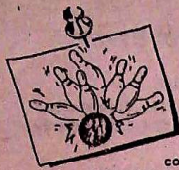

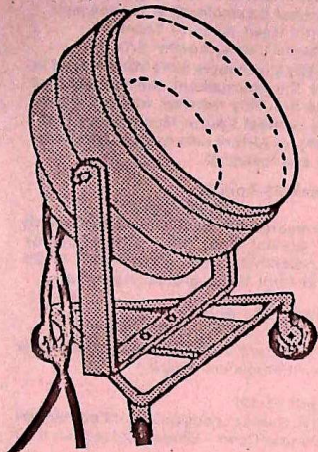

## SAWBA Selected For 1987 "Spotlight Award" by WIBC



After four years of "trying" success came to SAWBA and the association will be receiving the WIBC Spotlight Award in the 10,001 and up membership category!

The award will be presented by Mrs. Helen Baker, Cocoa Beach, Fla., the president of the WIBC on Tuesday, April 21st during the annual meeting in Hartford, Conn., and will be accepted on behalf of the entire SAWBA membership by president Ella O'Quinn.

The Spotlight Award is given annually to local women's associations after a 5-person panel reviews the presentations covering 14 different categories of service to the association membership.

Joining SAWBA in receiving WIBC recognition will be Bay City (500-under), Temple (500-1500) and Amarillo, Texas (2001-10,000). The 1501-3000 category award will go to Billings, Montana, and the two state association Spotlight Awards will be accepted by South Carolina and Missouri.

The local Spotlight Award Committee for SAWBA was chaired this year by Mary Williams, with committee members Helen Teller, Sande Koudelka, Dorris Tanner, Louise Mangelsdorf and Ella O'Quinn contributing ideas, reviewing and re-writing the previous presentations.

The SAWBA entry scored highest of all the other winners receiving 457 points out of a possible 500, and included 45 pages of documentation and exhibits.

SAWBA members will now begin the work on the formal display for the Annual Meeting during delegate registration. Members of the display committee will be Helen Teller, Sherilyn Crain, Anne Broyles, Gail Centu and Mangelsdorf and O'Quinn.

Previous Spotlight Award winners from Texas were Houston WBA and Austin WBA, and the Texas Women's Bowling Association last year in California.

### Annual Meeting And Election

Mrs. Lavonne Hodgson, WIBC 6th Vice President will be a special guest of honor at the SAWBA Annual Meeting scheduled for March 22 (1:00 p.m.) at the Sheraton Motor Inn, 1400 Austin Highway.

The Salina, Kansas WIBC official is better known to the ladies as "Bonnie" and her career on the Board of Directors began in 1967. She has been re-elected triennially until her appointment as Vice President.

Currently Bonnie is chairman of the WIBC Championship Tournament committee and additionally serves on the advisory and planning, finance and budget and Senior committees.

She became involved in bowling in 1942 and has held every office. After serving as president and secretary of the Salina WBA she has also served as president of the Kansas State WBA since 1967.

Many honors have come her way including membership in both the Salina and Kansas Halls of Fame. A 168-average bowler, Bonnie has several local and state WBA titles to her credit and she has competed in more than 25 WIBC championship tournaments.

At the SAWBA general membership meeting Bonnie will present a video presentation from WIBC, geared at the local association, and from all reports it not only is informational but highly humorous!

### Records Fall In 50th SAWBA Tournament

Your 50th Annual Local Tournament (Oak Hills & Astro Bowling Center) was featured record scoring!

It was a record-setting performance by former Superior Performance winner, Elizabeth Ann "Liz" Williams on closing day. Liz posted an all events total of 2,013 for her nine games, a record which stood since 1971.

She surpassed the previous Handicap All Events score with a 2106, annexed the Class A Doubles title with partner, Shannon Bell, and set a new Class A singles record of 736. Included in that series was a 288 game, tournament high, and for her 288 game earned WIBC honors for 100 pins over average.

During the 3-weekend run there were 268 teams, 553 sets of doubles, 1,106 singles and 1,039 entering optional all events.

Ladies rolling in team event again earned cash awards in the "Instant Cash" feature, and during the special NBHF/M feature at the doubles center, \$343.50 paid for going most pins over average, with a like amount donated to the Hall.

# Liz Williams Breaks City All-Time Series Record For Women !!

"That league bowls six games each session, and the first three games for me were terrible," said the very excited 30-year-old right-

hander, whose honors continue to mount.

"When I came to sub I told Fred jokingly that I thought I'd just shoot a 300 game about the fifth game. After those first three (550 series) I really just wanted to go home," she laughed.

"Then it was turnaround time. The first game of the second set was a 223, which was better. In the second game of that set everything started toppling. On the last ball of the game I pulled it through the nose, and left the ten pin for a 299---which I now call a 'high flush'" she chuckled.

The former Texas "Woman Bowler of the Year" (1982) closed out her series with a 225 game for a new record 757 series!

"I just can't believe this. I had been having a little trouble with my game using my Hammer (which she used Sunday), so I had a Black Knight (ball) drilled by Don (Jonietz). Monday

night in the Ponderosa Football league it worked - and I had a 702 series and it felt great, so I'll probably use that this weekend (Bluebonnet Queens tournament).

Liz is carrying a 205 average in the Football league at this point in the season and that 702 should raise that. But if Liz breaks that record, she'll be breaking her own record, since she carded a 209 in 1983-84.

"I didn't remember what Jan Goodwyn's high score was until now," said Liz, "But I remembered that I was close back in 1982 when I had a 752 and my 300 game."

"It's quite a thrill to break any record, especially one that has stood so long. I really am happy!" she concluded.

Liz just re-wrote the SAWBA Tournament record book last November when she surpassed the all-time

scratch all events total set in 1971 by Beverly Pantuso (1873) with a 2013 for her nine games; she toppled the handicap score record with 2106; set a new singles record of 736; and posted both the record scores for high game of 288 and the high series with 736.

Liz will be in the field at Grand Prairie this weekend shooting for a title she hasn't yet captured - the Bluebonnet Queens. In fact, the only San Antonio lady who has won the Queens is Beverly Pantuso, the lady from whom she acquired her city crown.

Turning back the pages of SAWBA history to 1973, the ladies were moving into a new association office on San Pedro; they were planning a new award to recognize the city's best performance on the lanes for the season; and word had been received that a new bowling center (Thunder Bowl) was to open.

That year - at Southside Lanes 14 years ago -- was also when the late Janet "Jan" Goodyn rolled games of 216, 259 and 279 for a 754 series -- an all-time three game record for women bowlers in the city.

Now in 1987, 14 years later, that record has toppled!

Last Sunday at Spare Time Lanes local SAWBA tournament champion Elizabeth Ann "Liz" Williams was asked to substitute on her husband, Fred's team in the Guys & Gals Traveling League -- and history was made.

# Patti Hines-Pam Barnes Win "Bring A Friend" Doubles Title

What a friend Patti Hines found in Pam Barnes!

The two teamed together in the San Antonio 600 Club "Bring A Friend" Doubles at Astro Bowling Center last weekend, and walked out with first place prize money of \$100.00 and the doubles title.

Patti, 176 average, is the club member with a wealth of 600 series to her credit, but Pam, who rolls off a 151 average, hasn't yet had her first 600 series in either tournament or league play.

The happy duo have bowled together in the St. Pius Ladies League for two seasons and Pam's highest game previous to this weekend was a 230 with a 580 career high series. She's currently rolling with a 155

league average, however.

Both are mothers of two sons and one daughter.

Pattie opened her play with a 217, while Pam added 211. In the second game Patti escalated to a 221, while Pam knocked off a 198. The third game could have sent them to oblivion, as Patti had just a 159, Pam a 163. But their scratch 1169, highest of the cashers, was good enough with their 175 pins handicap for a total 1344.

