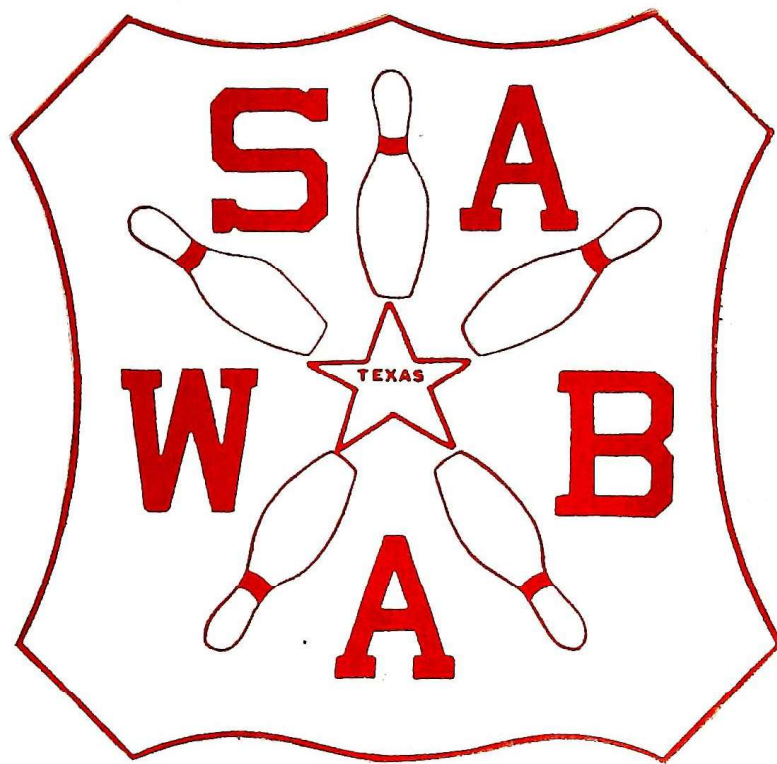
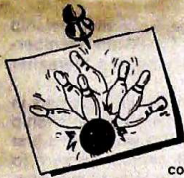

FROM THE ASSOCIATION SECRETARY'S OFFICE...

Can you believe another bowling season has finished and we are starting our new 1986-87 season. Several changes have been made by WIBC, and these will be discussed at our workshops on Thursday, August 14th at the Sheraton Motor Inn. For those of you who will not be able to attend, I'd like to list some for you.

1. Membership dues for 1986-87 season is \$5.50 for women, (those ladies who have already purchased a card in the summer leagues will not purchase in the fall leagues. Please check these cards to be sure they are a 1986-87 WIBC membership card and record their number for your final average sheet). The new 1986-87 membership cards are light blue on white.
2. There is a new look for the ladies sanction this year. It is in the secretary's handbook given out with league supplies. This is a pullout form of three parts, carbons must be used; returning two copies to our office (white and yellow) and keeping the last copy (blue) for your records
3. Secretaries of our mixed leagues also have something to make their work much easier. We now have the mixed league sanction. You will no longer fill out a separate sanction for the men and another for the women. Two copies of the sanction should be returned to our office and two copies should be sent to the men's association.
4. All sanctions now will be due within 30 days after your league begins. (mixed, mens and ladies). Please do not wait until your league has filled completely. Mail your sanction as soon as possible after your league has begun, returning our copies of the league sanction, a membership card filled out by each woman in your league, (please use pre-printed membership cards as they have your bowler number on them and this helps us here in the association office), along with \$5.50 for each woman buying her card through your league. Also, put a check mark by those purchasing cards in your league and check to be sure the ones not paying have listed the league where they purchased their card.

Our local association championship tournament will be held the first three weekends in November. Our 50th anniversary event will find team event at Oak Hills Bowling Center and doubles and singles at Astro Bowling Center. Entries will be in all Centers before fall leagues start. If not, please call the association office and some will be delivered. **CLOSING DATE FOR ENTRIES IS OCTOBER 16TH.**

RESERVED TIMES: If you have a preference, call the association office and make a reservation. This time will be reserved for you provided you return your entry along with entry fees by October 2nd. No reservations will be held after that date.

The following day, the delegates attended to the business of the State Association elections, rules and selection of the 1988 tournament site, and of course, it is "SAN ANTONIO, STATE IN '88." We did weave a little magic and are looking forward to the state tournament here in our beautiful city. The 1988 convention will be held at the Wyndham Hotel, IH-10 in May of 1988. the tournament site committee has selected World of Sports Bowling Center to host the team event and Astro Bowling Center will host the doubles and singles event. A beautiful plaque was awarded and is on display in the SAWBA office. This was quite a feat, as the original poster had been lost and had to be duplicated just before the trip to Dallas.

'Where there is great love, there are always great miracles,' someone once said... and so it was with the Santa Rosa Children's Hospital telethon with KMOL-TV's George McKenzie and Lori Tucker... with great help from the bowlers of the city!

George found the 'magic' of bowling during the Elf Louise fund drive (he bowled a 24-hour marathon at Christmas-time) so a 36-hour marathon for the hospitalized children was a 'snap'. After his visit to the SAWBA annual meeting explaining his marathon George received help from bowlers in six different centers and more than \$5,000 was generated for the record fund raising drive (total contributions were \$607,746).

Bowlers gave George companionship on the lanes during his 36-hour drive; challenge matches were held; bowling youngsters solicited pledges; senior-age and league bowlers made donations; proprietors donated lineage and bowling officials manned the telephone banks on the air.

Remembering the outpouring of love from bowlers to hospitalized patients, the SAWBA Board of Directors unanimously agreed to provide even greater support in 1987! A special 'Miracle' committee is to be appointed to make even greater things happen next summer.

ANAHEIM, CALIFORNIA
APRIL 28, 29, & 30, 1986**

14 San Antonio Women's Association delegates enjoyed sunny California for three days of the WIBC National Convention meetings at the Anaheim Convention Center. There were 3,450 in attendance.

After the call to order by president Helen Baker, reading of the annual meeting rules and welcome speeches, presentations were made for WIBC Hall of Fame Awards with meritorious service award to Freda S. Botkin and Cora Porter. The Superior Performance Award was given to Pat Costello.

Many association were presented with their 50 year plaques, including Houston, El Paso and the Texas State Association. On Tuesday, committee reports were made and spotlight awards were given. The afternoon was devoted to a workshop-question and answers.

Wednesday morning a very moving memorial service was presented as we remembered Violet "Billy" Simon and past WIBC president Alberta Crowe who had died this past year.

During the election of WIBC officers and directors which followed, our own Sylvia Broyles was re-elected by acclamation to her director position. We were very proud and happy to hear the next day at the WIBC board meeting, after the convention, that Sylvia had been appointed to seventh vice-president of WIBC by Helen Baker, the president of WIBC.

The final orders of business were to select the tournament site for 1990, and by a large margin, the vote was given to Tampa, Florida. The Gold Ball ceremony, passing the Gold Bowling Ball from the hosting city of the convention to the next year's hosting city, brought about the close of the convention with the very emotional and moving retirement of the flags. Holding hands, the delegates sang the farewell song, "May The Good Lord Bless and Keep You." With a smile on our face and tears in our eyes, we said goodbye to all our friends until next time.

**A PERSONAL INTERVIEW WITH
DONNA WALLACE, TEXAS
WOMAN BOWLER OF THE YEAR**

"When I received a call from the TWBA office on May 7th (my birthday), telling me I had been selected Texas Woman Bowler of the Year, I thought, OK, who's pulling my leg now. It didn't sound like a long distance call and I didn't recognize the voice. After several minutes of being reassured it was really so and offering to send a letter of confirmation, I realized it was for REAL.

SAN ANTONIO 600 CLUB

The following information regarding membership in the National, Texas and San Antonio 600 Clubs is furnished for those who might not be aware of the purposes, functions, etc. of the clubs.

Purpose: The 600 Clubs are formed for the purpose of uniting in an honorary group all females who have qualified for membership by bowling a three game scratch series of 600 or more, in leagues and tournaments sanctioned by WIBC and the YABA Collegiate Division, and to encourage members to promote social activities and devote themselves to the fun of bowling.

Meetings: The San Antonio 600 Club holds two meetings each season — an annual meeting in the first quarter of the year and a fall meeting as near the first of October as possible. There is usually a brunch or luncheon prior to the meetings.

Dues: National. One time only (life-time) fee of \$5.00 for which member receives a laminated membership card, 600 Club patch and 600 Club pin. Texas: initial membership fee, for which member receives membership card and gold pin with state logo, is \$3.00. Renewal fee of \$1.00 is due each August thereafter. San Antonio: Dues are \$2.00 when joining and a \$2.00 renewal fee is due each

August 1 thereafter. Total membership fee when joining is \$10.00 total membership fees due each August 1 thereafter are \$3.00.

The majority of Bowling Centers in San Antonio pay the initial membership of \$10.00 for the ladies who bowl a first 600 series in their center. Be sure to check with your proprietor to see whether he will pay this fee for his lady bowlers.

Remember: There is no penalty if you drop out of the club for a year or so. It is not necessary to pay past year's dues to become a current member again. Payment of \$3.00 is all that is required. And remember also: Your first 600 series makes you eligible for membership for life.

Tournaments: We host tournaments each season. (1) The Annual Singles Championship which is to be held this year at Astro Bowl on September 27 & 28 and is limited to members of our club only. (2) The Loving Tribute doubles this year will be held at Oak Hills bowling center on December 27, 28 & 29th and is open to men's, women's and mixed doubles teams. (3) The Bring-A-Friend doubles will be held this year at Oak Hills Center on February 21 & 22, 1987. Each team is made up of one 600 club member and one non-member.

