## SAWBA Members Unanimously Endorse

### Hosting 1988 TWBA !!

It's now official -- the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association will be hostess to the state women bowlers in 1988!

By action of the delegates attending the SAWBA Open Membership Meeting in Country Lanes' Mr. G's Teen Room, the action of the Board (July meeting) was ratified.

It was in July that the Board learned that it was possible to SAWBA to bid for the 1988 Texas Women's Bowling Association tournament and annual meeting two years from now. The Board wired TWBA Secretary Lil Poole



extending a bid for the '88 events. Several weeks later the Site Committee of TWBA visited local bowling centers interested in being host to the events. They also visited half a dozen hotels large enough to house women

bowlers during annual meeting weekend. Decision of the TWBA Board as to exactly which centers and which hotel will serve as headquarters will come at a later date.

## World of Sports- Astro Bowl Selected for '88 TWBA

The TWBA Site Selection Committee breezed into town last week to inspect our bowling facilities -- particularly those five centers which had indicated a desire to become hosts of the 1988 TWBA Championship Tournament -- and we scored well on their tally sheets!

Of the five centers expressing a desire to host, only two could be chosen.

To be hosts for all team events will be the World of Sports, and singles and doubles will be held at Astro Bowling Center.

The San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn., during this year's annual meeting of TWBA in Dallas, used a theme of "Weave Some Magic" and after wooing delegates at the Hospitality Room, received the unanimous nod of the delegation at voting time.

Four proprietor representatives -- Bob Freehauf, Jim Pestello, Bobby Scales and John D'Andrea -- joined the women's delegation in entertaining the delegates at the Hospitality Room.

SAWBA has the state record for the most number of teams entered in the TWBA Championships, set in 1981 when the events were hosted by the Sports Palace and Wonder Bowl.

The local association entered 519 teams, a record broken by Houston during their hosting of the Championships several years later. But the total number of teams record of 3,056 still stands.

During the Selection Committee's visit, members secretary Lil Poole and TWBA treasurer Sue Hunter expressed their pleasure at the cooperation of the centers' management and

commented on the excellent facilities available to San Antonio bowlers.

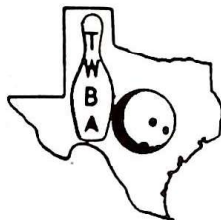

# League Visitation To Begin For 1988 TWBA Championship In Spring!

Say "YES" and "Let's Make Exciting Music Together" is the theme of the League Visitation Committee for the 1988 TWBA Championship Tournament next spring at World of Sports and Astro Bowling Center.

Local Coordinator Tip Pfeiffer joins the Committee extending an invitation to each and every sanctioned women bowler in the city to enter the 51st TWBA event which runs from March 11 through July.

It's for five-woman teams with singles, doubles and all events in six different classes -- so there's a place for every lady -- competing ONLY against ladies with like average.

Beginning November 8th SAWBA Directors, their 'buddies', volunteer SAWBA Service Representatives with help from league secretaries will begin the big "push" for entries. The goal is to visit each and every league in the city promoting

entries and assisting in competing entry forms.

And YES -- there is a deadline for entry! It's January 14, 1988 -- but local entries should be in the SAWBA office before that time!

YES...this tournament is for ALL WOMEN BOWLERS because of the six average classifications -- and there's no out-of-city travel nor a need for baby sitters -- There's a class for every bowler regardless of her average!

YES...for this tournament sponsor and personal checks will be accepted, so there's no need to head to your nearest bank or convenience store for a money order or cashier's check. Entry fee checks may be made payable to SAWBA!

And YES...there's a great deal of prize money to shoot for! Entry fee into team event is just \$11.00 (and \$11 for singles and doubles plus an optional fee of \$2 for all events). Ladies can share in

a huge prize fund since \$4.50 of each entry goes into the prize fund. Last year's total prize fund was in excess of \$212,000 with hundreds of glittering trophies, patches, prize money and a delightful awards banquet the end of the rainbow.

Yes...bowlers may use their current Yearbook averages, but new bowlers are also welcome! Three tournament rules take care of entering averages if ladies did not bowl last year...so no one can be denied entry!

YES...there are more than an ample number of squads to fit any busy gal's schedule. Once the tournament begins with Opening Squad (senior teams only)

on Friday, March 11, team competition will be 12, 3 and 6 p.m. on Saturdays, and at 9, 12 and 3 p.m. on Sundays.