In second behind the leading ladies was the team of Christine Johnson (member) and her 'friend' Mamie Bennett who swatted 1085 scratch, 1323 handicap.

Christine was rolling off a

153 average and had games of 209, 200 and 203 for one of the two 600 series of the event, while partner, Mamie, had games of 175-139-160 off her 148 average. They received \$75.00 runnerup money.

Patti also teamed with non-member Debbie La Duke for third with the team swatting 1309. It was Patti's second consecutive 597 series.

The other 600 series of the tournament was by member Nina Fay Weber with games of 212, 200 and 200 off her 170 average.

The tournament high game was by Bonnie Van Steenburg with a 235 scratch game.

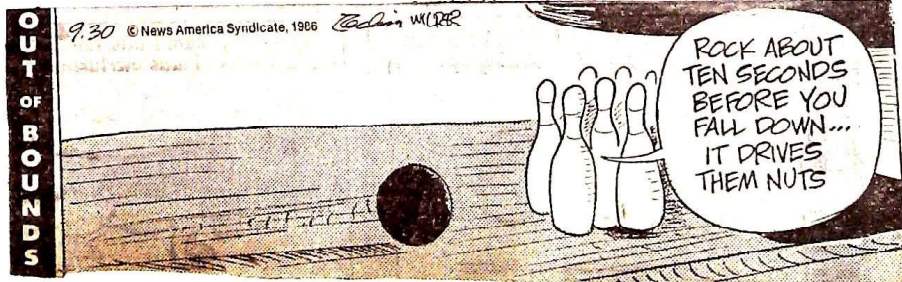

# Leila Wagner Wins Queens Crown By Just 7 Points !!

Bowling 'royalty' invaded Grand Prairie last weekend when TWBA staged its 18th annual Bluebonnet Queens tournament, and the spectators didn't curtsy to the 1987 Queen, they gave her a standing ovation at the conclusion of the ten games of match play in the finals.

Leila Wagner, the stunning airline flight attendant and professional bowling champion, who now resides in Fort Worth, rolled through the ten game finals of match play at a 215.9 clip, winning seven of her matches.

Wagner was in second after games 6 and 7, then faced San Antonio's Liz Williams in the 8th match, taking the win with a 211-179, to annex the 30 bonus points awarded for each win in the finals. In game nine Wagner shot to the top with a 227 game, plus 30 more bonus points, setting up the position round match against 3-time Queen and defending champion, Donna Dillon, Greenville.

Donna had also taken a win in the 9th match with a 222 game bringing her standings to plus-309 - 43 pins behind Leila.

In the first four frames of the championship match, Wagner doubles, spared, then struck again, while Dillon zipped in a four-bagger. Then came a 5th frame wash-out to stop Donna's string. She stayed clean the remainder of the game with a 8 and 9th double and a closing strike for the bonus points and a 223 game. But, in spite of a strike in the ninth and on the first balls in the tenth, Wagner lost the game with a 214, but gained the Queens crown by virtue of her 7-pin, in in total pinfall plus bonus!

Donna did everything but win back her title. She averaged 221.2 for her ten games of match play and set a new record for the 10-game finals of the Queens. Her 221.2 surpassed her previous record of 218.6 when she won her third Queens crown in 1986.

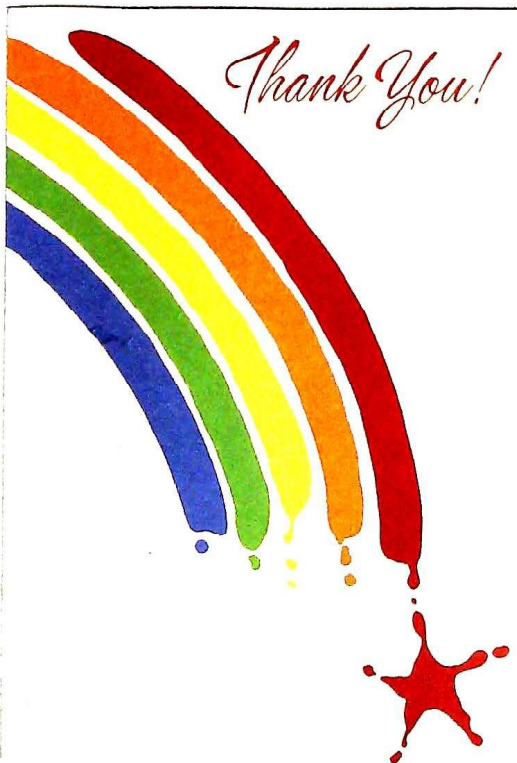

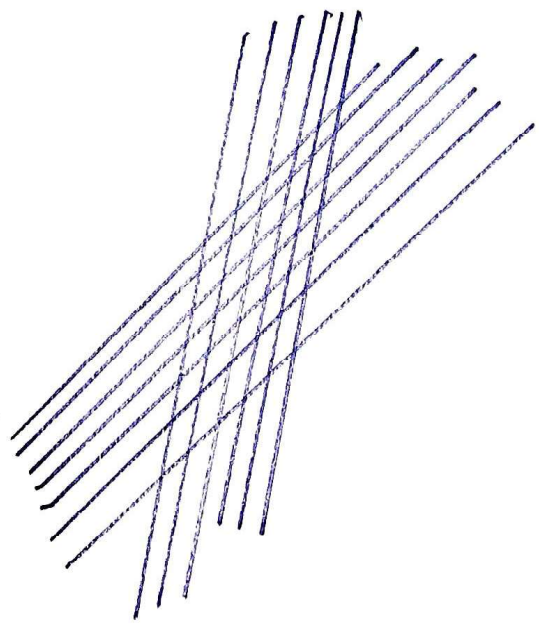

She tied her career high individual game during her 718 assault, since she previously had swatted a 266 game with a 657 series which was not turned in for WIBC recognition.

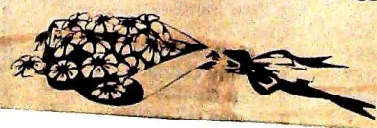

The women of the city worked smoothly through a 17-point agenda giving members an overview of the completed projects of the SAWBA and a glimpse of what's ahead in the coming months of the 1987-88 seasons.

With an informative and oftentimes amusing video presentation, WIBC 6th Vice President Lavonne "Bonnie" Hodgson, Salina, Kansas, encouraged members to tell others the WIBC story. She asked members to remember their first visit to a bowling center asking members to return that favor to others, and bring new women into our leagues.

She presented two special pins from WIBC to two

members - Bea Windsor who was the member in attendance with the longest seniority in WIBC, and the newest member, Gen Green (who joined her first league last September and already has carded her first 200 game in the Astro Senior league).

She extended warm

congratulations to the association on earning the WIBC Spotlight Award for 1987, an award to be presented at the annual meeting of WIBC next month.

Opening the membership meeting president Ella O'Quinn presented the gorgeous white satin banner for the speaker's podium. The banner, with the SAWBA logo in bright red with a gold fringe border, is a gift to the association from outgoing director, Clara Grimes. Grimes chose not to seek re-election as a director and her gift to SAWBA was for "fond memories of long hours worked together, most fun times and most enjoyable trips together."

President O'Quinn challenged the membership to begin making plans to enter teams and 'talking up' the 1988 TWBA Championship Tournament now, so that SAWBA can again give the women of Texas another memorable state tournament next year. Sites selected by the TWBA for the 1988 events are World of Sports (team event) and Astro Bowling Center (singles and doubles). She complimented the many women who have rolled award scores, won championships, and competed in several women's events which have brought recognition to the association.