Workshop A "Must" For League Officials

Next Thursday when SABA and SAWBA hold their League Officers Workshops, there'll be plenty of 'new' for league officials -- so it's almost imperative that each league be represented.

Workshops will be at 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. at the Sheraton Motor Inn (1400 Austin Highway) for both southside and northside league officials.

Special guest at the Workshops will be ABC field representative Dale Vickman.

One of the main topics of

interest will be the new league sanction forms. A new ABC/WIBC mixed league sanction application will be available as well. The five-part mixed league sanction application will be in the ABC/WIBC mixed league secretary's Workbooks.

League secretaries will be required to submit two copies to the ABC local office and two copies to the local association office. The fifth copy is for the league files.

The newly revised WIBC league sanction application is based on the same format as the mixed league application but is to be used only for all-women leagues.

This three part league sanction application will also be found in the new league secretary's workbook. Secretaries will submit two copies to the local office and keep the third for the league files.

This year the service kits will have a new look. For the 1986-87 season the service kit for all women leagues will have just four items: two bylaws books, the President's handbook and the secretary/treasurer's handbook which contains the sanction materials.

The service kit for mixed leagues will have the WIBC bylaws, the ABC Constitution, the Tenpin Puzzler, the Mixed League secretary-treasurer's handbook with sanction materials. In the past the service kit contained the sanction application and other material which totaled up to 18 items.

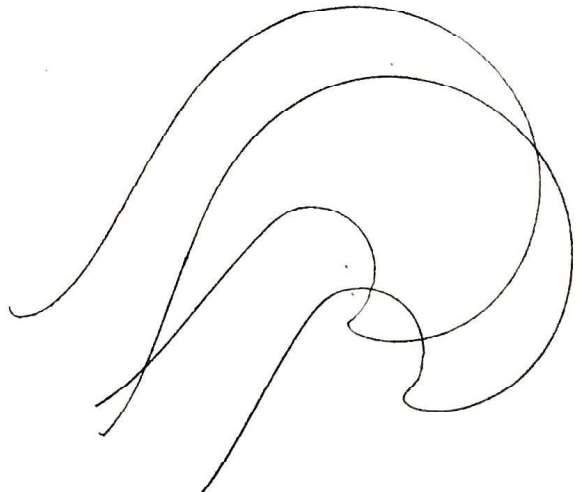
The new handbooks include information on

bonding, how-to information on conducting league meetings, rule interpretations, sample rules and guidance in resolving league problems. Also included is information on award application forms and parental consent forms -- a complete tool for league officers.

League officials should be aware that handbooks and sanction materials for mixed leagues and for the all-woman leagues are not identical and are not to be used interchangeably.

A wealth of information to assure smooth running leagues will be available at the Thursday workshops -- and every league officer should take advantage of meeting time -- it's free and open to any interested bowler.

But do plan to come early. Each session should be larger than before since the four Workshops are combined into two this year. If everyone arrives on time -- or early -- the Workshops shouldn't last longer than an hour.

Team competition is

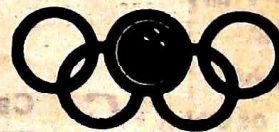
mixed with at least one man and one woman on each team. Singles has two divisions - men and women and handicap is set at 85% from 800 for team and 210 in singles and all events.

The 6th annual event is sanctioned by both ABC and WIBC and tournament director for the Texas State Bowling Council is Sylvia Broyles.

Another weekend of competition is Saturday, August 23-24 and additional squads will be added if necessary.

20 teams enter Noll pin meet

More than 20 teams have already entered the Elaine Noll Scholarship Bowling Tournament, to be held at 2 p.m. Sunday at Country Lanes.

The five-member team event is open to all ABC, WIBC and YABA bowlers. Entry fee is \$15 per person and is tax deductible.

The handicap event, co-sponsored by the Express-News Sports Department, the newspaper's volunteer organization - EN-CORPS, Columbia Industries and Dillard's Department Stores, is held in honor of the former Express-News sports writer who died of an inoperable brain tumor last year at the age of 30.

All proceeds go to Noll Scholarship Fund, which was established to assist aspiring female journalist.

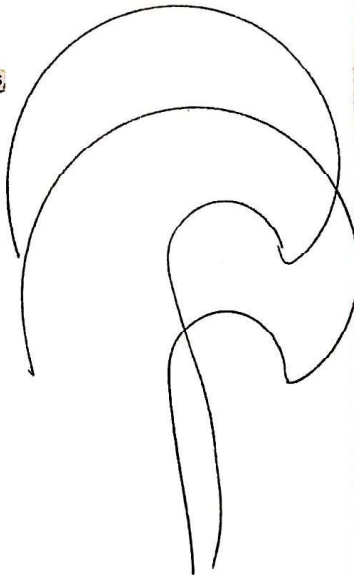
On the side, the best and worst dressed bowlers will get warm-up suits, courtesy of the Express-News' promotions department.

What's Correct?

Correcting a statement at the Workshops: In the first game of a series a bowler becomes disgusted with his score and discontinues bowling. The man was given a zero for the remaining frames since a sub was not available and it wasn't because of injury or emergency. Could an absentee score be used in the second and third games of the series.

According to the ABC Tenpin Puzzlers (Page 38) Rule 107 (b) only allows a zero score in the remaining frames where the

bowler quits during the game. The team is entitled to an absentee score in the 2nd and 3rd games according to procedures outlined in the league rules. An added penalty would in many cases have too great an effect on the position standings and penalize a team unnecessarily for a temperamental bowler.

Please check Rule Books when problems arise -- some rules have been changed. Look 'em up!

Competition continues this weekend after which the champions in each class and division will qualify to represent the State of Texas in the National Senior Tournament to be held in Niagara Falls, N. Y.

Tournament play continues with four squads on Saturday and Sunday. The event is sponsored by the Texas State Bowling Council, and is hosted by the Arlington bowling associations servicing the area.

Raby continues reign at State Senior Mixed

Lillian Raby has captured the Class C title in the State Senior Mixed Tournament for the second straight year.

"The only thing I regret is that my husband, Steve, didn't hold up his end of the bargain. He competed in the tournament, but he didn't finish too

well."

Yarbor, who entered with a 143 average, had a 733 handicap score in singles and 1,379 in all-events in becoming a double winner. She had respective scratch scores of 537 and 540 in singles and doubles.

"I really like those lanes in Grand Prairie. I wouldn't mind bowling there again," Yarbor said.

Yarbor started bowling in 1957 and quit the sport in 1969. A native of the Alamo City, she and her husband, Elden, moved back to San Antonio in 1980 after spending 27 years in Orange, Calif. A friend, Lucille Franks, whom she still bowls with, convinced her to return to action a few years ago. Yarbor is currently averaging 136.

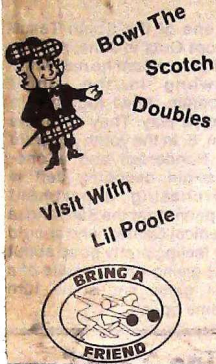
Yarbor's wins were her first ever in tournament competition.

coming season, members will be asked to adopt the proposed budget for the coming season, elect a Nominating Committee and remember departed members at the Memorial Service prior to the meeting.

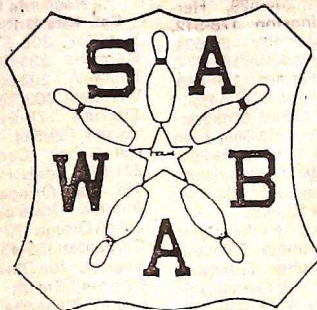
In addition SAWBA will honor one lady with the giving of the Superior Performance Award for outstanding performances on the lanes during the past season.

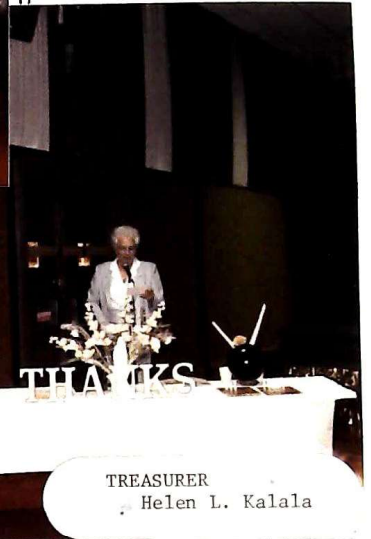

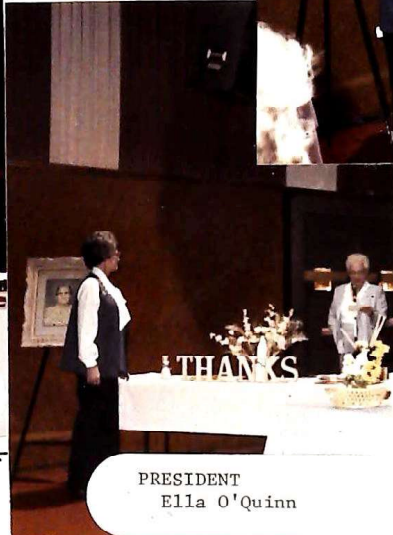

Laurie Jo Scales Earns SAWBA Superior Performance Award !!

The highest award the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association can offer to one of its members for performance on the lanes went to Laurie Jo Scales Sunday as the 91 members attending the Open Membership Meeting applauded her outstanding year.

Awards Committee chairman, Clara Grimes, noted, "Our winner went to the bowling lanes between three hundred to 400 times during the season -- she picked up and rolled her ball some 5,000 to 6,000 times and changed her shoes from 300 to 400 times and she is in this room."

And the suspense was over when she asked: "Laurie Jo Scales does this sound like something you might have done...for you are the SAWBA 1985-86 Superior Performance Award winner!"