Doubles and singles squads begin at 8:30 on Saturdays ending at 7 p.m. with three more squads on Sunday, 8, 11:30 and 3 p.m.

And...YES...those forms marked "YES" are for ladies who may not know anyone wishing to bowl, but they want to join the excitement of a State Tournament. All they need to do is complete the YES forms and the Committee will find a team on which they may participate.

Once the 1988 TWBA tournament begins begins it'll be seven or ten weekends of fund-raising extended to due to the number of entries; and every San Antonio woman bowler is wanted -- and needed. Say YES...and Let's Make Exciting Music Together !!!

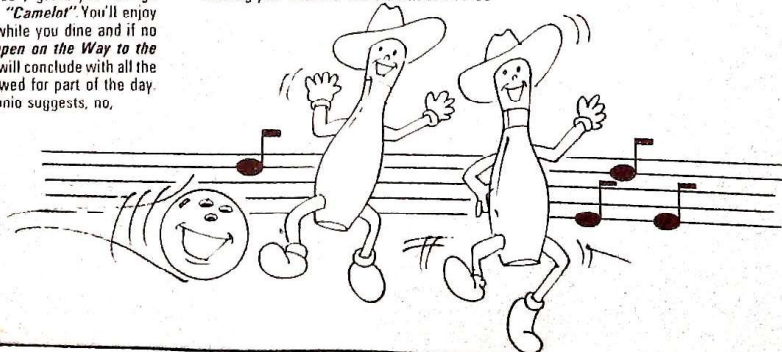

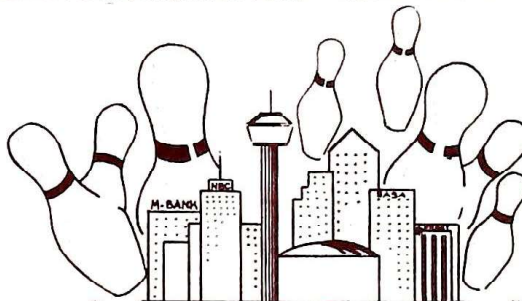

# Deadline For Ladies 'State' Thursday !!

The most important deadline of the year for ladies is less than a week away -- and there'll be no extension!

Absolute deadline for entries into the 1988 TWBA Championship Tournament at World of Sports and Astro Bowling Center is Thursday, January 14th.

SAWBA Board members, volunteer Service Representatives and a host of friends have been asking the ladies of the city to join the "Magic of Music" as San Antonio hosts the 51st annual state tournament and the TWBA annual meeting.

But entries at this point in time, entries are down! And all those ladies with entries partially completed in their desks, in their handbags or bowling bags, need to complete them as quickly as possible this week.

There's no need to mail them -- just drop them by the SAWBA office any time before 4 p.m.

Team event (at World of Sports) carries an entry fee of just \$11 per person. All teams are five member and all teams roll against only those ladies teams with like averages.

Ladies who would like to participate, but don't have a

team on which to bowl, need only to call their center director or the SAWBA office and indicate that fact. Teams will be made up for those in that category.

And there's a place for everyone. Opening squad and the teams rolling opening weekend Saturday are senior age bowlers, and as usual TWBA has some special awards for Seniors.

With the six-class format there's a Class for every lady bowler -- regardless of her average -- and there are 17 weekends available -- so a "just right" date is easy to find. The only time there'll be no bowling will be the

weekend of April 23-24 when the local delegates attend the WIBC annual meeting and compete in the WIBC Championships at Reno, Nevada. There'll also be no bowling July 4th weekend.

Team event is so easy to enter it's unreal! Just gather together five ladies who wish to have the time of their life bowling in a state tournament right here at home. Collect \$11 from each, get their address and zip code, and check the average in the yearbook -- and send in the entry! It's that easy!

It's not even necessary to acquire cashier's checks this year for a local team. Just send a personal or sponsor check and get the entry in the mail!

Come join the exciting music that is part of the TWBA tournament time -- but for heaven's sake don't delay any longer! January 14th is just six days from this Kegler issue! Don't be left out!

## Women on 17-week state roll

The Texas Women's Bowling Association championship tournament begins with opening ceremonies at 6:15 p.m. Friday at World of Sports.

Local Hall of Famer Helen Baetz is scheduled to roll the first ball.