TEAM USA chairman, Ruth James, reported 208 ladies participated in that segment of the tournament allowing SAWBA to send 22 ladies to future levels of

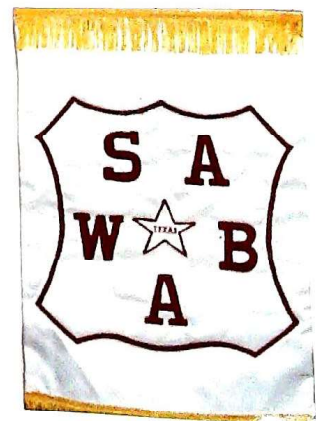
competition. The next step of competition in TEAM USA qualifying will also be held here (lanes to be selected at a later date), and one month later competition will be at Fort Worth.

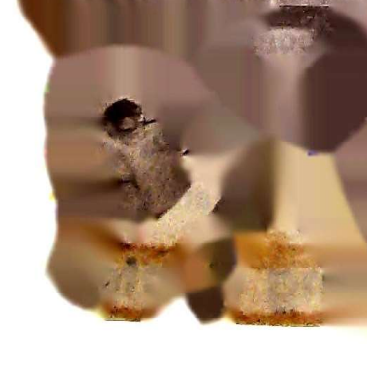

# Unanimously SAWBA Votes To Extend Bid For 1992 WIBC Events

The vote was unanimous by the 120 members attending the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association last week! SAWBA will pursue its bid to host the WIBC Annual Meeting and Championship Tournament for the year 1992 !!

The question was posed by SAWBA president Ella O'Quinn and WIBC 6th Vice President Sylvia Broyles, SAWBA member, and the members gave their unanimous approval to allow the Board to pursue the association's bid to

invite the women bowlers of the world to the city when WIBC will be celebrating its 75th anniversary of WIBC's founding.

"According to the list of requirements for a city to host the world's largest convention and tournament" said O'Quinn, "the local association would be required to field a minimum of 400 teams; provide 400-500 workers during the run of the national event; have a center with at least 60 lanes (or two centers with at least 32 lanes in one for team

events, and one 48-lane center (or more) for singles and doubles."

"Also available must be an auditorium large enough to comfortably handle 5,000 people, and during peak convention period (Thursday prior to the Annual Meeting until the following Thursday) hotel/motel accommodations to include almost 2,000 rooms," she added.

Assurances that these requirements could be met must be given to WIBC, together with commitments

from the City of funding to cover the cost of promoting the event and for the operation of the annual meeting, which means the waiver of the fee for the annual meeting site.

Receiving these assurances will be the goal of the association prior to July 1st when the formal bid must be at Bowling Headquarters.

San Antonio, as it did in 1968 when the WIBC was at Wonder Bowl, meets all the requirements, even with the enlargement of the size of the event since San Antonio

last was host. WIBC numbers tell the story:

"Upwards of 80,000 people will visit San Antonio -- visitors who would not otherwise be here," said Broyles.

"The totals compiled at Headquarters," she said, "are astounding. Surveys indicate that the average WIBC tournament attendee spends more than \$300 while in the host city. During the tournament 600-800 women arrive each day - each staying 3-4 days, many bringing their families."

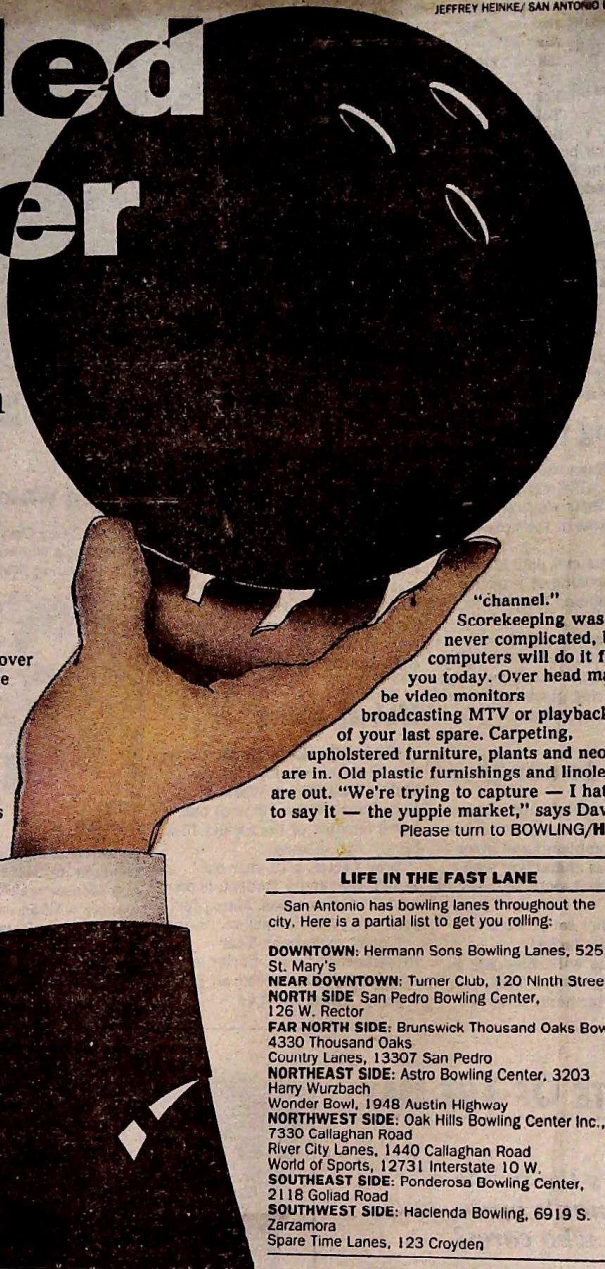
Upscale market catches on to the joy of ancient sport

Ronald Reagan did it often enough to be a cover subject of *Bowlers Journal* in 1946. Now, Bruce Springsteen does it. Kathleen Turner finds it relaxing. Slowly, the \$4 billion bowling industry, which had gotten less respect than Rodney Dangerfield, is now receiving its due.

About time, too, because bowling is perhaps 7,095 years older than pro football and centuries ahead of recreational jogging, today's upper-middle-class fetish. Not all that much has changed since the ancient Egyptians rolled out the sport, except that instead of nine pins there are now 10. You don't need an advanced degree to understand it, or a weightlifter's body to do it — beer drinkers assert that a little belly actually helps. Age is no barrier. And it can be a cheap outing.

Hoping to ride the wave of nostalgia for the cultural habits of the 1950s, owners of the country's 9,000 bowling centers have poured fortunes into marketing, image alterations and face lifts for their facilities, with startling results. Banished from the industry's vocabulary are alleys and gutters — heaven forbid that the wrong impression be gotten. In their place are the more genteel "center" and



"channel." Scorekeeping was never complicated, but computers will do it for you today. Over head may be video monitors broadcasting MTV or playbacks of your last spare. Carpeting, upholstered furniture, plants and neon are in. Old plastic furnishings and linoleum are out. "We're trying to capture — I hate to say it — the yuppie market," says David Please turn to BOWLING/H13

Zainea, 25, manager of Detroit's Garden Bowl, Michigan's oldest alley. "They like brass rails."

The industry's wider goal is to protect and enlarge a customer base bulging with 70 million participants, 9 million of them regular weekly league bowlers. As the sport got stiff competition in the 1980s from jogging, cycling and aerobics, participation dropped off. Only recently has there been an increase in casual, non-league bowling.

Some of bowling's newfound cachet is the result of an \$8 million advertising effort launched last year. The National Bowling Council signed Mary Lou

Retton, gold-medal Olympic gymnast, to tout the sport's virtues. Last year's effort was directed to "junior activity" — kids ages 6 to 14. For 1987-88, adults will be targeted. After some aggressive lobbying by the industry, bowling recently was made an exhibition sport for the 1988 Olympics in Seoul.