As Laurie Jo was escorted to the podium, Clara continued: "Laurie Jo bowled in three leagues this year - two at Oak Hills lanes and one at Wonder Bowl carrying averages of 186, 189 and 193. Her top average was a 193 in the Ladies Majors league in which her team also captured the league championship."

The spunky righthander also had 27 series over the 600 mark, including five series in the 650-699 bracket (673, two 660s, 659 and 658) and her individual high game for the season was a 263.

More importantly Laurie Jo was the SAWBA Scratch Champion with 1731 for her nine games in the Championship Tournament held at Ponderosa Bowl and All Star Lanes. She also carded the high scratch singles score of 622.

Laurie Jo already holds the all-time record score of 666 in Class A singles in the local Championships.

In February she was one of the six finalists in the SAWBA Life Members Invitational tournament at Astro Bowling Center, finishing second to winner Shelley Buchholtz.

Perhaps her greatest disappointment of the year was in the State Tournament in Dallas --- and it wasn't totally a disappointment. Laurie Jo was a member of the team which held the lead in Open Division team event until the very last weekend of the tournament. They finished just behind the championship team of Texas pros, but the points earned awarded for that feat were more than sufficient to earn her the local Performance title.

Also in the spring Laurie Jo made the semifinals in the Texas Bluebonnet Queens, was ninth in the San Antonio 600 Club singles, and was a member of the fourth place team in the Martha Washington Tournament at Oak Hills Lanes.

Although she didn't earn the high Composite average award this year, she does have the highest individual average of 193, and that distinction has been hers twice previously: 1984-85, a 190, and in 1982-83, a 200 average.

With the approach of the 1988 TWBA Championships, Laurie Jo will be more than hopeful. When SAWBA was last hostess to the state's women bowlers, she captured the State All Events title (1981) and was a member of the second place doubles team.

As local scratch champion Laurie Jo earned a spot in the TEAM USA and finished 12th in the standings at Grand Prairie, Texas

A member of SAWBA for 12 years, Laurie Jo also had

an outstanding record in the junior ranks. She's single and employed by the Whataburger chain in the accounting office.

Five ladies have received the performance award previously: Myrt DeFily, Elfi Tomczyk, Mary Falconer (8 years), Liz Williams and Donna Wallace (3 years).

SAWBA President Ella O'Quinn presented the new Superior Performance Award winner with a lovely plaque signifying the honor, and a gold charm which "tells the world you are San Antonio's best woman bowler in 1985-86".

Beaming proudly at the presentation were Laurie Jo's mother, Bettie Jo Gesler, her grandmother, Erna Trenkelbach who serves on the SAWBA Board of Directors, and her aunt, Irma Illhardt.

"Without the support of my family I could be nothing in bowling. I owe them so much for their guidance and encouragement. I do thank the SAWBA for selecting me. This truly is a great honor," said Laurie Jo choked with emotion.

The ladies attending the meeting gave her a warm standing ovation.

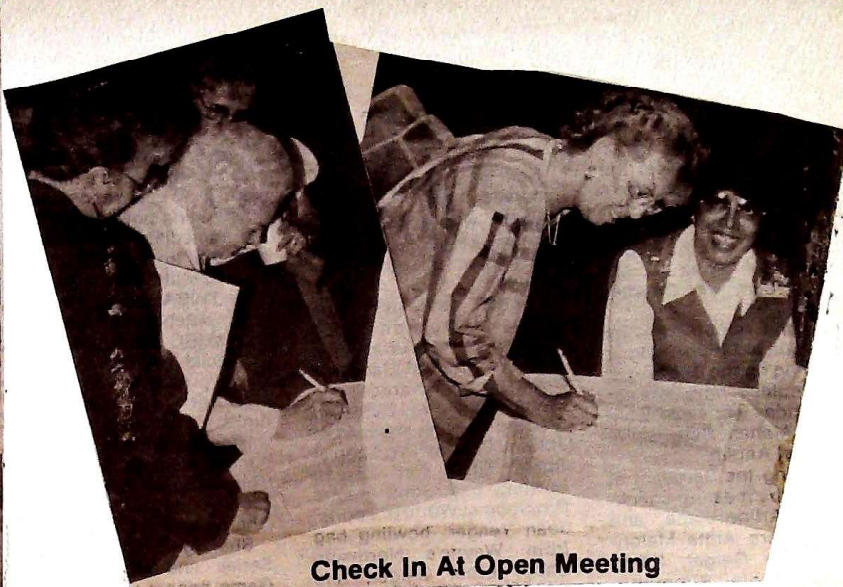

Friend lends a hand in Scales' award effort

Laurie Jo Scales has earned the top local women's award, thanks to a friend.

Scales, who had submitted her records in past years, didn't keep up with her efforts last season for the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association Superior Performance Award.

The unidentified friend wasn't going to let Scales' continued success go unnoticed, however. So, with Scales' help, the friend submitted Laurie Jo's feats to the SAWBA. It paid off.

The 1985-86 Superior Performance Award was presented to Scales during the association's open meeting last Sunday at Country Lanes.

"I was surprised that someone submitted what I had done," Scales said, "but it didn't bother me. I think that's the way it should be done."

Bowlers with averages of 185 or better receive a request for a record of their accomplishments from the SAWBA.

Scales, who won the state TWBA crown in 1981, bowled in three leagues this past season. She carried averages of 186, 189 and 193, and was a member of a league championship team. She also had twenty-seven 600

series, including five over 650 — 673, 658, 659 and a pair of 660s.

She also won the city scratch all-event and singles titles, placed second in the scratch division of the Life Members Tournament, was a member of the team that placed second in the TWBA state tournament, and was on the fourth-place squad in the Martha Washington Tournament.

"It's great," said Scales' mother, Bettie Jo Geisler, who is a member of the local Hall of Fame. "I'm very proud of my daughter. She deserves the award, since she really had a good season."

Scales had the city's top average last season at 193. She had the top average in both the 1982-83 and 1984-85 seasons with 200 and 190, respectively. Scales was second during the 1983-84 campaign with a 198 average.

"I knew I had bowled well last season but I didn't expect this," said Scales, who received a gold chain and a plaque. "I didn't keep up with anybody else. I think this is great."

"I would say this ranks among the best of my achievements. Winning state was also great, but we're talking about two different awards."

Scales joins Myrt DeFily, eight-time winner Mary Falconer, three-time winner Donna Wallace, Elfi

Also getting awards for 650 or better series were Williams 698, Betty Alfred 697, Lola Graves 695, Falconer 694, Linda Bray 694, Tommi Wilkins 682, Adelita Romero 674, Kimberly Theriault 670, Linda Nichols 668, Pamela Clark 665, Joyce Elseth 664, Shannon

Bell 662, Patricia Stevenson 661, Diann Heckman 661, Ann Nelson 659, Kathy Kirst 659, Doris Gallaway 654, Wallace 653, Margie Garcia 653 and Patti Hines 653.

Williams also received a pin for a 279 game. Rita Luna, LaDuke, Elsa Briseno and Judy Vinton were honored for respective games of 288, 278, 277 and 277.

On the business side of the meeting, Ella O'Quinn was installed as president, Anne Broyles vice president and Helen Kalala treasurer. 50th SAWBA Tourney Nears

League Visits To Begin By SAWBA Directors

While the ladies of the city are still contemplating what was meant by SAWBA Vice President Anne Broyles at the Open Membership meeting -- regarding "cheep -- cheep" -- they realize it has something to do with the 50th Anniversary championship tournament scheduled to roll the first three weekends in November.

The League Visitation Committee met this week asking the same question -- "Cheep -- Cheep" ???

Well, it should all become clear very shortly. The League Visitation Committee set the dates of September 24 through October 7th for league visitation -- at which time the SAWBA Board Members and volunteer Service Representatives will be

attempting to visit each women's mixed league in the city -- encouraging participation in this special landmark tournament.

Since the very first tournament in 1934-35 the ladies of the city have met in friendly competition to determine an all events champion who reigns supreme for one year.

The first tournament was won with an all events total of 1800, handicapped, by Mrs. R. W. Titsworth at the old Alamo Lanes, which later burned to the ground. The center was owned by the late Billy Simon.

Simon herself was a three-time champion (1937-38, 38-39 and 40-41). Hall of Famers Grace Baskin and Myrt DeFily each have held the crown six times, and

Glenda Recker and Kathy Kirst have each won the local championship title three times.

Beverly Pantuso holds the all-time high score of 1873 scratch for her nine games, a record set during the 1971-72 season at Southside Lanes (now Hacienda Bowl).

Defending champion this year is the newly crowned SAWBA Superior Performance winner, Laurie Jo Scales, who won last year with a scratch 1731 (All Star and Ponderosa Bowl) with handicap all events honors going to Laura Drake with a 1958.

Mary McIntosh holds the all-time high handicap title with 2038, set in 1982-83.

Tournament entry blanks are at all lanes and the reserved entries are coming into the SAWBA office at a brisk pace. Advance reservations with full fees must be received on or before Thursday, October 2, or the spots will be released.

Deadline for the tournament is THURSDAY, OCTOBER 16, so the ladies should be completing their entry forms as quickly as possible to assure one of the prime times.

The tournament is for every SAWBA member, regardless of average, since it's divided into four classes, and ladies roll only against those ladies with like averages.

Once again the ladies are eligible for Instant Cash in team event and there is no limit as to the number of awards a lady may earn during their competition at Oak Hills Lanes.

At the singles and doubles center, Astro Bowling Center, the special National Bowling Hall of Fame/Museum feature will allow ladies to make additional cash. Entry fee is just one dollar payable prior to the completion of the first game. Fifty cents is a donation to the bowling shrine and 50¢ goes into a special sidepot, going to the lady who shoots most pins over her average the second game, each squad.

