linda Bray in sixth place worth \$50 and Merrill Alexander of Dallas in seventh. Alexander earned \$40.

Doris Fox, New Braunfels, was runner-up, earning \$250 for her ten games, which included individual games of 221, two 214s and three games over 190.

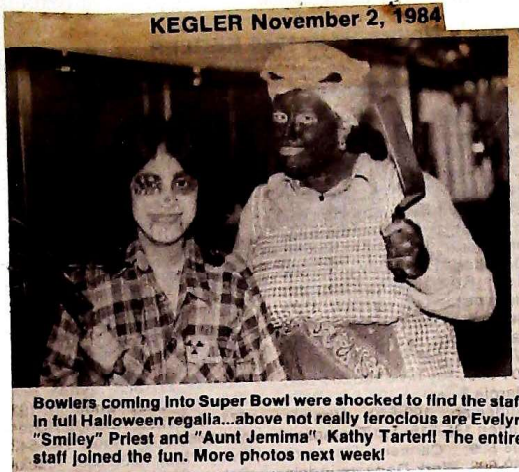

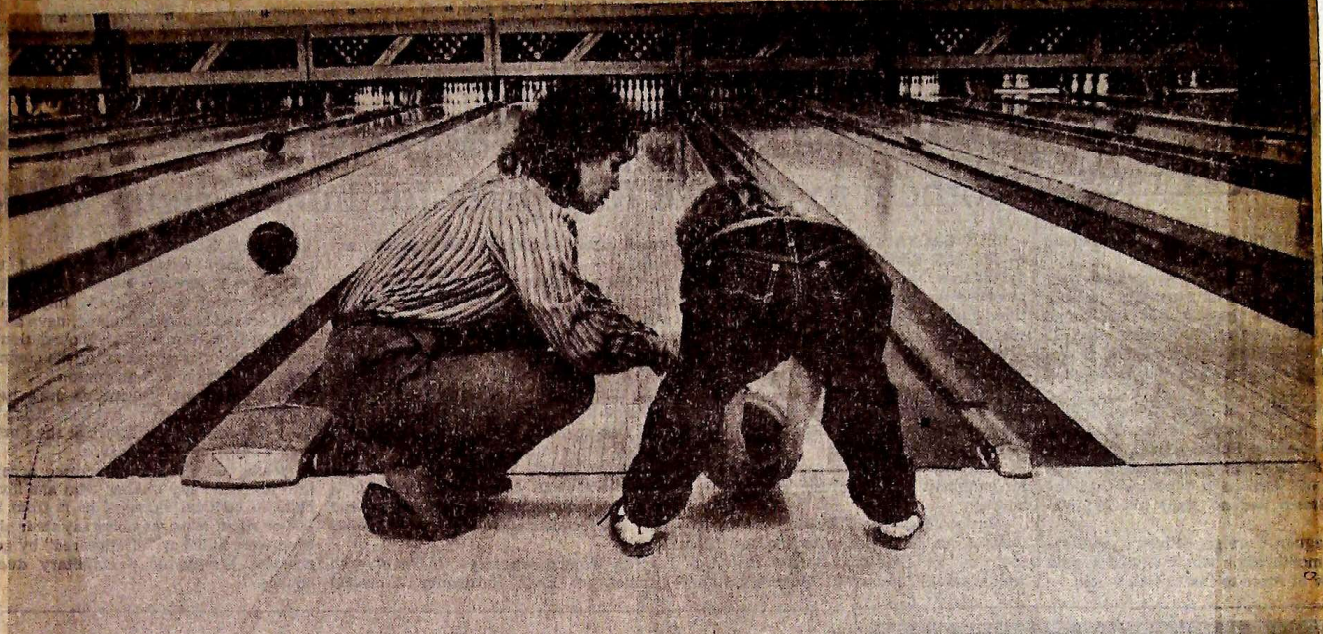

To equalize the competition, the bowlers were grouped according to age and ability, Manger said. Some, such as the wheelchair-bound, were allowed chutes to launch their bowling balls.

Senior Doubles & Singles Tourney Set for Astro Bowl

Our city's senior-age bowlers should be marking their calendars for December 3rd -- that's the deadline for entering the Alamo City Senior Championships at Astro Bowl.

The tournament is for both Doubles (either two men, two women or mixed) and Singles, and entry fee is just \$7.50 per event.