Efforts by the industry go far beyond mere image-making, though. Brunswick, the biggest operator of bowling centers and a manufacturer of bowling equipment, has built eight flashy new centers since mid-1983 in Sun-Belt cities and has four more under construction. You'll find ice-cream stands as well as

freshly baked chocolate-chip cookies and charcoal-broiled hamburgers at their new snack bars.

Independents are adding their own touches of class. At Little Tokyo Bowl, on the third floor of a sleek new shopping center in Los Angeles, the ultratrendy wait up to two hours to bowl and to eat Oriental and American dishes in the lounge. Bowling Green in Midwest City, Okla., has a pub, tearoom and billiard room. Centers that dim the lights and bring in a disc jockey on weekends for "Rock 'n' Bowl" nights have managed to convince young people that bowling can be an alternative to movies.

Ella O'Quinn happily accepted the gorgeous Spotlight for San Antonio, the more than 3,000 delegates gave the city a warm round of applause.

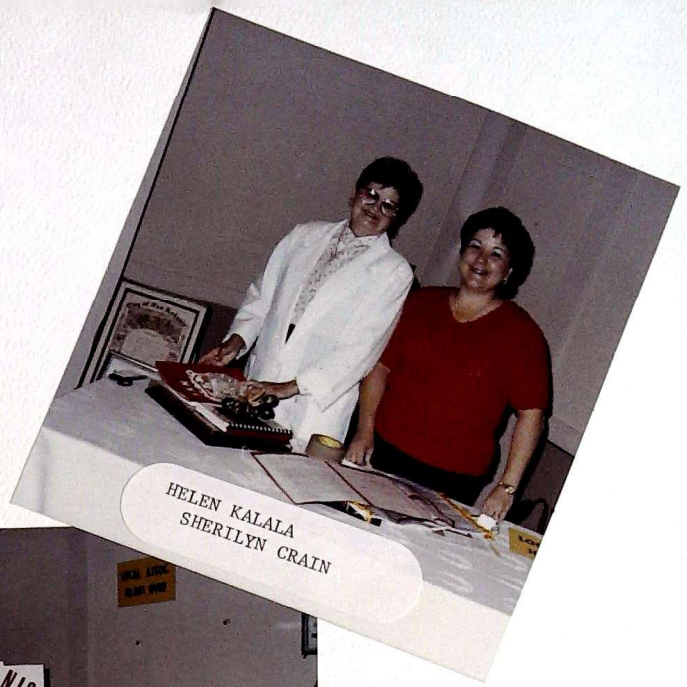

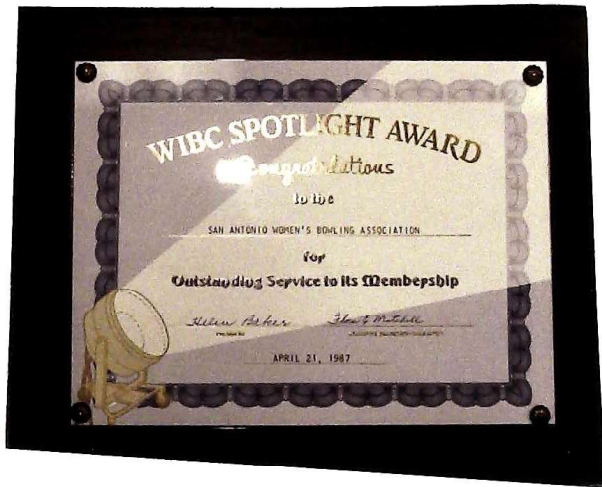

## Grace Richardson Shoots 300-773 For SAWBA All Time Series Record

### Brings 700 Total To Five For Season

What's the most valuable part of a bowler's body? His or her bowling hand, of course. Bowlers protect that part of the anatomy fiercely, but when a bowler has been bowling with no feeling in the bowling hand for months, it's not too devastating to be told that they have to switch hands.

That's the future ahead for pretty Grace Richardson who just swatted the first 300 game of the season by a woman, and in the process set a new all-time high series record for the San Antonio Women's Bowling Association.

Grace caught fire at Randolph Air Force Base lanes last Tuesday and blasted out a 773 series!

Her opening game was a 194 which is mid-way in her list of averages at Randolph (they range from 190 to 201). In the second game she started stringing the strikes, until a solid 10-pin stopped her bid for perfection in the 10th.

"That ball was right in the pocket" said the 29-year-old mother of three. "I really couldn't believe that the pin stood."

Without making any change in her line, Grace came into the third game feeling good — and after months of work in changing her entire game, principally because there was no feeling in her right hand, she hammered out her 300 game and the record series.

#### Number 5 This Season

What a year this lady has had! This record-busting score of 773 is the fifth in a string of series over the 700

mark. Grace has logged a 702, two 708s and 713, all since August 1st last year.

In addition to her averages at Randolph AFB, Grace also carries a 195 average at Ponderosa Bowl and a 183 at Astro Bowling Center.

The nerve damage in her right hand is irreversible so say the doctors attending Grace (damage from a fall), but the gutsy gal has made up her mind that when the right hand goes, she'll be ready. She's lifting weights and exercising the right hand so it'll last as long as possible, but is already doing a little practicing as a "lefty" to be ready for the switch.

"In fact," she says, "it shouldn't be too difficult to switch because I'm a natural-born left-hander."

Grace's husband, Chuck is also active on the Randolph lanes. He's a retired T/Sergeant and with Grace they have three children, Wesley 9, Dennis 6 and Melissa 3. Since Grace is a native of The Netherlands, she isn't eligible for

any TEAM USA events and making the first U. S. Olympic team, but that won't stop the highly-motivated and extremely courageous and determined righthander from setting a few records before she tries it from the other side of the lane.

#### Looking Back

It took 14 years for a lady to break the city all-time high series record set by the late Jan Goodwyn, and unbelievably her record score has been broken twice just this season.

Just after re-writing the SAWBA tournament record book, Liz Williams sizzled in a 757 series in the Guys & Gals Traveling League to surpass Jan's 754 series. Now it's Grace with the record in her possession.

Only eight other local women have attained perfection. Myrt DeFily, who just became a great-grandmother last week, had the first 300 in 1958, followed by Dottie Overstreet in 1962, Shirley Mansfield in 1967, Bettie Jo Geisler in 1973, Rita Dalton in 1981, Liz Smith Williams in 1982, Deborah Lauzon in 1983 and Diann Heckman in 1985.

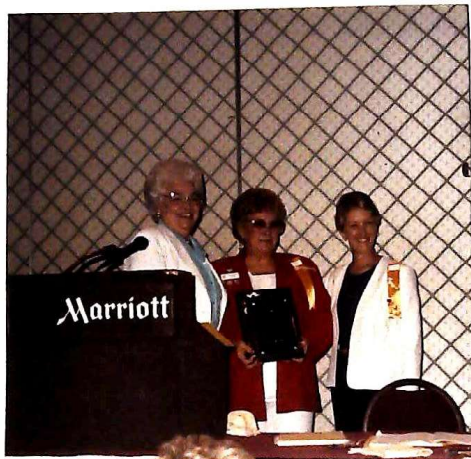

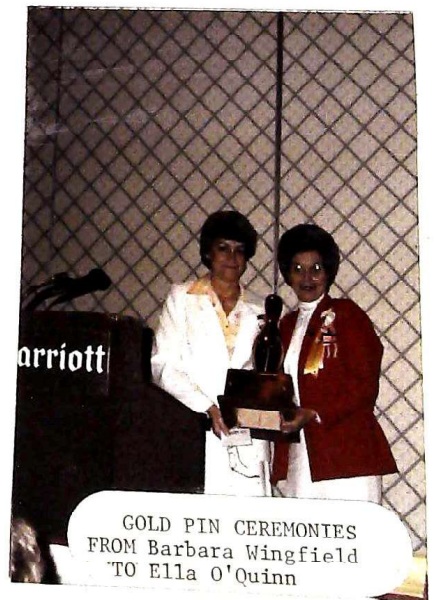

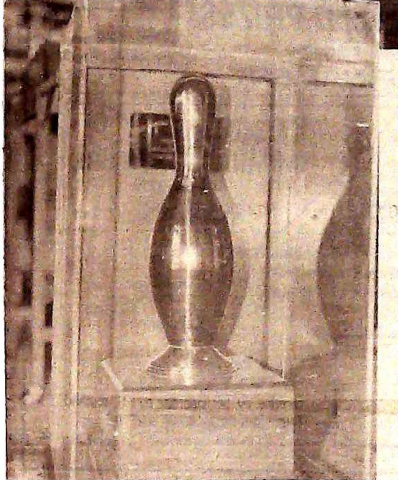

Shelley Buchholtz fired a shot heard around the city this week and that same shot may be heard around the state as this 1986087 season comes to an end!