There are six team squads available during the three weekends, with five squads of singles and doubles on Saturday, Sunday and the special Monday squad.

Entry fee is a nominal \$11.00 per person per event with the optional \$1.00 all events fee. Of the \$11.00 entry fee, \$5.20 from each entry is placed in the prize fund, returned 100% to the bowlers.

Should the supply of entry forms be depleted at a lady's favorite center, a quick call to the SAWBA office (824-1321) is all needed. Secretary Louise Mangelsdorf will have one in the mail the same day.

No one should be left out -- this special tournament will be one to tell grandchildren about -- but what is -- "Cheep-Cheep"???

The meeting was adjourned and refreshments were served.

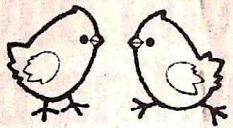

"I'm really excited over last weekend's performance," said Pauline, "I missed just three spares — and there were some splits, but everyone was having those. I really was feeling great while I was bowling, and the exercise I do every day (riding an exercise bike five miles each day) paid off. Some of the ladies were getting tired after ten games, but I felt great!" she said with her dazzling smile.

Although tournament rules called for five games of qualifying on Saturday and Sunday with a re-entry squad, it took Pauline just the noon squad to make her mark. With games of 169, 212, 223, 179 and 216, the 5' tall righthander pounded out a 999 five game total (199.8 average).

In the semifinal round after the re-entry squad, Pauline continued her torrid pace. Slamming in games of 181, 211, 178, 203 and 183

she became the leading qualifier for the finals.

Pauline waited while the other finalists battled each other and it was another bubbly San Antonian making her charge. Former state singles champ, Jaye Jean Smith was third seed in the stepladder, won her first match, and disposed of the second seed (no final results have been released so names are unavailable) then faced Pauline in the title match.

High career game back in

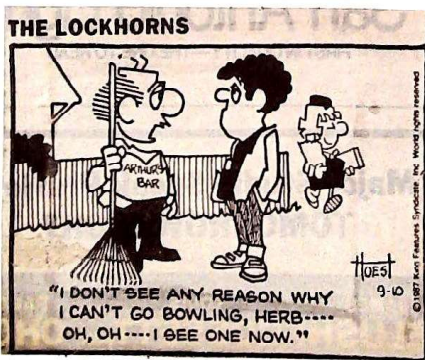

Bowling Council seeking Hall of Fame nominations

The Bowling Council Hall of Fame banquet isn't until February, but the voting procedure for those to be inducted has begun.

Nominating forms are at all lanes and any bowler may make a nomination.

There are 25 living members and 18 deceased members in the Hall, and the Council is seeking additional nominees. A candidate can be a bowler who has excelled over the years — a leader who has given of their talents administratively, a proprietor, a youth worker or a dedicated sponsor and any person within the service area of SAWBA and SABA who has given generously of their time and talent for the betterment of the game.

Deadline for nominations is Nov. 30, and the selection committee of eight previously inducted Hall of Famers and five representatives of the Council will make the final determination of this year's inductees — one man, one woman, and one of either sex to be inducted posthumously if desired.

Hall of Fame induction is the highest honor which can be bestowed on a bowler by his or her peers, but no one can be selected unless a nomination is made. All nominations are to be mailed to Sylvia Broyles, chairman, P.O. Box 339, Spring Branch, Texas, 78070 by Nov. 30.

TWBA Hall of Fame: Selection of this year's inductee into the TWBA Hall of Fame was announced this week. Hope "Tizzie" Tisdale of Austin will be inducted into the Meritorious Service category.

The 35-year-old bowler is one of

the most respected administrators in the state in women's bowling affairs and junior activities. During her illustrious career within the game, she has been honored twice by the state women — first as the service award winner, then as the recipient of the Junior Bowling Service Award.

A past TWBA director, Tisdale earned the respect and admiration of Texas women bowlers for her work as a physical education teacher at the Texas School for the Deaf, work which spanned more than 30 years.

She has labored with Austin youth for more 25 years and has served the Austin women as both secretary and president of their association. A great honor for a great neighbor and friend. Formal induction ceremonies will be next spring at the TWBA annual meeting.

Senior-age bowlers -- that so-called Geritol set -- and that was quite evident this past weekend when the Alamo City Senior Championships rolled at Astro Bowling Center.

The doubles and singles event drew 75 doubles entrants and 115 singles entrants, rolling for prize money and first place trophies.

And it was familiar senior names in the top slots at tournament's end. Jim Poole a retired Army man who spent 34½ years in the service, hammered out games of 201, 195 and 236 for a scratch 632. With his handicap of 96 pins, Jim posted the top score of 728 in men's singles division.

Jim rolls off a 168 senior league average after bowling for 15-20 years. He's a big, soft-spoken man who rolls four times per week when he isn't pursuing his other hobby, golf. At age 66, the Texarkana native has been active in the city since 1973.

The women's division title went to Lola Munk, who is truly the youngest looking 73 year old ever encountered.

A widow for three years, Lola bowls three times per week, when she isn't tending her garden, crocheting, or playing 9-pins.

A native of Omaha, Nebraska, Lola worked for 54 years - as a cake decorator for Colonial Cake and a sewing inspector before retiring at age 65. She boasts a 235 high game with a 535 series as her career series and currently rolls with averages in the high 130s to low 140s.

She and daughter, Loretta Mason roll together, and she has another daughter and one son.

It was her first career tournament win, although she has dozens of pins and patches. For the past four years she has earned an award in the state tournament.

So excited was Lola on award presentation day (Wednesday) that she hurried out of her home, shut the door, then remembered that she had left her keys inside -- making her late for the presentation!

During the tournament Lola had games of 157, 200 and 151 for a scratch 508. With handicap she earned

the title with a total 682 series in singles.

Doubles winners were Joseph Makarsky and David Ramsden, who do their bowling at Fort Sam Houston.

Joseph is a former senior champion who shot games of 173, 1987 and 212 (582, and Dave added games of 191, 189 and a whopping 243 for 623. Their total plus handicap was a winning 1367.

Makarsky rolls off a 169 senior league average and Dave's is a 177. They shared \$125 for their win.

SAWBA Local Tourney Draws 268 Teams !

The 50th Anniversary SAWBA Championship Tournament, scheduled to roll the first three weekends of November at Oak Hills (team event) and Astro Bowling Center will feature a \$19,509.40 total prize fund for the four classes of "Bowling Chicks" who'll be rolling.

A total of 268 five-women teams have been entered with 1,106 singles entrants, 553 sets of doubles and 1,039 optional all events entrants, down just a fraction from last year's event.

center. Each lady in this event, however, must pay the \$1.00 entry special fee prior to the completion of her first game to participate in the most pins over average pot for their second game. One half of the fee is a donation to the NBHF/M.

All ladies, too, may use their tournament scores to attempt to qualify for TEAM USA by payment of the \$5.00 administration fee prior to their bowling. Scratch all events scores will be used to determine the city's qualifiers for the event which is the first step toward bowling in the Olympics on the U. S. team as an exhibition sport in Seoul, Korea.

Registration tables will be set up at both centers for collecting the administration fee.

"Bowling Chicks" in the 50th landmark tournament will have the opportunity to tell the world of their participation. At the Bowler's Boutique will be hand towels proclaiming

PARTIAL TOURNAMENT RULES AND REGULATIONS

(Complete tournament rules may be found in each bowling establishment)
 This Tournament shall be governed by the provisions of Chapter 15, of the WIBC Bylaws pertaining to Local Championship Tournament.

- ELIGIBILITY:** Entry will be open to members of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association. Members of other associations who bow in leagues sanctioned through this association may enter, but participation shall be confined to the team event with the team of which the bowler is a regular member. Every entrant must be a member of WIBC.
- TEAM EVENT:** A member may bowl as often as she wishes in team event; however, not more than three players on one team can place more than once in the prize list for position standings.
- DOUBLES AND SINGLES:** Doubles and Singles may only be entered once. Bowlers entering Doubles must also enter Singles, and vice versa.
- ALL EVENTS:** All events is automatically entered without fee when bowler enters team, doubles, and singles; however, only those paying the optional all events fee shall be eligible for prize money in all events. Paid All-Events are not transferable unless substitute replaces original entrant in all three events and the transfer is made by the tournament manager or her assistants prior to substitute's participation in any event.
- When a bowler bowls in team event more than once, her first team score shall count toward her all events score.**

5. HANDICAP: Handicap to be 80% from the highest in each class. Class A will receive 80% handicap from the following scratch figures: Team event from 1000; Doubles Event from 400; Singles Event from 200. All other classes will be handicapped from the top of their respective categories. There will be four classes.

6. TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONS:
 a. In this tournament, the scratch score winners in each event shall be the **CHAMPIONS** and the highest all-events scratch score, regardless of class shall be declared and acclaimed the **LOCAL CHAMPION**.
 b. In this tournament, the handicap score winners in each event shall be the **HANDICAP CHAMPIONS**, and the highest all-events handicap score, regardless of class shall be declared and acclaimed the **LOCAL HANDICAP CHAMPION**. The handicap shall be based on: 80% difference of 200.

7. TOURNAMENT AVERAGE:
 a. Entrants will use their highest WIBC sanctioned average of 21 or more games taken from previous winter leagues or as of mid-night, May 31st as listed in the year book. Entering averages is subject to change if participant bowled in any league which did not submit averages, providing final average sheet is on file in the SAWBA office prior to distribution of prizes.

b. If no previous winter season average, an entrant shall use her highest WIBC sanctioned league average as of the end of the previous summer season, provided she has bowled 21 games or more.
 c. If no previous winter or summer league average has been established, an entrant shall use her highest current WIBC sanctioned league average of nine (9) games or more as of closing date of entry (Thursday, October 16, 1986).
 d. Entrants not having an average as specified in either a, b, or c, will use her highest average for nine (9) or more games as of date of participation.