The event continues for 17 weeks ends through July 17 with the team event at World of Sports, and doubles and singles at Astro Bowl. On hand will be 2,669 teams in six divisions — short of the record 3,086 set when the tournament was last held in the Alamo City in 1981.

"My feelings about the tournament are ones of apprehension, because I'm nervous, and confidence, because I think it'll be a good tournament," said Sylvia Broyles, the state secretary and tournament director.

Broyles, who has worked for the past 13 years on the state event, feels let down by San Antonio's lack of enthusiasm toward the tournament.

"Bowling is not given the credit it's due, especially as far as revenue to the city," Broyles said. "It really disappoints me that our city fathers aren't embracing the event."

"There will be about 150 teams, or about 1,000 people, coming to the city each weekend for the next 17 weeks. We're talking about women spending about \$100 a day. At least the hotels and motels in the area know the event is coming."

According to Broyles, approximately 12,900 women will be competing in the city. At the rate of \$100 per day — for food, lodging and entertainment — the meet could make a \$7 million impact on S.A.

"I love this tournament," Broyles said. "I'm really looking forward to the greatest women in the state bowling in our city. I just wished more people in high places would recognize it. Well, you get more with sugar than vinegar, and I'll keep working on the city's fathers."

San Antonio has 335 teams entered in the event, which has a total prize fund of \$208,848.50.

In the open division (850 and up), there are 108 teams, 521 doubles, 1,451 singles and 1,410 all-event entries.

Class A (800-849) has attracted 351 teams, 939 doubles, 2,093 series and 2,055 all-events. There are 745 teams, 1,688 doubles, 3,051 singles and 2,950 all-events entered in Class B (750-799).

In Class C (700-749), 866 teams, 1,853 doubles, 3,040 singles and 2,950 all-events are entered. Class D (650-699) drew 439 teams, 1,142 doubles, 2,074 singles and 1,971 all-events.

Class E (600-under), which now combines the novice division, will boast 160 teams, 674 doubles, 1,925 singles and 1,759 doubles.



## "Musical" Opening For TWBA Set at World of Sports On March 11th

The overture for the "Magic of Music" is about to begin — even though the full 'production' is till about two weeks ago!

"The Magic of Music" is, of course, the theme selected by SAWBA to use in promoting and staging the Texas Womens Bowling Association championship tournament, and later annual meeting.

Opening day for the gala is March 11, and activities begin

when TWBA is hostess to some 225 plus senior age bowlers who roll on opening squad.

The seniors will be feted at a reception at the Wyndham Hotel from 3-5 p.m. and the reception will be highlighted by entertainment by the "Senior Songsters". The Songsters have a lengthy list of credits at various civic and fraternal functions, and will lead the seniors in a sing-a-long.

Opening ceremonies are set

for 6:15 p.m. at World of Sports (team host) and the opening program is dotted with celebrities.

Officially welcoming TWBA to the city will be Councilman Nelson Wolff Jr.

TWBA president, Doris Coffman, Wichita Falls, will respond and introduce those TWBA Board Members, Life and Members Emeritus in attendance. San Antonio's Sylvia Broyles, State secretary and Tournament Director, will be conducting her first TWBA championship tournament since assuming the secretary's post last August.

Performing Master of Ceremonies duties will be popular sportscaster George McKenzie, KMOL-TV (Ch 4) and entertainment will be provided by George Monieta, a former youth bowler and KBUC talent contest winner. Debbie Kirst of Country Lanes will provide the musical accompaniment for the evening. Monieta is a graduate of Churchill High School (now attending S. A. College) who is rapidly becoming known in the country/western music field.

Ribbon cutting ceremonies will be conducted by President Coffman, Secretary Broyles and Councilman Wolff, after which SAWBA Life Member Helen Baetz will roll the first ceremonial ball. Mrs. Baetz is a former TWBA secretary (21 years), and former WIBC Board officer who is a member of the WIBC, TWBA and San Antonio Halls of Fame.

SAWBA president Ella O'Quinn will also welcome the guests, introducing SAWBA officials. Posting and retiring the colors will be SAWBA officers, Betty Holzmann, Anne Broyles and Ruth James. The evening's invocation will be given by Mrs. Maggie Nance of the Mt. Zion Baptist Church. Mrs. Nance is also an active league bowler in the city.

Because of the large number of senior teams signed up the first squad is 32 teams with the remaining waiting in the wings for Saturday, also considered 'opening squad'. The 1988 TWBA drew 2,669 five-woman teams and the event will roll each weekend until July 17th.