Rolling in the Sto-Pokes league last Friday night the jinning right hander out games of 298, and 240 for a gargantuan 791 series -- a new record for the city and at esstime the high for the ate's women bowlers.

Shelley's salvo came just 7 days after Grace on set a new men's city record at AFB with a 300

game and a 773 series.

Two days earlier Patti Hines swatted the second perfect game of the season for the city's women, and only the 6-10 on her final ball robbed Shelley of perfection.

Shelley, 29, was rolling off a 191 league average and to listen to her describe her night meant watching a lot of hand-waving as she talked, a lot of bubbly put-downs of her own abilities, and a lot of words of praise for her husband, Pokey, and ball driller, Don Jonietz of the Ponderosa Bowl Pro Shop.



"It wasn't like when I called Pokey in tears when I shot my first 700 series. When I finished the first game I called him at home and said guess who just shot a 298. I was happy but not hysterical," she said.

"The night started out really good. I was in the pocket every shot until the 9th frame when I tugged the ball, but it carried. On the first ball, in the tenth, I tugged it again, but carried. Only the 11th was good then I pulled it really bad in the 12th and left the 6-10. But I just kept telling myself,

that's okay, just have a good series," said the former league co-ordinator who now is the snackbar employee.

The 791 series is a career high since beginning her career about eight years ago.

"We've been so worried about Pokey's dad, (ill with cancer) that I really haven't felt like bowling. In fact, I had two 490 series the night before, so I guess this more than evens things out."

Shelley's been bowling in two leagues this season and subbing in two. Her first 700 series (a 733) was the highlight of her bowling career at that point--and it was a red letter day for the Bowling Buchholtz family. Pokey has to his credit an 813 series rolled in 1971, and son, Chad, 15, has had a 300 game this season (with a series near 750), and there's yet another Buchholtz on the horizon -- 11 year old Tammy.

Pokey and Shelley will be celebrating their 7th wedding anniversary on May 31st. "I guess it was an early anniversary gift from me to him," said Shelley. "He and Don have been so supportive of my bowling and I'm just sorry he wasn't here Friday night to see it. But there was a big tournament scheduled at Ponderosa and he had gone home to rest and be ready for a long weekend at the center." Pokey is the lane maintenance man at the center.

"When I came home he told me he was proud of me, and that if he had been there with me I would have shot a 900. That's just dreaming but it meant alot to me," she concluded.

Shelley's series was a landmark series for the San Antonio women. It marked the third time this season that the record of 754 set by Jan Goodwyn in 1973 has been broken. Liz Williams did it first in February with a 299-757 then Grace's 300-773, came earlier this month.

## SAWBA Board Votes To Delay Bid For WIBC Events Until 1993!

"We will have one entire year to line up sponsors and workers, and to be working

on our plans for a fantastic hospitality in Bismark-Mandan, North Dakota, than we would be if we dilute our forces and hurry a bid in Reno next year," she said.

"I have every confidence that our membership will agree and ratify our action at our Open Membership meeting in September, given all the facts of a hurried bid agreement. This way, too, we have an entire year to tell our story to the business and civic community before we pursue a venture of this magnitude," she added.

# Duke LaDuke Succumbs To Heart Attack

The diamond in the rough is gone. Lewis C. "Duke" LaDuke is gone and the loss suffered by the bowling family is a great one.

Duke died of a massive heart attack last Saturday morning at age 55, and friends and family said their farewells on Tuesday in a Memorial Service at Sunset Funeral Home.

Duke was many things to many people. Memories shared this past week among friends and family were numerous.

All agreed he had a special brand of greatness. He was impatient. Always with big dreams Duke had the ability to envision things a average man never saw. He had the tenacity to see that those dreams eventually became a reality.

He was stubborn as a mule at times. Loyal as the family pooch. Fun-loving as an over-active elementary boy, yet he worked harder and longer than most normal men.

Duke was certainly more than just a normal man. His dream was to make San Antonio a mecca to lure to the city some of the nation's greatest bowling events.

Many of his dreams meant "putting his money where his mouth was", as evidenced by the staging of the U. S. National Scratch Championships last year, and the staging of the past three Texas State Championships.

He craved bowling excitement--and that meant generating interest in all types of bowling competition, and making new friends for the game.

Duke was loyal and dedicated to the enjoyment of those who came through his center doors, and he had little patience with 'cry-babies', gripers or pessimists.

"Live life to the fullest and don't give up! Be yourself and don't live all your life in sadness." That was the LaDuke creed, and he lived it to the hilt!

Fiercely protective of his leisure time, Duke allowed himself plenty of time to pursue those hobbies which brought him to the outdoors -- hunting, fishing and skeet shooting.

The son of a Baptist minister with a loving mother and five sisters, one deceased, the man we know as "Duke" was more affectionately known by his family as "Junior". The southern Georgia qualities he brought to Texas were instilled early in his young life-- day-to-day fun with family and friends, and a marvelous outlook that spelled out "caring of others" -- every day of his life.

And a caring man he was. His daughters, Cindy, Sherry and Sandra, knew his strength. They knew they could always turn to him in time of need and support.

They knew too, that although he was opinionated, stern, solid in the belief of what was right and wrong, he was always ready to give a big bear hug and to

minimize their 'great and tragic' personal problems-- using a joke and a smile to ease the pain.

"He could build or repair anything," the daughters say. "but some of the greatest times with him at home were after some of his hunting trips, eating dove, quail or deer he hunted, or biting into some of the fish he'd proudly display after a trip. He was a great cook and shared recipes with his sisters or friends -- often getting or giving recipes via long distance. We loved him very much."

Duke's life took a dramatic turn last January when he married Debbie Davidson and became father to her young son, Buddy.

But it was inside the bowling family that Duke found his greatest glory. He has the respect of his fellow proprietors. Should a disaster strike at another center, the first call usually came from Duke -- if it was just for a loan of some parts to get the troubled center operational, or by the sending of Duke's own staff to help with the problem. Duke was always there to help.

Years ago his fellow proprietors elected Duke as their association President and since that time he has remained involved at the state, regional and national level in the organizations.

Bowlers within his leagues enjoyed his easy going ways, his quick and ready wit, and the senior

very beginning. When active on the lanes he was a regular member and in later years as a concerned sponsor. Some of his happiest days were when the entire league was in his center for a visit. He enjoyed both the members and the officials and was on a first-name basis with many from throughout the giant league.

Duke also liked having the professionals visit. PBA regional players were guests at the center several times, and Duke was a genial host.

In the early years of the center there were Saturday night fun-events for bowlers. Halloween was a special party-time, complete with costumes and prizes and Duke loved it! Just-for-fun center events were numerous and each bore the special Duke-touch - he wanted everyone having a great time while bowling.