8. Participants must check in 45 minutes before scheduled time of events and **MUST SHOW WIBC CARD** upon checking in. Replacements may be allowed for just cause in any event upon notification to the Local Secretary at least one (1) hour before squad time.

9. Substitutes will not be required to reimburse the original entrant with the entry fee paid nor shall she be expected to give the original entrant any prize money or trophy she (the substitute) may win.

10. Scorekeeper will be furnished by the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association.

11. Any player or team arriving late shall begin play with the score counting beginning with the frame then being bowled. No frames may be made up. No absentee average at any time is permissible in tournament play.

12. Entry fee must accompany entry form. **RESERVATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED BY TELEPHONE** but will be forfeited unless all fees are in the hands of the Secretary by Thursday, October 2, 1986.

13. Members are requested to wear suitable attire when appearing in the Local Tournament. **SHORTS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED.**

14. A prize list of winners will be posted in each bowling establishment ten days after the close of the tournament - **ONE WEEK** will be allowed for protest of the winners prize list. After that time prizes shall be paid according to the posted list.

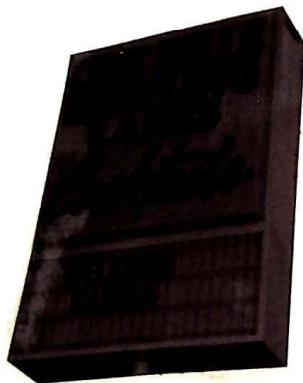

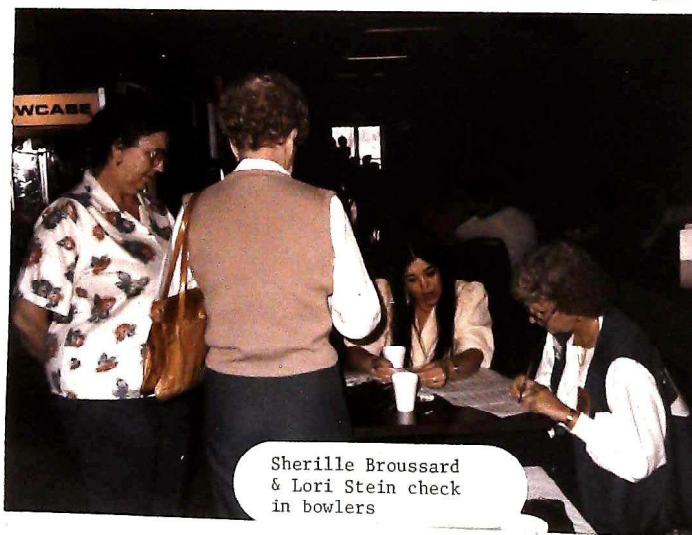

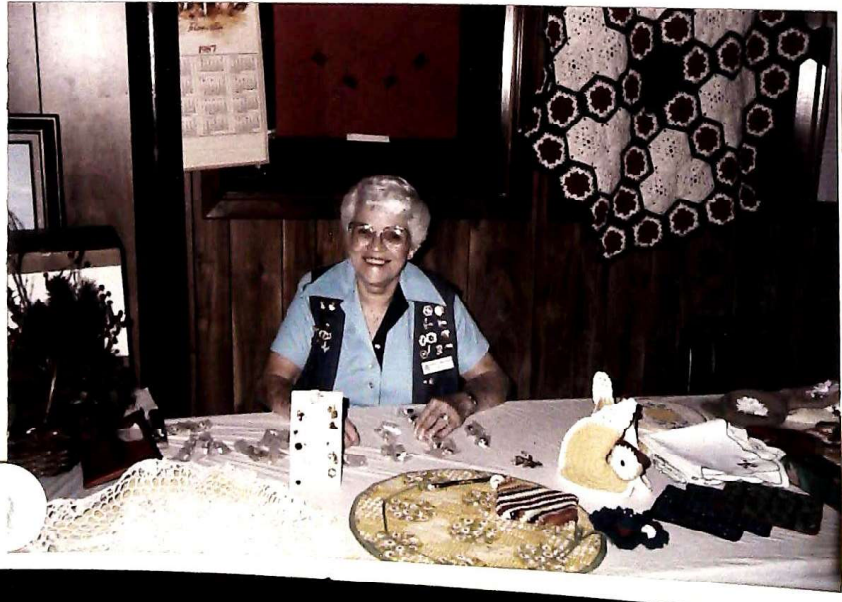

SAWBA tournament director, Louise Mangelsdorf took note of the landmark appearance on Saturday at Oak Hills when the teams rolled.

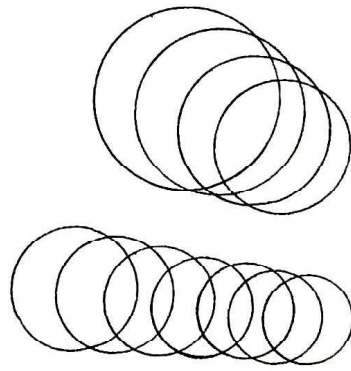

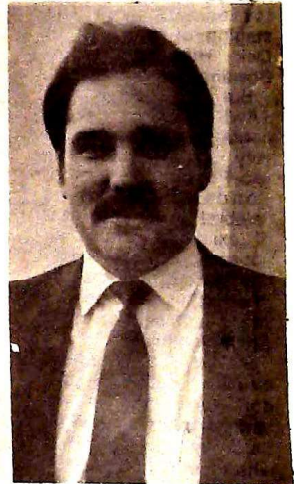
Don is well known to the bowling family but Harrison is a newcomer, in fact he's only been to the city about ten times in the past, that for Brunswick meetings.

"It is also anticipated that construction should take around four months, so hopefully we'll be open for summer bowling business while concentrating on forming new leagues for the fall season," he said wisely.

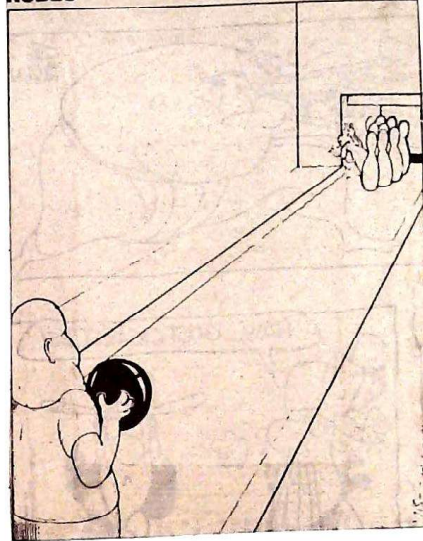
"Everything we have talked about thus far, tells me you love this game, or you wouldn't be becoming this involved. What kind of bowler are you?" we asked.

And for the second weekend the ladies noted a stairstep score. Jackie M. Alonzo had games of 157, 158 and 159 during her singles on the Saturday noon squad. Jackie rolls off a 143 average.

For Susan Gude, the SAWBA 50th tournament was also a memorable one. She shot her first career 500 series during her singles play with games of 181, 176 and 155. Susan posted a scratch 512 series off her 132 average.

Liz Williams Demolishes SAWBA Tournament Record Book

Elizabeth Ann "Liz" Williams aimed — fired her cannon — and the numbers in the record books tumbled — a total of six at final count!!

The former TWBA "Woman Bowler of the Year" and past SAWBA Superior Performane Award winner, surpassed the Class A All Events score of 1873, set by Beverly Pantuso in 1971. Liz posted a record all events Scratch score in Class A of 2013 for her nine games — a total that equates to a 223.6 average!

On her way to her record scratch all events, Liz also surpassed the record all events Handicap total of 2038, set by Mary McIntosh in November of 1983 when he first tournament handicap all events score was recognized. Liz's handicap total was a 2106 for her nine games.

Rolling off a 187 Yearbook average, Liz carded the Local Championship all-time high game when she swatted a 288 game in her singles play at Astro Bowl. Her 736 scratch singles score also outdistances the record set by Judi Brothers in November of 1975.

The singles total (games of 288 and two 224s) sets a new tournament record for Class A Singles, previously held by Laurie Jo Scales, a 666.

That 666 was broken twice during the 1986 event. Liz did it — and Mary Jane Calhoun, rolling off a 171 average, hammered out games of 249, 190 and 238

for a scratch 677 series. She is in second in the final unofficial standings in Class A singles, and second in handicap all events.

But there was more glory awaiting Liz. In her record setting 288 game, Liz went 101 pins over her entering average which will earn a WIBC award.

In her appearance in Class A Doubles she and partner, Shannon Bell, sizzled in 1198 for high scratch in that event! Shannon had games of 185, 187 and 173 for 545 while Liz carded 230, 258 and 165 for 653. The duo received 64 pins handicap in

the division for a handicap total of 1262.

The scratch total was 37 pins shy of the all-time record held by Donna Wallace and Mary Falconer, a 1235.

To complete her tournament play, Liz had a scratch 624 in team event at Oak Hills for her first appearance on the Class B Pin Shakers team. Later, with the Ponderosa Bowl team, she even surpassed that score with a 632.

"This means more to me than almost anything in my bowling career," said the jovial U.S.A.A. employee. "I was on a championship team before (Monarch Trophy #1 team which holds the all-time record with 2945) and I had a 711 team total which was exciting. But individually I've never bowled as well as I did Sunday."

"Since the birth of my daughter our priorities have been a little different. Misty Leigh is now three years old, and I don't bowl as much (a new Monday Night Ponderosa Football league and Thursday Outcast league, also at Ponderosa Bowl) so my average has dropped a little. Fred (her husband) stopped bowling for about three months and came back with a 700 series when he first came back. So I guess

it was my time to do something," she said, flashing her dazzling smile.

