Dolores Cavazos Takes Hdcp Title

Smooth stroking Ann Martin, who entered the SAWBA Championships with a 180 league average, became the unofficial Scratch All Events Champion -- and the 1984 Local Scratch Champion -- when the tournament completed its three-weekend run Sunday evening.

Martin, as team captain, sizzled in a 625 series in her team event at The Summit for the Slate's Bowler's Pro Shop team (which took the handicap team title in Class A), hammered out 535 in doubles with partner, Nell Gregg, and

put in 596 during her singles.

Capturing top honors and earning the Handicap All Events title was the Class D singles champ, Dolores Cavazos, who also set one of the two turnsprent records for the two tournament records for

Cavazos, a 129 average senior-age bowle, had 468 in team event, 442 in doubles and the record-setting 531 in singles to earn the Handicap title, given for just the second time this year With her 511 pins handicap added to her scratch 1441. Cavazos posted an unofficial winning total of 1952.

High tournament series honors will be shared this year by C nnie Smoot and Gayle Olivares, who each had 634 during their tournament play.

High tournament game honors go to Cecilia Ridgeway who swatted a 277 game at game Thousand Oaks She rolled with a 178 league average.

Senjor honors go to Lenora Rose for 544 (high series) and to Jean Jenkins for the high senior game of 223.

In addition to earning the Class A. scratch team title, the Havlin Paint team also posted the high individual team game of 974, and in Class B the high team game was by Bubbling Brown Sugar, with honors going to Ding How Restaurant with 882 in Class C and to the Summit Mixers in Class D with 790

addition to record setting performance Elida Mahan set a new record in Class C Singles with a 590 series. She had games of 226 176 and 191 off a 138 league

The third record of the tournament was the \$22,397 record prize fund of the event generated by 332 teams. 5877 sets of singles and doubles, and 1181 optional all events

TWBA HONORS THE 1984 CHAMPIONS

From the sparkling fountain of champagne punch through the final toast, the evening when TWBA honored the 1984 tournament Champions was filled with excitement, music and conversation. Champions and their guests were greeted by the TWBA Board of Directors in the foyer of the Dallas North Park Convention Center in mid-September with a fountain of sparkling bubbly and escorted into the banquet hall for a sumptuous meal.

Many "firsts" for TWBA highlighted the ninth annual Banquet of Champions. For the first time in TWBA's 47 tournaments, Co-Champions emerged when Charlene Scheel of New Braunfels and Donna Dillon of Greenville were crowned as overall winners for their scores of 1787 pins in the All Events competition.

For the first time since the Awards Banquets began nine years ago, party-goers were entertained by a Champion. In a deep,

throaty voice reminiscent of the late, great Patsy Cline, the captain of the Open Division team winners, Arlane Mitchell of Dallas sang her way into the hearts of all present. Mitchell had the guests clapping and singing along as she pleaded "if I don't go to Heaven, then let me go to Texas, as Texas is as close as I've been".

Brownsville's Rosie Cantu was the winningest Champion of the entire tournament, as she received honors for Novice Division team, singles and All Events, as well as winning the Class E Doubles with her partner Minnie Trevino, also from Brownsville. Rosie entered the tournament with a 116 average, rolled a 525 in Singles, shared a 995 score in doubles, a 2038 score for team, and put together a tremendous 1537 pins in All Events. She won more than \$1,000 along with the beautiful TWBA Championship Trophies.

Co-Champions were declared in other divisions as Lois Foster, Huntsville and Glenda Hamby bowled identical 625 series in A Singles and Linda Moss, Houston and Mary Magruder, Texas City, each rolled 616 in C Singles. These were first 600's for Moss and Magruder.

Winner of the big and beautiful silver bowls were Debra Lauzon. San Antonio, for tournament high series of 656 and Sandra Boyd, Houston, for tournament high game of 275. Lauzon also won the Open singles event with the 656 series.

As the Champions departed the banquet scene, many cries were heard of "we'll be back next year!" The 1985 Championships are scheduled for Houston, where the TWBA will celebrate its 50th Anniversary of membership in the Women's International Bowling Congress.

WACO IS HOST TO STATE MIXED TOURNEY

The men and women bowlers in Texas have responded and expressed their interest in participating in mixed competition, as the 2nd Annual Texas State Mixed Tournament had to add another week-end to accomodate the entries received at the last minute.

This year's competition is being held in Waco; the team event at Fairlanes Lake Air and the doubles and singles events at Fairlanes Westview. The tournament, originally scheduled to bowl all four week ends in October, will complete its schedule the first week end in November. A total of 554 teams (295 in Class A and 259 in Class B), 1081 mixed doubles (402 in Class A and 679 in Class B), and 1089 in each of the men's and women's singles events will be competing for a total of \$33,843.50 in cash and trophies. This prize fund included the special all events feature of \$2.00.

The tournament is sponsored by the Texas State Bowling Gouncil, and has a dual purpose for the bowlers. One, it provides the opportunity to bowl in state mixed competition, but the main purpose of the tournament is to raise funds for a Texas State Youth Scholarship Foundation. The Foundation has been formed and following the completion of the tournament after prizes have been distributed and expenses paid, proceeds will be transferred to this special fund for the purpose of providing scholarships for the youth bowlers in Texas.

It is expected that the tournament will continue to grow each year, as already there has been a sizeable increase over the first staging last year when the tournament had 364 teams entered and bowlers competed for a total prize fund of \$16,881.

Site for the 1985 tournament will be Fort Worth, and the Gouncil will select the site for the 1986 event when they meet in January. Associations interested in hosting this tournament should contact Sylvia Broyles, Tournament Director, P. O. Box 32024, San Antonio, Texas for additional information.