Among his interests too were the bowling pro shops he operated, the Electronics Center, and probably other

bowlers in the center virtually adored him. "I have to take care of those seniors. Not just because I like them all, but because mama (Mrs. Frances LaDuke of Georgia) would get me," he often joked. "Everytime she comes to visit she asks what I was doing to help the seniors, so we started the free bowling days to help out. She was pleased."

His life in the bowling family began in 1971 when he became partners with Joe Carmack in the operation of Austin Highway Bowl, later to be known as Astro Bowling Center. With a dream of an even larger playground for the city's bowlers. As sole owner of the center then, Duke added eighteen more lanes and with his staff, has brought national and international prominence to the bowling game.

Duke became actively involved in the Traveling Classic Bowling Assn of America (TCBA) from the

ventures unknown to most. He was a man who liked to make things happen, and he rushed through this life at a fast pace.

Exceedingly proud of the staff he amassed, he often would call himself the 'janitor' when someone complimented him on the operation of a special event, but the pride was there.

A gracious and generous host he loved to be surrounded by people, so the minister on Tuesday summed it up best. "it's not the length of life, but the quality of a life," that matters.

Maybe Duke stepped on some toes as he went head-long life's highway, but everyone knew exactly where he stood. Time never changed him. He was Duke today - your friend. And, he was Duke yesterday and tomorrow - and still your friend.

He loved a good argument. He loved a good joke. He loved to lift a few with the

boys' and he loved swapping tales. He was a tease, a charmer when the ladies were around, and a no-nonsense worker. At the construction site of some of the marvelous LaDuke Contruction homes-he was there working long before most were out of their beds.

The respect he earned was evident as the floral offerings were brought to the funeral home at his passing. Death came far too early.

As we share this sad time with his daughters, his wife and son, the four sisters, Hazel White, Mary Francis Duncan, Betty Davidson and Grace Richards, and his beautiful 82 year old mother, Frances, we remember the words of Dr. William Love, who conducted the final Memorial Service: "Take a moment in your own way to thank the Lord for the pleasure and privilege of sharing time with Duke LaDuke."

And indeed we do.

## 'State Mixed' Comes To S.A. In October

While the SAWBA/SABA City Mixed Tournament is underway it seems an appropriate time to remind all the city's bowlers of the Texas State Bowling Council 5th Annual Texas State Mixed Tournament.

The event this year will be right here in San Antonio with team event scheduled at Wonder Bowl with its new Pathfinder Lanes, and singles and doubles at Astro Bowling Center.

There are ample squad times to fit any bowler's schedule after the event opens October 10th, running throughout October and the first two weekends in November.

The handicap event features two classes depending on the team or bowler's average (Class A 171 and up for men and 161 and up for women). Teams will be four-member with

This is the first time the State Mixed tournament has been in our city, however the local Bowling Council has worked with the Texas State Bowling Council in the staging of State Jamboree (this year in McAllen, Oct. 7-8) and the State Senior Mixed Tournament (this year in Amarillo in late August).

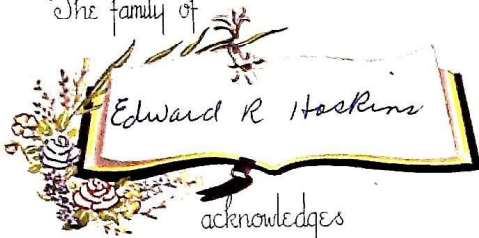

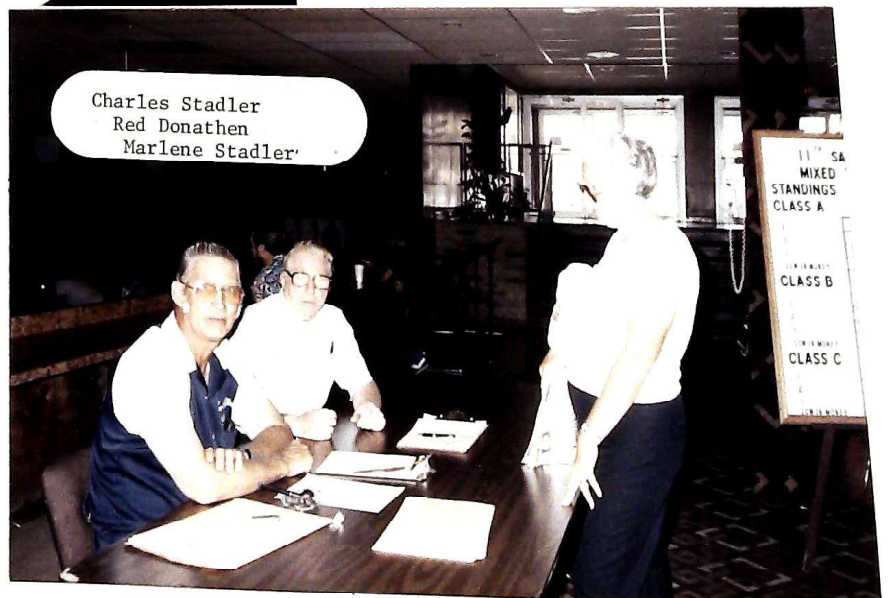

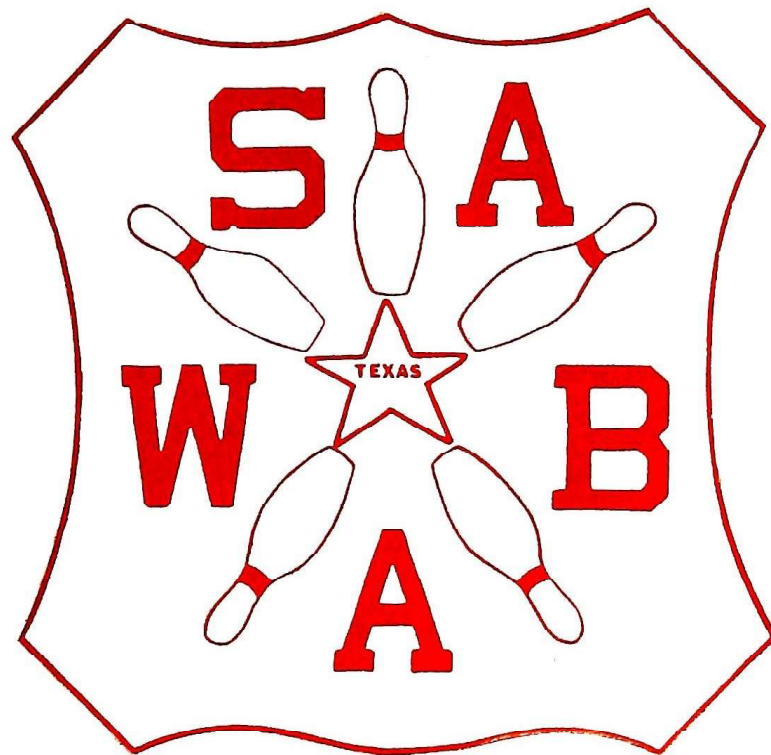

The Workshops are open to any bowlers interested in more efficiently conducted leagues, but primarily are for league officers to learn of the many rules changes for the new season.

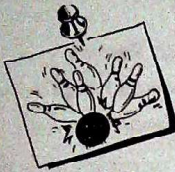

## Seniors Head To Amarillo For State Senior Mixed

The senior bowling family from across the state of Texas will meet at Amarillo Bowl in Amarillo to compete in the 7th annual Texs State Senior Mixed Tournament, this weekend and next.

This year's event drew an entry of 200 teams, and 783 singles (357 in the men's division and 426 in the women's division) according to tournament director Mary Elizabeth Pfeiffer.