Even though she holds the high game record for the tournament now, her 288 game just ties the high game for women in the city. Rita Luna on August 1st in the San Pedro Mixed Nuts league shot the identical score.

Liz's series score of 736, however, is the city high thus far in the season.

Liz is also a three-time Martha Washington Tournament champion. "I really like bowling at Oak Hills and Astro Bowl, even though I bowl my leagues at Ponderosa, which is closer to home," she concluded.

SAWBA's gift to the new champ is a paid entry into the Texas Bluebonnet (Queens Tournament in the Spring, as well as a bowling shirt proudly proclaiming her as SAWBA representative.

On the drawing board for the new champ, too, is completing her State Tournament entry form and competition will be in Austin.

Liz will be honored with all the other 1986 50th Anniversary Champions at the annual awards party scheduled for December 14 at Country Lanes.

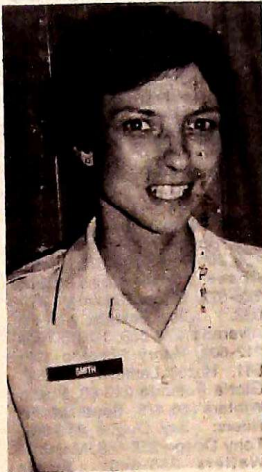
Her near-perfect game came at Wonder Bowl in the Tuesday Night Leftovers league, off her current league average of 151.

On the bowling side of her activities, Tip was TWBA Championship Tournament Doubles Champion, Class A in 1980.

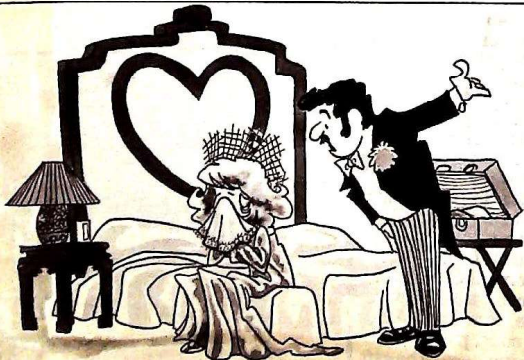
Tip has attended every Texas State Jamboree since its inception. Also, she has attended many National, State and local workshops.

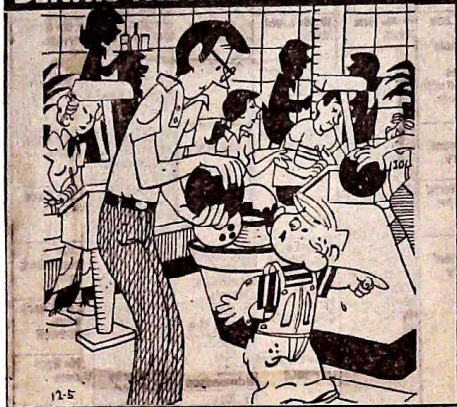

Tip and Gus are the first husband-wife team to be inducted into the local Hall, although the husband-wife duo of Mayselle (Bauman) and Willie Granieri have also been enshrined. Granieri was inducted posthumously in 1973 and Mayselle was inducted in 1980.

Bob Martin may be one of the most visible members of the bowling fraternity, when he solving league problems and checking lanes after award scores.

He started his career on the lanes at Hermann Sons Lanes at age 15, quit for three years, but returned in 1958.

He was assistant manager at Wonder Bowl in the years when Jim Coffman was manager and has been involved in the administrative end and management part of the game as well as excelling on the lanes.

He is a Texas State Assn. doubles champion, winning his title in 1964 with partner Stan Turek, when the duo shot a 1358 scratch total, a record at the time. This past year he shared the Singles

Class A title, after swatting a 703 series in the second half of the event, following the roof collapse at Don Carter's Lanes during the devastating storm in Dallas.

Bob has been a member of the local men's Board since 1972, was president during the 1979-80 season, and assumed the secretary's post in 1981. He was honored with Life Member status earlier this year.

For 25 years he has been in the field in the great ABC tournament and this year received his 25-Year Participation plaque. He has also attended half a dozen ABC conventions.

Bob was tournament manager of the City Match Games for several years, and was instrumental in the format for the City Match Game Singles sponsored by the association. Additionally he was league secretary of the Travel League from 1969 until 1981, and had been a member of the league since 1959. For many years Bob was also the secretary of the men's Commercial League at Wonder Bowl, where he now operates, with Stan Schöenfeld, the pro shop and bowling supply.

Since taking office as SABA secretary he has streamlined some office operations and has been a dedicated association worker on committees such as the Sponsor's Picnic, Yearbook and local tournament, and was coordinator when SABA was host to the TSBA Championships a few years ago.

Both Bob and Tip have held and attended numerous Workshops and attended the state Jamborees, Tip since the workshops were initiated.

In making the Board's selection known to the Council on Monday evening, Council President Ed Crabb noted Hall of Fame honor for these two dedicated bowling officials will be applauded throughout the city and state because of their dedication to the game and because of their years of service to the bowling family.

Serving on this year's Hall of Fame Selection Board were chairman Sylvia Broyles, past inductees Helen Baetz, Myrt DeFily and Madelyn Spreng, plus Lew Levinson, Bob Harris, Norby Peshorn and Gus Pfeiffer. Representing the Council were President Crabb, Bob Freehauf, Betty Holzmann and John Jones.

Plans are now being finalized for the Hall of Fame banquet and tickets for Tip's and Bob's many friends will be available shortly, priced at \$15.

The evening's menu will include lettuce wedge with choice of dressing, 8 oz. Prime Rib au jus, 1/2 stuffed baked potato, asparagus with Hollandaise Sauce, rolls, biscuits and butter, beverage and dessert. A social hour with cash bar will be open at 6:30 with dinner to be served at 7:30 p.m. followed by the presentation of the candidates.

Those presenting the

candidates for induction have not been named, however, the Master of Ceremonies for the evening will be George McKenzie, KMOL-TV's handsome and talented sports director, who noted, "Diane and I look forward to sharing such a special evening with some of the city's greatest people, the bowlers."

Tip and Bob become the 44th and 45th members to be honored with Hall of Fame induction.

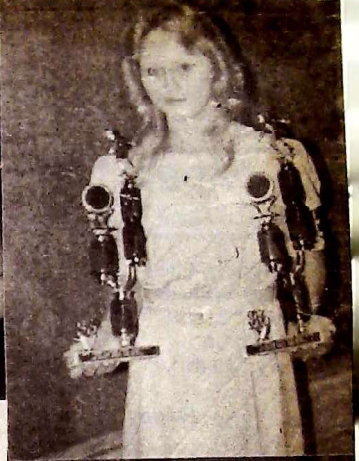

Past SAWBA President Dies This Week Doris Turner - 1917-1987

Doris Turner, a name almost forgotten as women bowlers go about the business of the present day, died this week from kidney failure complicated by pneumonia.

This jovial fun-loving lady should not be easily forgotten by the current women bowlers as she was one of the pioneers of the game.

Usually when we think of "pioneers" we think of the days of Billy Simon, Clara Grasso, Helen Baetz and numerous others who paved the way for ladies on the bowling lanes.

Doris' career didn't go back quite that far. She and her husband, Pete, started their careers at Woodlawn Lanes where Doris was employed after 15 years with

the Bowman's Beauty Shop. She continued her work with Hall of Famer Lew Levinson at Austin Highway Lanes (now Astro Bowling Center) before working for nearly a decade at Wonder Bowl, serving as manager before her retirement.

Doris was elected President of the San Antonio Women's Bowling Assn. in 1948 when Alice Iltis, also a Hall of Famer, was President, and she served in that capacity for three years.

Doris was an organizer and a motivator. One of her first acts as President was to call together directors from the 22 bowling leagues to conduct association business. She initiated a regular schedule for SAWBA Board Meetings. It was she who suggested a stagger system

for electing the association President and Secretary on alternate years, a policy followed today.

It was Doris who initiated the printed sheet entitled, "Duties of a League President", and as league officials followed the pattern outlined, more efficiently running leagues and increased membership followed. By the end of her first year those 22 leagues had grown to 66 and SAWBA membership grew to over 1,200.

Doris, too, was the first to realize the value of publicity for women bowlers. She appointed SAWBA's first publicity chairman and directed several fund raising projects to enable the association to host the

TWBA Championships for the 4th time in the 1951-52 season.

Later when SAWBA was making plans to host the 1968 WIBC Tournament at Wonder Bowl, the families of the Bowmans and Turners were written up in WIBC's *Woman Bowler* magazine as an example of "bowling as a family game." The article featured Doris' duties as league coordinator at Wonder Bowl where the 1968 event was to be held, with the all-bowling family of Rose Turner, then 83, her daughter Kay Bowman, grandson, Frank "Bubba" Bowman, Bubba's wife, Diane, and their daughter, Shellie, then 15.

Quoting the article, "A family devoted to and linked by bowling, the Turners and Bowmans demonstrate that you're never too old or too young for tenpins and that bowling is truly America's favorite family participation sport."

During her years as a center employee Doris was an able and efficient junior bowling instructor, as well.

As the clergyman noted during her final services last Tuesday, Doris loved and

lived life to the fullest, and her love of our sport, fishing, hunting, bridge, playing dominos made her a very social person - and a person whose happy outlook brought others to her side.

Sincerest condolences are extended to the family: her loving Pete, Colonel and Mrs. George H. Bowman, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bowman, Col. and Mrs. Keith Bender and numerous beloved nieces and nephews.

Those who wish may make a memorial donation to the American Heart Association in memory of bowling's special friend.

Certainly this life, and this bowling game, benefitted because Doris Turner was a great part of it. Those who had the privilege of knowing her and working with her, knew that she brought a great deal of love and dedication into our bowling lives. Those with whom she came in contact realized her greatness, and remember now how much she gave to the tenpin sport and to the women particularly who participated in it.