The Texas State Senior Mixed Tournament was held in Waco the last two week-ends in August, at. Westview Lanes There were 192 teams entered, in addition to 389 singles in the women's division and; 359 singles in the men's division. The senior bowlers ages 55 and over as of August 1 of this year, competed for \$7400 in prizes and the opportunity to represent the state of Texas in the National tournament. Entry fee of \$100 is paid for each of the all events winners by the respective state men's and women's organizations, Texas Bowling Association and Texas Women's Bowling Association

After all averages had been. verified by local association secretaries, the following were named state team champions by tournament director, Sylvia Broyles: Crombie's Team, James Crombie. Capt , Roy Dickerson, Vi Dedrick and John Choate, members with a total of 2456 Singles Champions in their respective divisions were Delores Cavazos, San Antonio with a 702 total and Ed Moore, San Antonio with a 723 total score

Men representing the state at the national tournament are Millard Watson, Dallas (Class A). Ed Moore, San Antonio (Class B); Joseph Makarsky, San Antonio (Class C) and Leslie Davis, Uvalde (Class D)

New City Champ Ann Martin Is Gutsy & Determined

Who is that gal, Ann Martin, who burst on the bowling scene and won the SAWBA Championship scratch title in the just completed tournament at The Summit and Thousand Oaks Dowl??

Well, to begin with she didn't just burst on the scenel Ahn's been here quite a while — in fact almost 27

But it's been just the last ax or seven years when she decided to "learn to bowl aght - or quit".

This soft-spoken, extremely self-disciplined to thander evidently does a taking to herself about her bowling game. She makes a decision and sticks with it.

Ann decided to watch watch some of the better average women bowlers to see what they were doing that she wasn't. And she read, then took a critical look at the equipment she was using - and made some changes. And, oh, how it

But the one change Ann made after bowling in three leagues last season - in three different centers - was a summer-layoff to prevent bowling burn-out. She then studied the advantages of finger. Inserts In her accurate the one league in which she's now competing at Super Bowl.

Those finger inserts, used and practiced with for two months. Ann feels made a difference in her bowling.

But it's the determination she brings to the lanes any time she comes to bowl which probably made the biggest difference. When she steps on that approach this quiet lady really concentrates on each shot. "I usually think about what I'm doing wrong - not that the lanes are at fault." And that is one thing that separates her from the majority.

That concentration and determination paid off in the Local Championships. She and her Slate's Bowlers Pro Shop teammates wanted really wanted - to make a good showing for their two-year sponsor, Charlie Slate.

And, Ann had great praise for her teammates, saying "they're really a nice bunch of ladies who are fun to bowl with."

Ann had some bad breaks in her first game of team event opening with a 157 game. "Terrible" she said, with that dazzling smile that flashes across her face. But it was that we can do it attitude which brought the team through.

The team - Gloria Jones, Nell Gregg, sub Carol Storms and Eva DeMartino followed their opening 840 game with a 915 team score,

with Ann adding a much better 225 as captainanchor.

They finished their play with a 913 team score, with Ann getting even better and a 243 game completed her team effort of 625.

The 2668, with 372 pins handicap was good enough to take the Class A team handicap crown.

The same team—with Nancy Johns as the regular member, placed 11th in the TWBA Championships last year at Fort Worth, but they

wanted a title for their effervescent sponsor - and now they can give it to him.

Ann's doubles partner, Nell Gregg, has a bowling career very similar to Ann's own. She reached that 'desperation plateau' herself - saying 'I gotta get better or quit'. Nell has a SWABA title to her credit already, and some nice placings in that event. Although she and Ann didn't win the doubles, they were in the top 30 in Class A. Nell had a 450 with her 155 average, and Ann added 535 with a 213 high game.

Moving into singles. Ann was well over her 180 average with games of 202, 192, and 202 (596 scratch). She received 48 sticks handicap for an eighth place finish with 644 in handicap, and her first city crown.

Ann's local victory - which still hasn't totally penetrated into her world of reality came just a few weeks after another sterling performance in Waco. Rolling in the State Bowling Council State Mixed tournament, Ann carded the tournament high game for a woman of 280! "I still can't believe that game,' she said almost shyly. "The highest game I had ever had before was in the 250s. It was a good feeling and I really enjoyed the tournament and think it-should be, like our City Mixed Tournament, one of the larget mixed tournaments anywhere," she added sagely.

Ann is also very firm in her belief that good bowlers should be active in several different centers, not tied down to just one center and become known as a "house bowler" For that reason during her career- and particularly since getting serious about her game, she has based her league play at Southside (now Hacienda Bowl), 1000 Oaks, San Pedro, Astro Bowl and now Super Bowl.

As Credit Manager for the NBC North, Ann was previously a switchboard operator. She's finding herself in the limelight a position she has previously avoided. But her talents haven't been unnoticed. She was selected in the city's Top Twenty last year, but titles had evaded her previously

She learned Tuesday night that along with the City scratch title comes the opportunity to represent the San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn. in the Texas Bluebonnet Queens tournament next spring in Fort Worth — an opportunity she's looking forward to.

She also graciously agreed to join some other 'celebrities' in doing some Cystic Fibrosis promotional television spots for the Bowl for Breath bowl in January.

This decidedly different champion is a great representative for women's bowling. In just a short time she's made the Top Twenty-and established herself as a force to reckon with in the tuture -- look for and expect even greater things. She's reached another plateau in her career and has made up her mind to do even betterand from past performance, what she makes up her mind to do, she does.

SAWBA Unveils New

Country Lanes will be the site of the first SAWBA Life Members Invitational Tournament for all members on January 26 -- and what a unique tournament it will be for the ladies!

According to tournament manager Sylvia Broyles the event is open to all SAWBA members, and each may roll just once in the event.

The prize fund will be divided 75% in the Handicap Division and payoff will be at a 1-7 ratio. 25% of the prize fund goes into the Scratch Division and contestants may qualify for prie money in both divisions.

To implement the six games in two blocks feature the bowlers are Squad A will roll their first three games at 10

a.m., returning for their second three at 1 p.m. For Squad B ladies will initially roll at 11:30 a.m. and return for their second three games at 2:30 p.m.