In keeping with the "Magic of Music" theme, decorations are 'floating' musical notes, two huge treble clefs and ribbons in the selected colors of pinks and lavenders.

Special guests for the evening in addition to the two women's Boards are representatives of the local men's association, local proprietors, Bowling Council, YABA Board and presidents and secretaries of near-by local women's associations plus media representatives.

## TWBA Gives S.A. Entry Totals

The official tallies for entries into the TWBA Championships here in the Alamo City were released this week from the TWBA Publicity Committee chairman, Millie Wood, Abilene.

The 51st event for TWBA features the 5th largest entry in history. That entry is 2,669 five-woman teams, which encompasses some 13,300 individuals; 6,817 sets of doubles, 13,634 singles and 13,045 have entered optional all events.

One significant change in the tournament format, the first since the Open Division was established many years ago, is the combining of Class E and the Novice Divisions. The Class E division will now be open to all bowlers who average 120 and below.

A major change in

tournament administration came last fall when San Antonio's Sylvia Broyles assumed the office of TWBA Secretary and Tournament Manager, the first change in that office in 21 years.

The total prize fund for the 1988 event is \$208,848.50, with \$60,052 offered in team event; \$61,353 in doubles and singles and \$26,090 offered in All Events in the six classes.

As SAWBA prepares to hostess the 51st TWBA Championships and Annual Meeting, it has already been reported that there are 335 local teams counted among the 2,669 entered. Houston will be sending the largest contingent from outside the hostess city.

Behind Houston is the Austin WBA with 144 teams, then Dallas WBA with 132 teams.

The San Antonio WBA holds the record for the most teams entered in the TWBA Championships - 3,086 teams set in 1981. That year, too was the record for most singles and doubles, 15,498, and the most all events, 14,814. That year Houston WBA sent a record number of teams to San Antonio, 347.

The richest prize fund was distributed in 1985, when \$216,488 was shared by the state's women bowlers.

During the 50th anniversary of TWBA Houston provided a record number of teams for the championships, 555 teams, and the longest-running TWBA tournament was last year in Austin which ran from March 6 through July 26.

The tournament will conclude this year on July 17th, after rolling 17 weekends.

## Texas 600 Club Singles Starts Sat. at Country

Members of the San Antonio and Texas 600 Club should be making their plans to roll in the state 600 Club singles tournament at Country Lanes during the run of the TWBA Championships in our city for the next 17 weekends.

The scratch singles event is divided into two divisions - Div. I for those with averages over 170; and Div. II for those 169 and below.

The 600 Singles is open only to those 600 members who have paid their current dues (Texas renewals \$1.00; \$2.00 local) and Texas 600 Club receipt cards must be paid prior to bowling. Local dues may be renewed at the same time.

Each member rolls three games on one pair of lanes and multiple participation is allowed (members may attempt to qualify twice).

Entry fee for the scratch singles is just \$10 per person with \$3.02 going into the prize fund, and the payoff is at a ratio of 1-10 or portion thereof.

Squad times on Saturday are until midnight, and on Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

In addition to the prize money, winners in each division are awarded a first place plaque in each division.

Bowlers use highest one league average of the previous season (21 games or more), and if no yearbook average, highest 1987 average of 21 games. However, if neither of the above applies, highest 21 game average as of date of participation.

Entry is on a "walk in" basis each weekend but members should be prepared to give their WIBC numbers, National and Texas 600 Club numbers when entering.

The Texas 600 Club annual meeting and BVL Auction is set for May 21st at the Wyndham Hotel, and donated items for the Country Store and Auction are still needed.

## BVL 3-6-9 Open To

### All Adults During TWBA Championships

Men of the city shouldn't feel left out while the local ladies are entertaining the state's women bowlers!

There's a place for the men to make a little extra spending money while helping generate a donation to the BVL Fund.

While the Texas 600 Club tournament for ladies is rolling at Country Lanes, men -- and women who are not yet 600 members -- can roll in the BVL 3-6-9 tournament whenever lanes are available on weekends.

The BVL 3-6-9, a regular feature at all TWBA championships will be at Country Lanes and is divided into two divisions -- men and women. The

handicap for the 3-6-9 is 80% of 210 in each division.

There must be at least two bowlers to constitute a squad and all bowlers may participate as often as desired, but place just once in the prize list.

Entry fee in the 3-6-9 is just \$7.50 with one dollar earmarked as a BVL Fund donation.