Doris Turner will be lovingly remembered.

The Roving Bowler

"Bowling center proprietors tend to take their bowlers, and especially their league bowlers, for granted."

"Bowling centers are making a ton of money on league bowlers...and they still continue to raise lane fees."

"When I come to my bowling center on league nights I expect to find everything in order and ready for me. I don't like to be kept waiting..."

"They should hire more help..."

"The equipment is worn out..."



If these condensed comments sound familiar to you, then you can begin to understand the on-going conflict between customers and management at most San Antonio bowling houses.

As a relative newcomer to the country's most unique sports/recreation activity, the arguments seem valid on both sides; as customers we expect certain responses for our money while proprietors, on the other hand, expect a certain amount of understanding from their customers.

Who is right and who is wrong? Perhaps it depends on our perception of bowling. Is bowling a one-way street where customers are always right, regardless, or is bowling really an unique activity requiring a partnership mentality that compels both customer and proprietor to work together?

If league bowlers regard management as a servant to their slightest whims then it is probable that bowling as a family recreation is heading down the short road to extinction. On the other hand, if we regard bowling as a preferred form of recreation for ourselves and/or our families, perhaps it would serve everyone's best interest to accept bowling's problems as our own.

It appears that most of league bowling's problems are self made. Not all, by any means, but enough that should cause members to reflect a moment. It may just be that our expectations are too great. Perhaps if we took a moment to look at our particular peeve from the other side of the aisle, it might help to put the problem in a better perspective.

Look at it this way; proprietors need league business in order to keep the house open...and we bowlers need bowling houses open in which to play our favorite game/sport. It appears there should be room for cooperation and understanding on the part of bowlers if bowling is to remain a profitable business and continue to fulfill our needs as bowlers.

That doesn't mean, however, that as customers we should tolerate abuses. If management perceives their customers as a patsy willing to roll over and play dead without a whimper, then it may be time to move on to another house or take up miniature golf.

Sixty one bowlers participated in handicap and scratch cash award events during the tournament

In the handicap division, Cindy La Duke, daughter of bowling proprietor 'Duke' La Duke, took home first place prize of \$168 with a high 1467, six game total. She also received an additional \$10 in prize money for rolling a high six game scratch total of 1299.

Second place money, \$125, went to Rocky Boubel with a 1395 total. Third place, \$100, was taken by Linda Hathaway who shot a 1386 total in her first winning tournament.

In fourth place and winning \$75 for her efforts was Emma Howard with a 1333. Fifth place and \$60 went to Nancy Echols with a 1320 total.

A newcomer to the San Antonio lanes, Pauline Lupo, placed sixth with a 1319 total and took home \$60 in cash. Dzan Creech took seventh and \$40 with 1313 pins; Oli Fuller, eighth place and \$35 with 1303 pins and finishing ninth was SAWBA director, Patti Hines who pocketed \$25.75 with her 1280 total pins.

In the scratch division, considered by some as a preview of the upcoming Bluebonnet Queens Tournament to be held next month in Grand Prairie, Rocky Boubel picked up \$75 in first place money after a face off against Cindy La Duke, Pauline Lupo, Shannon Bell, Patti Hines and former Holland native Grace Richardson.

Cindy opened with a Turkey and took the win from Shannon 189-169, when Shannon failed to punch out in the tenth.

Grace hammered out a high game of the second match, tossing a 232 at Patti, who opened in the tenth for a 174.

Even though she lost her next match, Pauline held onto her lead at plus 67, with grace moving into the runnerup slot at plus-61.

In spite of facing the Big Four split in the 8th, Pauline grabbed a win from Cindy 196-179, while Grace lost her match to Shannon 216-185, and Rocky annexed more bonus points with a win over Patti, 201-168.

Going into the third game, Pauline held onto the lead and increased it with a win ov, 196-179, while Rocky jumped into second with a win over Patti 203-174 while Grace dropped into third even though she lost the match to Shannon 216-185.

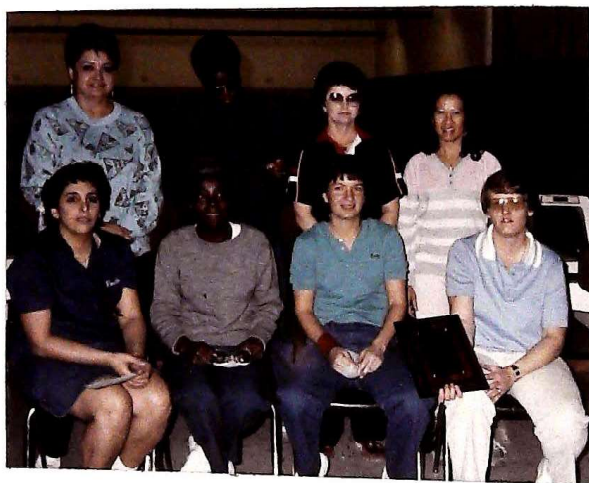
In addition to her \$75 first place prize check for the finals win, Rocky earned \$125 as runnerup in the handicap division.

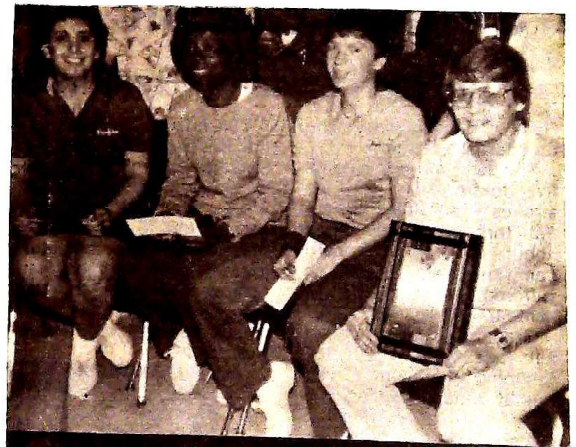

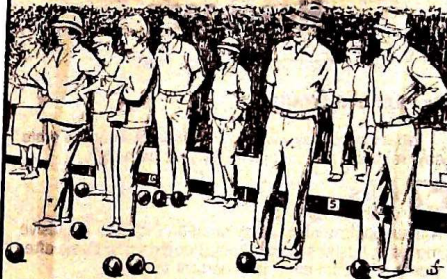

Sylvia has been involved with the San Antonio Bowling Council and the Hall of Fame since it was initiated in 1970. She was secretary for four years, served as President of the

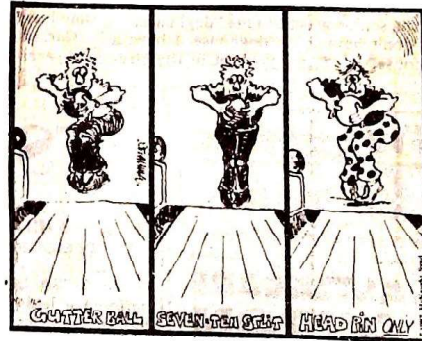
Council from 1979 to 1981, and was inducted into the Hall in 1978.

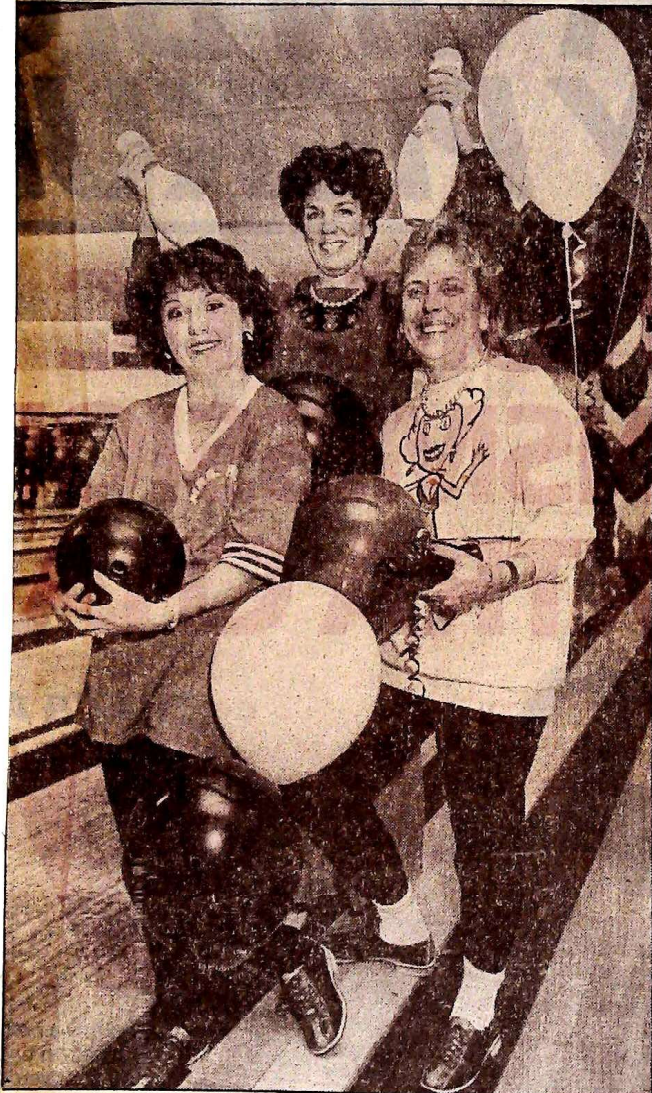

Tip to the standing ovation from the banquet guests.