At tournament's end all cashers were Texas lady pros and guests -- and San Antonio was represented by three apprehensive but determined gals who shot at the total \$2500 prize fund.

Linda Urbanek, Humble, was the big winner of \$750 first money after she won six of her eight matches in the finals. Linda accumulated 180 bonus points added to her scratch 3761 total (20 games).

But our three ladies in the finals - Anita Meloncon, who finished fourth; Kathy Sommers, who just missed the cut to the finals by 28 sticks; and Linda Bray, who was 16th in the overall standings -- are to be applauded. Each was experiencing her firt thrill of LPBT competition.

Tournament runnerup was Sandee Eisenhauer of Port Arthur, who was runnerup by 56 sticks behind Urbanek and Cass Leal, Houston, nailed down third with 3825. Both ladies had 5-3 records in the

match finals. Anita - who's affectionally known to many as "Totally Awesome" brought her 183 league average nervously into the competition - cashed in fourth for \$230. For her twenty games in the southwestern regional competition, Anita averaged 190-.75, and an invitation from several pros to join them in Houston when the LPBT rolls after the first year. friends down," said the stocky

"I am so happy I didn't let my righthander, who is a Kelly AFT MM-T Division staffer. "I was nervous and shaking all over,' she said excitedly after the competition, "but I'm pleased with my performance. I didn't panic, even when I ripped my thumb open - that was a lot of game! But the adrenalin was really flowing -- and I'm wondering how long it takes to get off this high!"

Saturday's qualifying brought Anita to minus-178 with a high game of 213. On Sunday morning she was extremely consistent with games of 197, 196, 179 and 191 and she missed very few spares which brought praise from one of the pros.

In the finals she compiled a 4-4 match record, splitting her first four games, but averaging 192.2. Her second four were 3 wins and one loss for a 185

Kathy Sommers is a transplant into San Antonio from Montana (last summer) and she probably responsible for Anita's entering.

Kathy was experiencing the same pangs of nervousness at the thought of rolling with the pros, and she didn't want to enter by herself. So she talked Anita into joining her, and even found them a sponsor -- Steve Hohlier of International Homes and the Prelude Club came to their rescue, paying the entry fee for both girls. Both Anita and Kathy were thrilled to death with the opportunity afforded them and both look forward to doing it again.

Anita, 32, is no novice to tough competition against women. She joined the Air Force in 1973; started bowling in 1976. Since she's been here (1980) from Hamshire, TX, Anita's been, extremely active in service competition. Twice she's won the AF Logistic Command all events title; was second in the 1982 AF Worldwide competition and won singles and doubles in 1982 Inter Serice competition worldwide. She's a 600 Club member and rolls in five leagues per week, plus the TCBA traveling team (Kegler team).

Summing up her first-time experience, Anita added, "I really was surprised at how nice and caring those lady pris were. Their comraderie was great. Spreng, Gaudern, Salzbrenner newest

onorees for San Antonio Bowling Hall of Fame

Antonio Bowling Council will install three new members into its Hall of Fame in Febru-ary, bringing the number of those already

Madelyn Spreng and Ron Gaudern are to be honored as liv-ing members and Walter M. (Walt) Salzbrenner will be given posthumous honors.

In selecting Gaudern, the committee has named one of the truly great bowlers ever to comwe from San Antonio. Mrs. Spreng is wor-thy due to her junior coaching and administrative contributions, and Salzbrenner, who died last year, gave more than 30 years of serv-ice to the local men's bowling association.

Gaudern, now the proprietor/ owner of two local bowling centers, was a "boy wonder" when he first was introduced to the bowling game. At 16, he astounded the local adult bowling popula-tion by reeling off series of 741, 723, and 706 when he was just 16

 after bowling only two years.
 Following a four-year stint in the U.S. Navy he returned to the Alamo City and became manager of Hermann Sons Lanes (at the time, one of the youngest center managers in the nation).

He was San Antonio's first member of the PBA, and in only his second PBA appearance, he finished second to the great Don, in 1946 and gave his time gener-

He went on to even greater feats as a member of the legendary Falstaff team with some of the game's greatest names - Billy Weiu, Dick Hoover, Glenn "Mr. 900" Allison, Harry "Tiger" Smith, and Steve Nagy. He led the St. Louis traveling league with a 225 average for the first year, and he participated in 135 exhibitions which covered 150,000 miles per

He suddenly left the pro ranks Gabriel, Cal. Ron opened Western Columbia, one of the country's largest bowling supply companies.

He also operates a center in Cali-

Most recently, he teamed with Columbia Industries in staging the Columbia Touring Pro-Seniors Doubles tournament at Ponderosa Lanes, bringing nationwide attention to the city.

Mrs. Spreng, a mother of two, secretary of two leagues, also is a past president of the San Antonio Women's Association, who was honored with a Life Membership in 1983. The fun-loving southpaw has done almost everything there is to do in the bowling game. She brought a lot of fun to the game, worked as a junior coach, was leagie coordinator, all before he served 10 years on the SAWBA

The outspoken leader has shared the workload at the state lecvl as well, having served eight years as a delegate, and 10 as a delegate to national. She continues to help wherever and whenever needed, including currently serving as a vice president of the women's 600 Club. She is the past secretary of the council which selected her for 1984-85 honors

Mrs. Spreng, her husband Jack, two daughters, two sons-in-law, and a granddaughter are also ac-

Posthumous honors for Salzbrenner will be accepted by his widow, Emily, an active bowler in two local centers.

Salzbrenner served as president of the men's association in 1953-54, and was a life member in 1954. He joined the SABA Board ously on all SABA projects. He was also instrumental in the formation of the junior program of the city. His faithful amd dedicated service to the game was recognized in 1977 when he received an appreciation plaque for his service. He was asked then to roll the opening ball for the tournament, He began his bowling at 15,

later bowled in leagues with many who were professionals later in their lives. An athletic youngster, Walt played basketball as a teenager against college players; played semi-pro baseball in California, and was active in the bowling family until his death.