All bowlers use highest yearbook average, and if non, current average of 21 games or more. All others bowl scratch.

# TWBA Opens Tonite At World of Sports !

Super Tuesday has come and gone -- and now it's Super Friday for the ladies of SAWBA as they begin their hosting of the 5th largest Texas women's Bowling Assn. championship tournament at World of Sports and Astro Bowling Center.

Opening ceremonies are tonight at 6:15 p.m. at the World of Sports and the opening squad is traditionally reserved for TWBA's senior age bowlers (those 55 years of age or older), and the first squad is packed with more teams waiting in the wings for their play on the first shift on Saturday -- which is also considered

opening squad. Forty-five senior teams are on opening squads with more to come during the 17-weekend run of the event.

Houston is sending the largest number of teams to the Alamo City with the SAWBA recording 335 teams of the 2,669 entered. Too, teams will be coming from 103 other local associations across the state for the Championships.

As TWBA enters the second-half century of conducting the State Championships there is an estimated prize fund in excess of \$208,000 at stake

for the ladies, with Class C (700-749 team average) generating the largest number of teams, 866.

Most of the defending champions are expected - Nancy Kuznieski formerly of San Antonio, then Austin, leading the way after she swatted 1934 to earn her State title last year in Austin.

Defending doubles champions from Open Division are Jean Herhold Cope and Dixie Broadwell of Houston who posted 1250. Joyce Davis, Big Spring, with 683 captured the singles title and the Ladies Choice team of Houston (Donna Conners, Jean

Cope, Dixie Broadwell, Carol Rountree and Luci Bonneau) are also expected to defend their crowns.

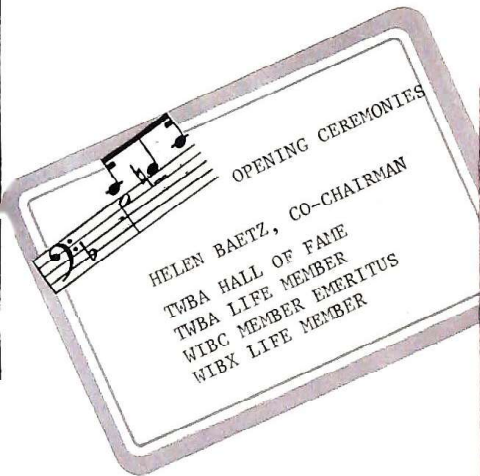
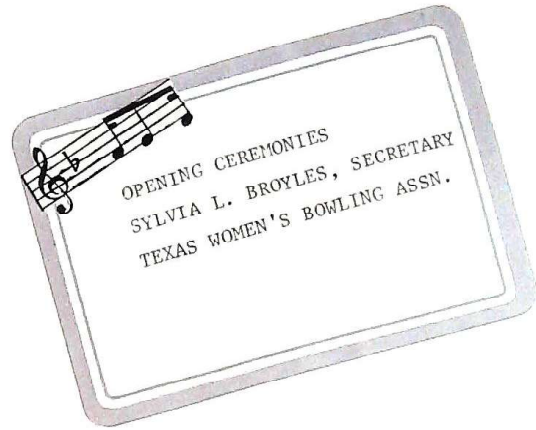

The six-division event will roll each weekend until July 17th with team events at World and singles and doubles at Astro Bowl.