Participants will be competing for a total prize fund of \$7,804.25, and in addition will be qualifyig for the National Senior Championships in Jacksonville, Fla. in 1988.

Teams are composed of four members, and must have at least one man or one woman. Singles event has two divisions - Men and Women, while All Events classification is according to age in each division (Men and Women), as follows: Class A-70 and over; Class B-65-69; Class C 60-64; Class D: 55-59. The tournament is handicapped 85% from 800 for team and 210 for all events and singles.

All events champions in each class and division will qualify for the opportunity to represent the State of Texas in the National Senior Championship Tournament to be held in May of 1988 on the ABC tournament lanes.

Competition begins with the team event bowling on the first squad on Saturday

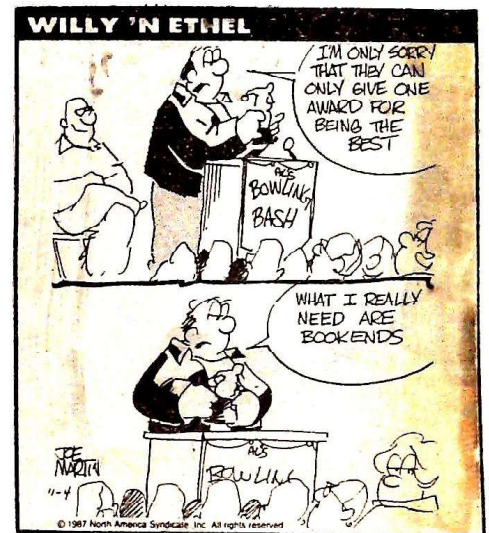
at 9 a.m. (followed by a singles squad at 11:30 a.m.). Tournament play continues with four squads each Saturday and Sunday during the two tournament weekends.

Holding down runnerup slots after the first weekend were Al Krueger (1315) and Myrtle Wheeler (1319) in the 65-69 age bracket; Kolodzie Harper (1271) in the 55-59 bracket; with Louise Wright holding down second place in the 70 and over category for women with 1265.

Zooming into third was the Top of the Hill foursome in team event with 2433; Louise Marx posted 1279 (age 65-69); Stephen Raby 1295 (60-64) and Rollin Recroft (55 thru 59) with 1276.

From the hoedown, the gunfire, to the quiet of an Austin office, to the fabulous explosion of color during the prairie fire scene, theatre

goers were treated to breathtaking singing and dancing.

Almost 2 million visitors have viewed the play since its beginning in 1966, and Saturday's final performance for the summer set the 2nd largest record - it was an SRO crowd. And as the audience literally cheered the performers at play's end, there were tears of sadness and joy in the eyes of the

cast as another season ended.

Only in Texas could you find hospitality such as the Seniors found in Amarillo.

At the lanes the Amarillo men's and women's association provided cakes each shift, coffee and tea and fresh fruit bowls. The executive vice president of "Texas" greeted every tour bus thanking visitors for coming.

Even the weatherman gave the seniors a welcome -- on Saturday night the temperatures dropped to 57 degrees, and at departure time for our bus it was 55 degrees. Our genial driver from Texas Transportation Lines used the bus heater until the first coffee stop outside Amarillo.

Sunday night's dinner stop was at the Country Barn where riders found the most marvelous food in the world and it was 45 happy bus riders who returned to the motel for their final night in the Panhandle.

The SAWBA senior trip committee of Anne Broyles, chairman, Fay Staub, Connie Lamson, who had to miss the trip at the last minute, and Sharon

Schuman who helped with the planning, made certain that every moment was a fun-time for the seniors -- they played games, worked crossword puzzles, played cards, Scrabble, sang as the bus rolled along, stopped for ice cream and shopping and made two delicious Luby's lunch stops -- all without a single 'hitch'.

## Lindemann, Goodman state senior champs

Bud Lindemann of San Antonio and Edna Goodman of San Marcos gave the area a pair of titles in the Texas State Senior Mixed Tournament.

Lindemann won the all-events crown in Class A, for bowlers 70 years old and over. Goodman captured women's singles with a handicap score of 706.

The tournament wrapped up its second and final weekend of action last Sunday in Amarillo.

"I got a lucky break," Lindemann said. "Before the tournament, I had been bowling low scores. In Amarillo, however, the lanes worked for me."

"I don't know what happened," Schuman said. "I retired 12 pins in the wholesale refrigeration

business. "I finally found my spot in Amarillo. Especially in the last game I bowled; I had a 213 and that put me over the top."

"I've been bowling since I was a buck. However, I laid off for a long time when the kids were growing up. The kids are all gone now, so I started bowling again with my wife and other senior citizens about six years ago. We enjoy it a lot."

Lindemann has a composite average of 138 in leagues at Astro, Country and San Pedro lanes.

Tommye Standke of Lubbock took the all-events title for Class B, ages 65 to 69, with a 1,392. San Antonio's Daisy Wheeler and Louise Marx finished second and third, respectively, with scores of 1,319 and 1,278.

The only other area competitor to make the top three was Bill Ernst of Boerne, who finished third in Class C (55-59) all-events with a 1,316 total.

The Open Meeting is one of two general membership meetings. This one was special to Board members as they rewarded members for outstanding performances during the past season, recognized four their own board members and installed officers and directors.

Members elected by their peers to serve as officers and directors on the SAWBA Board were officially installed in their posts by WIBC 7th Vice President Sylvia Broyles who also has assumed the duties of State Secretary this season. Each officer and director eagerly accepted the responsibilities in the posts to which they were elected.

The Board turned the

tables on Sylvia, presenting her with a gift of a desk set for her new office. She was named 7th WIBC Vice President following the last annual meeting by WIBC President Helen Baker, and the delegates attending the TWBA annual meeting last spring in Austin elected her State Secretary upon the retirement of Lil Poole.

"Let's make beautiful music together," said president Ella O'Quinn as she invited all the membership to join in the work and joy of hosting the TWBA Championship Tournament beginning March 11th. Selected as the theme for the 1988 TWBA by the SAWBA Board is "The Magic of Music" and musical motifs will be used as all the committees begin their work.

In recognition of her winning the Wood Award for promotion of bowling through journalism, the Board also gifted President O'Quinn with a silver charm and a lovely framed photo of the presentation in Austin.

After the members applauded Liz Williams naming as SAWBA Superior Performance Award Winner for the previous season (see related story, page 1) the members also recognized two departing Board members for their contributions over a 10-year span.

Clara Grimes has served on the Board since 1972 and Mary Elizabeth Pfeiffer since 1974. Each was remembered with silver charm remembrances for their years of dedicated and productive service on the Board. Neither chose to serve another term, but both affirmed their willingness to help SAWBA in any way possible in the future.

SAWBA Secretary Louise Mangelsdorf reported membership at 12,490 for the 1986-87 season, a decrease of 773 over the previous season.

She advised that there will be no local tournament this year since SAWBA is hosting TWBA, but the centers selected to host the 1988 Tournament will be Wonder Bowl and Country Lanes.

Operating a bit over budget this past year, treasurer Helen Kalala advised that coverage was due to the costly move of the association office, various costs of utilities and telephone changes, plus the drop in membership.

In presenting the proposed budget for the coming year, which was adopted by the members, she advised that SAWBA will operate with a budget of \$33,125 based on 12,450 members for the coming season. Savings were realized after the board strength was

decreased to 18 directors; the delegates fees were pared to \$150 per person and the office hours of the secretary's assistant were cut to 400 per year. No dues increase was approved for this year for the members.

Legislatively first vice president Betty Holzmann reminded members that new rules adopted at the WIBC Annual Meeting are bracketed in the new rule books and should be reviewed by all presidents and secretaries of leagues. The members approved two legislative changes in the local Bylaws: the cutting to 18 from 20 the number of Directors, and a change in candidate eligibility requirements for officers of the association.