The Hall of Fame banquet will be staged in February, at which time each of the honorees will be presented will Hall of Fame pins or a plague. Master of Ceremonies for the evening will be John Jowdy, Sr., with Sylvia Broyles, a WIBC director and lifetime friend of Madelyn's making that presentation. It was October of 1970 when the Council staged its first Hall of Fame banquet honoring Violet E. (Billy) Simon and the late Charles Treuter, and now these three candidates will join the select group of 25 living members and 14 deceased members honored previous-

As this year's selections walk into the Hall of Fame, just as Billy and Charlie did 14 years ago, many of their brilliant accomplishments will be overlooked -primarily because they are too numerous to list in one evening or in one story, and too, because, as in Walt's case, many records have been lost over the years.

Those who will gather at the Hall of Fame banquet will know a great deal about each of the honorees, because they have been lifetime friends and already KNOW about their accomplishments. Hall of Fame night is a warm and wonderful experience - a night of remembering and renewing acquaintances

There are a multitude of

reasons why Ron, Mad and Walt were selected by the Hall of Fame Board, Anyone who knows any, or all of them, knows that their love of the game and the people in it, is the common denominator for them all. Each has given of their time and talent to make certain that the game was better for their having come into it.

Following are some of the reasons for selection - all truly great contributions and truly remarkable accomplishments. You may not know, or have known them,

but we feel you'll be impressed with their backgrounds and credentials which qualified them for the highest honor to be bestowed on one of our bowling family members -induction into the San Antonio Bowling Council Hall of Fame:

Walter M. Salzbrenner

Finding a great deal of information on this gentle man is difficult - he never boasted he was not a flamboyant figure, but oh, the dedication, he gave to this bowling game of ours is amazing.

He was active until his death last year - missed few association, or committee meetings and his contributions were numerous.

A big athletic youngster from Fort Wayne, Indiana, Walt was always involved in sports. As a teenager, along with several friends, he played basketball against college players, and he modestly stated, "sometimes we won."

At age 20 he played a great deal of semi-pro baseball in California, but his bowling career had started long before

At age 15 he was introduced to the game as part of the youth program at his church. Later he bowled in a major league where several members went on to pro competition - but never one to back off from a good match. Walt often more than held his

During the years he lived in El Paso he was instrumental in convincing the league members of the benefits of ABC sanction coverage, and because of his drive and enthusiasm, most of the leagues soon became involved in sanctioned competition.

During World War II Walt served in the U.S. Navy and that is what brought him to the Alamo City.

Just as many servicemen have done when coming here, Walt quickly signed up for leagues - and tournaments. At time of his discharge from the service, he was bowling in six leagues weekly - and somewhere along the line during his bowling career, he earned ABC honors for a 297 game, but few knew that he had accomplished such a devastating feat.

As an extremely active San Antonio Bowling Association official Walt served in almost every committee. Hiscontributions were so great that the men of the city elected him as their president during the 1953-54 season, and the following year he was made a Life Member of the association.

How he loved the companionship and competition of league play - so much so that he was a respected member of the than 30 years. Lumbermen's League for more

leagues at Turner Club over a period of 10-15 years.

One of Walt's greatest pleasure durin his tenure as president of SABA was assisting in the forming of a junior bowling association tournament - he had great faith in the future of the game, and knew that the youngsters of that day would be a great part of

He and his wife, Emily, whom he married in 1948, were favorite and familiar faces at San Pedro when Lew Levinson was owner, and when not bowling they were there to watch others.

No task was too small to Walt he worked on the tournament staff doing whatever needed to be done, and he was organized, respected and pleasant to work with

In addition to his regular SABA duties he was especially fond of working with those attending the sponsor picnic, selling tickets, dispensing beer, or any job which needed to be done

So great were his contributions to the Association - and so great was the respect in which he was held - that the SABA awarded him an Appreciation Plaque in April of 1977 for faithful and devoted service for 31 years

With great pleasure he tossed out the opening ball of that tournament - an honor reserved for just a few.

An embolism first felled this gentle giant, but fought back from that illness, and it wasn't

December 21, 1984 KEGLER Ron Gaudern

November 15, 1935, the first of three children in the family of the late Louis and Margaret Gaudern: Papa Gaudern was



the astute student of the bowling game, and was the principal force in launching Ron's illustrious career on the beginning with his high school bowling at Hermann

But Ron helped himself financing his bowling with his salary from a local grocery store. As a Harlandale High School student he was hired as a part-time deskman until his graduation in 1954.

The tall skinny kid, at age 16 shocked the adults of the city, reeling off three consecutive series of 700 -- 741, 723 and 706, and closed the season with a 197 average -- quite a feat for a youngster with just two year's

bowling experience! Ron enlisted in the U.S. Navy and served four years -traveling to Norway, Ireland, Holland, Spain, Greece, Turkey, France Italy, Japan, Okinaway, the Phillipines, China and Siam.

Following discharge, he enrolled in S. A. College for a **Business Administration** course, paying his way there with his Hermann Sons salary in the evening. Vacation time found him heading for the Brunswick Management school, and thereafter he became assistant manager, then manager of Hermann Sons

Top ranked bowlers in the city flocked to Hermann Sons-not only to learn from Ron, but watch his exhibition matches. He soon reactivated the annual City Match Game championship tournament presented in majestic fashion --patterned after the National All Stars -- professionally staged and capped by a live telecast of the finals.

One of the lures of the exhibitions was the heads-up matches Ron staged with another Hall of Fame member, Fred List. Although extremely close friends off the lanes, they spared nothing in attempts to demolish one another, either by skill or words, when engaged in

combat on the lanes.
There followed lunch-time matches of the greatest excitement, then Ron found the lure of PBA competition to much to ignore. He set his sights on new fields to conquer. The confirmed bachelor of the happy-go-lucky variety, had the blessings of the directors of Hermann Sons, but at his own expense he participated in PBA events.

It took but one sensational performance. Bowling at Memphis in 1960 he flashed into national prominence with a magnificent display of courage, finishing second to the great Don Carter.