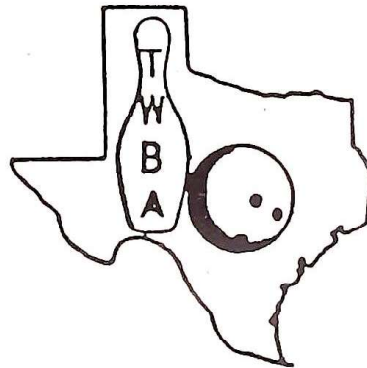

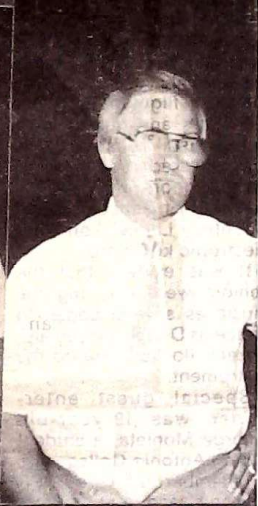

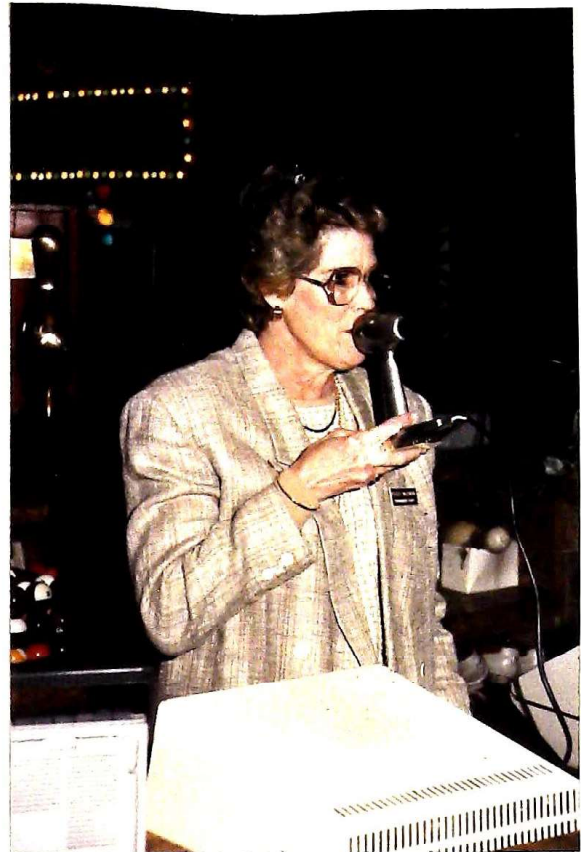
This week, a pair of women bowlers stole the spotlight from 33 men - and they did it with great games.

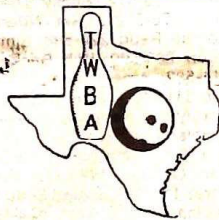

Another local gal holding down a top slot in all events is Cammie Brown in CI. A with her 1699 nine-game total, and Dona Long continues to lead C Singles with 581.





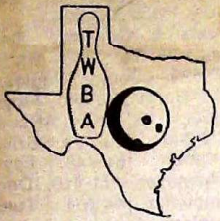

Moving into the first Vice Presidents slot, which Banker occupied, will be Joyce Deitch, Las Vegas, followed by Elaine Hagin, Castro Valley, Calif (formerly 4th VP); Lo Borschuk, Sioux City, Iowa who was also inducted into the Hall of Fame this year, as 3rd VP and former 5th VP, Dorothy Rowe, Phoenix, currently 5th.

San Antonio's Sylvia Broyles was elevated to the 5th Vice President's slot from her former position as 7th Vice President.

Taking Sylvia's place will be Hazel McLeary, Victoria, B.C. Canada who has been Sergeant At Arms, and replacing her is Director No. 6, Nancy Chapman, Green Bay, Wis. To fill Chapman's slot on the Board will be Barbara Prather of Lafayette, Ind. who garnered 1,113 votes from the delegates in her race as a candidate for the Board.

All other incumbent officers whose offices were up for election were returned to office, including Houston's Beverly McLendon, who also serves as TWBA Vice President.

Mrs. Baker's resignation came as a complete surprise to the national bowling family, but she assured the delegates and guests at Reno that her "health is

great" and "I have not lost my interest in bowling, I never will". "If there is any capacity in which I can still be of help to WIBC, I certainly will be happy to remain involved," she assured the delegates.

During the 3-day conclave many associations gave donations to the NBHF/M in Baker's honor, and the BWAA sent officials to present her with that group's "Flowers For the Living" award.

Baker, who was first elected to the WIBC Board of Directors in 1965, took office as only the 5th president in WIBC History on August 1, 1981, bringing to the position a wealth of experience as a bowling administrator. Her honors have been many over her years of service, but not nearly adequate enough to compensate for what she

has given to the bowling industry. The quick-witted, dedicated leader has earned the respect of all with whom she has worked, and she will be sadly missed.

Mrs. Banker, the incoming President, will be concentrating her efforts at the "grass roots level to promote increased membership. That in itself is a very big challenge," she said.

The new president also comes with a wealth of experience since her appointment by Mrs. Alberta Crowe during the 1968 WIBC annual meeting in San Antonio. Much of her work was centered around youth program, where she served as President of the AJBC for two years. She also has been extremely active with the NBHF/M and the National Bowling Council which administers the BVL Fund.