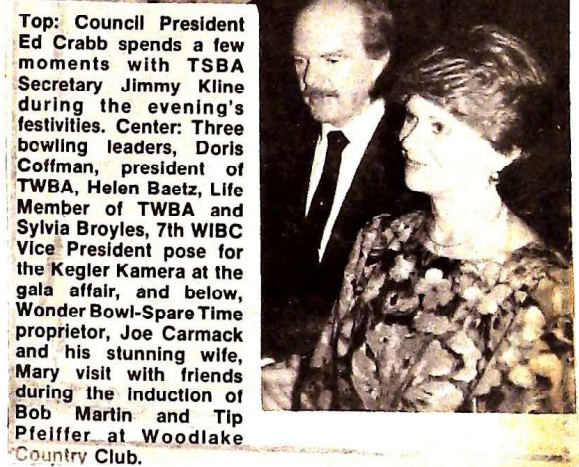
"All that I have done in bowling has been a pleasure and none of it could have been possible without Gus' support," and at this point her voice broke as the full impact of the honor overcame her.

Final Frame Jim Flanner-1919-1987

Years before this publication was in existence James Edward "Jim" Flanner, Sr., was an avid bowling watcher and supporter of the game and its participants.

His death left something that not even death can take away.

There's not one non-bowler in this city who was more on top of the game and more knowledgeable of the activities than Jim. He couldn't participate himself because of injuries suffered years ago in the war years, and his mode of transportation to various events were a specially equipped car and a pair of crutches. But if you waited for a complaint from this man, one never came.

Jim had a tremendous vitality and a sense of kindness that drew people to his side. He was often a scorekeeper giving countless hours of his time. When he kept score on a pair each received a consoling word and encouragement for a

better game to come, and outstanding achievements drew a warm handshake from Jim.

Jim's children, Barbie Tarr, James Jr. and Brian Flanner all were bowlers, and Jim proudly told of their accomplishments.

Another bowler came into the Flanner clan when Jim married his beloved, Bennie, and the family grew by three, John Whitlock, Rebecca Robinson and Frankie Leigh Whitlock, Bennie's children. Jim embraced them all as if they were his own. Later there were four children and Jim became the proud and boastful 'grandpa'.

He was a remarkable study of courage, love and his eagerness to help anyone endeared him to all. Conversations with him around the lanes were lively, often argumentative but fair, and always up-beat. If he disliked anything on this earth it was wearing a tie, often telling Bennie, "If I have to wear a tie, I won't

go", but if it was important to her or the family, the tie was quickly added to his attire.

Small children, too, flocked to Jim because he loved to tease them, and they returned for lengthy stays because of his delightful sense of humor.

He was the perfect host to guests at his home and the walls of the Flanner home bulged with guests sharing the Flanner hospitality.

The bowling family suffered a great loss with the passing of Jim Flanner at age 68. His zest for living was diminished only as he fought a gallant battle against cancer. He was hospitalized in mid-December and died peacefully in his sleep on February 8th. Private graveside services and burial were Wednesday at Sunset Memorial Park.

The Kegler staff and the entire bowling family share the family's grief but the memory of Jim Flanner, his courage, and laughter will be with us forever.

Bay, Rocky Boubel, scratch champion of the SAWBA Singles Classic, Linda Bray, Shelley Buchholtz, Rosie Cook, Wanda Hannah, Patti Hines, Kathy Kirst, Cindy LaDuke, SAWBA Singles Handicap champ; Pauline Lupo, Anita Meloncon, Marcia McNabb, Mary Ann Shingledecker, Connie Smoot of Columbia Industries, Linda Stahl and Annie Webb.

Also in this year's field is the TWBA State Champion Lauren Kelly and Maxine Smith, who carded the state's highest average in TWBA for the 1985-86 season.

Competition for the two-day event will start Sat., Feb. 28 at 9 a.m. as contestants on Squad A roll their first four games of qualifying. The fast competition will continue through the day as Squad B bowls their first four games at 11:30, and final four games for each are scheduled for 2 p.m. (Squad A) and 4:30 p.m. (Squad B).

Texas reigns over 1987 Spotlight Awards

Four Texas Women's Bowling Associations prevailed in the 1987 WIBC Spotlight Award competition to give the state a "few yellow roses" to sing about.

The San Antonio, Amarillo, Temple and Bay City WBAs were on the leading edge from Texas. Joining the four honorees, however, were Billings (Mont.), and both the Missouri State and South Carolina WBAs.

All six will receive their Spotlight Awards at the 1987 Annual Meeting in Hartford, Conn., in April.

These awards are given by the Women's International Bowling Congress for the WBAs outstanding efforts during the 1985-86 season.

The local association competition is divided by membership size into five categories: 500 and under; 501-1,500; 1,501-3,000; 3,001-10,000 and 10,000 and over. The states are divided into two categories: 30,000 members and under; or 30,001 and up.

The Spotlight Awards were instituted in 1984 to acknowledge the achievements of associations and their contributions to the organization of sanctioned women's bowling.

A five-member panel at WIBC Headquarters in Greendale judged the 53 entries for the awards based on 15 classifications. The criteria includes service to membership, promotion, association tournaments, awards program, public relations and publicity, interaction with the bowling family, participation in civic affairs, delegates to annual

meetings, workshop attendance, establishment of policies and procedures, use of association service representatives, hall of fame, senior program, fulfillment of duties by officers, and format followed in submitting application.

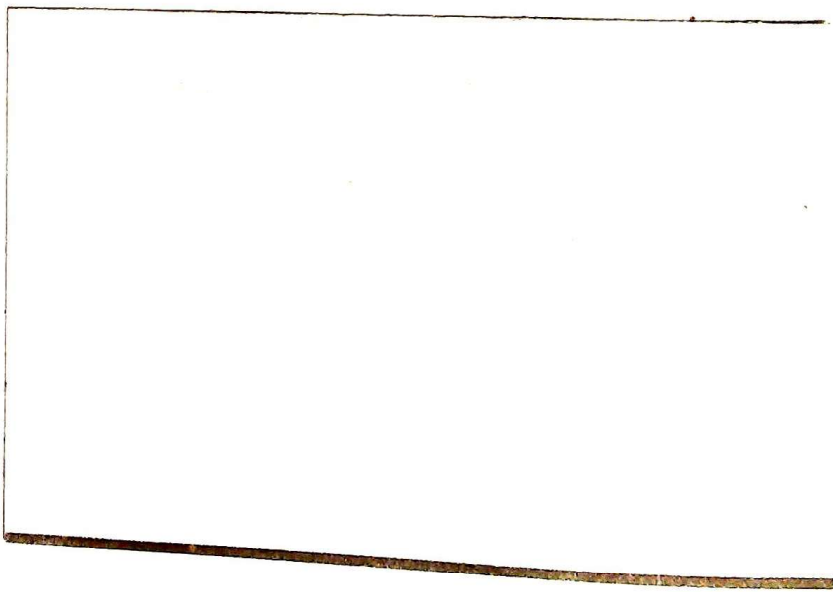
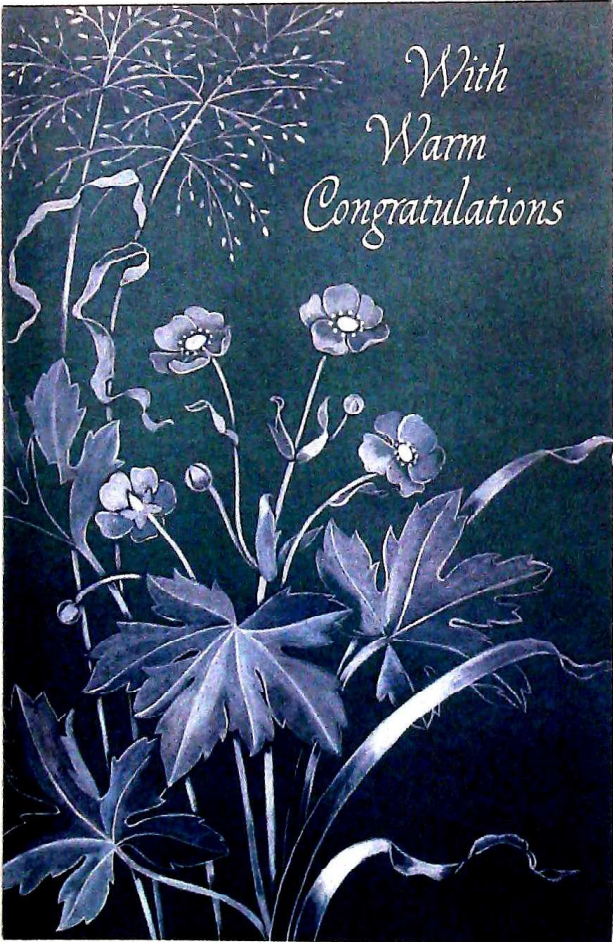
Most of the winning associations have entered and fallen short in previous Spotlight Award programs. Their improvement from other attempts, and perseverance, should be an inspiration to this year's applicants.

It was purely coincidental that many of the Texas associations received the Spotlight Awards this year. In fact, the midwest associations dominated last year.

All the associations showed an active interaction within the bowling family, by supporting the Young American Bowling Alliance (YABA), their local Bowling Proprietors Association (BPA), and the men's association.

All of the associations will arrange displays at the WIBC Annual Meeting registration area during delegate check-in. The displays will emphasize all their achievements.

 The local association competition is divided by membership size into five categories: 500 and under; 501-1,500; 1,501-3,000; 3,001-10,000 and 10,000 and over. The states are divided into two categories: 30,000 members and under; or 30,001 and up.
 The Spotlight Awards were instituted in 1984 to acknowledge the achievements of associations and their contributions to the organization of sanctioned women's bowling.
 A five-member panel at WIBC Headquarters in Greendale judged the 53 entries for the awards based on 15 classifications. The criteria includes service to membership, promotion, association tournaments, awards program, public relations and publicity, interaction with the bowling family, participation in civic affairs, delegates to annual