His moment of reckoning became apparent as he locked horns with the king of keglers. Pounding the pocket in relentless fashion, he strung out strike after strike for a 243, usually a winning performance, but this time only good enough for a tie. Such a break would have discouraged even the most hardened and seasoned veterans, but undaunted he unleashed another barrage of strikes to subdue his more noted adversary 223-215. Carter won the match with his patented stretch drive, but Ron

had arrived
Participating in a limited
number of events, Ron finished 9th among the money winners for theyear. He earned a contract with the Brunswick Advisory Staff in March of 1961,

that lasted just 17 days. In April of 1961 the folks at Columbia 300 Ball, realizing the potential of its hometown product, lured Ron into a lucrative contract. Ron applied all his business administration ability, and invested heavily in the company and became to

grow in the industry.

A call from Billy Welureceived the unanimous endorsement of the other members of the Falstaff team of the great St. Louis Traveling League. In his first season of competition Ron received high average honors with a 211. On that great team were such noted luminaries as Don Carter, Ray Bluth, Dick Weber, Harry Smith, Welu, Dick Hoover, Glenn Allison, Al Savas and Bill

Ron also made his presence known in the Missouri Match Game championships, rambling along at a blistering 216 average pace for the 100 game grind, he swept aside many stalwarts of the day.

Ron's two nationally televised appearances resulted in record breaking performances by the opposition. Pitted against veteran Steve Nagy on Milton Berle's Jackpot bowling show, he put in a 5-strike

performance, only to lose to Nagy's 6-strike performance. His second appearance was on the Make That Spare Show found Monroe Moore's conversion of 4-7-9-10 split, and a jackpot payoff of a record \$17,000.

At the peak of his career after finishing 18th in 1960, 27 in 1961 and 31st in 1962 on the leading money list. Bon suddenly quit the pro ranks andwent into business at San Gabriel, Calif. and his Western Columbia firm has grown to be one of the most reputable and profitable in the country. He has since added a bowling center there — and most recently acquired both At the peak of his career after recently acquired both Ponderosa Bowl and Hacienda Bowl here.

Ponderosa Bowl expanded to 40 lanes in order to house the Columbia PBA Touring Pro/Senior Doubles just a few months ago and plans call for the expansion of Hacienda Bowl to give even more lanes to the city's southside.

He's a tough man to catch up with - as we found when setting up the announcement meeting. We found him in California on his way to San Antonio but just for a brief meeting and lunch -then off to Dallas - then back for jury duty here - and back again to California!

He's always been a man on the move, and now his movements have led him to the portals of the Hall of Fame. It was a wise decision!

She had their respect, and when "Coach Spreng" witnessed misconduct conduct - or delay of the game she needed only to give them "the eye", and they knew to straighten up and get their minds on what they were doing!

She has loved the team concept of this game - but as an individual performer has earned more than her share of awards for high games, or high series. It seems hilarious now when she first came for bowling lessons from Dee Waugh, she almost became a 'righthander'. Dee was not aware that Mad was a 'lefty' and her instructions were geared for a 'righty'. Mad will still tell one and all that it is easier to coacha bowler by a



Making beautiful music together

Bob & Dorris Tanner

Bob Tanner has definitely figured out how to do it: "She's willing to do all the work," he says of wife, Dorris, "and I'm willing to loaf."

The Tanners are owners of TNT Record Manufacturing, built from scratch and sweat and determination nearly 40 years ago. Claims to fame include "La Cacahuata," on the Tanner's own "Disco Grande" label — for which the Tanners are still receiving which the Tanners are still receiving checks — and the original recording in 1957 of "City Lights" by Bill Anderson. The following year, Ray Price took the song to the top of the charts nationwide, and Mickey Gilley did the same

During the Great Depression, Bob worked as a jukebox distributor in Los Angeles. "The most I ever made working for somebody else was 35 cents an hour," he says. So he moved to San Antonio and did the logical thing. He became his own boss, making plates to stamp out records, taking photographs of hopeful musicians, printing music and sending custom-made albums to people all over the country. All, of course, was done with the help of Dor-ris, his "proficient, efficient" book-keeper. In no time, the two had built a million dollar record manufacturing business. The couple went into retirement in 1973 but, "due to circumstances beyond our control," found themselves back in business last April.

These days, the bookkeeper is boss. "She knows her job and I know mine," says Bob, sitting in his office at 1422 W. Poplar St. "She looks after the print department, talks to customers, oper-

ates the dark room and is addicted to the computers. My main responsibility now," he says, pausing to giggle, "is bowling."

Married for 30 years and business partners for even longer, the Tanners have stayed together because, "we don't try to upstage one another," Bob don't try to upstage one another," Bob says. "I respect her abilities and she re-spects mine, which I don't have." Be-sides, he adds, "we can't afford to sep-arate. We can't even afford to die."

Dorris, who joins the conversation after running around supervising personnel, checking in on the printing press and helping direct an 18-wheeler into the driveway with a

wheeler into the driveway with a truckload of vinyl for records, manages to find a few moments to add her own thoughts. "We're friends as well as sweethearts," she states simply. "We're different than most couples," continues Bob. "We don't think like the average couple thinks. The average person in this day and time is very restless. That's why they don't very restless. That's why they don't stay together."
"Let's don't go into the psychology

of other couples in our story," begs Dorris, before slipping out again. "She's a little tougher than I am," he says softly after her exit. "She runs the credit department."

Not only do the Tanners work together, they play together, too. Both have been bowling since 1957. "We're fair," says Bob, who recently bowled a 628 three-game series. Dor-ris, secretary of the 36-team Astro Skylarks, earned a trophy for a 266 game some years back. "Putting our ages to-gether," says Bob, "it would be pretty hard to beat us." He will not, however, divulge his age, fearing that it might scare away young women.

And with that, he's off to bowl, leaving Dorris and the plant behind. "At least three billion people," he says with an irresistible grin, "would like to be in my shoes.'