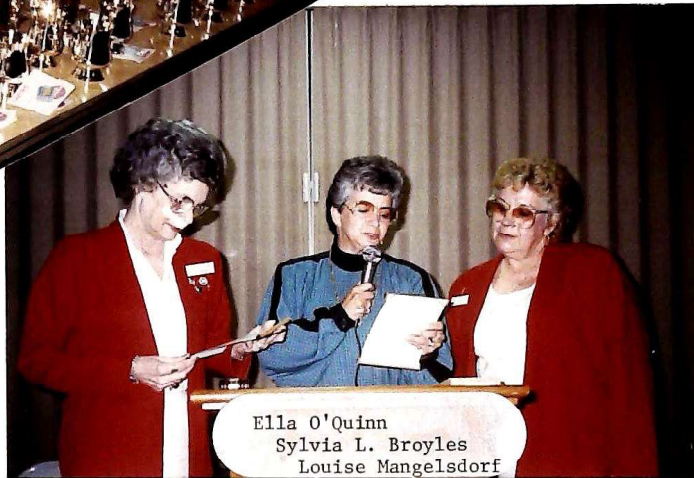
Corbett reading inspirational passages, the Service was highlighted by the absolutely gorgeous voice of Janice Haws who sang two hymns. Marion Moore

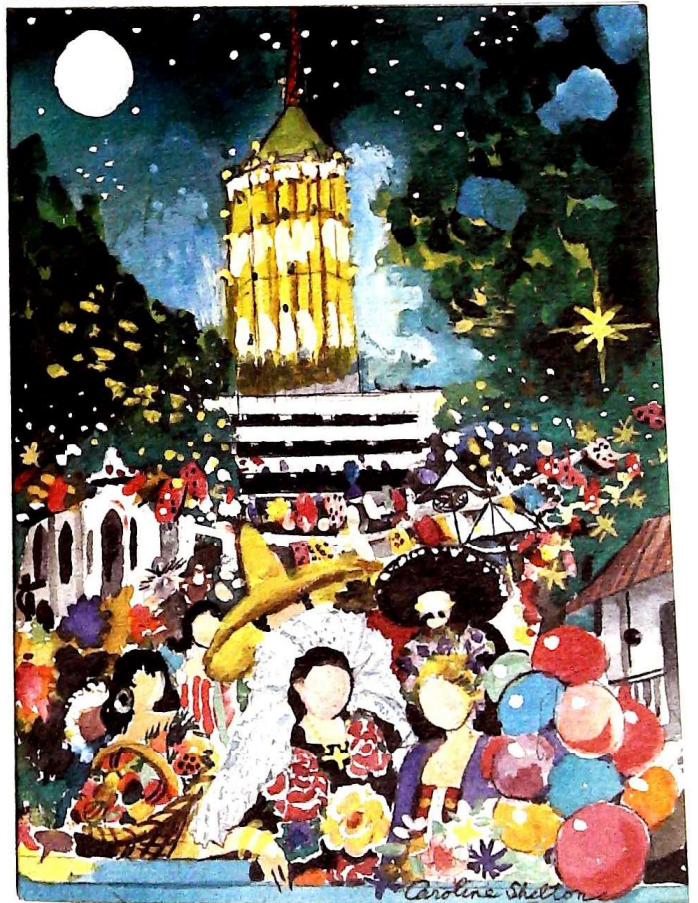
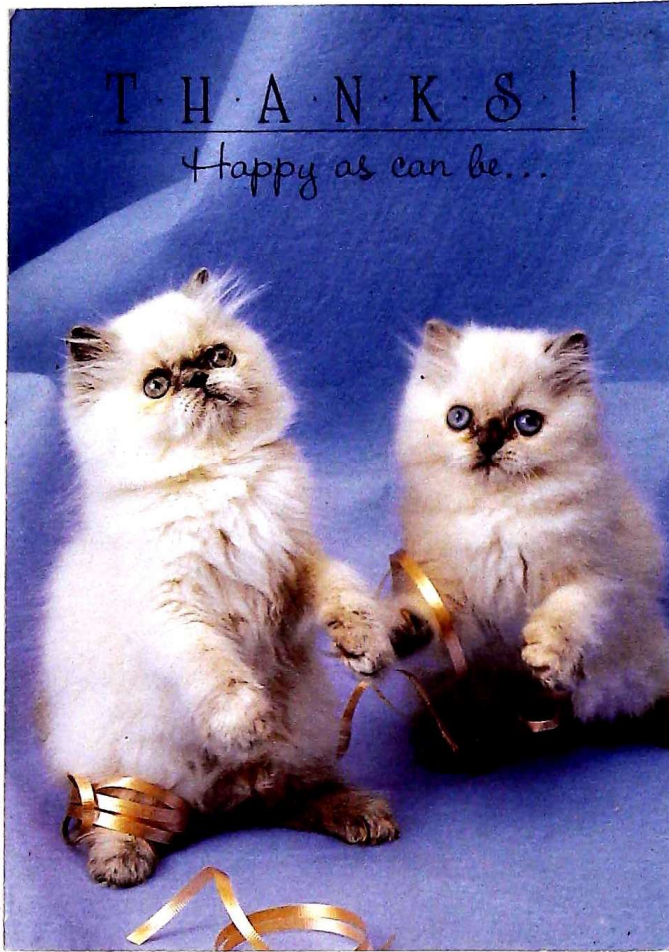

# Liz Williams Wins 2nd SAWBA Superior Performance Award!!

It should have come as no surprise that Elizabeth Ann "Liz" Williams would be named SAWBA Superior Performance Award winner again, even though several other ladies had outstanding season performances.

The SAWBA Board of Directors established a criteria for the selection of the recipient each year based on a point system.

Forty eight ladies of the SAWBA membership had averages over the 180 mark.

Liz bowled in four leagues this season ending with averages of 206, 190, 197 and 207 which earned her WIBC recognition for 200 or more average. She had 49 series over the 600 mark including nineteen in the 650-699 bracket.

Additionally she had seven series over the 700 mark -- 736, 701, 706, 702, 723 and two over 750, 750 and 757.

Her high game was rolled in a travel league where she was a sub. Her 757 series with this game was a city record over the previous 754, however was broken later in the season by Shelley Buchholtz with 791.

Liz was also a record buster in the SAWBA Local Championship Tournament with a record scratch score of 2013, plus a record handicap total of 2106. She and her partner won doubles, and she was awarded both the scratch and awards for Class A Singles for her record 736 series. In addition the 288 mentioned above was tournament high game.

During the season Liz also finished 9th in the Texas Bluebonnet Queens Tournament and twice was runnerup in the Ladies

Scratch Classic Singles.

Receiving bowling recognition is not new to Liz. She was the TWBA "Texas Woman Bowler of the Year" in 1983, was a member of the SAWBA first place Class A Team in 1983-84 which holds the scratch score record for the association. Liz also has to her credit a 300 game.

Her 207 average is the city's highest and she was rewarded for that accomplishment, and her high composite average was a 197.39.

Liz was unable to attend the SAWBA Open Membership Meeting Sunday to receive her multitude of awards, but they will be presented to her during league play -- but she has the CONGRATULATIONS of the entire bowling family on her outstanding accomplishments this past season.

The prestigious honor one of the highest the local women's association can give to one of its members was first given in the 1971-72 season. First recipient was Myrt DeFily. In the 1972-73 season Elfit Tomcyck was honored and for the next eight season, 1973-74 through 1980-81 Mary Falconer was the honoree. Donna Wallace was Superior Performance Award winner in 1981-82, then Liz Williams won it in 1982-83, after which Donna Wallace wore the crown for three season, 1983-86.