Budweiser Hall of Fame Qualifying Begins

Next Week At Most Centers

For the past three years the Budweiser beer company (Anheuser-Busch, Inc) has generated more than a half-million dollars for the National Bowling Hall of Fame/Museum in St. Louis. The exciting qualifying for national doubles competition with some of the sport's greatest begins this weekend. running until January 26.

Budweiser and Bud Lite distributors nationwide are joining hands with local associations and bowling proprietors to stage the qualifying tournaments and league bowlers may use their league scores for qualifying.

After regional leaders are determined the top 12 will be paired with Hal of Fame members in the National

under or over average of the amateur-will be combined with the Hall of Famer's score in each game and 30 bonus pins are to be awarded to the team outtotalling the opponent after each two-game match.

That's for the national finals — but here at home the Bud Hall of Fame tournament is one of the easiest to enter-come to the center for your regular league playget an entry form from your league secretary or from the desk—pay one dollar (\$1.00) entry fee before the end of the fifth frame of the first game — and bowl your heart out each time you participate in league play!

The bowler going most pins over average wins the special cash prizes awarded. One half of each entry is for the local prize fund, and one half is for the National Bowling Hall of Fame and Museum now open in St.

Many bowlers will like one of the rules which says that if your current league average is 10 pins LOWER than your current. (for 12 games) average, the bowler may use the lower average.

For centers who wish to give this opportunity to their bowlers, but do not have entry forms or full details, call Shirley Lehman, Wonder Bowl 655-1610, to copy, the entries and promotional material.

More than 1873 centers have signed up thus far to participate in the event. Local SABA and SAWBA officials will be helping the proprietors with generating entries. Local and state associations, as well as bowlers, are eligible for awards in the five Budweiser marketing areas serving as regional boundaries.

Dick Weber and Betty Morris were the leading vote-getters (for the second straight year) in balloting by national bowling writers. The national finals will be May 13-16 at Crossroads Bowl in St. Louis.

Remember to bring an extra dollar - and pay before the fifth frame of the first game, though - you could parlay it into a \$10,000 windfall!

Any regrets about your bowling game? "Sure, I was so mad at myself in the 198 game - I should have had a 200, but I got too excited with everyone watching, - and I missed them. It bothers me too that I can't bowl better, because I don't want to let my team down, she said.

Her teammates, Louise, Schmidt, Margo Brewster and Joan Vick - don't share that feeling though. "We can almost always depend on Marguerite to pull out a game in the tenth frame. She's such a fierce competitor and she never quits trying."

Happy 85th Birthday, Billy Simon !!

Saturday is a very special day for a very special lady!! Violet E. (Billy) Simon, a member of almost every Hall of Fame there is, is celebrating her 85th birthday. For this special day friends and relatives began arriving early this week and the San Antonio Women's 600 Club will be marking that special day with their Billy Simon "Bring A Friend" Doubles at River City Lanes.

Billy is remembered for a multitude of good deeds but perhaps most importantly, she was the lady who introduced San Antonio women, to the game of tennins---wa-a-a-ay back

Billy took the first teams of women bowlers from San Antonio to the Southwest Bowling Tournament ain 1933 - before TWBA was chartered by

WIBC -- and TWBA is celebrating its 50th Anniversary this year.

That first Southwest tournament drew 16 teams of Texas ladies and two years later Billy was instrumental in bringing the event to San Antonio.

Over the years it has been Billy who encouraged others to bring tournaments to the city, and she has enriched the coffers of not only the association in time of need, but hundreds of other tournaments for women. And, she's still doing it, ask any senior ladyl

Billy purchased her first bowling center - Lions Field Lanes so that the women would have a play to enjoy their game, because in those days the existing lanes were always reserved strictly for the use of men.

the use of men.
It was at Lions Field-which was really a wood

floor with equipment, pin boys, a tent cover with rollup flaps (such as an awning) as sides -- that the women firt met to form the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association.

During her lifetime - as well as she can remember - she has been involved in the operation of at least 19 centers throughout Texas - not all at the same time, of course.

It was through the ingenuity of Billy that San Antonio gave the state bowlers one of their greatest gifts - Helen Baetz. Billy, to use a current term, really "conned" Helen into taking the secretary's position, saying "all you have to do is take a few notes".

It was 21 years later that Helen gave up her "note taking" and retired as Secretary of TWBA, secure in the knowledge that TWBA's future was amply funded and offered multi-service and programs to the state's women bowlers.

It was Billy who brought the first women's professionals to the city when she operated Oak Hills lanes.

It was Billy who was always there to perpetuate the youth bowling program. Today this great lady is honored by having the Junior Scholarship Tournament named for her - and many of today's adults remember their Christmas one-dollar bill gifts from Billy.

It was always Billy who encouraged the women to bid for state tournaments and each was successful and larger than before.

Billy was right there, too, when SAWBA bid for and acquired the giant WIBC tournament for San Antonio in 1968. She even donned her famed Western garb (her trademark for years) and strolled across the stage during the bid skit to help the local ladies.

The friends she met over the years from all parts of the country, still come to local delegates at National and ask for Billy.

It was Billy who was honored with Hall of Fame and Member Emeritus status in TWBA. Locally she was the first women inducted into the S. A. Bowling Council Hall of Fame. She was the first Life Member of the San Antonio 600 Ciub and the list goes on and on.



Billy was our first to be inducted into the WIBC Hall of Fame and she was the first -- and only -- national champion. Billy and her partner, Erna Haufler, now deceased, earned the WIBC Doubles title in 1935.

Billy's greatness on the lanes is legendary. She reeled off series over 600 to set a national record. She was one of the first in the world to roll a sanctioned 700 series.

She ramrodded the state and local proprietors associations urging all proprietors to help each other - to help promote the bowling events regardless of

which center was host proprietors.

In the 1930s this native of Minnesota was in ill health. She and her friend, Babe Campbell who passed away just a few months ago, stuck a pin in a map and headed for San Antonio — and the city has never been the same sincel

Her natural curiosity is what brought her to the lanes in Minnesota first. It was there she learned about that "men's game" of bowling. One day she tried it and enjoyed it all of her life -- and still does.

That miserable weather up north was a blessing in disguise to all of us in bowling because that weather is what sent Billy Simon to Texas.

For lo these many years Billy has given so much to the game and asked for nothing in return. She's introduced thousands to the game. Many years have passed since she was able to compete, but nobody forgets Billy Simon, even though she isn't able to go to the lanes daily as before.

The years have take their toll on her physical body, but the mind is as sharp as ever - the speech a little slower - the smile always there - and the caring attitude undiminished. Billy loves the game and the people in it. How proud she is of the progress bowlers have enjoyed, never recognizing that SHE made much of it happen!

Billy Simon is indeed a legend in her own time. It seems so inadequate to say just "Happy Birthday, Great Lady", but-that truly sums it up --- "Happy Happy Birthday. Great Lady---and Thank You for all you have given us"!! May the next 85 years be as happy and productive as the last! We love you!!



Hall of Fame Excerpts...

John Jowdy, Jr. served as Master of Ceremonies for the just completed Hall of Fame Banquet honoring Ron Gaudern, Madelyn Spreng and (posthumously) Walter Salzbrenner. Response to his remarks has been so widespread that these excerpts are given so that everyone can enjoy his message.

We are here this evening to honor some very special people. They are in a word -Winners 1 they are part of that small percentage of people who are able to rise above the rest. Zig Zigler tells the story of the baloon salesman at the carnival: releasing colored baloons to attract a crowd, first a blue, then a green, then a red.

A little black boy was watching and went up to him and asked: "Mister, if you releae a black baloon will it go up too?"

The salesman looked down and said, "Son, it's what's inside the baloon that makes it go up."

Ladies and gentlemen, I would suggest to you that people are like baloons.

Regardless of race, creed, color and in particular, sex, it's what inside that person that determines the direction they go.

Always up, like a very fewor stays down, like the rest. Talent alone is not the criteria. Everyone of you know a person who had great natural ability, but never achieved their true potential. So what it is then that makes the winner so special?

My list of Winner's Qualities: 1. They are certainly committed to excellence -- to specific goals -- always "I can" or "I will"

2 They know they are not perfect. They admit their mistakes...learn from them...a nd go forward...

3. They work harder than the rest of us, and they are never afraid of losing --because they know that the next time they will win!. 4. They know what to fight

for and what to compromise

5. They have a healthy appreciation of their own abilities, and recognize their limitations.

6. They will only blame themselves, never others.

7. They always give more than they take.

8. They know that every rule in the book can be broken except one -- Be who you are -- and become all you were meant to be."

His closing remarks:

We have had a nostalgic view of the past, which now brings us back to the present.

But what about the future? Future of bowling - Future of the Hall - The future of bowling is the junior bowler. This groups is not a large percent of San Antonio's bowlers, but it is the majority of the movers and shakers, that make things happen.

Get involved in getting the junior bowlers into the bowling centers. Junior programs are off (membershipwise) all across the country. It's time to get involved.

As for the future of the Hall of Fame? 1. Keep your standards high. 2. Never confuse popularity with performance. 3. Always make them able to pass the final test - that a generation from now that Junior Bowler you brought in is now with his junior bowler - they look at all the meaningless names in the Hall, but they then look at the credentials of each member. Let them be able to say, "Yes, he or she wa truly special!"

Will Bowling "Take The Cure"?

Message delivered by Bill Taylor to the Iowa State Bowling Proprietors in Des Moines last November.

A long enduring illness cast upon bowling over twenty year ago, probably in an innocent manner at first, can begin to end in 1985, if the bowling world will "take the cure".

Just as a miracle drug can bring new hope to a seriously ill patient, there is now great expectation for bowling's return to good health, both commercially and sportingly, with the same single dose of medi-

This statement is made with full awareness that bowling presently is very sick and is about to become sicker this season, as the doubters and the fearful worry about the side effects of the prescribed medicine.

It is also made with full awareness that the ABC has been informed by highly respected and expensive researchers in no-nonsense and even stern language, that the ABC itself may be recognized as serving no worthwhile purpose only three years from now, if bowling does not "take the cure" by swallowing its life saving medicine.

What is this miracle medicine? It is simply a return to proper standards in pins, lanes and balls, and to the natural amount of seriousness which will return with those proper standards.

The natural amount of seriousness which prevails in any technical activity was drained from bowling in a slow pragmatic bloodletting which began in 1961, and which is still surging out of the body of bowling in 1984, when fewer bowlers of lesser ability achieved more ABC approved perfect game scores than ever before.

How should bowling take its medicine? Eagerly and hopefully, in large dosages of quick action on lane blocking and other forms of improper scoring rewards such as exotic bowling balls and flimsy pins, both of which to do teach a bowler how to bowl. Deliberately, the medicine is a marriage of honest bowling balls to honest bowling lanes, both of which have been laboratory tested and field proven, and both of which can be implemented in August of 1985, if the chicken-hearted and the pragmatists are not allowed to prevail. Then when proper balls and lanes have improved the patient's condition satisfactorily, as will happen automatically, I hasten to assure you, more attention then can be given to bowling pins, to insure the patient's permanent good health and longevity.

Waht are the ingredients of this medicine, ask the cautious family members? The miracle drug is a blend of "short oil", with lanes dressed no farther than 18 feet from the foul line, and the use of bowling balls without injurious ability to gain traction with a lane surface which is workable with short oil. Under those conditions, a bowler will hit the pocket target only with his personal ability, not with the lanes keeper's special talents. And the bowler will his personal abiity, not with the ball maker's special talents.

Recognizing that personal talent is the only way to success, bowlers will try harder. Thus, "short oil" equates with "practice", and where will people practice improving their bowling skills? In your bowling lanes, and you all know that just 3 extra lines per day adds over \$1000 per lane to your annual net profit.

Wo will object to bowling "taking the cure"? Almost all who profit, even if short term, from bowling's illness. But they are not to be considered. Bowling is first for bowlers and then for bowling proprietors who serve the bowlers, and only then for manufacturers who serve the proprietors and the bowlers. So bowling must be saved in order for its participants and its servants to have any hope for commercial opportunities. And the only hope for saving bowling lies in large quick dosages of proper standards in bowling lanes, balls and pins, and in the consequent return of seriousness to bowling.

Will Bowling "Take The Cure"? I believe it will, because the primary object of living things is to remain living. If bowling wishes to remain alive and regain its good health, just as with the universally dislike castor oil, bowling must hold its nose, open wide and swallow all of its medicine.

As the doctor reponsible for this prescription, my personal guarantee of success accompanies its use if the much needed medicine is "taken as directed."





Delegates were also elected to represent the association at the TWBA annual meeting in Dallas next year.





But Tuesday was a very special day for Hope - and one she won't ever forget. She'd had a very nice game and series (212-547) the previous week in league play, and over breakfast Tuesday, decided "I can do it - if I think positively and concentrate on those spots to help the team."

With that positive attitude Hope came to Oak Hills with her "black and blue" ball (and old Brunswick, the only one she's ever owned, now 15 years old) and slammed in an opening 234 game. That, too, is not so unusual because many ladies have 234 games.

But Hope continued to concentrate on those spots and there followed a 214 game.

Her teammates - Maxine Thompson, Madelyn Schott and Phyllis Kustelski were in happy shock! This tiny

bundle of dynamite (she stands just 5' tall) was bowling like a woman professional!

Of course, the good natured 'ribbing' which often happens in league play when someone is bowling extremely well followed after her two 200-plus games were announced.

"What in the World happened to you -what did you have for breakfast? and what is this positive thinking you've been practicing?" They were happy for Hope, but totally unprepared for what was to follow!

State Senior Mixed Tournament Heading Our Way!

Before last year's chamions take their turns on the lanes in Tulsa, the wheels are in motion for San ntonio to host the State Senior Mixed tournament Aug. 17-18 and Aug. 24-25 at Astro Bowling Center.

Squads during the two weekends in August are at 9 a.m., 11:30, 2 p.m. and 4 p.m.

All Events scores are classed in two divisions men and women as follows: Class A, those 70 years of age or over; Class B 65-69; Class C 60-64 and Class D 55 through 59. Age classification will be based on the participant's age at the time of participation in the state competition.

The San Antonio Council will be encouraging all senior league bowlers to support the tournament, and many are already completing their entry forms, anticipating a very large turnout.




The National Senior Championships have quickly come of age.



It started with a parade of local association Presidents and ended after an evening of fellowship and the giving of annual awards - that 50th Anniversary annual meeting of the Texas Women's Bowling Association at Houston's Shamrock Hilton last weekend.

And, in between were reports of progress for women bowlers and a warm message from the WIBC president, Mrs. Helen Baker, who was special quest for the entire weekend's activities.

Throughout the meeting a concern was expressed over declining membership, even though Texas enjoyed an increase last year, and hopes were high for participation of bowlers in the Olympics.

"I am proud of all the efforts expended in support of BVL and the National Bowling Hall of Fame," said TWBA president Drois Coffman, Wichita Falls. "Texas continues to be among the top contributors to both of these projects, because of your efforts."

Final credentials committee report reflected 292 attending the sessions, with several doze more as spectators. Mrs. Coffman was joined by six other officers, 10 directors, three Life Members, one Member Emeritus and 271 local association delegates.

Two new Members Emeritus were elected by the delegates - Eleanor Rice, Port Arthur, and Herbie Vannoy, Lubbock, joined San Antonio's Billy Simon, Rae Jackson, Dallas, Jewell Starr, Dallas, and Jo Tucker, Houston, in those special places of honor. Only Mrs. Starr was in attendance at the 50th anniversary meeting.

Following the President's Parade, where local Presidents were dressed all in white wearing royal blue sashed announcing their associations, representatives of all segments of the bowling family addressed the delegates. President Georgia Ball of the Houston WBA welcomed the members and guests, a message was heard by James Land, president of the Texas Bowling Centers Assn., which revealed that 2500 youngsters across the state are enrolled in the Grand Prix program and he advised that proprietors had agreed to pay \$50 per lane bed to begin a bowling promotional program.

Lee Burnett, president of the Texas State Bowling Assn., joined Mrs. Georgia Biggs, president of the Texas YABA in extending greetings to TWBA on the occasion of their 50th year of affiliation with WIBC.

As WIBC presient Baker looked forward to 1992 and the 4.5 million members anticipated by then in WIBC, Lil Poole, secretary of TWBA, looked forward to next 'year, advising the delegates that Championship Tournament events will be at Bowl Dallas (team) and Don Carter's West.

The tournament will open on March 14 and conclude on June 29 with an entry closing date of January 16, 1986.

The 51st annual meeting will be at North Park Inn & Convention Center on May 16. Champions will be saluted at the annual Awards Dinner on September 20 at Holiday Inn Brookhollow in Dallas.

Reports before the 50th anniversary luncheon were of Texas YABA, Public Relations, Senior Leagues, State Bowling Council, Site Committee, Bluebonnet Queens and the BVL Fund which reported a record donation this year of \$58,427.

Dorothy Cornelison BVL Award was shared this year by Arlington and Temple WBAs - both raised almost \$2.00 per member in their associations for the BVL Fund.

All delegates were guests of TWBA at the 50th anniversary luncheon and shared two attractive and tasty 50th anniversary cakes.

Three more awards were given after luncheon: The Secretary of the Year award was presented to Dot Kasprowski, El Paso; TWBA Service Award brought tears to the eyes of SAWBA treasurer Helen Kalala; and the Teas Youth Service Award was given to Hope

"Tizzie" Tisdale, Austin, for her work with the juniors and blind bowlers.

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





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
